HCCC KICKS OFF THE NEW YEAR WITH GRAND OPENING OF WELCOME CENTER AT JOURNAL SQUARE

Hereica udson County Community College officially opened its new Welcome Center on Tuesday, January 11 with a ribboncutting ceremony.

The new facility is located at One PATH Plaza, on the top level of the Journal Square Transportation Center in Jersey City. The totally renovated 1,900-square-foot masonry and glass facility was developed as part of the College's capital expansion plan. Rivardo Schnitzer Capazzi was the architect for the project, and MAST Construction Services served as the Construction Manager.

The Center will be open seven days a week and will also house a 29-station computer lab for students that includes Wi-Fi Internet access, a host of computer programs, a support desk and Smart Board.

Journal Square is a primary stop on the PATH railways, serving lower and midtown Manhattan, Hoboken, Newark and Jersey City. More than eight million commuters pass through Journal Square annually.

HCCC FOUNDATION RESUMES 'SUBSCRIPTION DINING' SERIES IN SPRING 2011

This Spring, Hudson County Community College — home of one of the East Coast's most acclaimed culinary arts studies programs will resume a subscription dining program that has been established, resulting in scholarships for deserving students.

HCCC Vice President for Development, Joseph Sansone, explained that the membership fee of \$995 provides the Subscription Dining Series member with a table-for-four for eight, four-course luncheons on Fridays this spring.

The menus — which will be planned and prepared by the Executive Chef and a team of culinary professionals who teach at the College's renowned Culinary Arts Institute (CAI) will include soup, appetizer, entrée and dessert courses as well as non-alcoholic beverages. (Beer, wine and cocktails will be available at an additional charge.) All meals will be served by the CAI's professionally trained student staff in the beautifully appointed Banquet Room of the HCCC Culinary Arts Institute/Conference Center, 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City - just two blocks from the Journal Square PATH Station.

The Subscription Dining Series dates are Fridays, February 11 and 25, March 4, 11, 18 and 25, and April 8 and 15, with service from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Each meal will be completely different, and each will be equivalent to those served in the finest four-star restaurants.

Sansone said Foundation's Subscription Dining Series program was conceived and developed after several area businesspeople expressed the desire for more luncheon dining options, especially those where they could take clients and associates.

Entries must be typed on one side of 8-1/2 x 11 white paper. Scripts and poems may be either double-or singlespaced; all other manuscripts must be double-spaced. Entrants' name, address, phone number and category must appear on the first page.

Entries that are more than one page in length must be stapled.

JUDGING & NOTIFICATION Every entry will be read by the judges. Judges' decisions are final.

Submitted manuscripts will not be returned; entrants are advised to retain a copy for their records.

Only students registered at Hudson County Community College are eligible to enter.

HCCC TO HOLD INFORMATION SESSIONS FOR COLLEGE GRADUATES INTERESTED IN BECOMING TEACHERS

Hudson County Community College is continuing to conduct information sessions to acquaint college graduates with a program that will enable them to become licensed teachers.

Sessions will be held on Saturday, February 12, at 11 a.m.; Wednesday, March 16, at 6 p.m.; Tuesday, April 19, at 6:30 p.m. and Wednesday, May 18, at 6 p.m. at the College's Culinary Arts Institute/ Conference Center, 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City. HCCC, in a unique collaborative project with New Jersey City University, is offering the New Pathways to Teaching in New Jersey Program (NPTNJ). NPTNJ is a program that enables individuals who already hold a bachelor's degree (or higher) to become licensed teachers without having to complete a traditional teacher training program.

To qualify for admission

into NPTNJ, a student must have:

- A bachelor's degree from an accredited institution
- A minimum grade point average of 2.75 in undergraduate studies or the highest degree earned
- A passing score on the Praxis II Content Area exam in the intended teaching field
- A Certificate of Eligibility issued by the state of New Jersey

In addition, the College will offer an "Introduction to Teaching" course. This course is one of the requirements necessary for individuals to obtain a Certificate of Eligibility (CE) from the New Jersey Department of Education.

RENOWNED AUTHOR AND PHILOSOPHER CORNEL WEST TO SPEAK AT HCCC ON FEB. 10

O ne of America's most insightful and provocative thinkers and a groundbreaking author, Dr. Cornel West will speak at Hudson County Community College on Thursday, Feb. 10 at 6 p.m. Dr. West will appear as the third guest in the College's 2010-2011 Lecture Series at the HCCC Culinary Arts Institute/Conference Center, 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City — just two blocks from the Journal Square PATH Station. (While the event is open to all members of the community, there are no tickets remaining.)


Cornel West was born in Tulsa, Okla. in 1953 and raised in Sacramento, Calif., where his father was a contractor for the U.S. Department of Defense and his mother was a school teacher and principal (Irene B. West Elementary School in Elk Grove, Calif. is named for her). He became interested in civil rights as a young man, participating in civil rights demonstrations and organizing protests to have Black studies courses included at his high school. West attended Harvard University and

graduated magna cum laude with a degree in Near Eastern Languages and Civilization in 1973. In 1980, he earned his Ph.D. from Princeton University. He returned to Harvard as a W. E. B. DuBois Fellow and went on to become Assistant Professor at Union Theological Seminary in New York. As Director of Princeton's Afro-American Studies Program for six years and as a professor in Harvard's Department of Afro-American Studies for seven years (with a joint appointment at the Harvard Divinity School). Dr. West is one of an elite group of scholars who have strengthened African-American studies programs in this country. He is currently the Class of 1943 Professor at Princeton University.

