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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE'S HUDSON SCHOLARS PROGRAM WINS PRESTIGIOUS 2024 BELLWETHER LEGACY AWARD

H CCC's Hudson Scholars Program is named the winner of the 2024 Bellwether Legacy Award, the highest honor bestowed upon community colleges by the Bellwether College Consortium. The Hudson Scholars Program was honored for its sustainable impact on student success, particularly those from traditionally underserved groups including Hispanic and African American students. The competition for this coveted award is intense. It is awarded only once every five years and all finalists are previous Bellwether Award winners.

The nationally competitive Bellwether awards, presented by the Bellwether College Consortium, recognize trendsetting programs that address critical issues facing community colleges through applicable research and the promotion and replication of best practices. The Bellwether Awards were presented at the Community College Futures Assembly, held February 25-27 in San Antonio, Texas.

The Legacy Award is the Bellwether College Consortium's "most prestigious recognition of a past Bellwether award-winning community college with a remarkably enduring and successful program. This award is presented to a college with sustained measurable achievements, such as high retention, graduation, transfer, and job placement rates."

A major point of pride for the entire HCCC community, the Hudson Scholars ${\it Program}$

exemplifies the sustained achievement in retention and graduation for which the Bellwether Legacy Award stands. Initially developed under the leadership of HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber, the Hudson Scholars Program expands academic access and promotes student success through an innovative and holistic approach, combining proactive student support, financial stipends, high-impact educational experiences, and early academic intervention.

Over 2,500 students are Hudson Scholars, and the program has made an immediate and significant mark. Hudson Scholars are significantly more likely to stay in school and continue their studies. Over the last three years, the ratio of HCCC students receiving intensive support from a counselor has increased by 575%, meaning that the program is now reaching exponentially more students.

Hudson Scholars students earned a credential within two years at three times the rate of students of the same academic profile not currently participating in the program. Hudson Scholars are effectively graduating within half the time of their historical peers, making the model a game-changer as time is often the enemy for community college students who juggle many competing priorities.

HCCC serves one of the most diverse communities in the United States – 55% of students identify as Hispanic, and 88% self-*Continued on page 7*

The plays, which are offered seasonally, are designed specifically for English language learners and provide an interactive experience where audience members can ask for scenes to be repeated, respond to questions posed by the presenters, and can ask questions of and speak directly to the characters in post-performance discussions. HCCC RECEIVES 2024 NATIONAL 'INSPIRING PROGRAMS IN BUSINESS' AWARD FROM INSIGHT INTO DIVERSITY

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Dr. Reber shared that HCCC's targeted recruitment efforts and unique academic programs led to increases in the number of students from historically underrepresented groups. The number of Black or African American students in the HCCC School of Business, Culinary Arts, and Hospitality Management disciplines increased about 150%, from 54 to 134 students (12% of HCCC's total enrollment in business programs); and the number of Hispanic students increased 170%, from 249 to 676 (60% of program total enrollment).

"We know that business programs are not always recognized for their success, dedication, and mentorship of underrepresented students," said Lenore Pearlstein, owner and publisher of *INSIGHT Into Diversity* Magazine. "We want to honor the schools and organizations offering programs that inspire and encourage young people interested in a future career in business. We are proud to honor these programs as role models to other institutions of higher education and beyond."



Each year a distinguished panel of judges chooses two students to win \$500 awards. The chosen works are then framed and installed on campus. You can see many student art award winners' art works in the Journal Square Student Center, on the 5th floor of the Gabert Library, and on the North Hudson campus 4th floor. The judges also award four \$150 gift certificates for art supplies to students.

We give many tours at the Foundation Art Collection. Just last month we gave a Collection tour to the Future Art Leaders of America, a program run by Mana Contemporary in Jersey City. This mentorship initiative is designed for Jersey City high school juniors and seniors who are passionate about the arts. HCCC HOSTS NIGHT OF IDEAS JERSEY CITY

n Friday, March 1, Villa Albertine, Centre Pompidou, and Hudson County Community College (HCCC), with the support of the City of Jersey City, presented the Night of Ideas. For the first time, this free and open-to-all event came to Jersey City, one of the fastest growing and most diverse urban centers in the United States, and the future home of the Centre Pompidou's first American branch. The event addressed urban growth and the future of cities through debates, installations, multimedia pop-ups, and workshops that prompted the 800 attendees to consider the impact of urban growth through lenses of inclusivity, sustainability, arts and culture, education, and food.

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identify as nonwhite. Furthermore, 80% of degree-seeking students qualify for federal financial aid. It is especially heartening to see that the program has made significant strides in supporting students from historically marginalized communities, including Hispanic and African American students.

The term-to-term persistence rates of Hispanic or Latino students in the Hudson Scholars Program increased by over 40%, while Black or African American students increased their likelihood of persisting by over 60%. Additionally, the two-year completion rate for traditionally underrepresented Hudson Scholars represents a threefold increase compared to 2018-20.

