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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND NEW JERSEY CITY UNIVERSITY JOIN FORCES FOR NEW CRIMINAL JUSTICE TRANSFER PROGRAM AGREEMENT

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) signed an articulation agreement with New Jersey City University (NJCU) on Tuesday, March 16, 2021. The signing took place in the new HCCC Student Center at 81 Sip Avenue in Jersey City. HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber was joined for the signing by NJCU President Dr. Sue Henderson, and members of their faculties and staffs.

“This new agreement will provide current HCCC students and graduates with a seamless pathway to transfer and complete a Bachelor of Science degree at NJCU. Further, it will guarantee that HCCC students, who meet certain criteria, have a reserved place in the NJCU Criminal Justice bachelor-degree program,” Dr. Reber stated. “We are excited to again partner with NJCU and provide opportunities for the people of our community to advance in their education and prepare for economic-resilient careers.”

“Hudson County Community College has long been a valued partner of our university and both institutions share a similar educational mission in our community. This articulation agreement further strengthens our partnership,” Dr. Henderson said. “Last year, transfers from HCCC received degrees in 24 different academic

disciplines and our nationally-ranked Criminal Justice program was among the most sought-after degree. We look forward to continuing to welcome HCCC students to NJCU.”

Under the terms of this new agreement, HCCC students who receive an Associate of Science degree in Criminal Justice from the College may

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE JOINS #CCMONTH CAMPAIGN TO IMPROVE AWARENESS OF VALUE, NEED TO SUPPORT COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Hudson County Community College announced that it will join #CCMonth, a month-long grassroots education and stigma-busting campaign coordinated by the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT). The primary goals of #CCMonth are to improve awareness of the economic, academic and equity advantages of attending community colleges, and to bust longtime stigmas wrongly associated with public two-year colleges.

“The past year has proved beyond any doubt that our College is absolutely vital to our community and our state,” said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. “#CCMonth is an opportunity to reach out into both and to demonstrate not only that community colleges should be the first choice of many

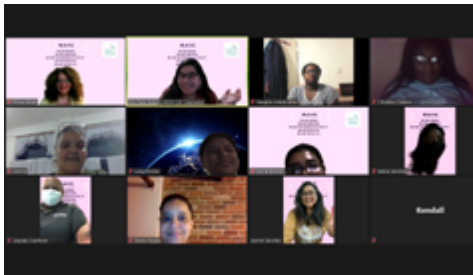
collegegoers, but why community colleges are first-class institutions that are vital to our local and state economies.”

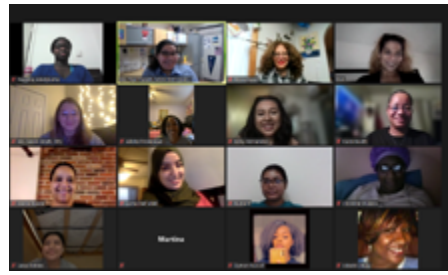
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EOF SCHOLARS GAIN EMPOWERMENT THROUGH W.A.V.E.

UPDATE ON HCCC'S STUDENT SUCCESS WORK

From March 16 – 19, 2021, Dr. Mary Fifield and Dr. Rene Garcia, HCCC's *Achieving the Dream* Leadership and Data Coaches, respectively, participated in their second visit to HCCC of the 2020-21 Academic Year. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, their visit was conducted through a series of virtual meetings. HCCC *Achieving the Dream* Dream Team Co-Chairs Heather DeVries and Dr. Sheila Dynan would like to extend their sincere thanks for all who made Dr. Fifield and Dr. Garcia's visit a success.

In the coming weeks, President Reber will receive a letter from Drs. Fifield and Garcia that will provide a summary of their visit, including key findings and recommendations for further consideration. As with past letters, it will be shared with the entire HCCC community for review and reflection.

HCCC's *Achieving the Dream* Dream Team continues to implement the College's Student Success Action Plan through eight How Teams. Each How Team is tasked with implementing one specific strategy of the Action Plan. The How Teams are pleased to share the following updates on their work.

How Team 1.1 ("ESL") has been working in collaboration with the faculty of the ESL Program to develop an ESL Proficiency Certificate. This proficiency certificate is comprised of 15 college credits and nests into the AA Liberal Arts General degree. Co-leads: Jenny Bobea & Alexa Riano.

How Team 1.2a ("AF English") is currently examining the fall 2020 outcomes for students who were placed through the Directed Self Placement (DSP) protocol as well as how the DSP process could be improved. How Team 1.2a is continuing to explore alternate modes of writing assessment and course exit processes. Co-leads: Lauren O'Gara & Robin Singer.

