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## HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS ARE FIRST TO COMPLETE NURSING DEGREES IN NEW JERSEY'S PAY IT FORWARD PROGRAM

ursing is one of the most in-demand careers in the United States, but attaining a college degree in this field can be cost-prohibitive for many students.

To close equity gaps in higher education and to support economic growth, New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy partnered with the NJ CEO Council and Social Finance to launch the New Jersey Pay It Forward Program in 2022. The first of its kind in the United States, this \$12.5 million program prepares students for careers in growth-fueled industries such as health care, green energy, and Information Technology (IT). New Jersey Pay It Forward is designed to help participants enroll in and graduate from high-quality academic and training programs. The Pay It Forward Program provides zero-interest, no-fee loans, non-repayable living stipends, access to emergency aid funds, and supportive services like mental health counseling for students. After completing one of the eligible academic or training programs, participants who earn above a minimum salary, such as \$49,290 for a family of three, repay their loans, and those funds are then paid forward to finance future students.

Hudson County Community College is the first institution of higher education in New Jersey selected to participate in the health care segment of the Pay It Forward Program. The HCCC Associate of Science (A.S.) in Nursing Degree Program was chosen for its proven, high-quality training, and track record of strong employment outcomes, employer relationships, and experience serving diverse learners. The Pay It Forward Program closely aligns with HCCC's dedication to diversity, equity and inclusion, and student success.

Nineteen HCCC
Nursing Program
students were among
100-plus students
in the state selected
as initial program
participants. On
Thursday, June 15,
HCCC graduated 19
students from the



College's Nursing Program and were celebrated with a toast and a pinning ceremony at the HCCC Culinary Conference Center. Attendees included David J. Socolow, Executive Director of the New Jersey Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA); Tara Colton, Executive Vice President for Economic Security at the New Jersey Economic Development Authority (NJEDA); Emily Apple, Director of Economic Security, New Jersey Economic Development Authority (NJEDA); Dr. Christopher Reber, HCCC President; Dr. Darryl Jones, HCCC Vice President for Academic Affairs; Dr. Heather DeVries, HCCC Dean of Academic Affairs and Assessment: Dr. Catherine Sirangelo. HCCC Dean of Nursing and Health Professions; Dr. Lori Byrd, Interim Director, HCCC Nursing Program; and representatives from the NJ CEO Council and Social Finance, the nonprofit designing and managing the program.

"The New Jersey Pay It Forward stipend and emergency funds helped me focus on my classes and worry less," said Eunice Rivera, a graduate of the program who accepted an offer to become an intensive care unit nurse at a nearby hospital. "The no-interest loan helps me stay in the here and now,

# HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND RUTGERS UNIVERSITY PARTNER TO ADDRESS FOOD INSECURITY AND HOW 'FOOD FUELS MINDS'

backgrounds, but many share experiences reflecting national concerns of food insecurity on college campuses. While an estimated 40% of United States college students are food insecure, 57% of HCCC students report being food insecure. The U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO) reports that about one of every three college students may skip meals while they attend classes, hold down jobs and internships, take care of family members, and maintain social and professional connections.

The "Food Fuels Minds" project is a collaboration of the HCCC "Hudson Helps Resource Center," faculty and students from the College's Art Department, and Rutgers University. The innovative project is focused on addressing food insecurity and stimulating interest in New Jersey's Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP). The project is funded by a grant from Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and designed to engage the College community in sharing their food insecurity experiences.

In late April 2023, HCCC students anonymously shared their personal narratives about food, hunger, family, struggle, support, and success. Forty HCCC art students interpreted these stories into paintings, illustrations, and typographic designs that were displayed in the College's windows and galleries. The art students also produced an original print and digital magazine incorporating their artwork, the narratives, and practical information about how to enroll for SNAP. The magazine is being circulated at College events, on both HCCC campuses, and within the community.

As part of the project, the research team from HCCC and Rutgers devised and offered a toolkit for other institutions to utilize in successfully combating food insecurity. The toolkit includes a film documenting the HCCC project.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber said that the College instituted the "Hudson Helps Resource Center" in Spring 2019 to address students' basic needs beyond the classroom. "Our 'Hudson Helps' program promotes student retention and success by removing impediments that prevent students from focusing on their studies," he stated. "Hudson Helps" includes a CARE Team that responds to students in times of difficulty and crisis; food pantries at the Journal Square and North Hudson campuses that provide meals to students and staff, no questions asked; nutritional counseling and SNAP application support; a Career Clothing Closet that assists students with professional and personal attire; emergency financial assistance; "Single Stop" benefits screener; Chromebook loans; Social Services Support (case management and general assistance); and mental health services.

"We are very proud to partner with Rutgers University in addressing this issue of national importance. We look forward to assisting other colleges and universities in making significant differences in the lives of students and their families," Dr. Reber said.

