

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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE **CELEBRATES A RECORD 1,504 GRADUATES AT RED BULL ARENA ON MAY 17**

udson County Community College (HCCC) held its 46th Commencement Ceremony on Wednesday, May 17, 2023 at Red Bull Arena in Harrison, NJ. Approximately 1,504 graduates, a college record, were joined by family, friends, elected officials, the College's Trustees, and HCCC faculty and staff. New Jersey Senate President Nicholas Scutari delivered the keynote address, and Sally Elwir delivered valedictory remarks.

Among the graduates were 13 students from Hudson County high schools who completed their associate degrees while still attending high school. There were also nine graduates who are incarcerated or reentry citizens.

"As members of the Class of 2023 embark upon the next chapters of their lives, we know they will continue to demonstrate the fortitude, perseverance, and leadership that brought them success as HCCC students," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "We celebrate them and their families."

Representing the 22nd District, New Jersev State Senator Nicholas Scutari is a strong education proponent. He co-sponsored the New Jersey STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Scholars Grant Pilot Program that builds upon existing STEM educational programs and creates new ones. Senator Scutari received his undergraduate degree from Kean College (now Kean University), his Master's degree from Rutgers University, and law degree from the Thomas Cooley Law School at Western Michigan University. Currently the President of the New Jersey Senate, he serves as Chair of the Joint State Leasing and Space Utilization Committee.

HCCC Class of 2023 Valedictorian Sally Elwir is a Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship Semifinalist who received her Associate in Science (A.S.) degree in Criminal Justice. She was President of the HCCC Student Government Association and Vice President of the Beta Alpha Phi Chapter of the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) International Honor Society.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HOSTS NJ REENTRY CORPORATION'S **INAUGURAL SUMMER TRAINING INSTITUTE**

n Wednesday, May 10, the New Jersey Reentry Corporation (NJRC) held a press conference to launch its Summer Training Institute for court-involved young adults at Hudson County Community College's (HCCC) Culinary Conference Center.

This innovative program that will ready them for a variety

of in-demand and family-sustaining careers. Participants will have the opportunity to take courses on general construction and forklift operation while earning OSHA 30 certification. Participants can also take culinary courses, Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) courses at RJW Barnabas, and courses on phlebotomy and becoming a peer recovery specialist (a professional who has successfully completed the recovery process and now helps others going through the same process). Additionally, they can learn Microsoft basics and receive Cisco Certification.

Summer Training Institute participants will also gain access to NJRC's full array of wraparound

services, such as enrollment in federal and state benefit programs such as Medicaid and SNAP, plus the offerings of the Francine A. LeFrak Wellness Center that provides medical, behavioral, and dental health screenings. Additionally, the Hudson County Department of Housing and Community Reintegration will provide supportive family services to participants.

n Thursday, May 4, 2023, Hudson County Community College welcomed Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) President Dr. Antonio Flores and other HACU leaders and members, higher education representatives, state legislators, and corporate and community leaders in the organization's "HACU on the Road" visit. The full-day program was held at the HCCC Culinary Conference Center, 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City, NJ. Several hundred individuals, including HCCC students, faculty, and staff attended the day's meetings and activities. A community luncheon involved representatives of colleges, universities, businesses, and community agencies from New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, and Connecticut.

Designed to promote dialogue about the state of Hispanic higher education, the "HACU on the Road" Summit engaged chancellors and presidents of colleges and universities, superintendents of Hispanic-serving school districts, corporate leaders, faculty, staff, students, media and other supporters. The event presented opportunities for attendees to learn more about HCCC best practices, HACU programs and initiatives, priority issues surrounding Hispanic college and university students and communities, and to develop alliances and partnerships.

"Hudson County Community College is a proud member of HACU, and a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI)," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "We were honored to host 'HACU on the Road,' and to welcome Dr. Flores, his colleagues, other summit participants, and to engage our college and tri-state colleges, universities and communities in important discussions." The "HACU on the Road" Summit began with a HACU/HCCC leadership meeting led by Dr. Flores and Dr. Reber. Lunch with the community members followed. Later, Dr. Flores, Dr. Reber, HCCC Vice President for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Dr. Yeurys Pujols, HCCC Latino Advisory Council Liaison Wendy Martinez, and HCCC Assistant Professor of Modern Languages, Speech and Communication Studies Gilda Reyes conducted a "Town Hall" panel discussion. P or the second year in a row, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) has received the national "2023 Most Promising Places to Work in Community Colleges" Award. The College is one of twenty colleges in the United States to receive this honor from *Diverse: Issues in Higher Education* and the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD). The award was presented to the College at NISOD's annual meeting in Austin Texas, May 27-30, 2023.

