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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE BEGINS SITE WORK FOR NEW TOWER FACILITY IN SPRING 2023

I udson County College (HCCC) Board of Trustees Chair, William J. Netchert, Esq., announced that the College plans to begin accepting bids for the construction of a new,

11-story, 153,186 square-foot academic tower facility in the Journal Square section of Jersey City.

"Urban college campuses such as ours require special considerations for students and neighbors in the surrounding community," Mr. Netchert stated. "This new tower will substantially accommodate those needs."

The mixed-use academic tower will be constructed on an existing, HCCC-owned parking lot located between Enos Place and Jones Street in the heart of Journal Square. It will replace a handful of the College's segregated, aging buildings along Sip Avenue from Jones Street to Tonnelle Avenue, and consolidate programs and services provided in those buildings.

Hudson County Executive Thomas A. DeGise said the County has been a partner on the complete development of HCCC and has committed \$35 million to help bring this project to fruition.

"HCCC has long been one of New Jersey's best kept secrets" "We value our ongoing partnership with Hudson County Community College and its continued growth in the many ways it benefits our residents and assists in the County's economic growth and development," County

Executive DeGise stated. "Among my proudest accomplishments over the last 20 years has been the expansion of our College and its facilities."

Dr. Christopher Reber, HCCC President, said that the new tower facility is the culmination of the HCCC Facilities Master Plan. "The vision established by our Board of Trustees is for this building to create a central, vertical, technologically advanced urban campus in the heart of Journal Square," he stated. "The new tower will enhance the overall quality of the academic experience for our students and serve our community in new and exciting ways."

Situated just a block from the Journal Square PATH Transportation Center, the new academic tower will include 24 state-of-the-art classrooms; expanded spaces for student services; expanded and centralized offices for Continuing Education and Workforce Development (CEWD); a full-size National College Athletic Association (NCAA) gymnasium and fitness center; a University

Then one's troubled past includes incarceration, there are a myriad of barriers to reentering society. Scant job opportunities become the toughest challenge. Now, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) and New Jersey Reentry Corporation (NJRC) are providing previously incarcerated citizens a pathway to new beginnings through training for in-demand careers.

On November 2, 2022, HCCC and NJRC celebrated reentry graduates of the College's Welding and Culinary Arts programs with a presentation of certificates. The event was held at the Governor's Reentry Training and Employment Center in Kearny, NJ. In attendance were NJRC founder and Chairman, former New Jersey Governor James McGreevey; HCCC President, Dr. Christopher Reber; HCCC Vice



President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Darryl Jones; Associate Vice President for Continuing Education and Workforce Development, Lori Margolin; Dean of Academic Affairs and Assessment, Dr. Heather DeVries; Dean of Business, Culinary Arts, and Hospitality Management, Dr. Ara Karakashian; and Dean of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics, Dr. Burl Yearwood.

he Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation Board of Directors announced that their 25th Anniversary Gala celebration on Thursday, December 8, 2022, raised nearly \$600,000. The event's theme, "Investing in Student Success," marked the debut of a new endowed scholarship fund, the Hudson Scholars Program Endowment, that will generate perpetual funding assistance to support student success.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber said the initial goal for the fund is \$3 million over the next several years through gifts, grants, and other investments.

"I am thrilled to announce this new fund and to share that we have raised nearly \$600,000 in recent endowment gifts, other gifts, pledges and Gala revenue," Dr. Reber stated. "This represents a College and Foundation record."

Donors who established and contributed to endowments with gifts ranging from \$25,000 to \$50,000 include Ellucian Foundation; MAST



Center for sister colleges and partners to offer baccalaureate instruction at HCCC; a new CEWD healthcare lab; exercise science lab; black box theater; student common areas; and administrative offices, among others.

According to Dr. Nicholas Chiaravalloti, HCCC Vice President for External Affairs and Senior Counsel to the President, the new HCCC academic tower will continue the technological progress of the College. "This building is designed – and will be constructed – for maximum efficiency, and the care, comfort, safety, and benefit of our students and our community," he stated.

Dr. Chiaravalloti noted that over the years the College received several awards for its fromthe-ground-up building projects. These include New Jersey Business & Industry Association (NJBIA) "New Good Neighbor" awards recognizing economic benefit/job creation, architectural merit, and community involvement in 2009 for the HCCC Culinary Conference Center; in 2012 for the North Hudson Higher Education Center; and in 2015 for the Gabert Library. HCCC buildings were also recognized with the Hudson County Planning Board 2010 Smart Growth Gold Award for the Culinary Conference Center, and 2015 Green Emerald Award for Urban Green Projects for the Gabert Library.

