HCCC joined the Achieving the Dream network because their mission aligns with ours," said HCCC President, Dr. Christopher Reber. "ATD is dedicated to reaching deep into communities to open new pathways into and through colleges for the most vulnerable learners, moving the focus from whole college transformation to whole community transformation. HCCC is committed to reaching new levels of success by empowering our students to achieve their personal, academic, and professional dreams and goals. We remain steadfast in maintaining our focus on equity in student success, including degree completion, transfer pathways, gainful employment, and engaged civic participation."

ATD Leader Colleges play an important role in accelerating the adoption of effective practices within the ATD Network and across higher education. Leader Colleges are recognized for the quality of their work in whole-college reform, resulting in increased completion rates for all students. Leader Colleges develop innovative methods to work with other colleges, share knowledge, and exchange ideas about evidence-based reform strategies.

In December 2018, ATD President and CEO, Dr. Karen Stout, visited HCCC and made a presentation about the ATD mission. Shortly after, a survey was distributed to the entire College community and the overwhelming majority of respondents endorsed HCCC joining ATD. In January 2019, the College's Board of Trustees approved the resolution for HCCC to join the 2019 cohort of ATD New Member Colleges.

# HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE PRESENTS NATIONWIDE '2023 TEACHING AND LEARNING SYMPOSIUM ON SOCIAL JUSTICE IN HIGHER EDUCATION'

ast year, the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Center for Teaching, Learning, and Innovation presented a first for New Jersey higher education – a national symposium dedicated to teaching and learning practices to promote social justice in colleges and universities. The symposium was enormously successful, and many of the nearly 500 registrants from seven states and 47 colleges and universities encouraged HCCC to make this an annual event.

From Monday, February 27 to Friday, March 3, 2023, HCCC presented its Second Annual "2023 Teaching and Learning Symposium on Social Justice in Higher Education" free of charge to all attendees. The nearly 40 presenters and panelists included nationally prominent educators, authors, college and university presidents and trustees, community advocates and leaders, and students examined how social and racial issues impact employment, health and the health care system, the environment, mental health, spirituality, the justice system, corporate responsibility, and youth advocacy.

year in the making," said HCCC President, Dr. Christopher Reber. "Realizing that the need for teaching about social justice grows more essential every day, Dr. Paula Roberson, the Founding Director of our HCCC Center for Teaching, Learning, and Innovation, worked passionately to prepare a roster of important topics and to engage expert presenters from across the United States."

This year's symposium began with welcoming remarks from Dr. Brian Bridges, Secretary of Higher Education for the State of New Jersey and

has welcomed longtime Hudson County Prosecutor and Superior Court Judge Edward DeFazio as the newest member of the HCCC Board of Trustees (BOT). Judge DeFazio was sworn in at the Board's regular meeting on February 21, 2023.

"On behalf of the entire HCCC community, we are very happy to welcome Edward DeFazio to the College's Board of Trustees," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "Judge DeFazio has a long and outstanding record of public service and leadership in Hudson County and will be a great asset to the HCCC family."

A Jersey City native, Edward DeFazio is a lifelong Hudson County resident who has more than 40 years' experience in public service. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Fordham University, and his Juris Doctorate from Seton Hall University Law School.

DeFazio began his career as Assistant Hudson County Prosecutor and rose through the ranks to become Homicide Unit Chief. He then served as Chief Judge of the Jersey City Municipal Court before returning to the Hudson County Prosecutor's Office as First Assistant Prosecutor. A decade later he was appointed New Jersey Superior Court Judge. DeFazio left the bench in 2002 to serve as Hudson County Prosecutor for two five-year terms.

In 2012, DeFazio was appointed to the Superior Court bench where he served for seven years before entering private practice at the law firm of Bruno and Ferraro. He is licensed to practice law in New Jersey, New York, and before the United States Supreme Court.

Edward DeFazio's professional affiliations include the New Jersey State Bar Association; member, Past Officer and Trustee of the Hudson County Bar Association; member and past President of the North Hudson Lawyer's Club; member of the New Jersey Death Penalty Study Commission; and State Director to the National

District Attorney's Association. He was named the 2006 "Lawyer of the Year" by the New Jersey Commission on Professionalism in the Law.

The HCCC Board of Trustees is the governing body of Hudson County Community College and is responsible for leading, advocating, and supporting the College's mission; ensuring fiduciary responsibility; establishing overarching goals and policies; and hiring, supporting, and evaluating the President.

The HCCC Board of Trustees is comprised of eight individuals appointed by the Hudson County Board of County Commissioners; and at least two individuals appointed by the Governor. Trustees maintain their trustee status until they are reappointed or replaced by the appointing authorities. The HCCC President serves as an exofficio member, and the College's student body elects a representative from the graduating class to serve one year as a non-voting student alumni representative.

