B nchanting aerialists, world-class cuisine that showcased popular dining trends over the past 40 years, decades-themed décor and music, and live demos were showcased at the 26th Annual Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation Holiday Gala on Thursday, December 7, 2023.

The fundraising event was held at the HCCC Culinary Conference Center, 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City, NJ. The memorable evening, which also marked the 40th anniversary of the College's acclaimed Culinary Arts Institute (CAI), began with a welcoming Champagne Station courtesy of HCCC alumnus' Fred Fogg Productions. Aerialists on a lollipop lyra served guests 'Cirque de Soleil' style, upside down while pouring bubbly. Later, guests posed for red carpet photos as they entered the Ballroom. Hors d'oeuvres by HCCC Chef Instructors Rob Maurer and Enmely Soriano were served throughout the evening.

Those in attendance were encouraged to explore the CAI kitchens and enjoy food inspired by four decades of culture – all prepared and served by HCCC CAI professional chef instructors, their students, and alumni. Included were:

 "Seafood Bar & Vodka Luge" - Chef Kevin O'Malley's ice sculptures took center stage with seafood favorites and Robert Hamer's martinis through the decades.

• "The Groovy 1970's" - Chef Gary Bensky prepared Benihana-style filet mignon, Katz'sinspired pastrami, and other 1970's delights.

• "1980's Celebration Kool" - East met West in the 1980's and 1990's with the combined talents of Chefs Kim Fong and Anthony Clode: seared chicken and smoked duck Galantines, foie gras pate with prosciutto, vegetarian terrines, chicken a la king pot pie, chimichurri, and more.

• "Livin' in the 1990's" - Chef Jasmine Pascua served crab cakes, tamarind lollipop chicken wings, Filipino BBQ, and much more.

• "The 2000's Sunrise" - Sushi and Sashimi Bar plus steamed oysters, prepared by Chef Puk.

• "Breads Through the Decades" - Chef Courtney Payne offered bruschetta, pretzel nuggets, avocado toast, white pizza, panini bread bowls, and more.

• "The Doctor's Bar" - Dr. Peter Cronrath shook things up with his mastery of mixology.

• "The Exploration Room" - Live demonstrations showcased the College's Schools of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM), Humanities and Social Sciences, Nursing & Health Sciences, and Continuing Education & Workforce Development.

• Works from the Foundation Art Collection and Student Art were displayed on the third floor. The Foundation was the driving force behind the establishment of the College's Permanent Art Collection in 2006. The collection now boasts more than 1,850 pieces of fine art by internationally renowned artists.

• After the Program – Desserts by Chefs Matthew Siciliano and Margaret Wong, chocolate showpieces by Chef Stephane Motir.

The Hudson County Community College CAI is nationally recognized for its award-winning curriculum, small class sizes, intensive handson lessons, and programming that emphasizes teamwork, discipline, technique, and proper service. Alumni include James Beard "Rising Star Chef" nominee Bruce Kalman, *Chopped* champion Claude Lewis, celebrity chef Jesse Jones, and *America's Test Kitchen* tester Rene Hewitt. The 72,000 square-foot CAI/Conference Center features state-of-the-art kitchens and classrooms including a bakery, ice sculpting studio, fish-andbutchery room, and mock-hotel hospitality suite. CAI kitchens were featured in TLC's "Cake Boss" and Progresso Soup's "Ring-Ring" commercials.

Andrew Campbell, President of Eastern Millwork, Inc. (EMI) located in Jersey City, received the 2023 Distinguished Community Service Award. EMI's partnership with the College has helped build a national model for workforce development.

"Every year, the HCCC Foundation recognizes the people and partners who support our students and help advance our innovative programs," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "Thanks to the generosity of Foundation benefactors, our students have transformative opportunities that help them attain degrees or certificates, pursue in-demand and well-paying careers, and fuel our regional economy."

Mr. Campbell and EMI work with the College as a valuable partner of the HCCC Schools of Continuing Education and Workforce Development and STEM. One of the nation's top manufacturers of custom architectural woodwork, EMI prides itself on using technological innovation to create high-end designs without sacrificing Old World craftsmanship. Through the EMI Holz Technik Dual Education Program that Mr. Campbell founded, qualified high school students are hired as apprentices who split their time between studies and work, and receive a full benefits package and annual raises. Upon program completion, the apprentices earn their Associate in Applied of Science (A.A.S.) degree in Advanced Manufacturing from HCCC, and Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree in Technical Studies from Thomas Edison State University with no college debt.

