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### HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND NEW JERSEY REENTRY CORPORATION ANNOUNCE GROUND-BREAKING PHLEBOTOMY TRAINING PROGRAM FOR COURT-INVOLVED INDIVIDUALS

t a press conference on Wednesday, Jan. 11, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) President, Dr. Christopher Reber, and New Jersey Reentry Corporation (NJRC) Founder and Chairman, former New Jersey Governor James McGreevey, announced the establishment of a Phlebotomy Technician Certification program leading to an industry recognized credential from the National Healthcareer Association (NHA). The program is designed solely for court-involved individuals. Governor McGreevey and Dr. Reber were joined at the event by New Jersey Acting Director of the Division of Consumer Affairs, Cari Fais; HCCC Vice President for External Affairs and Senior Counsel to the President, Dr. Nicholas Chiaravalloti; HCCC Associate Vice President for Continuing Education and Workforce Development, Lori Margolin; HCCC Dean of Academic Affairs and Assessment, Dr. Heather DeVries; and New Jersey Reentry Corporation program participants.

Dr. Reber said the training program is funded by NJ HealthWorks, a program sponsored by the United States Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration, and administered by the New Jersey Community College Health Profession Consortium Partners. The first Phlebotomy Training Program class of about one dozen students began January 23, 2023. Classes are conducted by HCCC faculty at the Governor's Reentry Training and Employment Center in Kearny, NJ.

## HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AWARDED \$2.2 MILLION FOR TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVE IN NEW ACADEMIC TOWER

Then Hudson County Community College (HCCC) began planning the new 11-story, 153,186 square-foot Academic Tower facility that will soon begin rising in the Journal Square section of Jersey City, technology to provide expanded learning opportunities for more students was high on the list of priorities.

"During the COVID-19 pandemic, we made a significant investment in technology to ensure our students could continue to make progress in achieving their academic goals by offering courses, programs, and services remotely and fully online," said HCCC President, Dr. Christopher Reber. "We determined that if we had the resources, we would apply those and other advanced technology principles to the Tower. Thanks to the advocacy and support of our representatives in the United States Congress and Senate, HCCC has been awarded \$2.2 million in federal funding to make this a reality. This will greatly benefit our students and the entire Hudson County community."

Former Congressman Albio Sires said, "HCCC plays a critical role in our community – serving a diverse population, promoting social and economic mobility, and helping students achieve the American Dream. This funding is an important part of my legacy as a Congressman, and I was proud to secure these resources that will provide high quality remote learning opportunities and increased access for students."

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## HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HOSTS TRIBUTE PERFORMANCE TO THE LEGACY OF DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

This year marks the 55th anniversary of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., whose life and leadership continue to inspire and influence people of every color and creed, in every generation, across the globe.

To honor the legacy of Dr. King, the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) presented a special program of gospel, Broadway, and a variety of inspirational musical numbers performed by Angela Birchett and Joey Joseph-DiCarlo on Tuesday, January 17, 2023. The program took place in the Atrium of the Benjamin J. Dineen III and Dennis C. Hull Gallery on the sixth floor of the College's Gabert Library, located at 71 Sip Avenue in Jersey City - just across the street from the Journal Square PATH Transportation Center.

"It is fitting that we honor the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who advanced civil rights and was awarded the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize for combating racial inequality through nonviolent resistance," said HCCC President, Dr. Christopher Reber. "Diversity, equity and inclusion form the very foundation of the College's Mission, Vision and Value statements, and are a central priority in HCCC's 2021-24 Strategic Plan, Student Success Action Plan, and workforce initiatives. This tribute reflects Dr. King's belief that music and education were powerful catalysts for change."

Angela Birchett is a seasoned vocalist, actor, songwriter, educator, and live music host who made her Broadway debut in the 2015 Tony Award-winning revival of The Color Purple. She has also appeared in several regional and touring companies, including The Color Purple first national tour; Dreamgirls as Effie White; Once on This Island

as Asaka; Smokey Joe's Café as BJ; and Hairspray national tour as Motormouth. Her television credits include CBS' Kevin Can Wait and NBC's Blindspot. Most recently, she starred as Jacky Clark-Chisholm in Lifetime's movie event. The Clark Sisters: First Ladies of Gospel that reached 11 million viewers in its opening weekend, making it the most viewed premiere on cable television in

Ms. Birchett is also the founder of AB Creative, Inc. and creates educational programming and oneon-one development that encourages individuality, celebrates black culture through the performing arts, and equips students and aspiring artists with a "toolkit" to take their place in an ever-changing entertainment industry.