"2023 Most Promising Places to Work in Community Colleges" recipients are recognized for exceptional commitment to diversity in all forms including race/ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, disability, age, class, and veterans – through best in-class student and staff recruitment and retention practices, inclusive learning and working environments, and meaningful community service and engagement opportunities.

To select the awardees, the "Most Promising Places to Work" research team uses a web-based survey to examine areas such as innovative programs, family friendliness, salaries/benefits, and professional development opportunities. The "Most Promising Places to Work in Community Colleges" team reviewed HCCC's on-boarding and evaluation, new

faculty and staff orientation, professional development, and work-life practices, as well as salaries and benefits. They learned that HCCC is steadfast in its commitment to Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) and encourages:

- Culturally aware curricula;
- Recruitment of and opportunities for – diverse populations, including
- administration, faculty, staff, and students;Diversity training and education that is available to everyone;

- Mediation of differences that may arise among community members to attain the best possible solutions and compromises; and
 Diverse conversations and discussions
- without censure or hostility.

"Last year, HCCC was recognized as 'a beacon for diversity,' and this year's award reflects our continued commitment to advancing equity and excellence," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "Everyone at HCCC – trustees, faculty, staff, students, and benefactors – work to make the College a welcoming, safe, and inclusive place to work and learn. Coming from a large family of Middle Eastern descent, Ms. Elwir speaks English and Arabic. She volunteers for the Hudson Helps Resource Center and Hope House, an emergency shelter for homeless women with children; and works for HCCC's Office of Student Life and Leadership. Additionally, Ms. Elwir has served as an HCCC College Student Success Mentor.

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Class of 2023 Valedictorian Sally Elwir is passionate about higher education, social justice, and volunteering. At the College's 46th Commencement Ceremony on Wednesday, May 17, she shared her higher education and community service journey. The event was held at Red Bull Arena in Harrison, NJ.

While working toward her HCCC Associate in Science (A.S.) degree in Criminal Justice, Ms. Elwir participated in a federal work study program and gave back to the Hudson County community. She advocated for the health and well-being of college students at HCCC monthly Town Hall and HCCC Board of Trustees meetings, and discussed issues that impede student success at a conference with Governor Phil Murphy.

Tenacious and motivated to achieve academic excellence, Ms. Elwir maintained a 4.0 GPA, Dean's List status, and served as Vice President of the HCCC Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) International Honor Society. She was a semifinalist for the 2023 Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship for her exceptional academic ability, leadership, service, and determination.

Ms. Elwir is adept at juggling her studies with other roles and responsibilities. She served as 2022-23 President of the HCCC Student Government Association; serves as a College Student Success Mentor; serves on the Student Conduct Board; is a member of the All College Council Student Affairs Committee; and works with the JED Foundation for mental health support. As President of the HCCC Criminal Justice Club, Ms. Elwir hosted a self-defense training session and panel. Her volunteer work has benefitted the HCCC Office of Student Life and Leadership, Hudson Helps Resource Center, and Hope House, an emergency shelter for homeless women and children.

A member of a large Middle Eastern family. Ms. Elwir is а first-generation college student who speaks English and Arabic. She developed leadership skills in the HCCC Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Student Passport Program. To promote multicultural activities and social events at the College, she organized the Arab Heritage Month Fashion Show

A proponent of criminal justice reform, Ms. Elwir has addressed the socioeconomic injustices of the "war on drugs," and assisted victims of sexual assault. While interning for the Hudson County Prosecutor's Office, she observed trials; shadowed an attorney, detectives and agents; and researched Megan's Law files and data. Ms. Elwir is a Community College Representative for the "It's On Us" Caucus Chair Leadership Program. She took master classes on sexual assault and prevention on college campuses.

"I plan on continuing my college education because I aspire to become a drug court attorney. My goal is to help those who struggle with addiction get recovery and a second chance," Ms. Elwir said. "I also feel strongly about public safety and ensuring that people's concerns are taken seriously. 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services; RECOVER by expanding access to short-term healthcare training and credentials and opportunities for recession resistant work; and PROSPER by deepening relationships with employers and creating experiential learning opportunities for students in recession-resistant industries.