HCCC'S WINTER GRADUATION: A MEMORABLE MILESTONE FOR ALL INVOLVED

hile graduation ceremonies are often thought of as springtime affairs, 430 Hudson County Community College students earned their credentials and graduated at the College's 2023 Winter Graduation ceremonies, held on December 4 and December 5.

The Winter Graduation ceremonies took place in the Scott Ring Room at the Culinary Conference Center. Over 500 students completed their degrees during the Fall semester, and a total of 107 students were cheered on by family, friends, faculty and staff in the audience. Because the event was live-streamed, many graduates even had loved ones tune in remotely from overseas to watch them graduate.

Graduates heard from HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber, Senior Vice President for Student Affairs and Enrollment, Dr. Lisa Dougherty, and Assistant Dean of Student Life and Leadership Veronica Gerosimo, who congratulated them on their success so far and reminded them that no matter where the next steps of their journey take them, they will always be part of the HCCC family because "Hudson is Home." Additionally, they were reminded that no matter how long it took them to complete their degrees, or what trials and tribulations they faced along the way, their degrees are the culmination of all of the hard work, and credentials that they will have forever. Student speakers for the two evenings included Payton Liberto, who graduated with an A.S. in Computer Science, and Guadalupe Romero Carrera, who graduated with an A.S. in Business Administration. Payton shared his story of overcoming challenges he faced in high school to get to where he is today. He skipped his high school graduation

due to discouraging words and feelings around this accomplishment. After some time away from school, he rediscovered his passions and motivation - both in computer science and in fulfilling his mother's dream of seeing him earn his degree. More than a few people in the room needed to dry their eyes when Peyton's mother joined him at the podium and embraced him.

Guadalupe spoke about coming to HCCC from her native Mexico, the hard work that it took to get to this point, and the sacrifices made by her family. Because the event was being live-streamed, she was able to speak directly to her family back home in Mexico and deliver a message of gratitude to them in Spanish; another moment that will live on the minds of those in attendance. Guadalupe also implored her fellow graduates to slow down, savor the moment, and celebrate this accomplishment

his gallerist, Robert Mann, who said Mr. Fink's photographs, "were like film stills from some incredibly volatile moment, and you can read the whole narrative from beginning to end; that was his gift." According to an interview in the Times in 2011, Mr. Fink said he was driven by what he called "sensual empathy." The photographs were meant to be "political, not polemical... But the necessary methodology is conventionally in-yourface... Not like other practitioners, who are in your face for the sake of being in your face. I am in your face because I want to be your face. I like to say that if I was not a photographer, I would be in jail. I want to touch everything. My life is profoundly physical. Photography for me is the transformation of desire." There is a lot to think about in that statement

IN MEMORIAM: PHILIP JOHNSTON

The Hudson County Community College family honors Philip (Phil) Johnston, a member of the HCCC Foundation Board of Directors since 2000, and Chair from 2010 to 2012, who passed on Friday, Dec. 15, 2023.

Johnston joined the HCCC Foundation at the invitation of Dr. Glen Gabert, HCCC President Emeritus, after meeting each other at an annual Holiday Gala. His company, Johnston Communications (now JC Solutions), created the College's fiber optics network during the mid1990s. The significant cost savings enabled the College to flourish and grow.

Johnston served on the boards of directors of the local Pioneer Boys and Girls of America, the West Hudson/South Bergen Optimist Club, and the HCCC Foundation's West Hudson fundraising committee.

Johnston was a supporter of the HCCC Foundation Golf Outing since its inception in 2003, and through his membership with the Forest Hill Field Club, sponsored the College, enabling the event to be held there.

"Phil's tireless support, generosity, and commitment to HCCC, our foundation, the faculty, and especially our students will not be

forgotten," said HCCC Foundation Chair Monica McCormack-Casey.

Right: May Belfort by Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec (1895), Lithograph in Color. May Belfort was born in Ireland. She first became famous as a comedian and singer in the London music halls. > Ringgold made titled, Picasso's Studio. According to the Mattatuck Museum where Ringgold has also exhibited her work, "A story quilt is a type of quilt that tells a story through pictures, sound, scents and textures." Ringgold is famous for her quilts. A recent review of the current show in the online arts magazine, Hyperallergic, reports that the exhibition title comes from part of the story inscribed on Picasso's Studio, "You asked me once why I wanted to become an artist and I said I didn't know. Well, I know now. It is because it's the only way I know of feeling free. My art is my freedom to say what I please. [It's not important] what color you are, you can do what you want [with your] art. They may not like it, or buy it, or even let you know it; but they can't stop you from doing it."