How Team 1.2b ("AF Math") is currently examining the fall 2020 outcomes for students who were placed through the DSP protocol. Next, How Team 1.2b will be conducting research on the emporium model of instruction. Co-leads: Laura Samuelson & Kyle Woolley.

How Team 2.1 ("Student Leaders") shared some of their "Hudson is Home" testimonials with Drs. Fifield and Garcia. Next, How Team 2.1 will gather testimonials using a different medium (i.e., video recordings). Co-leads: Koral Booth & Abou Traore.

How Team 2.2 ("Remove Barriers") has distributed a survey aimed at evaluating the current course design of CSS-100. How Team 2.2 is also examining the "life cycle" of placement for various student types (i.e., new, continuing, returning). Co-leads: Dr. Pamela Bandyopadhyay & Victoria Marino.

How Team 2.3 ("Hudson Helps") is pleased to share that, to date, 4,000 meals have been prepared by the Culinary Club and Chefs for distribution through HCCC's food pantries and other

Recently, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) students and staff provided Hudson County Executive Thomas A. DeGise with a tour of the recently completed Student Center at 81 Sip Avenue in Jersey City.

HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber and Mr. DeGise were joined by students and administrators in a tour of the renovated building, which was completed last March just prior to the COVID-19 pandemic shutdown.

"This building represents a milestone for Hudson County Community College as it is the first, dedicated Student Center in the College's 47-year history," Dr. Reber stated. "We are exceedingly grateful to County Executive DeGise, the County Commissioners, HCCC Trustees, and

everyone who assisted in making this dream a reality for our students."

Dr. Reber said the \$8.2 million renovation to a College-owned building was designed by Di Cara | Rubino Architects to create a state-of-the-art setting that affords students the very best in technology, safety and convenience. The renovation by APS Contracting, Inc. included the addition of façade brick stained to match that of the adjoining HCCC Gabert Library; replacement of the existing roof; complete interior demolition; the addition of a new entrance vestibule; installation of new HVAC systems, elevators, emergency generator; and a direct, indoor connection to the Gabert Library. "The web of our life is of a mingled yarn good and ill together," began Professor Katie Sweeting as our featured storyteller for Our Stories Untold series program. She was joined by over 60 students, staff, faculty, and family guests on Tuesday, March 16th, 2021, sharing her journey from the San Fernando Valley, California, to Kenya, East Africa, and Queens, New York, to Jersey City. A student appreciated Katie's "openness, the windows open on her family, the sharing of personal pictures, the quality of her friendships."

Supported by her husband of 37 years, Pastor William Sweeting, Katie encouraged the audience to think about their own life as she shared how her experiences, threading teaching, multiculturalism, and compassion, prepared her for each stage of hers. While she grew up in a white family and a white neighborhood, her parents wanted to make sure that she did not grow up racist and went out of their way to integrate black colleagues and friends into the family. Katie had a positive black male role

model, a lifelong friend of the family for over 50 years. She credits this man because she ended up falling in love with and marrying a black man and mothering three black sons.

Katie became a follower of Jesus at the age of 17, one of the most important decisions of her life. Her journey enthused multiculturalism in her personal and professional milestones, becoming a better person and a professor. She understood what it feels like to be a minority, at one time the only white member of a 3,000-member black church. She questioned standards of beauty when they did not match one's own culture. When students told her about their struggles, grief, and loss, she listened with empathy and compassion. She learned to live in the moment and focus on what you have, and not on what you don't have, as the best way to go about it -- simple things. "Be kind to yourself," she said.

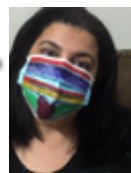

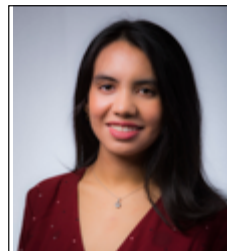

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) students Adoum Allamine, Gerardo Leal, Pedro Moranchel, and Sofia Pazmino have been named semifinalists for the highly competitive and prestigious 2021 Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. The recipients will be announced in April.

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation recognizes exceptionally talented community college students seeking to complete baccalaureate degrees. This year's 406 semifinalists were chosen from a pool of more than 1,500 applicants attending 398 community colleges throughout the United States. Recipients are selected based on their exceptional academic ability and achievement, financial need, leadership, persistence, and service.