While the program is resource-intensive – including the costs for personnel who are managing smaller caseloads, as well as stipends disbursed to students – Hudson Scholars' capacity to increase a student's likelihood of persisting not only covers these costs, but has actually resulted in increased net revenue and a return on investment (ROI) of approximately 30%. This financial sustainability means that the Hudson Scholars model is viable for replication by community colleges nationwide.

On winning the prestigious award, Dr. Christopher Reber stated, "This is a proud moment for our entire HCCC family. We are ecstatic to be recognized with this tremendous honor. Best of all, the work that won us this national accolade is all about increasing retention, completion, and success for our inspirational students."

The Hudson Scholars Program previously won the 2023 National Bellwether Award for Instructional Programs and Services and was honored by The League for Innovation in the Community College with that organization's 2021-22 Innovation of the Year Award. Adding the 2024 Bellwether Legacy Award to this list of accolades is an honor, but it is not the end game. HCCC will continue to build on the success of the Hudson Scholars Program by scaling it further to create more transformative outcomes, with adaptations to support returning adult students, nursing students, culinary students, student parents, and others.

In addition to winning the Bellwether Legacy Award, HCCC was a finalist in two other award categories at the College Futures Assembly. The College's "Transformational Learning Pathways Model for Justice-Involved Students" was a finalist in the Instructional Programs and Services category. Additionally, HCCC's "Framework for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Scalable Best Practices" was a finalist in the Planning, Governance and Finance category. 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ALUMNI CORNER

Amaalah Ogburn, Class of 2017

A.S. Health Services

Amaalah Ogburn is the Director of Faculty and Staff Development at HCCC. She was previously Associate Director of the North Hudson Campus. Amaalah has a bachelor's degree in Public Administration and a Master's in Public Administration (MPA) from Rutgers University. She is pursuing a Master's degree in Mental Health Counseling from Southern New Hampshire University.

How did you decide to attend HCCC, and what made it the right choice for you?

In 2013-2014, over the course of 10 months, I experienced three major life events. I became a mom, I lost my mom, and I left a job that I had for over 10 years. I realized that while I had skills and experience, I did not have any credentials, so I made a deal with myself -- "If I can get my tuition paid, I'm going to go to school and figure out what's next for me." I also knew I needed to set an example for my son. I needed him to know that college would be a requirement for him, which meant I had to lead by example. HCCC was within walking distance from my home and would not keep me away from my son more than necessary. HCCC was the only school I applied to, and once financial aid was approved, the decision was made. I began my studies in Spring 2015.

Initially, HCCC was the right choice because it was affordable and convenient. Thankfully, it turned out to be so much more. Hudson is where I realized my intelligence. It's where my unique perspectives were welcomed and embraced. Hudson made higher learning accessible to me and created space for me to dream, explore, and grow personally and professionally.

Any favorite memories or classes at HCCC?

Being here for nine years as a student and employee, I have many fond memories. One is of my favorite class, Comp 101. The professor empowered students to think outside the box. He encouraged us to look at our stories more deeply. His approach really opened my eyes to a whole new world. Rather than having us regurgitate information, he pushed us to use our imagination and welcomed our perspectives and interpretations. I had never experienced that in an academic setting.

What inspired you to earn your MPA?

Like many of my decisions, I was winging it when I pursued my MPA. It was a decision made in survival mode. I needed credentials to make more money and provide for my child. But like my experience at Hudson, my MPA program opened my eyes to the world of politics, civil service, and government operations. It helped me understand many of the things my mom used to talk to me about as a kid. It helped me to understand what she meant when she talked about systemic oppression or social constructivism.

What advice do you have for HCCC students?

Stay curious, explore everything, and remember that every experience is meant to teach something. I would also share that education is more than what you learn from textbooks. It's the people you meet, the conversations you have, and your lived experiences.

You are now pursuing a Master's in Mental Health counseling - what inspired you to do that?

During a conversation with a colleague, I was asked, "What's your brand? What are you known for and do well?" I spent two years reflecting on those questions and realized that from a young age, people often felt safe confiding in me and looked to me for advice and perspective. Additionally, while looking for my own mental health professional, I realized that there is a lack of representation for marginalized folks in the mental health field. After that experience, I decided to pursue a Master's in Mental Health so that I can incorporate mental wellness into my work at HCCC, help to develop other mental health professionals and support my community with their mental wellness.

What do you like about faculty and staff development?

What I LOVE about faculty and staff development is hearing my colleagues' stories. I enjoy learning about their experiences and passions. I love that I can encourage and empower colleagues to share their knowledge with the larger College community and that I get to witness them light up with excitement when they have either learned something or shared something that feels good to them.
