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### HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE RECEIVES \$850,000 INVESTMENT FROM JPMORGAN CHASE

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) has been named the recipient of a oneyear, \$850,000 investment from JPMorgan Chase. The investment will be utilized for a program the College developed to address the challenges of the economic crisis in Hudson County that were brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic. The program is designed to provide lasting improvement in the County's workforce ecosystem.

"We are exceedingly grateful to JPMorgan Chase for funding our 'Gateway to Innovation' initiative," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. "This program is strategically aligned with needs related to the community's COVID-19 challenges, and the College's student success and 'Hudson Helps' initiatives."

Dr. Reber said the HCCC "Gateway to Innovation" project was developed to provide short-term, upskilling credential attainment opportunities in health care; career services for alumni in areas such as health care, information technology, finance, insurance, and logistics; enhanced non-academic support for students, including financial counseling and access to benefits such as WIC, SNAP, and citizenship guidance; and deeper engagement with employers in technology, finance and other recession-resistant sectors that will lead to resilient career pathways.

"Our neighbors in Hudson County have been uniquely impacted by challenges stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic," said Abby Marquand, Vice President, Global Philanthropy, JPMorgan Chase. "We are proud to support Hudson County Community College in their effort to develop and enhance sustainable career pipelines that will help more people get back to work in in-demand industries."

Over the course of the next year, the College will focus on building relationships with area employers to define in-demand skill sets; recruiting industry experts for adjunct teaching as well as faculty externships and experiential learning for students; and creating new programs that support and increase student retention and graduation and engage alumni. The initiative will also target dislocated workers from retail, hospitality and service sectors and help prepare them for recession-resistant careers in health care, including Certified Nursing Assistant, Patient Care Technician, Pharmacy Technician and Hemodialysis Technician positions.

### HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE OFFERS NEW CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN CULINARY BUSINESS INNOVATION

HI udson County Community College (HCCC) is offering a new academic certificate in Culinary Business Innovation for careeroriented individuals who want to improve their employment opportunities or use their culinary talents to start a successful business.

"The culinary industry has been especially hard hit during the pandemic, and this certificate program prepares students to navigate current and anticipated business challenges in the industry," said HCCC President, Dr. Chris Reber. "This certificate program will assist those currently working in the industry to advance their careers, and will provide those starting a culinary enterprise with the business background that is essential for success."

Experienced and new culinary professionals who enroll in the 30-credit, two-semester Culinary Business Innovation certificate program will acquire the accounting, management, marketing, leadership, culinary, and entrepreneurial skills that are key to career and economic growth. Upon successfully completing the program, students will be professionally certified with the ServSafe Food Manager Certification.

The HCCC Culinary Business Innovation program is closely aligned with the curricular requirements of the HCCC Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree in Hospitality Management – Entrepreneurship Option. The A.A.S. degree program focuses on how new businesses are created and how they can thrive.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects employment of chefs and head cooks to grow 10 percent from 2016 to 2026, faster than the average for all occupations. Food Service Manager positions are projected to grow 9 percent, with the addition of 27,600 jobs.

### **COLLEGE SERVICE DAY 2021 - RISING TO THE CHALLENGE OF EXCEPTIONAL TIMES**


hursday, January 21, 2021, saw the convening of more than 350 faculty, staff, administrators, and invited guests at Hudson County Community College's Professional Development Day, as part of our spring semester start-up events. College Service Day (CSD) opened at 9:00 a.m. and concluded at 4:30 p.m. The evening program, All College Faculty Orientation (ACFO), kicked off at 6:40 p.m., just after departmental meetings and a dinner break. Both events were held on the same day. This makes the 2nd fully virtual CSD and ACFO. Things were different this year because of the pandemic, now lasting nearly one solid year. It's been a challenge for our students, our faculty, our administrators, our staff, our trustees, and our community. There were times when decisions had to be implemented quickly. Everyone had to rise to new and different challenges to remain successful in these exceptional times, mission accomplished! Our efforts help mark the year's CSD theme "Rising to the Challenge of Exceptional Times." A theme significant to our past accomplishments and one that can inspire us to do even greater things in the future. The theme is a collaboration and consensus, during multiple meetings, of members who serve on the CSD planning committee.

The event kicked off with a moment of silence for the recent attacks on Capitol Hill and acts of hatred and racism displayed throughout our nation. Attendees were then lifted by an inspiring student welcome from Warren Rigby, Member of the ACCT Student Trustee Advisory Committee, and a recent HCCC graduate who shared his journey in completing one degree and beginning another in pursuit of a degree in our nationally recognized Nursing program. The audience listened attentively to important updates from Dr. Chris Reber, College President on where the college is headed, and how everyone is involved in the success of our future. He shared updates on some staff reorganizations created by the resignation of Dr. Eric Friedman who began a new position at President of Bergen Community College. Dr. Reber also spoke about critical steps taken to prepare the campus to keep everyone safe and whole, and updates on the state's CCOG for students. Dr. Darryl Jones, Vice

President for Academic Affairs shared a list of new hires and gave them a warm welcome to the HCCC family, and offered a powerful welcome back to all faculty, staff, and students! This semester we were able to continue the Philip Johnston Excellence in Teaching awards program with the addition of two deserving faculty members added to our long list of past awardees. The 2021 award recipients were Laurie Riccadonna, Professor, Humanities and Dr. Clive Li, Instructor, STEM. Dr. Frederick Bonato, Provost and Vice-President for Academic Affairs of Saint Peter's University, was our judge and on hand to make the announcement. Each award recipient received a beautiful plaque and monetary gift.