Joey Joseph-DiCarlo is the New York/New Jersey-based pianist who will accompany Ms. Birchett. A Louisiana native, he recently played keyboards in the orchestra for Beetlejuice: The

Musical on Broadway. His other credits include Pippin (Broadway/National tour); tours of The Color Purple and Hairspray; and multiple productions at Paper Mill Playhouse in Millburn, NJ.

The HCCC Benjamin J. Dineen III and Dennis C. Hull Gallery presents a variety of exhibitions and programs at the College's Journal Square and North Hudson campuses every semester. The Gallery's exhibition space boasts Manhattan views that stretch from the Statue of Liberty to the upper west side of New York City. #### HCCC AWARDED \$2.2 MILLION FOR TECHNOLOGY INITIATIVE IN NEW ACADEMIC TOWER

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Executive Tom DeGise. "My thanks to Dr. Reber, his administration, and the Board of Trustees for their tireless efforts to move this project forward and to my friend, former Congressman Albio Sires, for securing a vital piece of the funding for it."

The HCCC "Technology Advance Project" will provide Immersive Telepresence Video (ITV) in the 24 classrooms of the new Tower. ITV will allow synchronous learning classroom technology systems to connect remote students to inclass learning from home or across classrooms and campuses. It will also improve students' educational experience by reducing travel and keeping students on their home campuses.

"This is a game changer," Dr. Reber stated. "Implementing our 'Technology Advance Project' will increase the number of certificates and degrees offered fully at all HCCC campuses; provide state-of-the-art, high-quality learning options; better accommodate student scheduling

needs; increase enrollment; offer best-practice, cutting-edge workforce development programs; and help students build their technology and communication abilities in virtual environments. These skills are essential across today's complex workforce."

The mixed-use HCCC Tower will be constructed on an existing HCCC-owned parking lot located between Enos Place and Jones Street. It will replace a handful of the College's segregated, aging buildings along Sip Avenue from Jones Street to Tonnelle Avenue in Jersey City, and consolidate programs and services provided in those buildings.

The HCCC Tower has been designed for maximum efficiency and the care, comfort, safety, and benefit of the College's students and the community. It will include state-of-the-art classrooms; expanded spaces for student services; expanded and centralized offices for Continuing Education and Workforce Development (CEWD); a full-size National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) gymnasium, fitness and wellness center; University Center for sister colleges and universities to offer baccalaureate instruction at

HCCC; a new workforce development healthcare lab; exercise science lab; black box theater; student commons areas; and administrative offices, among others. Construction is expected to begin this spring.

In addition to the \$2.2 million federal grant, the County of Hudson has committed up to \$35 million in funding for the Tower's construction. The College has also submitted applications valued at over \$18 million to the New Jersey Office of the Secretary of Higher Education (OSHE) for funding from the Higher Education Facilities Trust Fund (HEFT) to cover the Community Education and Workforce Development (CEWD) classrooms, health laboratory, offices, as well as learning laboratory and classrooms; Higher Education Technology Infrastructure (HETI) fund for technology infrastructure; and Higher Education Equipment Leasing Fund (ELF) for the Fitness/Wellness Center and Fitness Laboratory.

"This Academic Tower will truly be a central resource for all members of the community, a place we can all point to with pride," Dr. Reber stated.

"We are proud to partner with Governor McGreevey and NJRC in developing and providing this Phlebotomy Training Program," Dr. Reber said. "This is a life-changing opportunity, exclusively for court-involved women and men, that offers a pathway to well-paying, in-demand careers. This program also addresses a critical national need for professionals in this sector of health care."

NJRC Chairman James McGreevey stated, "This Phlebotomy Training for court-involved persons to become a Certified Phlebotomy Technician is a landmark course. This is the first New Jersey Phlebotomy Training Program solely focused on the court-involved population. This three-month training program will require significant academic and substantial clinical training hours resulting in a professional phlebotomy career. The successful completion of the training will provide for national certification through the National Healthcareer Association. We are honored to partner with HCCC in our shared advocacy mission and commitment to Second Chances. We celebrate the importance of this Phlebotomy Training Course, which continues

to highlight the need for 'industry-recognized credentials' through job training for the reentry population."

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that Phlebotomy is one of the fastest growing career sectors in the country with a projection of 21,500 openings for phlebotomists each year over the decade. The 2021 median pay for phlebotomists who draw blood for tests, transfusions, research, or blood donations, and work in hospitals, laboratories, blood donor centers, and doctors' offices, is \$37,380 per year.

In addition to this program, Hudson County Community College and New Jersey Reentry Corporation work in partnership to provide career pathway certification training and creditbearing learning opportunities for court involved individuals in Welding, Advanced Manufacturing, and Culinary Arts. In November 2022, HCCC and NJRC celebrated NJRC graduates of the HCCC Welding and Culinary Arts programs.

