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## HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE NAMED LEADER COLLEGE OF DISTINCTION BY ACHIEVING THE DREAM

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) has earned "Leader College of Distinction" designation from Achieving the Dream (ATD), the national reform movement of high-achieving community colleges. The honor is bestowed upon innovative higher education institutions that demonstrate sustained and significant outcomes in the advancement of student success. HCCC is one of six Leader Colleges to receive this honor.

ATD is the acclaimed national nonprofit organization dedicated to advancing community colleges as hubs of equity and mobility in their communities. ATD created the Leader College of Distinction Award in 2018 to recognize colleges that meet challenging student success goals. It is the highest designation of institutional success outcomes in the ATD network of colleges.

"This recognition is important to our colleges. It affirms to their faculty and staff and communities the importance of their student success work and that they are making progress on important milestone metrics in their journeys," said Dr. Karen A. Stout, President and CEO of Achieving the Dream. "Hudson County Community College is an exemplar of excellence within the ATD Network. It is driving accelerated and scaled gains in equitable student success results, which effect substantive improvements for students, families, and the community HCCC serves. Their dedication and hard work both inform and inspire other colleges, and we admire them for their work."

HCCC joined the ATD network of 300 colleges in January 2019 and achieved Leader College status last year by demonstrating continuous improvement in retention and graduation rates, especially among Hispanic and African American students; attending annual ATD DREAM meetings; filing annual student success action plans and reports; and serving as an invited presenter at ATD national meetings and webinars.

"We're proud to be named a Leader College of Distinction, and thank our Trustees, faculty, staff, and students for helping produce transformative results that empower our students and our community," said HCCC President, Dr. Christopher Reber. "ATD's mission aligns with our College's mission of opening new pathways for our most vulnerable learners and helping ensure that students achieve their academic and professional goals. Seeing our students complete degree and certificate programs, become gainfully employed, and engage in civic participation is inspiring, and compels us to continue building upon our successes."

Hudson County Community College utilizes evidence-based data and programs and ATD best practices to shape policy and practices that result in student success:

"Hudson Scholars," the College's innovative, national Bellwether award-winning student success program provides advisement, stipends, and early academic intervention to assist students facing financial challenges, language barriers, employment concerns, and family responsibilities. In just two years, Fall 2021 first-time, full-time Scholars participants earned a college credential at three times the historical rate. Scholars who meet monthly with their counselors during the semester persist to the following term at a 99% rate; Fall-to-Fall persistence improved 46% for Hispanic/Latino students and 83% for Black/African American students. The "Hudson Scholars" program has benefited more than 2,500 students to date, is now self-sustaining, and is being scaled to all students.

• HCCC's "Hudson Helps" Resource Center is a compendium of wraparound services, programs, and supports that focus on basic needs beyond the classroom and result in greater student achievement.

• The HCCC President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI) and HCCC's corporate partnerships address the needs of the community and the regional labor market, resulting in pathways to careers with familysustaining wages and apprenticeship programs. These partnerships include Eastern Millwork, Inc., Veolia, New Jersey Water Association, New Jersey Utility Association, International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 825, and many other industry leaders and unions.

## HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE VICE PRESIDENT PARTICIPATES IN HARVARD LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

hange is inevitable. Preparing for organizational change can mitigate negative impact on an organization's present and future operations. The Harvard Graduate School of Education's "Organizational Change in Uncertain Times: A Leadership Program for Higher Education" was designed for higher education leaders who are responsible for change agendas. Hudson County Community College (HCCC) has announced that Dr. Nicholas Chiaravalloti represented the College in the program.

The four-week virtual institute is designed to assist college leaders preparing to meet change head-on, from developing initial strategy to implementation and evaluation. The institute provides a synchronous, interactive learning experience for engaging with peers and Harvard Graduate School of Education faculty. Participants had the opportunity to use contemporary research and apply best practices to address specific challenges their organization may be facing. Program content included live sessions, discussion boards, breakout sessions, and readings.

Attendees assessed how well-positioned their educational institutions are in meeting current and future challenges; deepened their understanding of factors that both inhibit and advance change; reflected on their leadership strengths and growth opportunities to increase their effectiveness as they drive innovation and lasting impact; explored skills and strategies to lead teams through change and uncertainty; and developed a blueprint as a guide for addressing anticipated challenges.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber said the College's success in supporting students and the community is due in large measure to HCCC supporting the professional development of administrators. faculty and staff. "Dr. Chiaravalloti serves as our liaison with federal, state, and local officials and the community at large. He provides executive and administrative direction for the



College's legal affairs, and leadership in developing, supporting, and executing our priorities, so this opportunity was especially well suited to his work here," Dr. Reber stated.

Nicholas Chiaravalloti has been serving as HCCC's Vice President for External Affairs and Strategic Initiatives, and Senior Counsel to the President since 2017. He holds a doctoral degree in Education from St. Peter's University, Juris Doctorate degree from the Rutgers-Newark School of Law, and Bachelor of Arts degree from The Catholic University of America.