"I am honored to have been chosen as a Hudson County Community College Trustee," Judge DeFazio stated. "The College is a treasure, an incredible resource for our community, and together with my fellow Board members, Dr. Reber, and the entire HCCC team, we will continue accomplishing great things here."

# **MODEL UN CONFERENCE**

For seven decades the Harvard Model UN Conference hosts students from 40 countries to discuss global issues. Students learn to negotiate with others, and collaborate on policy proposals and detailed programs to solve global issues ranging from drone technology to territorial sovereignty.

Each college or university is assigned countries to conduct research on global problems. This year, Hudson County Community College was assigned to Egypt and Croatia.

# Foundation Art Collection

The Hudson County Community College Foundation Art Collection of 1,825+ works is installed in the public areas of campus buildings. The entire College is an educational art museum. This Collection reveals aspects of America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history from the Hudson River School period to today. In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

Each month, this page in HCCC Happenings provides updates on artists whose works are in the Collection, and new additions to the Collection.

#### **Artist News**

Each year, the College acquires the annual presentation print from The Print Club of New York. This year's print, Vol, by Didier William is a wood carving, polymer plate, letter press print. Editor Gillian Greenhill Hannum notes in the International Print Collector's Societies Newsletter that William was born in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, and earned his BFA in painting at Maryland Institute College of Art and his MFA in painting and printmaking at Yale. He has exhibited at many places, including the Bronx Museum of Art, The Museum of Latin American Art in Long Beach, and Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art. She notes, "Much of his work focuses on the presence of gravity. Mindfulness is an important aspect of his practice, and he brings the viewer into the moment ... to explore the conditions of space a body can occupy. For William, this was a way to think about immigration, where the ground is snatched from beneath you. What happens when gravity is taken away? What remains?"

If you like Emma Amos's and Faith Ringgold's work, now on view at the Benjamin J. Dineen III and Dennis C. Hull Gallery, you might enjoy going over to the Hudson River Museum in Yonkers where you can see the exhibit "Matrix: Prints by Women Artists, 1960 – 1990," featuring prints by Emma Amos, Helen Frankenthaler, the Guerrilla Girls, and Faith Ringgold, on view through April. Also on view through April is "Artists Select: Valerie Hammond & Kiki Smith Celebrate 25 Years of Neiman Center Prints," at the LeRoy Neiman Gallery, Columbia University, 310 Dodge Hall, 2960 Broadway at 116th Street, New York. Kiki Smith's work can also be seen on the top floor of the STEM Building.

Jan Wurm's painting Lear and His Fool is on view on the second floor of the Gabert Library. In a 2020 interview with Livia Stein, Wurm talks about her inspirations and her work. This is part of her project documenting the lives of Northern California women artists, the "Bay Area Women Artists' Legacy Project." Wurm says that "isolation" inspired her early art. When she was 8, her parents moved from California to a little town in the Austrian Alps. She had no friends, so after school, she would go home, do her homework, and then "what was left in my room was drawing and

my colored pencils and my watercolors and my pastels, and that's what I did until I was 12," when her family moved back to the U.S. She says, "It was all formed. It was sort of all decided. [Art] was my language. That is what I was using to communicate and express everything that otherwise would be shared with people." Stein asks the artist if she went to a lot of museums in Europe. Wurm says, "Like a duckling, I was imprinted very early with a lot of the visual language that still is there... That happens with the art and the architecture and the environment that we're looking at when we're very young, and it was so strong there." Wurm has recently curated two shows, one about her teacher Richard Diebenkorn's work, and another about Diebenkorn's teacher, artist David Park. Wurm says it was the "greatest gift to have the privilege of doing these things." She says that curating and writing allows her "to illuminate and share" art that is "really important." In the process of creating these shows, she explored the thought and development of artists, and it taught her "how and why I came to the things that I valued." In a January 2023 article in Art in America, Nina Yankowitz Defies the "Woman Up: Patriarchy," Glenn Adamson gives long-overdue recognition to Yankowitz's art calling her, "a significant figure in feminist art," and comments on her early work's reception "or lack thereof." Reviewing her recent exhibition at Eric Firestone's gallery space on Great Jones Street in New York City (works produced between 1967 and 1972,) Adamson writes, "These paintings ought to be in the collections of the Whitney Museum, the Museum of Modern Art, and other major institutions. Instead, they have been in storage for 50 years. How did this happen?" In answer to that question, he discusses gender discrimination in the art world. He also mentions that Yankowitz was only 21 when she first made these works, and that she is not keen on self-promotion. Further, Yankowitz refuses to confine herself to one artistic medium, Adamson notes, "For the last five decades, Yankowitz has continued to explore the fusion of music, technology, and visual art." We are glad to see her getting some of the praise she deserves. We appreciate her interdisciplinary courage, and hope to install her recent donation later this year.

