HUDSON COUNTY NATIVE THOMAS A. BRODOWSKI INSTALLED AS VICE PRESIDENT FOR ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES



t its monthly meeting on January 28, the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Board of Trustees approved the reorganization of the College's senior leadership team, and the installation of Thomas A. Brodowski to the newly created position of Vice President for Administrative Services.

HCCC Board Chair William J. Netchert, Esq. said that over the past several months, members of the Board's Executive Committee — along with the Chairman of the Board's Personnel Committee and HCCC President Dr. Glen Gabert — had examined and assessed the structure and organization of the College President's Cabinet.

"We determined that we should restructure the President's Cabinet so as to best utilize the strengths of current staff and to make certain the College was positioned to meet long-term goals associated with our mission, vision and growth," Mr. Netchert stated.

The Board concluded that the position of Vice President for Administrative Services should be added to the staffing table, and the positions of Vice President for Finance and Vice President for College Operations should be deleted and replaced with the positions of Chief Financial Officer and Executive Director for College Operations. The Vice President for Administrative Services will report directly to the President, and four areas currently reporting to the President — Finance, Operations, Technology and Human Resources — will now report to the new vice president and thereby form the new Administrative Services Branch.

The Board approved the appointment of Thomas A. Brodowski as the new Vice President for Administrative Services. A native of Hudson County, Mr. Brodowski holds a Bachelor's degree in Mechanical Engineering/Construction Management and Master's degree in Engineering Management from New Jersey Institute of Technology (NJIT). He is an adjunct professor at NJIT, where he teaches Strategic Planning and Project Management on the graduate level.

Mr. Brodowski has extensive professional experience in both the for-profit and nonprofit sectors, with direct supervision of four areas that will report to him at

The Hudson County Business Management Training Program began on January 7 with "Introduction to Management." Fifteen employees from various small businesses in Hudson County were in attendance. CBI looks forward to working with Hudson Community Enterprises to train their employees in computers. This training is funded through the NJBIA Basic Literacy Grant. Free training through this grant continues to be a great way for CBI to reach out to businesses in Hudson County.

Jo Ann Kulpeksa, Enrollment Support Assistant,

explains her role at Hudson County Community College very clearly: "Number one is to help the students, to guide them and to assist with any problem or question they may have. Number two is to enter all of the applications so that they're current and accurate when they get to their counselor or financial aid." She has been assisting students as a full-time employee for eight years at HCCC. "The most important thing is letting students know you're there to help."

Before coming to HCCC, she owned a bagel shop in Montclair with her sister, who made all of the baked treats by hand. "I love people; I love working with people" she says. After the landlord raised their rent beyond their means, she applied for work at a temp agency and worked at the Daily News magazine section, U.S. News and World Report, and The Atlantic Monthly, performing payroll functions. She was promoted to the Assistant to the Chief Financial Officer position when the incumbent took ill, but eventually lost the position when she returned. Back at the temp agency, she was placed at HCCC and worked for Robert Martin.

"They liked me," she says with a smile. She told a story to illustrate her role and how connected she feels to the students and the College. "A young man came in with his entire family: Mom, Dad, Uncle and Aunt. They were new arrivals and needed help. I walked him over to take his placement test and he was so sweet and appreciative. Throughout the semester, he came to see me with questions. Other employees asked me, 'doesn't it bother you that he comes so often and asks so many questions?' No, it doesn't bother me at all.

"The young man graduated in two years as valedictorian! He thanked his mother and then he thanked me during his speech. I had so much pleasure helping him. He's at Stevens [Institute] now. The extra step is very important. They totally appreciate it."

When asked about changes at the College, she responded enthusiastically about the growing number of online applications. In the online system students enter their own information and spell their names correctly which cuts down on time wasted double-checking documents. "It's so important to get the information right. We don't want any errors to get in the way of students being successful."

Rosie Soy Associate Professor, English

"I didn't follow the traditional path; I was a woman with a career."

Many scholars agree that the momentum of the modern women's movement began at the Seneca Falls Convention in 1848. That meeting became the symbolic catalyst for later suffrage activities. In 2013, when Rosie Soy found out about an event being held by Hostos Community College to continue to examine social and civil rights issues for women, she eagerly agreed to be a presenter. "I wanted to be part of the event at the place where the women's movement began! It was a privilege to speak there, to connect. They didn't see me as an authority figure. The students there reminded me of the students here at HCCC."