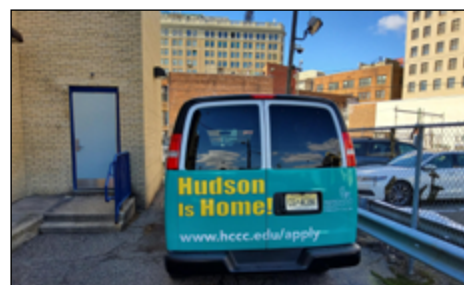
"Everyone at Hudson County Community College joins me in congratulating Adoum, Gerardo, Pedro, and Sofia on this great achievement," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. "These extraordinary students have worked diligently and are most deserving of this major scholarship and

recognition. They are an inspiration to our entire community."

Nearly half of all postsecondary students begin their college journey at two-year institutions. The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation research found that community college students who transfer to four-year institutions have equal to or higher graduation rates as compared to students who enrolled at these institutions directly from high school, or transferred from other four-year institutions. The Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship aims to increase the number of community college students completing their education at prestigious and high-performing four-year colleges and universities.

Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship recipients receive financial support for the full cost of attendance at four-year and graduate institutions, comprehensive educational advising, opportunities for internships, study abroad, and graduate school funding, as well as access to a network of over 2,800 fellow Cooke scholars and alumni.

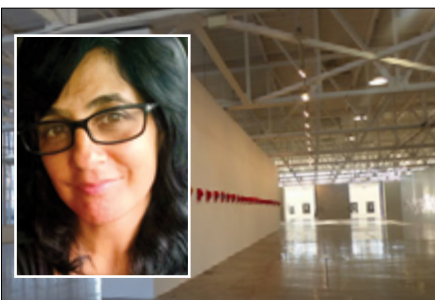
HCCC DEBUTS NEW VAN WRAPS



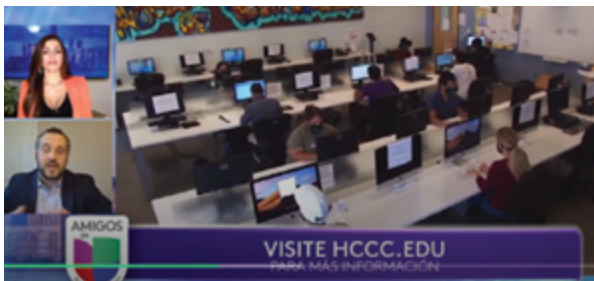
The Safety & Security Department at Hudson County Community College recently debuted College vans with wraps displaying the new College tagline, "Hudson is Home."

ARTIST NEWS

In 2020, George Floyd's murder sparked a long-overdue national discussion about discrimination against BIPOC individuals and communities, a discussion which we are actively engaged in at HCCC. In this important matter, in a time when critical change needs to happen, the arts community is drawing attention to the need for humble learning. We see this in a recent article by Ann Hernandez, a Senior Diversity Fellow at the American Alliances of Museums, who writes about "How to Master Humble Learning."

Hernandez says that we often feel "that we need to be experts and wise contributors in every situation, especially if we are dubbed 'leaders' in our organization. We do not allow ourselves to be vulnerable, humble learners, recognizing that we all have areas to develop and things we need others to teach us. ... Cultural competence development

Thanks to the amazing generosity of our donors, the Foundation Art Collection has grown from 25 installed art works to over 1,500 works. This accomplishment is a testament to our extraordinary community.

is exactly one of these areas that require humble learners. To 'master' cultural competence is to never feel like you know everything. You are constantly asking questions, observing details, and carefully experimenting with what actions make sense in a given situation and culture. You are constantly reflecting on your own beliefs, traditions, and way of being in order to respect how others live differently."

She suggests eight steps that may be helpful inside (and outside) the arts: 1. Understand that what's normal for you may not be for others. 2. Observe a situation before jumping in. "In some cultures, including the white American culture, we are rewarded for 'jumping in and taking action.' It is seen as taking initiative and adapting quickly. Humble learning is not about that. The value lies in getting outside of yourself for a moment and recognizing other ways of being first. Then, you compare them with your way of being and take action from there." 3. Be curious and ask questions: others don't know what you don't know, and it's important to learn about others' "values, behaviors, and cultural patterns." 4. Try to find the ways you can relate to another person or culture. 5. "Be uncomfortable. It probably means you are learning something. Challenge yourself to embrace experiences or differences that are new to you. Reflect on why something makes you uncomfortable and use that to understand the difference that you are encountering and how it relates to your norms." 6. Celebrate each new thing learned; and check your ego at the door. 7. Be patient, because it can take a lifetime to learn about a culture. Forgive yourself when you make a mistake. 8. Embrace the practice of being a beginner. By doing this your process can be joyful and educational, and you may find yourself eventually in step with this person or this culture. 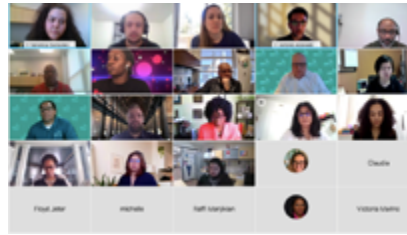

