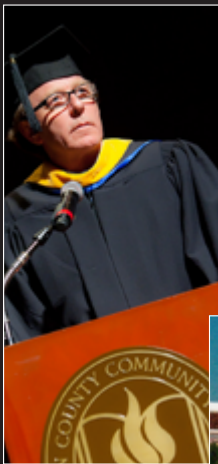

KORAL BOOTH SELECTED AS HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES STUDENT ALUMNI REPRESENTATIVE

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) alumna Koral Booth was sworn in as the Alumni Representative on the HCCC Board of Trustees at the virtual Board meeting on Tuesday, November 24, 2020. She was chosen for the position by HCCC students and will serve throughout the upcoming academic year.

"Koral exemplifies the determination, persistence, and generosity of our students," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. "Not only was she an excellent student, she was also a true leader – mentor, community activist, and one of the College's best spokespersons. This is a well-deserved honor."

Ms. Booth, who enrolled at HCCC as a 37-year-old mother of four school-age boys, earned her Associate of Arts (A.A.) in English degree in May. "It was a difficult decision to return to school because I was sacrificing being a full-time, stay-at-home mom. I wanted something better for myself and for my children. I went for testing, academic counseling, registration, and my first class all in the same day," she said.

During the course of her college studies, Ms. Booth lost her mother to cancer and her father to heart disease, but she remained focused on her goals, and immersed herself in college life. With support from her sons and her HCCC family, she made the Dean's List twice and became a role model for other non-traditional students. Ms. Booth started "The Later in Life Leaders" club for older HCCC students. As a Peer Leader, she mentored students, and provided assistance in the HCCC Enrollment, Student Life and Leadership, and the Center for Academic and Student Success departments. As an Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) English tutor, she helped students hone their writing skills.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE PRESIDENT'S ADVISORY COUNCIL ON DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION IS THE FOCUS OF NEW PODCAST



The most recent segment of the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) "Out of the Box" podcast spotlights the College's President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI). The podcast may be viewed at <http://www.hccc.edu/outofthebox/PACDEI/>.

In the new "Out of the Box" segment, HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber is joined by PACDEI Co-Chairs Yeurys Pujols, HCCC Executive Director of the North Hudson Campus, and Lilisa Williams, HCCC Director of Faculty and Staff Development. Their discussion details the inception of PACDEI, and its impact on the HCCC community, the greater Hudson County community, and other higher education institutions.

Located in one of the most ethnically diverse areas of the United States, Hudson County Community College students were born in 119 countries and speak 29 different languages. The College has been recognized with national awards for achieving equity in its educational programs and services – and in the administration and delivery of those programs and services – including the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) 2015 Award of Excellence for Advancing Diversity, and the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) 2016 Northeast Regional

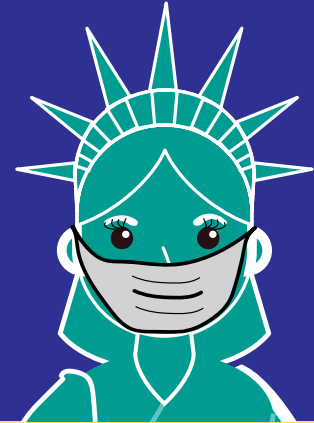
Equity Award. Additionally, the 2017 Equality of Opportunity Project ranked HCCC in the top five percent of 2,200 U.S. higher education institutions for supporting students' upward economic and social mobility.

"When we ask students why they chose to study at Hudson County Community College, they almost always respond that it is because of our diversity," Dr. Reber said. "That diversity, and the multitude of our community's collective cultures, life experiences, skills, and aspirations are the very values and traits that empower us to be productive and caring members of our society. We are all proud of the differences we share, which are the foundation for the life-changing and transformational education we offer and the social mobility we provide to the communities we serve."

The HCCC PACDEI was established in Fall 2019. At that time, there was no way to foretell the enormously important role it would play during the challenging days and months that followed. These include December 2019 targeted, anti-Semitic shootings in Jersey City that took the lives of six individuals; the rise of COVID-19; the tragic deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, and others; and the growth of the Black Lives Matter movement.

OUR STORIES UNTOLD

Submission by Lilisa Williams, Director of Faculty and Staff Development, Yeury Pujols, Executive Director of the North Hudson Campus, and Anna Krupitskiy, Vice President for Human Resources.

On November 24, 2020, Nakiya Santos was joined by close to 60 HCCC staff, faculty, and students while telling her story, titled Epitome of Resilience. She is an HCCC alumna from the Class of 2016, a former student Peer-Leader, and currently serves as a Recruiter in HCCC's Enrollment Services. Santos also teaches College Student Success and is a recent graduate from the Masters in Social Work program from Rutgers' University. She met every attempt at pursuing her education with a sacrifice that made her "bend a little, but never to fold." "Life has a balance," Nakiya shared, "to win, you have to experience some loss." Being at HCCC kept Nakiya fighting.