In addition to the County's funding, Chairman Netchert said HCCC has applied to the New Jersey Office of the Secretary of Higher Education (OSHE) for funding from the Higher Education Facilities Trust Fund (HEFT) to cover the CEWD classrooms, health laboratory, offices, as well as learning laboratory and classrooms; Higher Education Technology Infrastructure (HETI) fund for technology infrastructure; and Higher Education Equipment Leasing Fund (ELF) for the Fitness/Wellness Center and Fitness Laboratory. "We have responded to the most recent OSHE process and submitted applications valued at over \$18 million," added Netchert.

"HCCC has long been one of New Jersey's best kept secrets," Mr. Netchert stated. "The construction and utilization of this tower will bring visibility to the life-changing benefits of higher education and will be another point of pride for our students and the people of the County."

Artist News

In the Jersey City Times last month, writer Tris McCall praised the recent show at the Benjamin J. Dineen III and Dennis C. Hull Gallery on the 6th floor of the Gabert Library. The show was called, "Your Home is My Home." McCall notes that this exhibit was "the College's contribution to Hispanic Heritage Month, and it asks many [questions:] Who gets to call the Americas home, and on what basis? Are borders serving anybody, or are they just there to exacerbate ugly differentials in power? What do new arrivals in North American cities have to do to be embraced? How much of ethnic culture is heritage, how much is happenstance, and how much is simply self-preservation?" The author praises Curator Michelle Vitale for a "consistently intriguing show." The review also praises an artwork borrowed for the show from the HCCC Foundation Art Collection. The work is usually on exhibit on the 3rd floor corridor of the Gabert Library devoted to Hispanic art. McCall writes, "none encapsulates the show quite as fully as "The Crossing," a 1991 lithograph by Cuban artist Luis Cruz Azaceta. A severed head floats in a dinghy, surrounded by jagged Caribbean waves. Its eyes are bloodshot, and its mouth is frozen in a rictus, caught somewhere between amazement and horror. Should the decapitated man reach the United States, what sort of reception could he

possibly hope to get? Would it have been better for him to stay in a place where his neighbors were determined to separate his head from his shoulders? This is the existence he's guaranteed: caught between nations, robbed of volition, at home everywhere and nowhere, drifting in the great, turbulent in between." Kudos to Michelle Vitale for the show!

The Foundation Art Collection's photograph of Paris at night by Gordon Parks has been installed on the 2nd floor of the Gabert Library. Parks is famous for many things, among them his photographs of the Civil Rights Movement. An exhibit of his photos from that era is on view at Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, through January 2023. The show mostly focuses on images surrounding Park's groundbreaking pictures of Civil Rights leader Stokely Carmichael. In 1967, Life magazine published Parks's images of Carmichael, who, as chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), called for Black Power. According to the U.S. Government National Archives website, "Black Power began as revolutionary movement in the 1960s and 1970s. It emphasized racial pride, economic empowerment, and the creation of political and cultural institutions. During this era, there was a rise in the demand for Black history courses, a greater embrace of African culture, and a spread of raw artistic expression displaying the

realities of African Americans. The term "Black Power" has various origins. Its roots can be traced to author Richard Wright's non-fiction work Black Power, published in 1954. In 1965, the Lowndes County [Alabama] Freedom Organization (LCFO) used the slogan "Black Power for Black People" for its political candidates. The next year saw Black Power enter the mainstream. During the Meredith March against Fear in Mississippi, Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) Chairman Stokely Carmichael rallied marchers by chanting "we want Black Power." Carmichael's words elicited national headlines and media backlash. Parks had been on the road with Carmichael and the SNCC from fall 1966 and into the spring 1967, and took over 700 photographs (in a pre-digital age, with costly film and costly production processes, that was a lot of pictures). These included images of Carmichael speaking with Dr. King, going door-to-door in Alabama registering African American citizens to vote, and addressing Vietnam War protestors outside the United Nations building in New York City. Gordon Parks was inspired by Stokely Carmichael's message of self-determination.