HCCC GTI met or exceeded goals of training students, awarding credentials, job placement, screening students for benefits, working with area employers in recession-resistant sectors to define in-demand skill sets, recruiting industry experts as mentors, delivering workshops, developing experiential learning opportunities, and mapping competencies to curricula and degree programs. Through these initiatives, HCCC uplifted, empowered, and provided pathways to a better future for thousands of students and alumni, as well as dislocated retail, hospitality, and low-wage essential workers.

In January 2021, JPMorgan Chase awarded HCCC an \$850,000, one-year investment to fund GTI. HCCC GTI was so successful that the award was increased by \$200,000 and extended to January 2023.

As Associate Director of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion at HCCC, Natalia Vazquez-Bodkin leads by contributing to the creation of diversity policies and procedures and equitable services. She oversees the Opportunity Meets Innovation Grant (OMIG), an award of \$500,000 from the State of New Jersey for Academic Year 2021-2023; co-chairs the President's Advisory Council for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI), which consists of more than 42 participants; and successfully led the College through the Method of Administration (MOA) Civil Rights Compliance Review for Career and Technical Education programs of study with the New Jersey Department of Education.

Ms. Vazquez-Bodkin notes that financial support from the OSHE Opportunity Meets Innovation Grant enabled HCCC to support faculty, staff, students, and community members through several innovative initiatives, programs, and events. One such program is the homegrown, grassroots initiative, entitled Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Student Passport Program (DEISPP), that was created in response to the emotional impact of COVID-19 and the social unrest that the community was experiencing. Another is the eCornell Diversity and Inclusion certificate program that is offered to HCCC employees free of charge. Many other programs were made possible with this funding, including Title IX and Sexual Harassment Training, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Summer Retreats, and ALICE in-person active shooter training.

The NJRC Summer Training Institute will provide young adults with skills and a direction, which will establish future careers."

Speakers at the launch included New Jersey Reentry Corporation (NJRC) Founder and Chairman, former New Jersey Governor James McGreevey, HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber, and NJ Council of County Colleges President Dr. Aaron Fitchner. Labor organizations such as the Laborers International Union of North America (LiUNA) and the Eastern Atlantic Regional Council of Carpenters also participated. Deputy Assistant Commissioner of Workforce Development Nicholas Toth spoke about investing in the state's labor force. Local leadership including Jersey City Council President, Joyce Watterman, and Hudson County Department Director of Housing and Community Reintegration Frank Mazza also participated in the event, along with Jenny Davis, the Chief of Intergovernmental Affairs for the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey.

Pastor Raul Ruiz of the New Jersey Coalition of Latino Pastors and Ministers read the opening prayers and spoke about the importance of community engagement, and Tamika McReyolds, First Lady of the Mt. Olive Baptist Church in Jersey City and Hot 97's DJ Wallah discussed the importance of summer programs and youth engagement. Reverend Ritney Castine of the Mount Pisgah AME Church in Jersey City concluded the event with closing remarks and a prayer.

About NJ Reentry Corporation

The New Jersey Reentry Corporation (NJRC) is a non-profit agency with a social mission to remove all barriers to employment for citizens returning from jail or prison. The NJRC is premised on the ambition to create an environment which promotes pro-social norms, encouraging the establishment of attachments to positive rehabilitative cultures, strengthening bonds among peers who promote positive norms and values, and promoting family reunification. Participants receive individualized assessments and treatment plans that first address essential needs, including housing, treatment, mental health care, medical care, and access to health insurance and other public benefits to secure these essential needs.

The daily expense of supervising a probationer is twenty times less than the average expense of incarcerating an individual in prison or jail. The costs of imprisonment is increasing while the benefits are decreasing substantially. NJRC's capacity to secure public safety for communities depends upon their ability to improve management to the thousands of individuals in New Jersey who are under probation and/or parole supervision. Proper recognition must be given to persons without resources as post-release success frequently depends on the quality and services amongst support provided within a community.

Furthermore, gainful employment is the most critical aspect of post-prison reentry. Job training, employment counseling, as well as employment placement programs are essential tools for effective reintegration and workforce development.

The NJRC was developed subsequent to the successful implementation of a pilot reentry model in Hudson County/Jersey City in 2014 with the support of Governor Christie's administration. The Hudson County/Jersey City reentry model was initiated through a series of strategic partnerships between the Hudson County Department of Corrections (HCDOC), the New Jersey Department of Family Services (DFS), and local non-profit providers. Also included are the Jersey City Employment and Training Program (JCETP) and Integrity House, a substance abuse treatment provider, both with decades of experience serving court-involved individuals.