Dr. West gained national acclaim in 1993 when his book *Race Matters* became a best seller. A searing analysis of racism in American democracy, the book has sold more than half a million copies to date. He has published 17 other books since that time. His newest, *Brother West: Living and Loving Out*

Loud, a Memoir, is an exploration of the heart behind the human mind. In the book, Dr. West discusses his growth into a progressive cultural icon, why he embraced his calling of teaching over preaching, and what it means to live as "an aspiring bluesman in a world of ideas and a jazzman in the life of the mind." Dr. West was influential in developing the storyline for the popular "Matrix" movie trilogy, and he has been providing weekly commentaries on "The Tavis Smiley Show" on Public Radio International.

HCCC President Dr. Glen Gabert said: "This has surely been one of the most exciting series of lectures we have ever hosted. We look forward to welcoming Dr. West to Hudson County and to the College. An educator and social activist whose writing and speaking have earned him praise and criticism, he is truly a Renaissance man, and we all will enjoy listening to and learning from him."

RENOMBRADO AUTOR Y FILÓSOFO CORNEL WEST Dará Discurso en HCCC el Jueves, 10 de Febrero

Uno de los pensadores más profundos y provocativos de América, Cornel West, dará discurso en HCCC, el Jueves, 10 de Febrero, a las 6:00 p.m. El Dr. West aparece como invitado en la Serie de Conferencias 2010-1011 de HCCC en el instituto de Artes Culinarias/Centro de Conferencias de la Universidad, 161 Newkirk Street en Jersey City. El evento está abierto a todos los miembros de la comunidad y la entrada es gratuita.

Cornel West nació en Tulsa, OK en 1953 y creció en Sacramento, CA, donde su padre tenía un contrato con el Departamento de Defensa de los Estados Unidos, y madre era maestra y directora escolar (la escuela Irene B. West en Elk Grove, CA fue nombrada en su honor). Su interés por derechos civiles lo tuvo desde muy joven, participando en demostraciones de derechos civiles y organizando protestas para que cursos de estudio Afro Americanos fueran incluidos en su escuela secundaria. West asistió a Harvard University y se graduó con los más altos honores (magna cum laude) con un grado en Lenguajes y Civilización del Cercano Oriente en 1973. En 1980, obtuvo su Doctorado de Princeton University. Regresó a Harvard como un W.E.B. DuBois Fellow y se convirtió en Asistente de profesor en el Seminario Teológico Union de New York.

Como Director del Programa de Estudios Afro Americanos en Princeton University por seis años y profesor en el Departamento de Estudios Afro Americanos de Harvard por siete años (con nombramiento doble en la Escuela de Divinidad de Harvard), el Dr. West es miembro de un grupo de escolásticos que han fortalecido los programas de estudios Afro Americanos en el país. Es actualmente Maestro de la Clase de 1943 en Princeton University.

El Dr. West obtuvo aclamación nacional en 1993 cuando su libro Race Matters (Raza Importa) se convirtió en el mejor vendido. Un análisis del racismo en la democracia de América, el libro ha vendido más de medio millón de copias hasta la fecha. Ha publicado otros diecisiete libros desde aquel. El más reciente, Brother West: Living and Loving Out Loud, a Memoir (Hermano West: Viviendo y Amando a Gritos, Memoria) es una exploración del corazón detrás de la mente humana

En el libro el Dr. West discute su crecimiento convirtiéndose en un ícono cultural, porque albergó su llamado a educar en lugar de predicar y lo que significa vivir como "un melancólico en un mundo de ideas y como un cuentero en la vida de la mente." Dr. West fue de influencia en el desarrollo de la historia para la popular trilogía de películas "Matrix" y ha estado proveyendo de comentarios semanales a "The Tavis Smiley Show" en Public Radio International.

El Dr. Glen Gabert, Presidente de HCCC dijo: "Esta sin duda ha sido una las series de conferencias más excitantes que hemos auspiciado. Estamos ansiosos de dar la bienvenida al Dr. West al Condado de Hudson y a la Universidad. Un educador y activista social cuyos escritos y discursos le han dado honores y críticas, Él es realmente un hombre del Renacimiento, y todos disfrutaremos escucharlo y aprender de él."

La serie de conferencias de este año culminará el próximo 3 de Marzo con la presentación de Juju Chang, presentadora de *Good Morning America* de la cadena ABC-TV.

FEBRUARY TESTING SCHEDULE

Il new students are required to take the CPT, which allows for course placement that is appropriate to their skill level. In certain cases, such as if a student testing has not completed high school or its equivalent (GED), the Placement Test can also be used to determine eligibility for financial aid.

It is extremely important that you take the College Placement Test seriously. Depending on your score, you may have to register for and pay to take additional semesters of courses that do not bear college credit/ count toward graduation.

2011 continues, the A Datatel information system conversion continues. The new computer system, known as Colleague, integrates data from across the College community in an effort to streamline processes and empower all users (faculty, staff and students). Additionally, MyHudson, the name for the new HCCC Portal, is a webbased tool available that centralizes HCCC information for all who use it and Liberty Link is the tool inside the Portal that gives users access to real-time information from Colleague.

By the time you read this, *Colleague* will be already be in use to pay employees (full-time and part-time). The Human Resources/Payroll module is one of the major components that has now been incorporated in the implementation project. Later this year, Human Resources will be adding options to your *Liberty Link* menu so that employees can view additional information through *MyHudson*.

Community Education is currently transitioning to *Colleague* to conduct their business. Datatel consultants are working with this department to train CE personnel on the Datatel tools they will soon use. Community Education will also have a significant presence on the new college website, another Datatelrelated improvement that will premiere in a few months.

Progress continues as we transition to the new system. Please be patient as all of us adjust to our "new" way of doing business. Once everyone gets more familiar with *Colleague, MyHudson*, and *Liberty Link* and our other new tools, you will notice even more improvements.