Project Management Certificate Student: Therese Camporeale

During Fall 2020, the Continuing Education Department offered a new Project Management Certificate program that promised participants would gain a comprehensive understanding of various principles and processes involved in managing a project of any size in any industry effectively. Continuing Education developed this program alongside the instructor, Susan Seradilla-Smarth, who has over 18 years of experience as a Project Manager Professional (PMP) and is a Certified Six Sigma Back Belt and Certified SCRUM Master. The goal of the program is to provide participants with strategies and practical hands-on tools to drive successful project outcomes. The certificate program provides participants with 36 hours of Project Management education, which is necessary if they want to receive certification from the Project Management Institute (PMI.)

Continuing Education interviewed Therese Camporeale, a student from the first cycle of the Project Management Certificate program.

What inspired you to take the Project Management Certificate program at HCCC?

I came to Continuing Education after my employment was affected by the pandemic in early 2020. I was looking for a substantial change in my career prospects and started researching Project Management. I noticed that more companies were pivoting toward Project Management and Agile Processes, with PMI projecting growth in their industries over the next 10 years.

What sort of experience did you already have managing projects?

I worked on projects during my time in education, travel, media, and non-profit organizations and knew this was the path I needed to take.

What is your opinion of the program?

The PMP Certificate course at HCCC lived up to the course outline, syllabus, and my expectations!

What were your biggest takeaways from the program?

The program provided me with a comprehensive view of all the Knowledge Areas and Process Groups, and it was presented in a lively and interactive manner.

What is your opinion of the program's instructor?

Professor Susan Serradilla-Smarth provided online presentations, real-world PM examples, opportunities for discussion, and fun learning tools for my success.

What certification did you achieve after you completed the program?

Thanks to the program I met the educational requirement to sit for a PMI certification. Along with my experience, I qualified to take the CAPM certification exam and recently passed the exam!

transfer up to 60 credits towards a B.S. in Criminal Justice degree at NJCU. They will enter NJCU as fully matriculated students with junior-year standing. A minimum of 39 credits in Criminal Justice are taken at NJCU to complete the bachelor degree requirements.

An especially important feature of the new agreement provides HCCC students with access to NJCU financial aid counselors who will assist with early financial planning and furnish estimates of

financial aid and scholarships that are useful in creating a four-year plan for completing the Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice degree.

Individuals with a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice are eligible for a wide variety of rewarding careers in law enforcement, the court systems, and corrections systems on the local, state and federal levels.

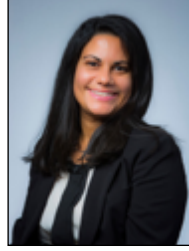

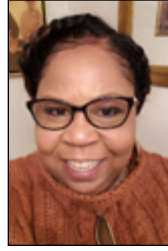

On March 23, 2021, the Office of Human Resources organized Professional Career Paths, an employee panel, in honor of Women's History Month. The panelists were Nadia Hedhli, Associate Professor, STEM; Heather DeVries, Dean of Academic Affairs and Assessment; Jennifer Rodriguez, Coordinator of Early College Programs; and Sharon Wilson-Harriott, Assistant Controller in Finance. Each reflected on their professional career path along with the opportunities and challenges of work-life balance. The conversation was facilitated by Anna Krupitskiy, Vice President for Human Resources.

Over 45 in attendance, the audience shared that it was an uplifting experience to learn about the successes and setbacks of fellow female colleagues. Many viewed themselves in some of the speakers' experiences, like balancing demands of parenting and professional development pursuits. The audience appreciated the opportunity to hear and learn from women of HCCC that often work behind the scenes to keep our institution and programs running. The program had a significant impact from hearing the career journeys of other women and discussing strategies, goals, and the importance of mentorship.