Santos welcomed the audience into her private space and kept everyone engaged throughout every step of her interactive narrative. A single mother at the age of 18 and a single mother of two at the age of 21, her first attempt at attending HCCC as a teenager did not go as planned. She nevertheless returned years later as an adult. She shared that speaking to her advisor when she was a student helped her refocus her academic priorities into helping others, which led her to human services and social work interests.

She emphasized the need for self-care and her habits of burning a candle and lighting the sage. She continued with showcasing an empty glass vase representing the body, where she put a bamboo stalk representing the spirit. She then proceeded to add purple crystal stones (her favorite color) for every inspiration and note of empowerment that she encouraged the audience to give her, representing the support and love needed for the bamboo stalk to persevere. She then filled up the vase with water, essential for the nourishment

of the spirit. She noted that for the bamboo stalk to grow and prosper, it needed the base, the purpose stones, and the water, and that we all can serve others to help them grow and flourish.



Santos' impact on the HCCC community is infinite. As noted by many who know her, she exudes compassion, strength, and warmth. Her colleagues noted the effect that she has had on them. Additionally, one of her students also expressed gratitude for her support, which enabled the student to last through the semester and the first year at HCCC, which she called a second home. Another student stated that she is a warrior that does not back down. A colleague noted that "without her, I wouldn't be the woman I am today."

Our Stories Untold storytelling emerged as a partnership between the Office of Human Resources and the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI). This series highlights the HCCC community members' personal, educational, and professional experiences, advice, and insight. Each program aims to introduce some of our outstanding and influential colleagues to enhance inclusion and create community. Previous participants have shared that the program lets them feel like they have a voice at HCCC, with so many inspirational stories hidden within our community.

STUDENT SUCCESS ACADEMY

Student success initiatives offer programs and services to support students with the goal of increasing rates of academic success. The purpose is to have a positive effect on students' academic paths by communicating current classroom performance, providing information beneficial to academic success, and referring students to appropriate college services for addressing obstacles students might encounter.

Assisting students, who are having academic difficulty in achieving program completion is one of the main goals of Hudson County Community College. Each semester, the Satisfactory Academic Progress Committee reviews and analyzes students' academic standing. To assist with this initiative, in helping students who are placed on academic probation, suspension, or facing dismissal, the Academic Affairs and Student Affairs Divisions have been collaboratively working together to develop a program to assist with student success. This initiative aids students in reaching program completion and graduation. The Student Success Academy provides students with extra support, such as assistance with registration, academic support services, counseling, and academic needs.

During the first week of October 2020, over 100 students attended a virtual Student Success Academy event. This event enabled students to connect with faculty, administrators, associate deans, advisors, financial aid, tutoring support services, counseling, and members from the registrar's office. Each student who attended has been set up with follow up appointments with an advisor through the end of the semester. All of the students, who attended were very excited and motivated to be part of the Student Success Academy.

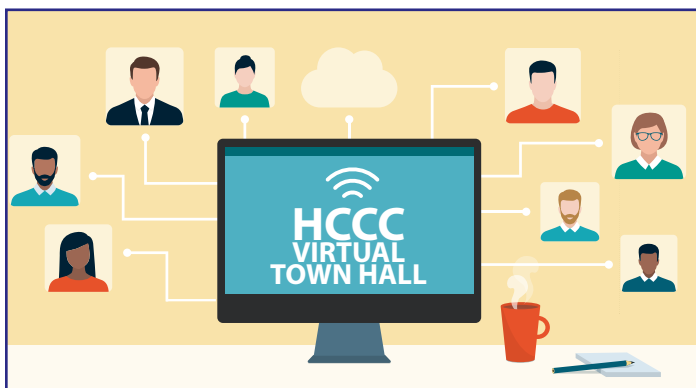

The podcast details how PACDEI was created by Dr. Reber to develop new levels of understanding and access, to build upon the College's strengths, and to move the College community to become more transparent and inclusive. The on-camera discussion also explains that the success of the initiative has been an outcome of the support of the entire College community as well as area Latino, African American, LGBTQ and other groups and their leaders. That support is unique in Diversity, Equity and Inclusion programs, and as such distinguishes the HCCC PACDEI.

