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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOUNDATION TO HOST 22ND ANNUAL HOLIDAY GALA FUNDRAISER

The Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation invites the community to its 22nd Annual Holiday Gala. The theme for this year's fundraiser is "Cultures and Diversity" in acknowledgement of the Hudson County community and the College's students, faculty and staff.

The Gala will be held on Thursday, December 5, 2019 at 6 p.m., at the Culinary Conference Center located at 161 Newkirk Street – two blocks from the Journal Square PATH Transportation Center, and directly across the street from public parking. Proceeds from the fundraiser will provide scholarships for deserving HCCC students.

The evening will include tours of the College's award-winning Culinary Arts Institute (CAI) kitchens where guests can enjoy world-class cuisine prepared and served by students and chef instructors. The HCCC 2019 Distinguished Community Service Awards will be presented to Frank Gargiulo, retired Superintendent of Hudson County Schools of Technology; and Gary Greenberg, Executive Director and CEO of Boys & Girls Clubs of Hudson County.

The Foundation will also hold its Lucky Odds Raffle that evening. The Grand Prize winner will receive 40 percent of raffle ticket sales; Second Prize will receive 6 percent; and Third Prize will receive 4 percent. Raffle tickets are \$50 each. Located in the second most ethnically diverse city in the nation, Hudson County Community College is nationally recognized for its diversity and equity programs. HCCC students were born in 119 different countries and speak 29 different languages. In 2017, the Equality of Opportunity Project ranked HCCC in the top 5% of 2,200 U.S. higher education institutions for social mobility.

The Hudson County Community College Foundation is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit corporation giving tax-exempt status to contributors. Established in 1997, the Foundation generates financial support for the College and its students, developing and awarding needs-based and merit scholarships, providing seed money for faculty programs, assisting incoming students in achieving academic success, providing for the College's physical growth as well as the cultural enrichment of Hudson County residents.

Since its founding, the Foundation has raised more than \$3.5 million in scholarships. The Foundation Art Collection, which was established in 2006, now includes over 1,250 works – most by nationally and internationally renowned artists.

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) student Avery Tan has been presented with the Educational Opportunity Fund Professional Association of New Jersey (EOF-PANJ) Arrigo O. Rogers Scholarship. Mr. Tan was recognized at an EOFPANJ ceremony at William Paterson University on Friday, November 1, 2019.

"This is a great honor for Avery and the College," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. "Avery is the first HCCC student to be awarded this scholarship, and one of just two community college students in New Jersey to receive the scholarship this year. He has worked diligently and is most deserving of this honor."

The non-profit EOFPANJ is the official liaison between the Educational Opportunity Fund campus-based programs and the New Jersey Office of the Secretary of Higher Education. EOFPANJ advocates on behalf of New Jersey EOF programs, monitors legislation and policy decisions that affect the EOF constituency, and provides a venue for professional development of members.

fter earning an Associate in Science in Computer Science from Hudson County Community College (HCCC), Abderahim Salhi was accepted into Columbia University. Now, the Jersey City resident has returned to HCCC, where his incredible academic journey began.

Mr. Salhi, who graduated Summa Cum Laude in May 2019, was selected by HCCC students to be the new Student Alumni Representative on the College's Board of Trustees. He was sworn in to serve a one-year term at the Board's Reorganization meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 26.

As an immigrant from Algeria, he enrolled at HCCC in 2017 and quickly became an outstanding student and leader. He collaborated with fellow students, clubs and organizations to initiate workshops that covered scholarships, internships, and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) activities. He served as Chapter President of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) International Honor Society and Sigma Kappa Delta, the English Honor Society; and Vice President of the College's STEM and Model United Nation Clubs. He was also a fellow in the America Needs You and the Goldman Sachs Local College Collaborative programs.