Congratulations to Juan Sanchez on his recent exhibit "RICANSTRUCTIONS condiciones que existen" at the Hutchinson Modern & Contemporary Gallery in New York City. The HCCC Foundation Art Collection Coordinator stumbled on the exhibit by accident while walking down 64th Street, and was delighted by wonderful use of color and fantastic compositions. Sanchez' work can be seen on campus on the 3rd floor of the Gabert Library. Calling Sanchez, "one of the most influential and talented Nuyorican artists working today," Arlene Davila wrote a wonderful review of the show in *Hyperallergic Juan Sánchez's Nuyorican* State of Mind (hyperallergic.com), including this praise, "From painting to photography, Sánchez is a brilliant mixer of mediums; his sophisticated hybrid aesthetic echoes the very condition of being Nuyorican." According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary, a Nuyorican is a "person of Puerto Rican birth or descent who is a current or former resident of New York City." The term was coined in 1974.


an intern at the Dineen Hull Gallery during the summer of 2022.

AWPP Students' Developments

The Academic Workforce Pathway Program (AWPP) goal is to improve the students and communities with educational experiences. Studies prove that incarcerated students' perspective on life improves with participation in education programs and workforce skills (Prison Fellowship, 2022). Students are now making impacts in their communities by being examples of the academics taught to them while incarcerated. These students have contributed to their education while assisting others with resources that are available to help them after they are released.

AWPP students' final exams begin on December 12, 2022, and ends December 19, 2022, for both men and women students. All students are encouraged to participate in the Spring Semester to further their opportunity to accumulate college credits toward their degree. The women completed their first college semester with improvements

each week. On December 20, 2022, the AWPP Team is scheduled to evaluate the program's progress and outcomes for the semester.

A few impactful and successes we have had in December include, Leon Foster will end the Fall 2022 semester with the completion of 135 hours of Social Work Internship II. The program is an effective intervention for him as shown by an agreement with the judge who is committed to prioritizing his graduation from the AWPP program with his associate degree. Leon Foster is anticipated to graduate in May 2023. Leon's commitment to his

education proves that education is a pathway that can improve the Hudson County communities in the future if the outcomes continue to have productive rates of success.

Additionally, Joseph Wise, the first scholar released from incarceration inspires other AWPP students to continue seeking life-changing pathways through higher education. He continues his education through at HCCC while being committed to find a job in his field of study. In addition, he provided AWPP students with hope and inspiration through a letter of support shared with those incarcerated. In this letter he credits

Hudson County Community College Continuing Education and Workforce Development department, has grant opportunities for Hudson County residents. Gateway to Innovation is a grant initiative providing Hudson County residents with wraparound career development services toward entering a new career/academic pathway in health-care, finance, and technology.

Finally, Keith Bowens, an intern with AWPP from Rutgers University studying for his master's degree in social work (MSW) created a presentation highlighting the program success and pathways that inspire students to further their education. The presentation encourages and supports AWPP students to learn from mistakes by redirecting negative behaviors and making efforts to reduce recidivism.

accessible for all Americans," said ACCT President and CEO Jee Hang Lee. "This year's regional ACCT awardees represent the most outstanding people and programs from throughout the country, and we are excited to be able to bring attention to them."

Dr. Reber was installed as HCCC President in July 2018. He has devoted his entire 40-year-plus career to higher education, serving as President of the Community College of Beaver County (2014-18); Executive Dean and Campus Executive Officer of Venango College of Clarion University of Pennsylvania (2002-14); Associate Provost for Advancement and University Relations, Dean of Student Affairs, and Affiliate Assistant Professor of Education at Pennsylvania State University at Erie, The Behrend College (1987-2002); Director of Human Resource Development Division, and Director of Lifelong Learning at Lakeland Community College (1984-87); and other positions earlier in his career. He holds a Postdoctoral Certificate from the Institute for Educational Management, Graduate School of Education at Harvard University; Ph.D. in Education from the University of Pittsburgh; M.A. in College Student Personnel Administration from Bowling Green State University; and B.A. in Latin from Dickinson College.

Dr. Reber tirelessly and passionately advocates Hudson County Community College (HCCC) as well as state and national community college priorities. As HCCC President, he created the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI); established the Vice President for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion position and Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion; instituted the "Hudson Helps Resource Center" to promote student retention and success through wraparound services to support the holistic needs of students; initiated "Hudson Scholars," a model student retention and support program; formed community and corporate partnerships that promote upward social and economic mobility for students and community members; and successfully led HCCC throughout the twin pandemics of COVID-19, and racial/social injustice. Because of the culture of caring and connectedness Dr. Reber has nurtured, HCCC students have proudly coined the phrase, "Hudson is Home!"