Back in the 1990s, Barry Tompkins approached Professor Soy to see if she wanted to create a Women's Studies program at Hudson County Community College. She agreed, having studied and taught women's literature. In her master's thesis on racial affirmation at the University of California, San Diego, she looked at seminal texts (Maud Martha by Gwendolyn Brooks, A Raisin in the Sun by Lorraine Hansberry, and others) and probed into the images of African-American women in literature. She is grateful to Professor Tompkins for getting her started on the Women's Studies course and launching the program. And she appreciates all of the work done on behalf of the program by the coordinator, Dorothy Anderson.

Originally a history major at San Francisco State University, she applied for work as a secondary education teacher but found that only substitute teaching positions were available. In California, she met Stefan Bosworth,

who would later become her husband. and traveled with him back to New York, accepting work as a preschool teacher. After marriage, they set off for California again where Stefan took a job teaching history at UC San Diego. Rosie applied to the university's literature department and began to study African-American literature. Having grown up in a suburb and having later experienced living in the diverse Sugar Hill neighborhood just north of Harlem, she appreciated the "slice of life" that a diverse neighborhood presents. She earned her master's and began teaching part-time at CUNY. When a full-time position was advertised at HCCC, she applied.

Since her first year at HCCC, she has been teaching the Humanities course, amongst others. She says: "In the humanities course you can teach students about cultures; I wanted them to look at cultures that came here. I tell students that I'm an immigrant and they're surprised. My parents came here from the Philippines. I knew I was different; we ate different food. I would have to explain to Americans where the Philippines were. Everyone else at school was white. I focus on issues of identity in class, American identity, the American Dream. I want them to figure out that we have ethnic literatures even though we're all American. I have them read Out of the Shadow by Rose Cohen about an immigrant's real experiences."

Each semester Professor Soy has her humanities students complete a research paper. Recently, at the end of the semester, a male student came up and shook her hand. He told her, "thank you so much, I have learned a lot." She was genuinely surprised to be thanked. "I'm amazed that students are still interested in their personal lives and the connection to what they're doing at the College."

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE NAMES NEW DEAN FOR STUDENT SERVICES



t its December meeting, the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Board of Trustees affirmed the promotion of Michael Reimer to Dean for Students Services.

Mr. Reimer holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Saint Peter's University (New Jersey) and Master of Arts degree

from Fairfield University (Connecticut).

He began his career in education as Graduate Assistant in Student Affairs at Fairfield University and went on to become that school's Director of Student Activities. He was also a middle school teacher at a New York school.

In 2004, Mr. Reimer joined the staff of Hudson County Community College as Coordinator of the College's Transfer Services Department, and also served as Director of Advisement & Counseling and Associate Dean for Student Services.

HCCC Vice President for North Hudson & Student Affairs Dr. Paula P. Pando said that Mr. Reimer has made significant contributions to the College, its students and the community. Among his accomplishments: Serving as team leader for implementation of the student module of Colleague (a single-source software suite); assisting in organizing a Superstorm Sandy Relief Fair which benefited and assisted community members affected by the 2012 hurricane; assisting in launching several technological initiatives, including Retention Alert (for faculty) and MOX (a mobile access app for students; developing the online College Student Success Course; revising the New Student Orientation program and creating an online module to maximize student participation; and strengthening support services for armed forces veterans who are students by partnering with the VET Center of Secaucus to make counseling, and support and referral services available on the HCCC campus.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS HOLDS DISCUSSION ON TEACHING

Academic Affairs faculty and administrators met to discuss the effect of MOOC's (massive open online courses) on traditional instruction.



embers of the Academic Affairs Division met on Friday, January 10 in the Follett Lounge at the Culinary Conference Center to discuss a recent article in The Chronicle of Higher Education, "Will MOOCs Change the Way Professors Handle the Classroom?" The provocative article by Jeffrey R. Young in the Nov. 7, 2013 issue of the Chronicle focused on MOOCs, the massive, free online courses that are making their way into K-12 and college curricula across the United States.