PROFESSOR HOSICK'S FITNESS POP-UPS BRING TRANSFORMATIVE HEALTH INSIGHTS TO THE STUDENT LOUNGE

hen you walk into the Student Center lounge, you're accustomed to seeing students studying, socializing, and lining up to order at Libby's Café. But if you happened to walk through the lounge on a Friday this past semester, you may have been surprised to see people stretching, doing jumping jacks, and using foam rollers.

You didn't accidentally walk into Planet Fitness – you encountered the Health and Fitness pop-up event series organized by Personal Fitness and Exercise Science Instructor Karen Hosick.

Students, faculty, and staff had the opportunity to get their blood pressure, heart rate, and oxygen saturation levels checked.

They also had the chance to partake in a threeminute step test to gauge their cardiovascular fitness and have their target heart rate calculated to track the intensity of their workouts.

Participants were also able to have their flexibility assessed through stretching exercises and to have their body composition (body fat percentage and muscle mass) assessed.

Learning these numbers was an eye-opening experience for many participants. Not only did they benefit from obtaining this crucial and potentially life-saving information, but they also learned about which areas they could improve upon and received personalized advice on how they could get better over time. This motivated participants to add exercise into their routines, which brings innumerable benefits ranging from weight loss, a stronger immune system, and improved cardiovascular health to mental health benefits such as reduced stress and increased levels of energy.



While participants gained invaluable information and advice about their personal health levels, the events also benefitted the Personal Fitness and Exercise Science students who were able to gain vital real-world experience working with participants, instructing them on technique, and explaining what their results meant. Professor Hosick explained, "The fitness Pop-Ups are a winwin because our students gain confidence in their skills while improving the health and fitness of the HCCC community."

This hands-on experience will help these students as they pursue careers in exciting fields like physical therapy and personal training.

ONLINE LEARNING AT HCCC CONTINUES TO GROW WITH LAUNCH OF SIX NEW FULLY ONLINE PROGRAMS

where the launch of six new fully online programs in the past six months, Hudson County Community College continues to make significant strides in expanding access to college education and reaching more students than ever before through its robust catalog of online and hybrid courses.

Powered by a dedicated team of online learning professionals, the Center for Online Learning (COL) at HCCC supports faculty across the College's four Academic Schools in designing, developing, and delivering an innovative, interactive, and accessible online curriculum.

The addition of these six new fully online programs raises the total number of fully online programs offered through Hudson Online to 16. Notably, these programs are offered across a wide range of disciplines.

Newly added programs include a Certificate in Accounting, an Associate of Arts in Early Childhood Education (Liberal Arts), an Associate of Arts in Elementary/Secondary Education (Liberal Arts), an Associate of Arts in Special Education (Liberal Arts), a Proficiency Certificate in Community Healthcare Navigator, and an Associate of Science in Health Services Option in Public Health. In addition to these fully online programs, most of the College's 90+ programs can be completed partially online, and Hudson Online's 150+ online and hybrid courses include a variety of online labs and electives. This affords students tremendous flexibility in scheduling their classes by removing barriers students often encounter in finding a course section that meets their needs. Over onethird of HCCC's students take one or more courses online each semester, and approximately 12% of students take their entire course load online.

Hudson Online continues to build momentum. Enrollment in online courses has more than doubled from pre-pandemic levels, and the number of students taking all or most of the courses required for their degree online has increased by 400%. The College's "new normal" following the pandemic demonstrates that demand for online learning in Hudson County and beyond continues to grow. HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber stated, "We firmly believe that online learning is a long-term opportunity that enriches lives and empowers our students and members of our community. We are proud to be a leading institution in this endeavor, and we are committed to continuing to expand our online offerings in the future."

HCCC's online programs and courses meet the needs of various populations, including working professionals who are seeking career advancement and first-time students who prefer the convenience of online coursework.

Executive Director of HCCC's Center for Online Learning Matthew LaBrake states that "Expanding access to online learning is essential to our mission as a community college, providing members of Hudson County with equitable access to an education they might not be able to obtain otherwise. We are providing students who are working multiple jobs and raising children with a way to take classes in their free time. We provide students with health concerns or lack of transportation with a means to access an education from the comfort of their home."

