The award was presented at the Regional Awards Luncheon of the 52nd Annual ACCT Leadership Congress in San Diego, California. Industry County Community College (HCCC) officially celebrated the grand opening of its new Student Center at 81 Sip Avenue in Jersey City on Thursday, September 30, 2021. A ribbon-cutting ceremony took place at 12:00 noon with HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber officiating. Food tastings from Libby's Home Kitchen and Starbucks, which are located in the Student Center, were available for students

throughout the day. Attendees explored the new Student Center through self-guided tours.

The College-owned building, which formerly housed faculty offices and classrooms, underwent an \$8.2 million renovation that was completed at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020. "This building is the first, dedicated

udson County Community College (HCCC)
President Dr. Christopher Reber and
Kearny School District Superintendent
Patricia Blood signed an agreement for the HCCC
Early College Program on Thursday, Oct. 21. The
signing ceremony took place in the Scott Ring
Room of the HCCC Culinary Conference Center,
161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City.

As a result of the agreement, Kearny High School (KHS) students will have the opportunity to earn their Associate of Arts in Liberal Arts degree upon high school graduation. Students will complete a combination of college-level courses taught as part of the high school curriculum by qualified high school instructors, and courses taught by HCCC faculty on the KHS campus after regular school hours. Credits earned transfer toward baccalaureate degrees at four-year colleges and universities, and students who complete the program will finish their senior year of high school with both a high school diploma and an HCCC degree.

The sixteen KHS students enrolled in the first HCCC-KHS cohort may take Basic French I, College Composition I, College Student Success, and Introduction to Computers during the 2021-22 academic year.

"Students enrolled in the HCCC Early College Program literally jump-start their college education while paying only half of the In-County

tuition rate – a huge savings in comparison to tuition at four-year institutions," said Dr. Reber.

In May of this year, HCCC presented associate degrees to 29 Hudson County high school graduates, including 18 students from Dickinson, Lincoln, and Ferris High Schools in Jersey City, and 11 students from Hudson County Schools of Technology's High Tech High School.

OUR STORIES UNTOLD

ver 50 faculty, staff and students joined Professor Karen Galli and her family on Friday, October 8th, 2021, for the first Fall 2021 session of the Our Stories Untold series. Professor Galli began her story with a memory that during her undergraduate and graduate studies, she came across very few if any Asian or Latinx instructors. Her story throughout the one-hour program reinforced the theme of belongingness and connections that she has made over her life's journey thus far, where she's been, how she thinks, and how all this informs her teaching.

Professor Galli posed three questions that she would typically pose to others to understand them better during her presentation. The first was about art. Professor Galli spoke about Ai Weiwei's Kui Hua Zi exhibit, which featured 100 million sunflower seeds made from porcelain, individually delicate but collectively powerful. She continued by showcasing the number 1,445,524,887 – which represented the number of people in China. She asked, "Where do I fit?" and asked the audience to wonder how a billion more people in an entirely different country can exist separately yet resemble each other.

The second question was about the books that influenced her. She noted her discovery of a comic book, *Lo Fu Zhi* ("Old Master Q"), and

its complicated meaning to her, allowing for visual storytelling and a connection to a culture that was so far from what she knew and what she understood. Another book, the World According to Garp, or at



least the discovery of it, made her feel like a rebel at eight years old, setting her up for the joy of discovering life's journey. She further shared that A Field Guide to Getting Lost by Rebecca Solnit had the most influence on her life. Because it allowed her to think about the things that are far from you, but that can look different when they're close, and things up close that can look different when they're very far from you. This book was also the catalyst to her traveling the world and discovering her true self. Further, Beyond Despair by Aharon Appelfeld set her on a journey of researching epigenetic inheritance and how stories can have a profound impact even if our generation is not experiencing trauma.

Professor Galli began her presentation with a quote: "Do I dare disturb the universe in a minute there is time for decision and revisions which a minute will reverse." The universe and our community seem to agree. With several of Professor



he mission of the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion is to promote an institutional climate that embraces and celebrates differences while championing equitable and inclusive practices, policies, and procedures in all College activities. The Office leads and supports practices that foster safe, inclusive, and accessible facilities and activities for all community members.

On September 1, 2021, the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion launched virtual listening hours, entitled "We're All Ears," that invited members of the faculty, staff, students and beyond, to engage with the DEI Team (Yeurys Pujols, Vice President for the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; Natalia Vazquez-Bodkin, Associate Director for the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; Jacqueline Safont, Director Accessibility Services; and Michelle Vitale, Director of Cultural Affairs).