A lively, interdisciplinary discussion centered around several claims made in the article, including "there's a growing sense that monologues by professors are of limited effectiveness," and that "new approaches challenge fundamental notions of the role of the professor in the classroom." While some, including Dean Christopher Wahl, challenged the premises of the article as faulty, arguing that what the author describes is not really the current model, others worried about the "unprecedented"

power" that education/technology companies may gain over the education process.

Dr. Nancy Booth added that "we have multiple opportunities to supplement our traditional courses; this is just the latest." Dr. Eric Friedman, Vice President for Academic Affairs, who convened the discussion, said that "having faculty and administrators together to debate current trends in higher education is essential for resource allocation and the future direction of the College."


PROFESSIONAL NOTES

Emma Amos says about her art: "I hope the subjects of my paintings dislodge, question and tweak prejudices and notions relating to art and who makes it, poses for it, shows it, and buys it. The work reflects my investigations into the otherness often seen by white male artists, along with the notion of desire, the dark body versus the white body, racism, and my wish to provoke more thoughtful ways of thinking and seeing."

Faith Ringgold's work is installed at the North Hudson Higher Education Center. Ringgold has received more than 75 awards including 22 Honorary Doctor of Fine Arts. She is especially well known for her painted story quilts, which blur the line between "high art" and "craft" by combining painting, quilted fabric and storytelling. She has written and illustrated 17 children's books.







CONSTRUCTION OF HCCC'S NEW LIBRARY CONTINUES



Construction of Hudson County Community College's new Library/Academic Classroom Building is still in progress. When completed later this year, the building will house a 33,000 square-foot Library on the first two floors; nearly 30 classrooms in traditional, computer-lab and tiered lecture hall designs; and on the top floor a rooftop terrace, a large lobby/exhibition area and three flexible-size classrooms with moveable partitions.

TESTING SCHEDULE

all new students are required to take the CPT, which allows for course placement that is appropriate to their skill level. We have created a walk-in schedule to give students the opportunity to Study/Review their Math and English skills prior to visiting the Testing Center.

It is extremely important that you take the College Placement Test seriously. Depending on your score, you may have to register for and pay to take additional semesters of courses that do not bear college credit/count toward graduation.

Before Taking the CPT:

- a. Students must submit an Application to Admissions (70 Sip Ave.)
- b. To review for the College (College Board's "Accuplacer"), please visit: www.college-board. com/student/testing/accuplacer/
- c. For CPT exemption criteria such as SAT scores and applied transfer credit for English and/or Mathematics visit: www.hccc.edu/testing

On the day of the CPT students must:

- a. Report at least 10 minutes before the test start time.
- b. Bring photo ID (Driver's License/Passport/Green Card / Student ID).
- c. Have your College Wide ID number.
- d. Bring a copy of transcripts (only if student is a transfer or foreign student).

About the CLEP:

The College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) gives students the opportunity to receive college credit for what they already know. For more information on CLEP, please visit: www.collegeboard.com/student/testing/clep/about.html

Before Taking the CLEP Exam:

- a. Please call (201) 360-4191 or -4192, as CLEP exams are administered by appointment only.
- b. All appointment cancellations must be made at least 24 hours in advance.
- c. HCCC students must have a permit to take the CLEP (form available at the Testing Center or the MyHudson portal). It is recommended that visiting students review their school's CLEP policy before registering.
- d. All students must pay a \$20 HCCC service fee (non-refundable) per examination at the Bursar's Office, located at 70 Sip Avenue, Jersey City, or the North Hudson Center Main Office, located at 4800 Kennedy Blvd., Union City, NJ. This fee must be paid prior to setting an appointment for the exam. Testers must show receipt on the day of CLEP exam.
- e. Please contact the Testing Center for an appointment: (201) 360-4194, - 4192 or - 4191.

On the Day of the CLEP Exam:

- a. Students must report at least 10 minutes before the test start time.
- b. Bring two (2) forms of identification (Driver's License, Passport, Green Card, Student ID, or Military ID).
- c. Bring \$20 receipt from Bursar's Office.
- d. Bring \$80 CLEP Fee: money order, payable to ETS/CLEP, or credit card (Visa, MasterCard, American Express, or Discover are accepted).