Mr. Salhi is the recipient of multiple scholarships and awards: 2019 All USA-Academic Team; New Century Transfer Pathway Scholar for New Jersey; Pearson Scholarship; Phi Theta Kappa Hites Transfer Scholarship, the most prestigious scholarship awarded by PTK; Research and Development Council of New Jersey Merit Scholarship; and Garden State S-STEM Scholarship.

As a community leader, Mr. Salhi volunteers with National Multiple Sclerosis Society, Jersey Cares, Cancer Society, and the gardening program at Liberty State Park. He was on the steering committee for the HCCC Food Pantry project. His personal interests include cooking, scuba diving, photography, travel, robotics and drones.

Tudson County Community College has entered into an agreement with New Jersey City University that will strengthen pathways for students in business programs. HCCC students now have a seamless pathway to a Bachelor of Science degree in Finance with NJCU. "This is a tremendous opportunity for our students to advance in their studies, and to prepare for rewarding and high-paying careers in the greater New York-New Jersey area," said President Chris Reber. He noted that the Bureau of Labor Statistics projects employment of business and financial operations occupations to grow 7% now through 2028, faster than the average for almost all other occupations. Career opportunities for finance graduates include financial planning, financial analysis, insurance, investor relations, and corporate banking.

The agreement, which is retroactive to September 1, 2019, enables HCCC students who complete an Associate in Science degree in Business Administration to seamlessly transition to the NJCU Bachelor of Science in Business program with full junior status. HCCC students may transfer up to 60 credits, and will need just 60 additional credits to complete their B.S. degree at NJCU.

In order to be eligible for this program, the HCCC business students must maintain a 2.5 grade-point average (GPA). To assist in making a smooth transfer, the students will be able to meet on campus at Hudson County Community College with an NJCU advisor who will facilitate admissions and provide financial assistance counseling. As a result of the agreement, the NJCU application fee will be waived, and students will be apprised of opportunities for merit-based scholarships. The HCCC students participating in this dual-admissions program will also have access to NJCU events and the NJCU School of Business facilities.

n November 21, over 130 faculty, staff, administrators, and students gathered for HCCC's Capacity Café. Led by Dr. Mary Fifield and Dr. Rene Garcia, HCCC's Leadership Coach and Data Coach, respectively, the Capacity Café event is a collaborative and highly interactive event in which HCCC community members had the opportunity to discuss HCCC's strengths and weaknesses as well as identify opportunities for action in the seven ATD capacity areas. The afternoon concluded with a brief report out from each table's facilitator who provided a high-level overview of strengths, areas for growth, and recommendations that were generated from their groups. The raw data from the Capacity Café has been shared

In the coming weeks, the Core/Strategy Team will work to distill the contents of the raw data into several central themes. These data points are an important part of HCCC's first year of data exploration and will ultimately help inform strategies in HCCC's student success action plan to help more students enroll, persist, and graduate.

The Hudson County Community College Foundation Art Collection, which includes artworks in media such as prints, drawings, painting and sculpture, photographs, American craft pottery, and ephemera, reveals aspects of America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history from the Hudson River School period to today. In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

ARTIST NEWS

The Museum of Modern Art in New York City recently re-opened with great fanfare about the museum's now including art by people who aren't white and male in the permanent collection. It is an improvement that of the 1,443 works on display, 336 (23%) are now by women artists.

In major American cultural institutions, art made by women usually comprises only about 13%. Here at HCCC, art made by women is over 50% of the collection. Critic Maura Reilly, in a recent issue of *Art News*, does not think the new MoMA installation is worthy of great praise. Instead, she calls it "tokenism."