The purpose in holding "listening spaces" is not just to market the newly developed Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion to HCCC members, but also to create synergy among departments and institutional goals and efforts by providing internal stakeholders a safe space to discuss how the Office of DEI can support the various areas of the College community and the students served. This space also allowed everyone to address any questions, comments, or concerns. Throughout four sessions, over 25 participants tuned in to the listening hours. The dialogue provided the team with a foundation to address some of the needs within the College community.

In the upcoming months, the DEI team is conducting Team Participatory Action Workshops (PAW) with supervisors and their teams around the campus. The "Team PAW" was developed adopting the framework used in participatory action research (PAR) that is an approach that seeks to generate personal healing and social change through focused discussion and analysis with community members. The purpose of the Team PAW is to collectively consider ways to infuse DEI into specific areas of our College community by focusing on what currently exists and locating and strengthening potential gaps.

Artist News

If you like **Judy Brodsky's** art work, "Iron Horses," on the 4th floor of the STEM building, in the area devoted to Urban Landscapes, you might be interested in her recent article in *Hyperallergic* called, "A History of Digital Art Through a Feminist Lens." Despite the fact that the most famous artists today in the world of digital art are men, Brodsky notes that, "Many of the issues connected

to digital art were raised by women digital artists as early as the late 1960s when computers first became publicly available. Until then, digital technology was in the domain of the military, the government, and major university laboratories." If you're interested in the re-visioning of digital art's history to be inclusive, check out Brodsky's recently published book: Dismantling the Patriarchy, Bit by Bit: Art, Feminism, and Digital Technology.

Camden, New Jersey-born artist Mickalene Thomas, whose works are installed on the first floor of the Gabert Library, was recently profiled in the New York Times by Angela Flournoy (October 13, 2021). "Camden's not an easy place to break from," said Thomas. "I took the first opportunity to get out without hesitation." After leaving high school at 17, she followed a girlfriend home to Portland, Oregon. At first, Thomas wanted to study art therapy, or perhaps interior design, but then she saw Carrie Mae Weems' photographs in an exhibit called: "Kitchen Table Series" "in which Weems plays, and plays with, different roles of Black womanhood in the traditionally gendered family space." That inspired Thomas to go to art school. She returned to the New York metro area and enrolled at Pratt Institute earning her B.F.A. If you look at her work installed in the Gabert Library, you'll notice Crayola crayons and glitter. "She's always been very good at taking humble materials and imbuing them with this kind of nobility," said artist Kehinde Wiley. "And a part of it has to do with just the self-assured sass that comes with it. You know, I don't know if it's sass or cockiness, but it's this kind of attitude that comes from knowing your own value." The Times notes, "The things an artist endures while growing up certainly don't define who they are, but in the case of Thomas, the good and the bad of those years seem to have fueled a particular kind of tenacity and an irrepressible urge to do things her way..." To which we might add, "with well-deserved success."

The exhibition began by presenting his still life flower paintings, such as the *Sunflowers* and the *Irises*, highlighting how he would continuously draw the same subject to improve. It is also important to note that during his career he was influenced by Japanese art which inspired paintings such as *The Courtesan: after Eisen and the Almond Blossoms*. There was also a replica of van Gogh's *The Bedroom*, where students were able to take pictures and stand in the room van Gogh depicted in his painting. After the exploration of Van Gogh's artistic journey, the exhibition led into a wide room where spectators were immersed in the colorful and impressive painting in a show that

lasted about 30 minutes. Attendees were encouraged to sit down and absorb the vibrancy and life of his painting in a magical experience, from the *Starry Night* to the *Wheatfield with Crows*.

Once the exhibition was over, EOF scholars were able to artistically express themselves by coloring famous Van Gogh printouts, which they could hang to be displayed. They also had the opportunity to try the VR experience that displayed the town van Gogh lived in and was inspired by to create some of his most famous art. This was a great opportunity for EOF Scholars to learn about and experience the incredible art of Vincent van Gogh.



Student Center in the College's 47-year history, and because of the pandemic, this is the first time our students are able to take full advantage of everything it offers," Dr. Reber stated. He said the HCCC Student Center has been bustling these past few weeks, and Student Center Information Desk Assistants have been very busy because of increased on-campus classes.

