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ENROLLMENT TREND (1992 TO 2011): INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH

since its inception in the summer of 1974, Hudson County Community College's (HCCC) enrollment growth has been phenomenal. Based on New Jersey state enrollment data in Fall 2011, it is the sixth largest community college in the state in terms of full-time enrollment, and 10th largest in overall enrollment. The graph on this page charts HCCC's fall enrollment growth over the last 20 years.

From the year 1992 to 2001, student enrollment in the fall semesters grew almost 72%. During the last ten years from Fall 2002 to Fall 2011, the enrollment growth tipped 68%.

With the exception of two brief periods between 1996 to 1998 and 2003 to 2005, enrollment growth has been steady and unrelenting.



Classes for the fall semester will begin on Wednesday, Aug. 29 at the Journal Square campus and North Hudson Higher Education Center. Classes are also being offered in off-campus locations including Bayonne (start date Thursday, Sept. 6) and Kearny (beginning Tuesday, Sept. 18). In addition, several courses – including College Survival Skills, English Composition I and II, and Introduction to Computers and Com-

puting – will be available in online format for the fall semester.

GET CONNECT-ED WITH HCCC!

Hudson County Community College has implemented Connect-ED, a text- and voicemessaging system in the event of a crisis or emergency.

Connect-ED is HCCC's response to a federal law which requires disclosure of pertinent information about campus crime and security.

The system will allow the College to send time-sensitive notifications by phone, email and/or text message.

Both HCCC students and employees have been automatically registered in the emergency alert system and will receive alerts to their HCCC email accounts unless they opt out.

Users are encouraged to access the College's website, www.hccc.edu/emergency, and click on the Connect-ED link to register additional contact infor-



mation such as home, work, and cell phone numbers.

HCCC will provide this emergency service free of charge to students and employees — there is no charge to sign up. However, mobile service providers may charge a fee for incoming messages depending on an individual's plan.

Personal information entered into the Connect-ED system will be kept confidential.



HCCC CULINARY ARTS INSTITUTE REACCREDITED BY ACFEFAC WITH 'EXEMPLARY' DESIGNATION

udson County Community College Culinary Arts Institute (HCCC CAI), the area's premier culinary arts education program, was once again awarded accreditation for its culinary certificate, diploma and degree programs by the American Culinary Federation Education Foundation Accrediting Commission (ACFEFAC). The HCCC CAI is the only state school to earn "Exemplary" status designation from ACFEFAC.

ment. The CAI recently introduced an Associate degree option in Baking and Pastries in addition to providing several non-credit courses through the Division of Community Education. Il new students are required to take the CPT, which allows for course placement that is appropriate to their skill level. In certain cases, such as if a student testing has not completed high school or its equivalent (GED), the Placement Test can also be used to determine eligibility for financial aid.

It is extremely important that you take the College Placement Test seriously. Depending on your score, you may have to register for and pay to take additional semesters of courses that do not bear college credit/count toward graduation.