## Contemporary Peacemakers: Waves of Change Exhibit Now to April 7

Inspired by the teachings and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., the HCCC Benjamin J. Dineen III & Dennis C. Hull Gallery has been transformed into a center for social change. HCCC celebrates Dr. King's activism through history, the arts, and community with the exhibit, Contemporary Peacemakers: Waves of Change. The exhibit takes inspiration from Régine Michelle Jean-Charles', A Trumpet of Conscience for the 21st Century: King's Call to Justice. Jean-Charles examines the influence of Dr. King's 1960s-era speeches on American social movements. The exhibit timeline begins with King's legendary visit to Jersey City and archives social changes throughout the decades, ending with the Black Lives Matter movement, and Tamika Palmer's virtual event in the Gallery in February 2021. Other highlights include an interactive-word display created by the Poetry and Language Collective, NJ Reentry Program's original works of art, a digital mural by the PACDEI Student Action Group, and an ever-changing food donation sculpture sponsored by Goya Foods.

# Associate of Science - Exercise Science

#### What factors led you to decide to attend **Hudson County Community College?**

Between walking and public transit, both of HCCC's campuses were really accessible for me. Also, as a transfer student, they were able to see me as a person rather than my previous GPA.

#### What is your favorite memory of the College, in or out of the classroom?

My favorite memory was how much HCCC really cares about its students. One of my professors, Professor Hosick, would consistently go out of her way to email students when there were upcoming food drives for those dealing with food insecurity, and would even help us learn to navigate our classes and financial aid. She always went above and beyond to make sure our needs were being met both in and outside of the classroom, and I really appreciated that HCCC had plenty of tools available to help students succeed.

# How did you become interested in **Exercise Science?**

I've played organized sports since I was 5 and have been running and weight lifting since 13, so I have always had a passion for fitness. When I got my personal trainer certification, clients would ask me questions that I struggled to answer because I didn't have the knowledge or language to explain various concepts and movements. I think there is a big misconception that exercise science is an easy major where you only need to count reps and add weights, but there is so much more to it, and that pushed me to want to understand every aspect of the science behind the movements.

## How did your time at HCCC prepare you for your career/ life now?

My time at HCCC has set me up with successful tools like time management, working with others, and working consistently hard to prepare me for the transition to attended Rutgers University. Even more so, I am much more confident and knowledgeable when it comes to being a personal trainer; I have a much more solid foundation after my time at HCCC.

# What is a typical workday for you?

I'm probably the busiest I have ever been, which has turned me into a very schedule-oriented person in order to effectively manage my time! Most mornings start with a run around Liberty State Park before traveling around Jersey City to meet with clients. I then head to New Brunswick for afternoon classes and some library time. On my way home, I'm usually able to squeeze in a workout





before training a few more clients in the evening.

The most memorable clients I've worked with so far has to be a couple who were completely new to training and were very intimidated by the barbell. One of them started out barely able to bench 5 lbs. dumbbells, but by the end of our time together, she was benching 55 lbs. with the barbell and squatting 175 lbs. It was so awesome to see each one's confidence grow in the gym along with their abilities, which will always be my favorite part of my job.

# Who are your biggest inspirations that have impacted your work in some way?

My mom is incredibly hardworking and kind, so those were qualities were instilled in me from a young age. As much as I still have a competitive streak in me from my years of playing sports, I think that some people focus on that too much. I enjoy helping my coworkers and classmates, because I think its best if we can all learn and succeed together rather than trying to outdo one another. I think there are enough pieces of the pie to go around, and ultimately it creates a better culture and feels good to collaborate with others.

# What advice do you have for students just starting their college careers?

My advice to recent HCCC grads is to make a schedule and stick to it, because it can be hard to transition from a consistent class schedule to having a completely unstructured day. I would tell them to be proud of their accomplishment; in my short time at Rutgers, I have already seen a difference in the student body and found my classmates at HCCC to have many more obstacles in their personal lives. I think it makes all of us appreciate our degree that much more to have struggled and still found success on the other side.

For new students, I would tell them to take it slow and don't be embarrassed to ask questions! Everyone is here to learn, so there's no need to try and look smart instead of reaching out for help when you need it. There are plenty of tutors to choose from, and overall, professors have your best interest in mind as long as you try to stay involved and make an effort in class. Enjoy the process of getting your degree, 2 years goes by quickly!
