

he Fall 2020 regular term begins on Wednesday, Sept. 2. Quick Term (12-week) courses begin on Wednesday, Sept. 23, 2020, and Online B begins on Friday, Oct. 30, 2020. The Fall 2020 schedule can be accessed at www.hccc.edu/schedule.

Students in need of support services such as financial aid, bursar, testing, and registration will be able to access these services on-ground by making an appointment. In-person appointments are limited, so students are encouraged to use remote services. All student support services will continue to be offered remotely. Students can find a complete listing of terms and other important information in the Fall 2020 Enrollment Guide, http://www.hccc.edu/enrollmentguide.

Students, faculty, and staff who are participating in on-ground teaching and learning or who will be utilizing on-ground services should plan to arrive to campus a few minutes early in order to complete the Screening Process and must remember their HCCC ID card. The Screening Process has two components: a health survey and a temperature screening via one of the College's thermal mirrors. All individuals seeking access to 870 Bergen Avenue (F Building) should enter and proceed through the Screening Process at 263 Academy Street (STEM Building).

- Complete Smartsheet survey via the link or QR code on this page, or the paper survey, which is available at each Security Desk;
- 2. Receive clearance email (2-3 minutes later);
- Show clearance email and HCCC ID card to Security;
- 4. Proceed to the Thermal Mirror;
- 5. If green, proceed to your destination;
- 6. If red, wait 15 minutes and try again.

Posters with the QR code and link to the Smartsheet survey will also be displayed across campus. The Smartsheet survey can be completed as early as 6 p.m. the night before an individual is coming to campus, and paper-based surveys will remain available for those who need them. Individuals will have to complete either the paper-based survey or Smartsheet survey each time they enter a different building for the purposes of contact tracing.

The Return to Campus (RTC) Task Force, along with its working groups, will continue to meet throughout the fall semester. HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE GRADUATES CHOSEN TO PARTICIPATE IN PRESTIGIOUS RUTGERS HONORS LIVING-LEARNING COMMUNITY

Recent Hudson County Community College (HCCC) graduates Yoshira Domenech and Mario Perales have been accepted into the Rutgers University Honors Living-Learning Community (HLLC) program. Rutgers HLLC is nationally recognized as a model for honors education programs.

"We are very proud of Yoshira and Mario, as they have earned the honor of participating in this groundbreaking honors program," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "The Rutgers HLLC program will provide them with the information and opportunities to become our future's best leaders."

Yoshira Domenech relocated to Weehawken from Charlotte, North Carolina. Ms. Domenech is the second member of her family to attend HCCC; a cousin is a Culinary Arts graduate. "My aunt's advice to study at HCCC was the best advice ever," she says. While Ms. Domenech began her HCCC studies as a Criminal Justice major, she opted to pursue an Associate in Fine Arts degree after an assessment indicated that she has genuine talent rooted in the arts and in art direction. A Dean's List honoree, Ms. Domenech's art work – primarily acrylic on canvas paintings – has been featured in the College's biannual student exhibitions. She states that the Cultures & Values class she took at HCCC has informed her passion for social justice issues. Ms. Domenech earned her HCCC degree in December 2019. She is looking forward to being a Rutgers HLLC scholar, and plans to use her art to bring awareness to issues confronting the community.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE MIDDLE STATES UPDATE

HUDSON COUNTY



- Hudson County Community College has successfully submitted the Annual Institutional Update (A.I.U.) to the Middle States Commission. The A.I.U. requires institutions to provide key data indicators each year, including but not limited to enrollment, financial information, and, importantly, measures of student achievement. The College provided three Context of Performance statements related to student success:
- \bullet Revised IPEDS 150% and 200% Graduation Rates
- A summary of HCCC's Achieving the Dream action plan, highlighting the use of data to measure student success
- An expanded set of student success metrics using the Voluntary Framework of Accountability standards
- Dr. Eric Friedman, Executive Vice President and Provost, and the College's Accreditation Liaison Officer, will attend a Presidents and Provosts virtual meeting on Tuesday, September 15. Topics of interest include: Changes at MSCHE, including a review of the strategic priorities for the Commission under its new leadership; the political environment in relation to the accreditation landscape regulatory changes that went into effect on July 1, 2020; updates regarding the coronavirus (COV-ID-19) pandemic; and a discussion of results from the recent MSCHE membership survey.