Di Cara | Rubino Architects designed the renovation to create a state-of-the-art setting that affords students the very best in technology, safety, and convenience. The Student Center is the "living room" for all HCCC students – a place where students can relax, meet outside the classroom, share ideas and values, assist and advise one another, pursue career and employment opportunities, attend events celebrating diverse cultures, and build long-lasting relationships.

The HCCC Student Center first floor includes the Welcome Center, Student Lounges, full-service Café, Veterans' Lounge, and Security Command Center. The second floor houses offices for Student Life, Student Government and a variety of other student organizations, an Open Lounge, and a large, Multipurpose Room for events and meetings. Offices of the College's Security, Custodial and Facilities staff, and storage space are located on the lower level.

The renovation by APS Contracting, Inc. included the addition of façade brick stained to match that of the adjoining HCCC Gabert Library; replacement of the existing roof; complete interior demolition; the addition of a new entrance vestibule; installation of new HVAC systems, elevators, and an emergency generator; and a direct, indoor connection to the Gabert Library.

Wi-Fi and computer stations are available throughout the building, as are "green" elements for energy efficiency and sustainability.

The HCCC Student Center is the latest of several construction projects undertaken by the College that have transformed Journal Square. It represents the College's mission to serve its diverse communities with inclusive educational programs and services that promote student success, upward social and economic mobility, and resources for growth. The project was financed with Chapter 12 funding, a state program for county colleges that is funded through State and County capital bond financing. All of the College's capital improvements have been completed with appropriated capital. As a result, the College does not carry any capital debt, and not one dollar of student tuition is utilized for debt.

In this versatile course, Au pair students not only learned about the history and making of Walt Disney World, but also about different countries, cultures, the history and progress of communication and technology, U.S. history, as well as animals and wildlife! Students visited educational attractions in three Disney theme parks: EPCOT Center, Animal Kingdom and, of course, the Magic Kingdom.

Some attractions visited in EPCOT included Spaceship Earth, where students traveled in time and explored the history of communication on a ride that took them from the Stone Age to the computer age. Soarin', where students took flight on a breathtaking journey as they soared over some of the world's most awe-inspiring sights – from the Great Wall of China to Iguazu Falls in South America. This was a great opportunity to experience the joy of hang gliding through a virtual reality!

In EPCOT's World Showcases, students walked through the countries and spent more time at some selected ones, especially the American Ad-venture pavilion – where they watched a show that presents the history of America, which was a great introduction to U.S. history. Visiting the World Showcases is a great way to expand your cultural diversity without the expense of traveling.

At the Magic Kingdom, students visited Liberty Square and Liberty Bell and learned the history behind both. They also visited the Hall of Presidents and learned about all 45 of the men who served as U.S. Presidents. This audio animatronic

The highlight of the Exploration Trail was the gorilla habitat, which offers guests the opportunity to enjoy the beautiful creatures in their natural habitat of grassy hill, and waterfalls.

Indian Folk Dance – Garba Course

The Department of Continuing Education launched a unique series of fun cultural dance workshops, beginning with the Indian folk dance, Garba. In this month-long course, which ran at the Culinary Conference Center in September through

Garba is a form of dance, as well as a religious and social event that originates from Gujarat, India. Garba is a circular and spiral pattern dance form that originates in the northwestern Indian state of Gujarat. This form of dance is performed during Navratri (Nine Nights), the longest and largest dance festival in the world. The Garba Hindu festival is dedicated to the feminine form of divinity and her nine forms. Garba is danced around this symbol to honor the fact that all humans have the divine energy of Devi within them.



Galli's students in the audience, she shared her educational and professional pursuits journey. These included initial failures, confusion, and uncertainty as to her purpose and what she most loved. These experiences also made her discover that another person could see her potential and impact even before she could see it for herself, a mentor who found her during her career in banking. A faculty member stated that "I loved learning more about Karen and I'm glad it let everyone else see what an amazing person she is and how valuable she is to our community." We loved her story on the importance of a life's journey, even failures, and finding humor in situations where one does not speak the native language and is covered in leeches.

"The entire *Untold Stories* program is powerful in connecting employees," a participant stated. *Our Stories Untold* storytelling emerged as a partnership between the Office of Human Resources and the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. This series highlights the HCCC community members' personal, educational, and professional experiences, advice, and insight. 




How did your time at HCCC prepare you for your career/ life now?
