# HCCC Breaks Ground for New Learning Resources Center & Academic Building

udson County Community College has announced plans for an important addition to the College — a new Learning Resources Center & Academic Building at 65-79 Sip Avenue in Jersey City. Groundbreaking for the six-story structure took place on Thursday, Nov. 3. Hudson County Executive Thomas A. DeGise and other elected officials representing the County and its municipalities joined HCCC President

Dr. Glen Gabert, Board of Trustees Chair William J. Netchert, Esq. and other members of the Board, as well as members of the College's administration, faculty and staff.

Plans for the new structure call for the first two floors to be dedicated to the Learning Resources Center, which will house traditional printed and ebooks as well as other digital media. The Learning Resources Center will also in-

clude several computer and information stations, a copy center, and various areas for individual as well as group studies. A key feature of the design is the two-story reading room with a coffee bar that will provide students, faculty and staff with a comfortable place to relax before and after classes. The plans also include a rooftop terrace that will provide sweeping views of New York Harbor, the Hudson and

# HCCC Trustee Bakari G. Lee Elected to National and State Positions for College Trustees

udson County Community College Board of Trustees' newly elected Vice Chair, Bakari Gerard Lee, Esq., a member of the law firm of McManimon & Scotland, has been elected to positions with the Association of Community College Trustees and the New Jersey Council of County Colleges.

In October, Mr. Lee was elected 2011-2012 Northeast Region Chair of the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT), a nonprofit educational organization of governing boards representing more than 6,500 elected and appointed trustees of community, technical and junior colleges in the United States and beyond. ACCT is dedicated to strengthening the capacity of these colleges and to helping them foster their missions through effective board leadership at local, state and national levels. Prior to this election, Mr. Lee served as an Associate Member of ACCT Governance & Bylaws Committee, was appointed to the 2011 Northeast Region Awards Committee, and was elected to the 2010 Northeast Region Nominating Committee prior to being nominated for a Northeast Region Director seat.

On Nov. 14, Mr. Lee became Chairman of the New Jersey Council of County Col-

leges (NJCCC), an independent, trustee-headed, state association that represents New Jersey's 19 community colleges. The organization joins the leadership of trustees and presidents, and acts as the voice of the community college sector before the state legislature and other branches of government. Mr. Lee served as Chairman of the NJCCC Legislative Committee. He is also one of the organization's Trustee Ambassadors, a special group that meets regularly with state legislators and congressional delegation members to advocate on behalf of New Jersey's community colleges.

Mr. Lee was appointed to the HCCC Board of Trustees in May 2006. Mr. Lee is an Officer of the HCCC Board, previously serving as Secretary/ Treasurer until his election on Nov. 22 to the position of Vice Chair. Mr. Lee also is the Chair of the Finance Committee, and serves on several ad hoc committees.

After graduating from Florida A&M University with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration, Mr. Lee went on to earn his Juris Doctorate from Rutgers University School of Law - Newark. He was admitted to the practice of law in New Jersey and the United States District Court of New Jersey in 2004, and in the

State of New York in 2007. Prior to joining McManimon & Scotland, he served as a law clerk for the Hon. Daryl Dean Donohue of the Territorial Court of the Virgin Islands - St. Croix Division, and as Senior Analyst in the Animal Health Division of Pfizer Inc.

Mr. Lee states that in accepting these new roles he hopes it will demonstrate that the HCCC Board of Trustees is actively committed to the College and educational advocacy. "I hope these positions will help to raise the stature of Hudson County Community College. They most definitely provide the College with direct access to decision making

To these four men and the entire Facilities Department, we thank you.


# CUSTOMER SATISFACTION SURVEY – DATATEL MANAGED SERVICES (DMS): INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH

udson County Community College routinely conducts assessments to collect information used in planning and decision-making and to identify opportunities for improvements to programs and services. In October 2011, the Office of Institutional Research and Planning administered the Customer Satisfaction Survey on Management Information Systems (MIS) services performed by the

Datatel Managed Services (DMS) Group. The Highlights, provides insights about college activities and attitudes about a wide range of MIS services.