She cites a room with 13 works by European artist Pablo Picasso, and a 1967 work by African-American artist Faith Ringgold: American People Series No. 20: Die. The painting depicts a race riot. Reilly writes, "I am thrilled that Ringgold is being given long-overdue prominence in MoMA's permanent collection galleries. She certainly deserves it. However, I am disappointed in her placement. Why is she integrated into a room dedicated to a white male master?... Positioned as she is, Ringgold is presented as a derivative of Picasso, or as a supporting character. The irony is that Picasso himself, in his desire to reinvent painting, borrowed motifs from the tribal art.... His Cubism was derived from African art. ... Given that Ringgold's work of the '60s was not influenced by Picasso alone — she was also fueled by her admiration for the writings of James Baldwin, the paintings of Jacob Lawrence, and the decorative work of the Kuba peoples in Zaire, to name just a few examples-it might have been more interesting to include her work in relation to Lawrence's Migrant Series, also on view in the museum. Or, more radically, why didn't MoMA present an entire room dedicated to Ringgold, with multiple paintings and sculptures, and then place a single Picasso work therein?"

Ed Bereal's 1968 print work, Self-Portrait - a collaged image of Dr. Frankenstein, the Frankenstein monster, and Frederick Douglass - is installed on the first floor of 2 Enos Place. Bereal has a new, six-decade retrospective exhibit at the Whatcom Museum in Bellingham, Washington. Called "WANTED: Ed Bereal for Disturbing the Peace" the show will be up through Jan. 5, 2020. According to Patricia Leach, the museum's executive director, she approached the 82-year-old artist because she had wanted to work with him for a long time, "Part of our mission is to provoke and promote curiosity on a variety of issues." However his work since the above-mentioned Self-Portrait, "has only become more confrontational, grotesque and darkly satirical, exploring themes of gun violence, racism, police brutality, corporate greed, complicity, the military industrial complex and, most recently, climate change." Bereal said, "We've just set up, in that gallery, a battlefield ... Our docents come in as medics." Weeks after the show opened, Bereal noted, "People were acknowledging the fact that the show is uncomfortable, and in many cases, kind of frightening." The biggest

If you like Barry Le Va's work at the North Hudson Library, you might enjoy a field trip to Dia:Beacon to see the "floor-based, site-responsive installations from the 1960s, using felt, aluminum bars, and ball bearings, as well as early works using glass, meat cleavers, and powder." How can that be considered art? Le Va's kind of art is called Postminimal and Process art. Le Va is not that interested in making solid, permanent objects. He is interested in exploring concepts like dispersion, chance, and impermanence. He uses these odd materials to convey his interest in these ideas. Dia:Beacon itself is a strange, huge museum far up the Hudson River in Beacon. New York. It fills an entire former Nabisco box-printing factory. Some say that the vast space itself is far more beautiful than any of the exhibitions inside it.

Congratulations to Prof. **Christopher Schade**, who has taught at HCCC. He will be exhibiting his paintings and drawings at the Boston Design Center in a solo exhibition through Dec. 12.

Five artworks by **Kiki Smith** are installed on the sixth floor of the STEM Building at 263 Academy Street, where you can see many works by New Jersey artists who are also teachers.

If you will be in Paris any time soon, 100 more works by Smith are on view at Monnaie de Paris through February 2020 (https://www.monnaiedeparis.fr/). It is the artist's first solo show in France.

HCCC HONORS VETERANS WITH DISCUSSION LED BY RETIRED NAVY VETERAN ON NOV. 15

To pay tribute to area veterans, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Department of Cultural Affairs hosted a special session of the College's Art Café series. The Nov. 15, 2019 event featured a discussion on the life and legacy of an American veteran led by U.S. Navy veteran, retired Jersey City Police Officer, and Hudson County Community College alumnus Leon Tucker, Jr.

A veteran of the Vietnam War and Operation Desert Storm, Mr. Tucker spent 20 years in the U.S. Navy, stationed in the Philippines, California, and Hawaii. Mr. Tucker's valor and commendation awards include the Navy Achievement Medal, Combat Action Ribbon, Expert Rifleman Medal, Kuwait Liberation Medal, Andrew Young Black Male Achievement Award, and more.