A staff member appreciated the discussion on "[t]he truthfulness that we all have a level of bias within us and that we need to own it and acknowledge it!" Professor Sweeting shared that we should not ignore the fact that we all have some level of racism. Instead, we should confront it, own up to it, and then we can move on from there. If you don't, "you won't help anybody else's heart," she stated. Pastor Sweeting shared the importance of talking to his black sons and other young men about encounters with law enforcement. He noted that these conversations must happen early and as an ongoing reminder. He also added that Any significant change will happen over time and that it is important to see one's role and involvement in a movement and use each individual space to move this forward. Pastor Sweeting further appreciated HCCC's work, as part of this movement, on diversity and what the college represents of its student body.

"The entire *Untold Stories* program is powerful in connecting employees," a participant stated. *Our Stories Untold* storytelling emerged as a partnership between the Office of Human Resources and the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI). This series highlights the HCCC community members' personal, educational, and professional experiences, advice, and insight. the building, as are “green” elements for energy efficiency and the sustainability of resources.

The HCCC Student Center’s first floor includes Student Lounges, Student Welcome Center, full-service Café, Veterans’ Lounge, and Security Command Center. The second floor houses offices for Student Life, Student Government and a variety of other student organizations, as well as an Open Lounge, and a large, Multipurpose Room for events and meetings. The office of the College’s Security, Custodial and Facilities Departments, and storage space are located on the lower level.

The new HCCC Student Center is the latest of several construction projects undertaken by HCCC that have transformed Journal Square. It is

representative of the College’s mission to serve its diverse communities with inclusive educational programs and services that promote student success, socioeconomic mobility, and provide resources for growth. Students can meet outside the classroom, share ideas and values, assist and advise one another, pursue career and employment opportunities, develop better understanding of diverse cultures, and build longstanding relationships.

The project was financed with Chapter 12 funding, a state program for county colleges that is funded through State and County capital bond financing. All of the College’s capital improvement endeavors have been completed with appropriated capital. As a result, the College does not carry any capital debt, and not one dollar of student tuition is utilized for debt.

dents, and particularly for the most demographically and socioeconomically diverse students. They guarantee fair admissions for all students. They offer supports for adult students who have to work to support their families. And without community colleges, many American students would not be able to access higher education at all.

Despite all this, many American people wrongly believe that community colleges are inferior institutions, and in most states, universities receive significantly more per-student state support than community colleges do. These negative attitudes and disparities support and encourage ongoing socioeconomic and demographic disadvantages and inequities in the United States.

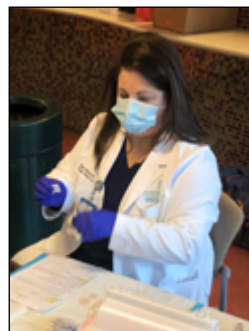
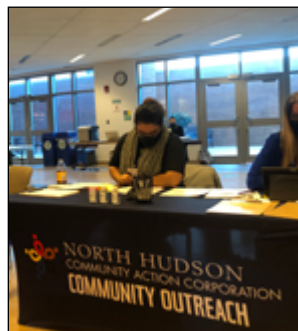
“Community colleges are engines of diversity, equity and inclusion,” said ACCT President

and CEO J. Noah Brown. “They give opportunities to all students, and they support all students throughout their educations, whether they attend to attain an associate degree or certificate, intend to transfer on for a bachelor’s or higher degree, or they take one or a few courses to learn a new skill or expand their horizons.”

The campaign is expected to have strong participation from community colleges and their supporters throughout the country.

- Make sure the mask fits to cover your nose, mouth and chin. If you adjust the mask to cover those areas, wash your hands before and after.
- Make sure you can breathe and talk comfortably through your mask.
- Wash reusable masks after each use. If the mask is disposable, discard it when visibly soiled or damaged.

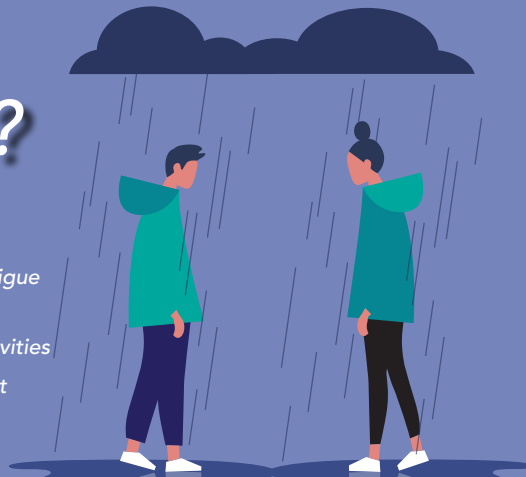