Dr. Reber, Mr. Pujols and Ms. Williams speak about how HCCC PACDEI continues to plan, organize and host workshops, diversity and inclusion training, and programs that address current events and issues of systemic racism, police brutality, social injustice, and building more understanding within the College and throughout Hudson County. HCCC PACDEI programming has been so effective that the trio were asked to present at a conference at New Jersey City University (NJCU), and PACDEI has been selected to serve as an Experiential Learning Site for the NJCU Community College Leadership Doctoral Program. In addition, the nationally acclaimed student success network, Achieving the Dream (ATD), has asked HCCC PACDEI to share its work with other ATD member colleges.

ARTIST NEWS

Over the years, Anne McKeown has been involved with the HCCC Foundation Art Collection in numerous ways. As the Master Papermaker at the Brodsky Center for Innovative Editions, her extraordinary craft is present in many Collection works installed throughout campus. As an artist, McKeown's own work is installed in the North Hudson Welcome Center, the STEM Building, 70 Sip Avenue, as well as in the Gabert Library. In addition, you can see works of art she donated throughout the Gabert Library, including a remarkable Willie Cole work on the second floor, and the extraordinary Juan Sanchez piece on the third floor. We cannot thank her enough for her generosity with her time, insight, talent, and art.

For Newark's Gallery Aferro "Past and Power" project, Emma Wilcox recently interviewed McKeown. They discussed McKeown's groundbreaking 1973 "Be-Cause Look Book" a 100-page book-length art work, copies of which are now in major museum collections. McKeown created the book under the name "Shiva Queeney" with Michael Sheridan (under the name of "Michael Goode-nough"). In the interview, she talks about events in her childhood shaped that her vision of the world, and that changed her life:

"It was just such an incredibly powerful experience to watch it on live television, following the Birmingham fire hoses and police dogs of May, 1963 and the brutality of the police at the Edmund Pettus Bridge in March 1965. As a child, it fractured the world in my, in my experience. It didn't radicalize me at the moment, but it ... it cracked my understanding of what was real. Then in 1968, when the police were beating people approximately my age and the protestors were saying

'the whole world is watching ...' It just, ooh! It was so much, again, such a shock of realization and the shock of understanding that it couldn't be denied, in my blood. ... My family, my schooling, did not teach me radical thoughts. I did not learn them anywhere but from the news because they showed things. The television televised news. And I didn't even hang out with people who were that way, who were radicalized. There were rumblings, but it was very much in my head that all of this happened. ... There was this, this breaking point of, you know, all of the Civil Rights actions, and then the anti-war actions. Seeing a dead student on the ground shot by the non-military quote-unquote guys, the National Guard. It just was incomprehensible." Across the pond, American artist Jo Baer has a new exhibition parts of which were inspired by time she spent many years ago in a castle with 37 rooms and no heat. "Once upon a time, from 1975 until 1982, I lived in a Norman castle in the Irish countryside. Naturally, as chatelaine of Smarmore Castle in County Louth, I exercised horses, and so became familiar with my neighborhood and neighbors. I also became familiar with those perspectives that are only possible for riders. One

day in 1976, while on horseback and looking over a hedge, I became intrigued by a large, peculiar stone standing in one of the former fields of the demesne (the castle's surrounding property)." The local postmistress explained, "that it was called the 'Hurlstone' and told me 'a Giant threw it there'—of course." Audrey Flack is featured in the exhibit "Women to the Fore" at the Hudson River Museum through Jan. 3, 2021. The show features 40+ female identifying artists, spanning 150 years. According to the curator, "In 2020, many people and institutions are taking stock of the 100th anniversary of the Nineteenth Amendment, what it won and where it failed to achieve voting rights for American women. Women are still fighting for freedom, and art can be a powerful tool to help us see the complexity of their lives and ideas. Female-identifying artists have distinguished themselves by working persistently within an oppressive patriarchal system and by rebelling against this status quo. With each succeeding generation, they have created work that raises awareness of interdependent systems of discrimination and how to make productive change." 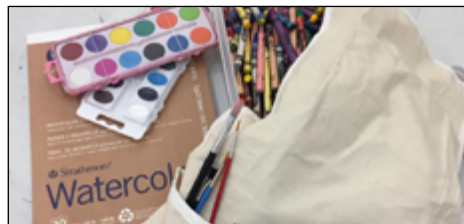

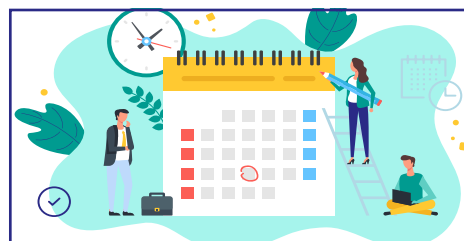

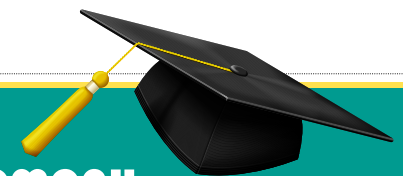