READY FOR A CLOSEUP: ITV COMES TO HCCC



TV (Inter-network TeleVision) received plenty of attention during College Service Day on Aug. 26. During the general session in the morning, Chief Information Officer Patricia Clay and Yeurys Pujols, Executive Director of the North Hudson Campus, announced the installation of the ITV technology at select locations across campus. In the afternoon, Clay co-facilitated on ITV and WebEx with Diana Perez, Academic Lab Manager; Kelly Garay, Senior Lab Assistant; and Paola Valcarcel, Academic Lab Coordinator.

The goals of procuring the ITV technology on campus were:


- To increase enrollment by allowing residents of northern Hudson County to take courses previously not offered at the North Hudson Campus;
- To increase the number of academic programs offered at NHC by adding courses offered in this modality:
- To increase the success of new and special cohort courses by allowing students from both campuses to register; and
- To decrease course cancelations by registering

students from both campuses' in traditionally low enrolled courses.

The ITV technology will also facilitate large meetings on campus without requiring staff from the Journal Square Campus to travel to the North Hudson Campus, or vice versa.

Some courses will be piloted during the Fall 2020 Quick Term. ITV spaces will be available for faculty teaching synchronous remote courses. ITV technology will also be available for recordings.

ITV has currently been installed in classrooms (Room 418 at the Gabert Library and Room 504 of the North Hudson Campus); meeting rooms (70 Sip Ave., Room 418 and North Hudson Campus, Room 703A); and conference spaces (in the Culinary Conference Center, the Scott Ring Room, Banquet Room and Johnston Room; and the Multipurpose Room at the North Hudson Campus). Installation at the STEM Building Multipurpose Room is scheduled during the Fall 2020 semester. HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE CABINET ACCEPTS INVITATION TO FIELD-TEST NEW EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP CURRICULUM

Recently, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) President Dr. Christopher Reber accepted an invitation on behalf of the College's leadership team to be part of a cohort of just 13 Achieving the Dream (ATD) colleges who will experience and test a new executive leadership curriculum.

Achieving the Dream is a national educational reform network whose work has had a transformational impact on the colleges with whom they partner. The ATD mission focuses on helping higher education institutions build equity and capacity in their student success initiatives by using data to inform practice.

In her invitation, ATD President and Chief Executive Officer Dr. Karen A. Stout wrote: "Over the past year, Achieving the Dream has worked closely with the Aspen Institute and other higher education organizations to develop a curriculum designed to help increase the capacity of senior leadership teams to scale and accelerate student success efforts, across all sectors of higher education. The working hypothesis driving the development of the curriculum – funded by the Gates Foundation - is that high-performing leadership teams are an essential component of studentsuccess oriented transformation and that both presidents and leadership teams can take concrete steps to increase this essential organizational capacity."

The program will include three virtual sessions – one exclusively for participating ATD college presidents, and two for college leadership teams.

"My colleagues and I are dedicated to fostering an environment that promotes student success. It is an honor to be part of this national test program, which we are certain will benefit our students, instructors and staff," Dr. Reber said. He noted that the curriculum was developed through a process of interviews with presidents and senior college leaders as well as a document review that included ATD college leaders.

Hudson County Community College joined the Achieving the Dream Network in 2019. In becoming an ATD member college, HCCC has adapted a laser-like focus on improving key student success metrics in the areas of student engagement, retention, persistence and completion.

HCCC'S DREAM TEAM SHARES STUDENT SUCCESS ACTION PLAN

n August 18 & 19, 2020, HCCC's Student Success Dream Team hosted two open fora for the college community during which the details of HCCC's Student Success Action Plan were shared. Thank you to all those who participated! Between the two sessions, nearly 100 members of the college community attended. For those who were unable to attend, a recording of the open forum on Wednesday, August 19 as well as a PDF of the slide presentation will be made available soon.

In 2019, HCCC partnered with Achieving the Dream, which is a national organization with a proven track record of helping community colleges provide equitable outcomes for students and improve key student success metrics such as retention and completion. HCCC's first year of engagement with Achieving the Dream required an intensive exploration of our data. The results of this data exploration informed the development of HCCC's Student Success Action Plan. BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVES NEW THREE-YEAR ACADEMIC MASTER PLAN



t its August 11, 2020 meeting, the Hudson County Community College Board of Trustees approved the Academic Master Plan 2020-23. The Academic Master Plan (AMP) is intended to define strategic direction for the academic branch of the College for the next three years. It will also provide essential building blocks for the College's next Strategic Plan.