With full access to all support services that on-site students enjoy, online students don't miss out on HCCC's student-centered and supportive approach that led students to coin the College's motto, "Hudson is Home." These services include use of the College Library's digital resources, 24/7 on-demand virtual writing and tutoring, accessibility services, personal mental health and wellness counseling, IT assistance, academic advising, and career coaching. Online students are also welcome to visit HCCC's two campuses in Jersey City and Union City to take advantage of community spaces and in-person support services.

Center for Adult Transition, ACCESS

The ACCESS Program at the Center for Adult Transition is thrilled to highlight the success of its second Community Partner Engagement Event on November 10, 2023. ACCESS students from cycle three and their support persons gained valuable insights into available resources from local partners such as Computer Care Partners, the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation Services, the Department of Developmental Disabilities, Hudson Community Enterprises, and Project SEARCH. This event has been instrumental in helping students navigate their journey into independent living and shape their paths in academics and the workforce. It has been truly inspiring to witness the participants' enthusiasm as they explore ways to overcome personal and academic challenges, fostering a sense of community awareness around neurodiversity.



Water Workforce Utility Program (WWUP)

The Water Workforce Utility Program (WWUP) wrapped up its final session on November 8, with 14 students successfully finishing the program. The WWUP was an eight-week program with a 50-hour curriculum that provided participants an opportunity to receive an introduction to the water industry and certifications in OSHA 10 and CPR/First Aid. Students also received classes in Basic Math, Customer Service, and Career Readiness. The program has been led by Associate Vice President Lori Margolin; Dean of STEM, Dr. Burl Yearwood; CEWD Director Catherina Mirasol; and CBI Coordinator Joyce Alvarez in partnership with the Director of Jersey Water Works, Paula Vega-Figueroa. Throughout the program, students were able to attend a utility-centered activity facilitated by Michael Assante and John Libitz from Veolia. Students were also invited to interview for internship positions at Veolia, and five out of the seven students who interviewed have continued with the recruiting process. On November 4, students received a presentation by Matthew Maffei, the Apprenticeship Coordinator at New Jersey Water Association. At present, seven students have shown interest in applying to the apprenticeship program and are preparing for their interviews with the help of Natalie Brown, WWUP's Student Success Coach.

Ms. Brown is currently working alongside students who wish to further their education at HCCC or pursue careers in the water industry. Everyone united and celebrated involvement in the water sector at Jersey Water Works' Annual conference on December 13.

Congratulations to the students who accomplished this significant milestone! A heartfelt thank you goes out to our partners and instructors whose dedication made this achievement possible.

What made it the right decision for you?

We spoke with Sally Elwir (HCCC Class of '23). Sally was the valedictorian for the Class of 2023 and is now studying both Government and Politics and Criminal Justice at Fairleigh Dickinson University. She is also working as an event assistant in the Office of Student Life and Leadership. She was recently sworn in as the Alumni Representative to the HCCC Board of Trustees.

What inspired your interest in politics and law? I wanted to get into politics to represent the Middle Eastern people and the Palestinian people since we are a small minority group. I enjoyed my American government class and my criminal law class. I don't know what type of law I want to pursue further, but I'm interested in recovery law and labor law.

I am going to be starting a new internship at the New Jersey League of Conservation Voters, a group that lobbies legislators to try to pass laws that will protect the environment.

Tell us about your experience as a Palestinian-American in Government and Politics.

I was a minority in that major. Sometimes you felt alone - especially hearing bad things about my country and just being an Arab in general, you can feel like you aren't being accepted as much. One person actually told me to stick to criminal justice, knowing that I was Palestinian. I didn't take it seriously or let it discourage me.

As a Middle Eastern woman, I want to get into that field to promote DEI and to make everyone feel included. I knew that I was a hard worker and I knew that what I was doing was right. If you let their words get to you, then minorities will never get the same opportunities as everyone else. I want to inspire other people like me to get into law, government and politics.

Inclusiveness is big to me - you need to make everyone feel like they're included. Make sure that no one is left out, no matter where you come from.

Tell us about how you became the President of SGA.

The position kind of fell into my lap. All of the executive board members from my fist year graduated, so they wanted me to run it since I had the most experience. I wanted to be involved and be the voice of the student body. Serving in the role definitely helped me with my public speaking skills.

What inspired you to choose Fairleigh Dickinson **University?**

The small classes stood out to me. I like to be in a small community; I learn more that way and build more relationships. The campus was very nice - and the unlimited parking was a plus. Additionally, I received a scholarship from the school.

What's next on your agenda?