The HCDOC recognized that addressing the need for addiction treatment and successful return to society would result in improved public safety and established a Community Reintegration Program funded in part by a federal Second Chance Act grant. The program has been recognized by the United States Department of Justice Bureau of Justice Assistance and the National Institute of Justice "as being at the forefront of the reentry field." The project is one of only seven in the country to be included in a gold standard evaluation by the National Institute of Justice.


Artist News

Congratulations to this year's Student Foundation Art Award Winners: The two \$500 Purchase Awards went to **Elaf Hussein** for her watercolor, "Romina: The First Frost" and **Simone Colta** for her drawing, "La Zimnicea."

The four \$150 art-supplies gift-certificate awards went to Tashionna Green, Travis Muniz, Eliza Nunez, and Lucas Pinheiro. Thank you to the many talented artists who participated in the contest.

The work of Pacita Abad (1946 - 2004) is installed in a lobby of Filipino and Filipino-American art on the 3rd floor of the Gabert Library. A major exhibition of her work runs through Sept. 3 at the Walker Art Center in Minneapolis. It will then travel to the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art and the Art Gallery of Ontario in Toronto. In a recent review of the exhibit in The New York Times, Alex V. Cipolle writes that the exhibit seeks to give long overdue attention to this wonderful artist. Victoria Sung, the Walker associate curator of visual arts, said, "I just felt like she was an artist who had been so underrecognized and overlooked for so many years" said Ms. Sung, the show's curator. "One of the central questions I grappled with was how an artist like Pacita — who was remarkably prolific and whose works have such a robust physical presence — was at once visible and invisible.... She was at the center of her communities, artistic and otherwise, but, like so many other women artists of color, was relegated to the margins when it came to mainstream art spaces and art histories.... It's only now that Pacita's work is being recovered in the context of American art histories, but also Philippine, Southeast Asian and transnational art histories."

The recognition of long-neglected artists seems to be a "thing" this spring: Jaune Quick-To-See-Smith continues to get wonderful reviews for her

exhibit at the Whitney Museum in New York City through August 13. You can see her work on the 4th floor of the Gabert Library as well. In a recent interview in *Hyperallergic*, the artist says of this long-overdue retrospective, "In this long journey, it is step by step, hand over hand, something like climbing a rope.... A partial culmination of a life's work. Few artists have the advantage of viewing their work in hindsight; this is the gift the Whitney has given to me and those who have followed my work. Sometimes we install an artwork because of the artist's skill, and wonder, "How else can this be relevant?" Then, suddenly it becomes quite relevant. Take for example, the costume designs that New Jersey artist, **Sister Mary of the Compassion, OP**, made in the mid-20th century for a production of a four-hundred-year-old play by Francis Beaumont called, "The Knight of the Burning Pestle." For educational purposes, our gouaches installed on the 7th floor of the North

Hudson campus are charming and well-executed. They also raise questions about the nun artist, who lived in a monastery in Union City and had taken a vow of silence. How did she end up doing these works?

To our surprise, "The Knight" play was recently performed in downtown New York City, and got a wonderful review in The New York Times. The paper notes that the raucous disruption of public events, which we see frequently today, was old news by 1607 when this "tricksy, loopy, wildly self-referential" play was written. A satire about the theater, "The Knight" is a play within a play. It starts with an Elizabethan acting troupe working to put on a new show. The locals are upset that nearby business owners aren't represented well, and insist on making a local grocer the hero. Calling part of the play, "beautifully silly," the reviewer notes that some sections of the play don't age well (but how well does anything age after 400 years?) Still, the play is "a satire of theater that is also a valentine to it, to the transport of becoming swept up into a play, to the wonder of seeing someone just like you onstage."



- Weaving diversity, equity, and inclusion guidelines and practices into recruitment and hiring practices, screening committee procedures, promotion considerations, and succession planning.
- Creating clear and transparent processes for safety, security, and incident reporting that are free of intimidation and respectful of confidentiality.
- Building community and a sense of belonging for students by advancing their academic development, professional growth, and personal transformation.

Transparent and inclusive processes at HCCC are truly owned by the College community and include monthly Town Hall meetings; implicit bias training; inclusion of faculty and staff at national conferences; opportunities for members of the College community to participate in the eCornell Diversity and Inclusion Certificate program free of charge; a competitive tuition reimbursement program for faculty and staff; a broad range of regularly scheduled employee development workshops; and much more.