The approval of the new AMP represents the culmination of a year of intensive and collaborative work. In concert with a Core Planning Group comprised of faculty and administrators from across Academic Affairs, Dr. James Davy facilitated the process using an appreciative inquiry approach. In November 2019, 50 participants from across the College engaged in an exploration of strengths, opportunities, aspirations, and results in interactive SOAR fora. At the January 2020 College Service Day, the entire College Community had an opportunity to review the emergent strategic directions and to define related initiatives. Dr. Davy used the results of this session to draft

the plan, which was shared with the College in the spring. The planning committee once again convened in late April and early May to refine language of the plan, assign responsibility for individual initiatives, and identify key action steps.

The AMP includes three overarching strategic directions: (1) Advancing a Culture of Care through a Strong Focus on Equity, (2) Advancing a Culture of Student Success and Completion through Faculty Engagement, and (3) Advancing a Culture of Student Success and Completion through Collaborative Pathways and Partnerships. Each strategic direction includes supporting initiatives such as redesigning ESL and Developmental Education Programs (Strategic Direction 1); supporting the development of new faculty from onboarding through tenure review and beyond (Strategic Direction 2); and elevating the availability of academic service learning, internships, apprenticeships, and partnerships (Strategic Direction 3).

ARTIST NEWS

For those of you who are familiar with Gordon Parks's work through the Foundation Art Collection piece, *Place de la Concorde*, which is an elegant street scene of Paris at night, it may come as a surprise that he is best known for his portraits of Americans and his portrayal of social injustice here. The Museum of Modern Art is featuring an online-accessible show of his work for Life magazine. Called "The Atmosphere of Crime," this series of photographs challenged stereotypical images of delinquency, drug use, and corruption. He called the camera his "weapon of choice" to attack issues including racism, poverty, urban life, and injustice. To check it out, go to https://www.moma.org/calendar/exhibitions/5235

A few weeks ago, the National Gallery of Art in Washington made history by buying its first painting by a Native American artist -- Jaune Quickto-See-Smith. When asked why it took them so long to acquire contemporary artwork by the First Peoples, the artist said, "Good question Because of popular myth-making, Native Americans are seen as vanished. It helps assuage the government's guilt about an undocumented genocide, as well as stealing the whole country." She continues,

We welcome anecdotes and information about how the art collection benefits our community. If you have enjoyed using the art collection in your teaching, your studies, or your everyday life, please let us know! Contact <u>ASiegel@hccc.edu</u> and tell us the story of how the art collection works for you.

"It's like we don't exist, except in the movies or as mascots for sports teams, like the Washington Redskins or the Cleveland Indians." The artist cites the current political climate making possible this purchase, "My painting is caught in a perfect storm: Black Lives Matter, the death of George Floyd, COVID-19, the presidential election, the Standing Rock Sioux temporarily winning a stay on the pipeline and add to that the Supreme Court saying the Creek Indians do exist and their treaty is valid. ... These are possible reasons that caused my painting to be purchased." There are many great contemporary Native American artists. 

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE 'EARLY COLLEGE' PROGRAM AFFORDS HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS THE OPPORTUNITY TO FAST-TRACK ASSOCIATE DEGREES

his Fall, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, many high school juniors and seniors will be taking classes online from the safety and comfort of their homes. These students—as well as those taking classes in-person at their high schools—will get a head start on their college education through the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) "Early College" program.

The HCCC "Early College" program is open to all students living in or attending high school in Hudson County. Students enrolled in the program can earn up to 36 credits toward an Associate degree, and may even be able to substitute a college class for one of their high school classes through the state-approved Option II program. Study options include fully online, plus evening and weekend remote classes.

In addition to the option of students to take courses independently, HCCC also has agreements with 20 individual high schools that allow additional choices for students, such as dual enrollment agreements, where specific high school classes have been matched with college courses and students are able to earn college credits while taking those classes. Additionally, students at partner high schools have the opportunity to take college courses on site, either during or immediately after the school day, taught by college instructors. Finally, HCCC has entered into agreements that al-



low students the opportunity to earn an Associate Degree upon graduating high school.