After retiring from the Navy, Mr. Tucker continued pursuing a career in public service, joining the Jersey City Police Department (JCPD) where he was assigned to the West District, and served in the Anti-Gang Task Force. Mr. Tucker spent a year with the Hudson County Prosecutor's Office Municipal Task Force in 2005, actively involved in arresting high-profile drug dealers and breaking up gang activity. He became a conflict resolution team member at Lincoln High School, the institution he once attended. He assisted during the cleanup at Ground Zero after the 9/11 terrorist attacks at the World Trade Center, and helped in the aftermath of Superstorm Sandy.

Mr. Tucker graduated with an Associate of Applied Science degree in Criminal Justice from Hudson County Community College in 1997. He went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice at New Jersey City University, and a Master of Public Administration degree from Fairleigh Dickinson University. He retired from the JCPD in 2017.

Hudson County Community College's Student Center will be located at 81 Sip Avenue on the HCCC Journal Square Campus in Jersey City. That location is owned by HCCC but has been off-line since the Fall 2017 opening of the College's state-of-the-art STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Building.

The construction work will include complete demo/renovation of the approximately 26,000 square-foot, two-story building which has a mezzanine level and basement. Plans call for the installation of new HVAC systems, sprinklers, elevators, emergency generator, and a direct, indoor connection adjoining the Student Center to the neighboring HCCC Gabert Library. The existing roof will also be replaced.

Recent developments in the building's construction (as of late November) include:

- Inspection and removal of the oil tank is scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 5.
 Once it is removed, the water line installation will be completed.
- Installation of perimeter ceiling tiles on the first and second floors continued.
- Replacement of the ceiling grid on the mezzanine level began.
- Fire stopping and drywall finishing continued at stair tower 1, as well as on the 71 Sip Avenue (Gabert Library) connection.
- Installation of light fixtures on the first floor continued in preparation for above ceiling inspections from the City of Jersey City.
- Inspection of the elevator shaft took place on Nov. 26, and mobilizing for the installation is scheduled for the week of Dec. 2.
- On Nov. 23, the street in front of the building was "saw cut" and test pitting was performed.
- Roofers installed the cap sheet and have completed installation.
- Floor preparation on the south end of the first floor began on Nov. 23 and self-leveling of the north end was completed.
- Rough-in work above the ceiling on the first floor continued.
- Installation of toilet partitions on the lower level began.
- Work continued on the installation of sprinkler heads on the first floor and basement.
- Steel work on the rooftop continued.

The Student Center is scheduled to open during the Spring 2020 semester.

She is the past Treasurer of the Rockland County Mental Health Association Board of Directors. In 2006, Ms. Rodgers was recognized as one of Rockland County's Ten Outstanding Hispanic Women.

Get Connect-ED with HCCCI

Hudson County Community College has implemented Connect-ED, a text- and voice-messaging emergency-alert system in the event of a crisis or emergency that poses an immediate and lifethreatening danger to the College community.

Connect-ED is HCCC's response to a federal law which requires disclosure of pertinent information about campus crime and security. The system will allow the College to send time-sensitive notifications by phone, email and/or text message.

Who are your biggest inspiration that have impacted your work in some way?



To see people like, Mr. Felix and very close friends who understand what I'm trying to do and support all my craziness. HCCC and Mrs. Jennifer Christopher have been very been inspirational and helped me by believing in me since 2015.

What advice would you give to recent HCCC graduates?

Please believe in you and your aspirations. There will be people out there who will doubt you, but you can achieve your dreams. When you face them, turn your head and walk away. Stay away from negative people and those who question your future with doubt in their minds. Finish school and go on to your master's. The road might be hard but keep pushing. People didn't think I could do what I'm doing because I was 66 and I'm now 71 years old; they thought I was crazy. If I can do it, so can you.

What advice do you have for those students who are just starting their college career?

It is very simple. Stay focused, be strong, work hard, never miss class, ask questions, and you will succeed.