The students took a deep dive into the historical immigration experience and learned about America's largest immigration station, which was operational from 1892 to 1954. # Foundation Art Collection

The Hudson County Community College Foundation Art Collection of 1,850+ works is installed in the public areas of campus buildings. The entire College is an educational art museum. This Collection reveals aspects of America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history from the Hudson River School period to today. In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

Each month, this page in HCCC Happenings provides updates on artists whose works are in the Collection, and new additions to the Collection.

#### **Artist News**

Can art change attitudes toward climate change? A recent study, inspired by the art of **Diane Burko**, found art can change attitudes. (You can see Diane Burko's work, *Arizona Landscape*, in the STEM Building in the second floor Dean's Reception Area.) Elaine Velie reported on this finding in the online arts journal *Hyperallergic*. The researchers discovered that using art to convey environmental data eased political perceptions about climate change. How did they study this?

The researchers showed 671 people just the Keeling Curve (a daily record of global atmospheric carbon dioxide concentration) on its own, and then showed them Burko's 2020 mixed-media artwork, SUMMER HEAT, I and II, about the Keeling Curve, which uses vibrant color to shows images of a heating world.

They found that people felt more positive emotions when they saw the art than when they saw just the Keeling Curve. "The study notes that some evidence suggests that emotion changes the way people think about climate change." After seeing Burko's art, "People on both ends of the political spectrum moved toward the middle. This effect, however, was only observed when the scientists asked the participants to reflect on how Burko's artwork made them feel — simply looking

at SUMMER HEAT, I and II did not change viewers' ideas about climate change."

The researchers were Nan Li, Isabel I. Villanueva, Thomas Jilk, and Dominique Brossard of the University of Wisconsin and Brianna Rae Van Matre of the nonprofit EcoAgriculture Partners. Li said, "This study could pave the way for a transformative shift in climate communications and science communications in general.... Highlighting the power of art to provoke emotions and promote self-reflection."

Congratulations to Hudson County Community College's own WOOLPUNK® (also known as Michelle Vitale, our Cultural Affairs Director) for her exhibit at the Montclair Museum, which was on view through July 30, 2023. You can see WOOLPUNK®'s work on the sixth floor of the STEM Building which is devoted to the art of New Jersey teachers. Her show at the Montclair Museum, created specifically for MAM, was called Sunflowers & Graffiti'd Sky in the Garden State. It was based on a photograph of a Jersey City community garden. She had this picture printed on a large-scale banner, and then she embroidered it with donated recycled fabrics to bring attention to clothing waste and landfill issues.

Congratulations also to HCCC's own art Professor Michael Lee, who recently won the prestigious Adolph and Esther Gottlieb Foundation 2023 Individual Support Grant. Over the past two years, Prof. Lee has made a significant—and invisible—contribution to the Foundation Art Collection through his artful installation work. We are especially grateful to Prof. Lee for his work on the Gabert Library sixth floor installation of Henrietta Mantooth's Jail Birds works, which bring attention to issues faced by incarcerated people. A short documentary film about the Jail Birds installation is now being completed by a Brazilian filmmaker, and features Prof. Lee. We hope to be able to show the finished documentary to the community later this year.

In June, Continuing Education launched a new ESL course titled, "English Pronunciation and Accent Reduction." This Accent Reduction class, created and taught by language instructor Aycha Edwards, is designed to help ESL students improve their English pronunciation and communication skills. The class covered topics such as intonation, stress, linking, and rhythm, as well as the individual sounds of English. Students practice with audio to hear how their speech is developing and receive feedback to help refine their speech and sound more like native speakers. This HCCC/NJRC program offers students the opportunity to enroll in online, self-guided GED courses through GEDworks. This collaboration allows Hudson County Community College to provide comprehensive support to individuals facing obstacles in furthering their education.

The program is designed to be flexible and accessible, with remote learning options available to accommodate diverse schedules and individual needs. Students who join the program will undergo testing to determine their current educational level. Once they pass the assessment, they will begin a self-paced GED course that typically spans a period of three months. Throughout their GED journey, students will have the guidance of a dedicated Student Success Coach who regularly checks in with them and offers resources to address any challenges they may encounter along the way.

Upon successfully passing the GED test, students will have the opportunity to enroll in any of our wide range of programs, including Culinary courses, Phlebotomy certification, Welding certification, and other programs offered by NJRC.

Diego graduated magna cum laude from HCCC in 2019.



After graduating from HCCC, Diego continued his studies at Rutgers University, where he earned his B.S. in real estate finance and his M.A. in economics. Diego is now putting his education from HCCC and Rutgers to work as a Relationship Manager at Bank of America-Merrill Lynch and is in the process of taking his licensing exams to become a financial advisor.