In 2020, the first of these students completed one of these programs, with 11 students from High Tech High School earning an Associate of Science Degree in Environmental Studies. As of today, 197 high school students are currently on track to eventually also earn a degree.

The HCCC Early College program not only allows high school students to get a head start on their college careers, but those participating pay just half of the in-County tuition rate – a huge savings in comparison to tuition at four-year institutions. Credits earned in the HCCC "Early College" program transfer toward baccalaureate degrees at four-year colleges and universities. This tuition break is available to all eligible Early College students, regardless of whether they attend a partner high school or not.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE SHOWCASE

Hosted by NJCU's Ed.D. in Community College Leadership Program



n Tuesday, July 28, 2020, the 2nd Annual Community College Showcase, hosted by NJCU's Ed.D. in Community College Leadership, took place virtually with over 1,500 registrants! Members of the Hudson County Community College were heavily engaged in this conference as attendees, presenters, moderators, and planning committee members.

When the pandemic impacted the ability to hold in-person events, and only amplified the need for such a conference, NJCU's Ed.D. in Community College Leadership Program Directors Dr. Christine Harrington and Dr. John Melendez made the decision to transition this conference to a free, virtual conference. This allowed the conference to extend its reach, promoting to educators across the country and world, with registrants representing 40 states and 6 countries.

Attendees logged onto Zoom for a full-day conference featuring 28 educational sessions, 8 breakout networking opportunities, an opening keynote from Dr. Tia McNair from the Association of American Colleges and Universities on the topic of "Are You Student Ready?", and a closing from Dr. Margaret McMenamin, President of Union County College, focused on "Managing Change in 21st Century Community Colleges."

Members of the HCCC Community were seen in the following opportunities:

Eric Adamson and Karen Galli, English Instructors, presented Otherness as Asset: Building Confidence in Community College Writing, which had over 50 attendees who learned about incorporating autoethnography into college composition course design. Attendees learned the value of self in the classroom, identified ways to incorporate

otherness as asset in formative and summative assessments, and began planning an autoethnography assignment. In all, the presentation focused on building confidence in one's otherness and writing through self-reflection, social reflection, and explorative writing.

Jenny Bobea, Associate Dean of English and ESL, served as a member of the Community College Showcase Planning Committee and as the host for four sessions throughout the day.

Lisa Dougherty, Dr. David Clark, and Dr. Chris Reber, Vice President of Student Affairs and Enrollment, Associate Dean of Student Affairs, and President respectively, presented "Ready for the "Whole" Student: The Evolution of "Hudson Helps" to Provide Holistic Student Supports" to close to 70 attendees. HCCC learned through the #Real-College survey administered by the Hope Center for College, Community, and Justice that 68% of HCCC students face food insecurity, housing insecurity or homelessness. In their presentation, they shared how Hudson Helps evolved from a concept and two food pantries into a comprehensive program (soon to be physical Resource Center) with wrap around student supports. The highlight of the presentation was a video testimonial from Koral Booth, 2020 graduate, who shared how various Hudson Helps resources supported her during her time at HCCC.

Veronica Gerosimo, Assistant Dean of Student Life & Leadership, moderated the Community College Leader Panel which garnered over 150 attendees. The panel featured Dr. Demond Hargrove, Vice President of Student Development at Union County College, Dr. Chris Shults Dean of Institutional Effectiveness and Strategic Planning at Borough of Manhattan Community College, and Dr. Michael J. Sparrow. Dean, Enrollment Management and Retention at Northhampton Community College. Veronica also served as a member of the Community College Showcase Planning Committee and as the host for three more sessions throughout the day.

Yeurys Pujols and Lilisa Williams, Executive Director of the North Hudson Campus and Director of Faculty and Staff Development respectively, and Co-Chairs of the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, presented "Steps to Launching Diversity, Equity and Inclusion at Your Institution. There were over 90 attendees on hand to learn the strategies, lessons learned, and steps on how PACDEI was formed at HCCC and what they could do to launch an effective PACDEI, or some other DEI group, at their institution. The attendees were encouraged to ask questions during the presentation using Zoom's famous chat room and at the end of the presentation. Yeurys and Lilisa received feedback about the presentation being meaningful and well received.

NJCU's Ed.D. in Community College Leadership program is a practice-focused 55-credit co-hort-based online program with an annual 1-week in-person summer institute requirement that is designed to be completed by working professionals in 3 years.