#### Artist News

Erik Desmazières, whose work is on view on the 4th floor student lounge (407) in the Culinary building, is having an exhibit called Hidden Worlds: Prints and Drawings by Erik Desmazières, at the Childs Gallery in Boston through March 25, 2023. The Desmazières work in the HCCC Collection, Crab and Fish, occupies a room filled with art about food. By contrast, the copperplateetchings in this new exhibition include dizzyingly cool architectural prints. According to the gallery, "The exhibition highlights Desmazières' early work, heavy with fantasy and science fiction leanings, and is supplemented by later uniquely cerebral views of Parisian rooftop." These works are, "things that never were, but certainly feel as if they could have been. His uncanny attention to detail and hand for atmospheric light and shadow brings to life scenes in a variety of reoccurring motifs: cities and buildings, battles and warriors, libraries and letters, wonder chambers and curiosities, comedies and characters." Desmazières was born in Rabat, Morocco in 1948. He studied printmaking at the Cours du Soir de la Ville de Paris. A recipient of the Grand Prix des Arts de la Ville de Paris, he was elected to the prestigious Société des Peintres-Graveurs Français where he has served as President since 2006.

In last month's *Harper's Bazaar* magazine, world-famous artist **Shirin Neshat** wrote about her sources of inspiration. The artist grew up in Qazvin, Iran, a religious and conservative city. "I

don't know where I got it from-my parents were not at all culturally inclined—but I had this urge to be an artist." She left Iran in 1975 when she was 17 and went to study at the University of California, Berkeley. Distracted by world events—The Iranian Revolution in 1979, and the installation of the Islamic republic-she "barely graduated" and stopped making art. Because of the revolution, the US and Iran severed ties, so she couldn't see her family for over 10 years. She was finally able to return in 1990, after Ayatollah Khomeini died. She was shocked by the changes in her country, which had been quite cosmopolitan. Now, it was religious. The impact of this change on women's lives was extreme. "Once I returned to New York, I started to think about making work that reflected upon what I had experienced. I finally became an artist because I had a purpose." Her first series of photographs "explored how the hijab controls the female body on a psychological and emotional level." She says, "I wasn't trying to support or criticize anything: I was just trying to delve into certain questions that seemed so paradoxical and contradictory to the nature of women." She had a photographer friend take pictures of her, then she started to copy "poems by Iranian women and draw Iranian-Persian motifs in ink directly on to the photographs, which became my signature style." The work in the HCCC Foundation Art Collection is in that signature style. It is slated for installation later this year. She says, "Ultimately, everything I've done is a celebration of the power of women." Her current show, The Fury, at the Gladstone Gallery, 515 West 24th Street in New York City runs through March 4, 2023.

New Jersey artist Faith Ringgold, whose work can be seen on the 3rd and 6th floor of Gabert Library, is exhibiting her work at The Picasso Museum in her first comprehensive solo exhibition in Paris. An extension of her recent retrospective at the New Museum in New York, the Paris show also includes examples of her so-called French Collection art works. The Museum notes, "Faith Ringgold is a major figure in American feminist art, from the civil rights struggles to those of Black Lives Matter, and the author of some very famous works in children's literature. Her work links the rich heritage of the Harlem Renaissance to the current art of young black American artists. Through her re-readings of modern art history, she engages in a genuine plastic and critical dialogue with the Parisian art scene of the early 20th century, particularly with Picasso and his Demoiselles d'Avignon."

Congratulations to Maya Lin, whose porcelain work can seen in the first-floor cabinet in the Gabert Library. She won the 29th Annual Crystal Award, from the World Economic Forum. The award celebrates the achievements of leading artists who are bridge-builders and role models for leaders of society. According to the Forum, the winners, "connect us to each other; they help us reflect on the human condition, and they provide visions of the world that can cut through the limitations of short-term or linear thinking." They specifically praised Lin's "extraordinary creative talent in combining science, art and architecture, and her exemplary leadership in the promotion of nature and environment. Lin has fashioned a remarkable interdisciplinary career through her highly acclaimed art and architectural works, showcasing sustainable design and emphasizing a stronger connection to the land and nature." They cited President Obama's words in 2016 when he gave Lin the Presidential Medal of Freedom. He said her Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, DC, "changed the way we think about sacrifice and patriotism and ourselves." In Lin's 5th and final memorial, What is Missing?, she ``uses science-basedartworks to raise awareness of the current mass extinctions of species, while emphasizing that by protecting and restoring habitats and reforming our land-use practices we could significantly reduce emissions and restore and protect biodiversity."