Other highlights from the morning program included a panel of our key University transfer partners who shared their institution's processes and steps for general education curriculum and the role it plays in a student's success in learning, graduating, and transferring to continue their education. Panel members delved into their processes for assessing general education curriculum, including DEI principles into their classrooms, and changes they expect for the future of general education. Panelist included the following university representatives: Dr. Jason D. Martinek, Interim Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences, New Jersey City University, Dr. Maurie Cohen, Professor of Sustainability Studies and Chair of Department of Humanities, New Jersey Institute of Technology, Dr. Sofia Pinto-Figueroa, Associate Dean of Undergraduate Education & Dean of Academic Services Rutgers University, and Dr. WeiDong Zhu, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, Saint Peter's University. The panel was moderated by our very own, Alison Bach, Assistant Professor of English and Heather DeVries, Dean, Academic Affairs and Assessment. We heard short updates about OER, ITV and COL.

A panel of HCCC's Faculty Members, Dr. Jerry Lamb, Assistant Professor, Criminal Justice, Dr. Sirhan Abdullah, Assistant Professor, Health Services, Dr. Clive Li, Instructor, STEM, and Elana Winslow, Assistant Professor, Business, shared best practices for remote teaching. The panel was





#### **ARTIST NEWS**

The Foundation Art Collection recently acquired a work by Iranian American artist **Shirin Neshat**, which we hope to install later this year. Neshat has an exhibition through Feb. 27, called "Land of Dreams" at the Gladstone Gallery in New York City. Recently, in an interview published in the Christian Science Monitor, Neshat said that political art should be not obvious and preachy. "It's wrong to tell people what's right and what's wrong. But it is possible to make art that makes people think about important issues in a whole new way and have new insight." In her 30-year career, she has struggled to strike a balance in her work that is politically conscious, "tackling the real issues we're facing - and allowing multiple interpretations so people can think about it and take away whatever they wish." She strives in her work, "to emphasize the diversity in this country between multiracial ethnicities and the shared humanity that defines America." She says, "the American identity is this multiplicity and hybridity."

If you like Ed Ruscha's work, installed in the sculpture cabinet on the sixth floor of the Gabert Library, or if you're interested in urban photography, or if you'd just like to take a virtual vacation in California right now, you might like "12 Sunsets," a recent online exhibit by the Getty Museum in Los Angeles. The Washington Post says this interactive website is "so cool it hardly knows what to do with itself. Which, of course, only reinforces its cool." Starting in 1966, the artist drove Sunset Strip in California with a camera on his truck, and used the photographs he took to make an artists book called, "Every building on the Sunset Strip." Ruscha and his team have continued photographing Los Angeles for the last 55 years, amassing over 60,000 photographs. west on Sunset Strip, and you can time travel: To go forward in time use the up arrow; to go back, use the down arrow.

What is an artist's book? Here's Jennie Smith. the senior teaching artist at the De Young Museum in San Francisco, teaching kids how to make one: How To: Memory Book Inspired by Jennifer Bartlett's "Four Seasons" (https://www.youtube. com/watch?v=oOHea8vqK48&feature=emb\_ logo). She uses for inspiration a series of works by Jennifer Bartlett (whose painting, Homan-Ji Series XI: Trees and Forest, is installed our Academic Affairs conference room on the fourth floor of 70 Sip Avenue). The materials are simple — you can use stuff you have at home – a brown paper grocery bag, an old cereal box, a glue stick, a pair of scissors and some crayons--to make a lovely book. This video project is designed for kids ages 3-8, but as a person who's fine with careful instructions and low-stakes assignments, I enjoyed it too.

Andy Warhol is one of the best-known artists in the world. His work, *Perrier White*, can be seen on campus in the Dean's Reception Area (Room 218) of the Culinary Conference Center. Recently, his role as a pioneer in creating gay-themed art has been celebrated in a new book called *Andy Warhol: Love, Sex and Desire. Drawings* 1950-1962. ### LANDMARK LEGISLATIVE ACTION: PASSAGE OF LEGISLATION TO ESTABLISH THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE OPPORTUNITY GRANT AS A PERMANENT PROGRAM

n Monday, Jan. 11, the New Jersey Senate voted 26-6 to establish the Community College Opportunity Grant (CCOG) program as a permanent state financial aid program. The Assembly, which passed the legislature late last year, concurred with Senate amendments to the legislation yesterday as well. The legislation (A4410 / S2743) will now go to Governor Murphy for his signature.

The Community College Opportunity Grant program provides a last-dollar scholarship to attend a community college for individuals in households earning \$65,000 adjusted gross income or less. The CCOG program was first established in the state's FY 2019 budget and assisted more than 18,000 students last year, including recent high school graduates and working adults. These students enrolled in a community college and embarked on a path toward earning college degrees and credentials. CCOG expands economic opportunity while helping New Jersey build a productive and innovative workforce that enables economic growth and recovery. "It was an important day for the future of our state, our economy, and all who live in our great state" according to Dr. Aaron R. Fichtner, President of the New Jersey Council of County Colleges.

When this legislation is signed by the Governor, current and future students will have the certainty to know that this program will be there for them now and into the future.

"Thanks to Governor Murphy and our legislators, greater numbers of students can take advantage of this free-tuition program," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. "Thousands of HCCC students balance college with full-time employment, full-time studies, and caring for their families. This program enables our students to achieve their higher education goals while managing other important priorities."

New Jersey's 18 community colleges thank Senate President Steve Sweeney, Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin and the entire Senate and Assembly for their support of this landmark legislation. The colleges thank Governor Murphy for proposing



and supporting this program during the past three years and look forward to his signature.