"Needless to say, I am humbled and deeply moved by this honor," Dr. Reber stated. "It is a privilege to work with my colleagues at Hudson County Community College as well as our elected representatives, and community and corporate partners in creating transformational opportunities for our students, Hudson County residents, and the community college movement nationally. Our students and their achievements are inspirational."

Ellucian Chief Executive Officer and President, accepted the award. She said, "Hudson County Community College is one of the best examples in the nation of a community college that is transformational and a role model for so many others."

The Ellucian Foundation's Progress, Accomplishment, Thriving, and Hope (PATH) Scholarship Program has provided 65 colleges and universities with more than \$1 million in grants for scholarships to over 1,100 students. HCCC received a \$25,000 PATH award for students' tuition and living expenses. Additionally, the Ellucian Foundation made a \$50,000 endowment investment in the HCCC "Hudson Scholars" program that will amplify the College's capacity building efforts and help scale the program to all students in perpetuity.

The national award-winning "Hudson Scholars" program focuses on retention and improving student outcomes by scaling successful elements of acclaimed, best-practice models. "Hudson Scholars" offers one-on-one, high-impact mentoring and support, personal and academic advisement, early academic intervention, rich and meaningful programming, and financial stipends tied to academic milestone attainment. Started in Fall 2021 with initial funding through Federal stimulus dollars, the program now serves over

1,700 students who are continuing and completing their studies at three times the rate of all students. The nationally distinctive "Hudson Scholars" program model will eventually be scaled to support all HCCC students.

"Hudson Scholars" has been recognized with the 2021-22 Innovation of the Year Award by The League for Innovation in Community Colleges and is one of just ten programs in the United States invited to compete as a finalist for the 2023 National Bellwether Awards in Austin, TX next February.

Established in 1997, the Hudson County Community College Foundation is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit corporation providing tax-exempt status to contributors. The HCCC Foundation supports the College and its students by building awareness and developing financial resources. The Foundation provides scholarships, seed money for new and innovative programs, stipends for faculty development, capital to assist in the College's physical expansion, and resources to address students' basic needs beyond the classroom.



going to have opportunities for good careers and family-sustaining wages. If you want to continue your education, you are now on a pathway to a degree and a better future," he told the students.

Hudson County Community College is one of only ten community colleges in the United States to receive a \$100,000 Metallica Scholars Initiative Cohort 4 grant to train previously incarcerated individuals for certification in welding. The American Welding Society reports that by 2025, the United States will be faced with a shortage of more than 400,000 welding professionals. HCCC launched its first welding course in Spring 2022 as an elective in the College's Advanced Manufacturing associate degree program. A noncredit version of the course incorporates basic welding skills with preparation for the Certified Welder Test accredited by the American Welding Society.

"It was a phenomenal class. I went in not knowing anything about welding. Showing up was half the task. When you open up, you learn, bounce ideas off each other, and get encouragement from teachers. And when you love what you do it ceases to be a job," said welding certificate program graduate John Noonan.

HCCC's nationally recognized Culinary Arts program helps students attain the knowledge and

skills needed for a wide variety of careers. HCCC Culinary graduates include Chef Claude Lewis, founder and owner of Freetown Road Project, who earned international acclaim as a grand-prize winner of the Food Network's Chopped competition, and many others who have achieved great success and national acclaim.

"This experience taught me discipline and dedication. It's not hard if you show up and stay on track. Just come to school every day, learn, and do your cooking," said Reubina Crayton, a Culinary Arts Hot Food Proficiency Certificate program graduate. "Thanks to everyone who made my dream possible – the NJRC family and HCCC for giving us the opportunity to better ourselves."

Governor McGreevey thanked HCCC and said their partnership with NJRC is "the best in New Jersey." He applauded the College for encouraging graduates to embark on new chapters in their lives. "It is never too late for new beginnings. It is showing up and putting in the hard work," Governor McGreevey said. "What's extraordinary about this partnership is that Hudson County Community College is responding to the workforce development needs of the community. Traditionally, universities and colleges focus on academics. HCCC is also training people for careers, employment, and for an opportunity to rebuild and transform their lives."

I chose an Education major at HCCC because I enjoy helping younger people expand their knowledge, and I want to make a big impact on their lives."