- 1. Fifty-three respondents completed the customer satisfaction survey.
- 51% of the respondents indicated that email is the primary mode of communication with DMS.
- 3. 75% of the respondents indicated high priority requests were generally completed within a 1-3 days time-frame.
- 87% indicated that the completed project met the objectives outlined in their request.



- 5. 81% reported that DMS provided the help they expected.
- 6. 58% were satisfied with the

timeliness of the DMS staff's response to inquiries and services.

## DECEMBER 2011 TESTING SCHEDULE

Il new students are required to take the CPT, which allows for course placement that is appropriate to their skill level. In certain cases, such as if a student testing has not completed high school or its equivalent (GED), the Placement Test can also be used to determine eligibility for financial aid

It is extremely important that you take the College Placement Test seriously. Depending on your score, you may have to register for and pay to take additional semesters of courses that do not bear college credit/count toward graduation.

### **BEFORE TAKING THE CPT:**

- a. Students must submit an Application to Admissions (70 Sip Ave).
- b. To review for the College (College Board's "Accuplacer"), please visit: www.college-board.com/ student/testing/accuplacer/
- c. For CPT exemption criteria such as SAT scores and applied transfer credit for English and/or Mathematics visit: www.hccc.edu/testing

## ON THE DAY OF THE CPT STUDENTS MUST:

- a. Report at least 10 minutes before the test start time.
- b. Bring photo ID (Driver's License / Passport / Green Card / Student ID).
- c. Have your College Wide ID number.
- d. Bring a copy of transcripts (only if student is a transfer or foreign student).

## BEFORE TAKING THE CLEP EXAM:

   or -4192, as CLEP exams are administered by appointment only.
- b. All appointment cancellations must be made at least 24 hours in advance.
- HCCC students must have a permit to take the CLEP (form available at the Testing Center).
- d. All students must pay a \$20 HCCC service fee (non-refundable) per examination at the Bursar's Office, located at 70 Sip Avenue, Jersey City, or the North Hudson Center Main Office, located at 6515 Polk St., West New York. This fee must be paid prior to setting an appointment for the exam. Testers must show receipt on the day of CLEP exam.
- e. *Note*: Please contact the Testing Center for an appointment: (201) 360-4194, -4192 or -4191, for future CLEP exams.

## ON THE DAY OF THE CLEP EXAM:

- a. Students must report at least 10 minutes before the test start time.
- Bring two (2) forms of identification (Driver's License, Passport, Green Card, Student ID, Military ID).

- c. Bring \$20 receipt from Bursar's Office.
- d. Bring \$77 CLEP Fee: money order, payable to ETS/CLEP, or credit card (Visa, MasterCard, American Express, or Discover are accepted).

Hackensack Rivers and lower Hudson County.

The top four floors of the building will be dedicated to classrooms — as many as ten on each floor — that will include traditional learning, computer lab and tiered lecture-room designs. Wi-Fi will be available throughout the building and all of the classrooms will be "smart" classrooms with the most up-to-the-minute technologies.

The new facility is part of the College's \$173 million capital expansion program. As with all of the College's construction efforts, the exterior of the Learning Resources Center & Academic Building has been designed to complement the early 20th century architecture of the Journal Square area. The brick exterior design includes a granite base and cornices, twostory arched windows, as well as metal panels at the top floor to provide a contemporary edge.

"The College has experienced record growth every year for the past three years, and we are now serving over 10,000 students. This new Learning Resources Center & Academic Building will address not only our recent growth, but also the future needs of our neighbors here in Hudson County," Trustee Chair Netchert stated.

"It has been said before, but it cannot be overstated: Our goal is not just to serve more students, but to serve them better. The Learning Resources Center & Academic Building will enable our students to access a wealth of resources — the newest technologies and more traditional

approaches — that will enhance the value of their education here at Hudson County Community College," Dr. Gabert said. He noted that the new building will also provide students with a comfortable place where they may congregate and enjoy the college experience more fully.

"The Learning Resources Center & Academic Building is yet another example of how Hudson County Community College is meeting the needs of its rapidly expanding student body," said Hudson County Executive Thomas A. DeGise. "We are pleased to support the College's continued growth. Now more than ever, the high quality, low cost education offered by HCCC is what our workforce must have if it is to succeed in our challenging, ever more knowledgedependent global economy."