Prior to joining HCCC, Dr. Chiaravalloti was Director of Community Engagement, and Director of the Guarini Institute for Government and Leadership at St. Peter's University. He also served for six years as Assemblyman for the 31st Legislative District (Bayonne/Jersey City); Majority Whip; and State Director for the Office of Senator Robert Menendez. In the private sector, he was a partner in the law firm of Weiner & Lesniak, LLP and is the owner of consulting firm ANJ LLC. Dr. Chiaravalloti serves on the New Jersey Broadband Commission, the Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America - Northern New Jersey Council, the Executive Board of the Hudson County Chamber of Commerce, and the Regional Planning Association New Jersey Committee.

# Foundation Art Collection

The Hudson County Community College Foundation Art Collection of 1,900+ works is installed in the public areas of campus buildings. The entire College is an educational art museum. This Collection reveals aspects of America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history from the Hudson River School period to today. In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

Each month, this page in HCCC Happenings provides updates on artists whose works are in the Collection, and new additions to the Collection.

any of you remember 14 years ago, when the Foundation Art Collection included ▲ 25 installed works, and another 25 in storage. There are now more than 1,940 artworks in the Collection, thanks to the generosity of 100+ amazing donors and the stalwart support of President Reber, the Foundation Art Committee, the Foundation Board, and the College Board of Trustees. In honor of the fact that the Foundation Art Committee has recently approved art donations that will take the Collection to over 2,000 works, we are devoting this column to an overview of how this all works. The Collection is unique because we put all art and artifacts on display in public areas of our nine campus buildings, in humanitiesthemed groupings, making the entire campus an educational museum. We are proud that many of the pieces in the Collection are by people of color, and about half are by women (the national average of women's art in museums is 13%). We have dozens of artworks by important artists; and we are pleased to report that many of those artists hail from our home state of New Jersey. As you may know, our Foundation Art Collection now serves as a national model for community colleges to develop significant art collections. #### How do we pay for this project?

All funds spent on the Collection are donated. Our operating funds have been largely raised at the annual Gala. Up to \$15,000 is donated there, and then that sum is matched both by the Foundation Board and the Board of Trustees. So, we manage the Art Collection on a budget of about \$45,000 a year. When other college museum professionals hear about that small sum, they gasp. How is it possible that we do so much with so little?

#### Where does that money go?

Once a work is donated (or, rarely, purchased), it takes about two years to get the art ready to be installed. Art has to be photographed and catalogued on our online public, searchable database: Foundation Art Collection

(https://www.hccc.edu/community/arts/ foundation-art-collection/index.html). Then, art is selected in coordination with people in charge of the College areas where art goes. With the approval of our fine administrators, educators, and staff, art is then on the path to be placed where it can provide maximum benefit. A large part of our budget goes to archival framing. Thinking ahead, we want this art to benefit the community for a long time. Without that necessary framing expense, acid in framing materials would destroy art. A significant sum is also devoted to art restoration because sometimes donors give us wonderful work that needs repair. Repair is expensive when you do it right, but it is so worth it. We also spend a major portion of the budget on Plexiglas boxes and installation. People often ask why we bother with custom-built Plexiglas boxes since each costs hundreds of dollars. The reason is that we want the Collection to be easy to care for and long-lasting. Please know that in 14 years, not a single boxed artwork has been damaged. Thank goodness. When you find another art museum in America that can make that claim, we will be happy to know their secret. If the secret is armed guards, well ... a box is a lot less expensive.

#### How does all of this get done?

The "we" referred to above, is two hard-working, part-time employees: Dr. Andrea Siegel-the Collection Coordinator--and her super assistant, Darius Gilmore. Now that the Collection is over 39 times larger than it was 14 years ago, we work a lot harder.

Another thing that makes our work possible is the ongoing and wonderful support of the Maintenance team, the Facilities team, and the Security team. Their excellent, behind-the-scenes efforts make them the unsung heroes of this project.

#### Into the Future

We are now looking ahead to learn how best to protect, preserve, and develop the Collection to maximize the benefit of this wonderful art for our students and our community. We seek to build a solid pathway to the future. We need to take steps toward greater professionalization.

For starters, we need an expert Preservation Assessment, so that we can have the best possible advice about how to best preserve and protect the Collection. With a Preservation Assessment, we can plan to move forward wisely. That costs about \$8,000.

It is good stewardship to get the Collection appraised. A ballpark figure for that work by a certified fine and decorative art appraiser is about \$50,000.

Just these two steps will make us more prepared for our future, and also more eligible for important grants to support our future needs.

We are also exploring the idea of developing an endowment to preserve our Collection. Wouldn't it be wonderful if the Collection was self-sustaining for generations into the future?

**P**emme Digital, the newest gallery exhibition, opened on January 30 on the sixth floor of the Gabert Library at Hudson County Community College. The show hosts seven emerging to internationally recognized female-identifying and non-binary artists who investigate environmental, political, and identity themes thrpugh various digital technologies. Artists include Anna Ehrsam, Deborah Jack, Donna Kessinger, LoVid, Stevfni.XYZ, Tricia McLaughlin, and Vandana Jain.

Women creating digital art is nothing new, and as technology grows, so do opportunities for all artists. Krista Kim, founder of the Techism movement, was quoted recently stating, "NFTs (non-fungible tokens) enable all people, regardless of sex, race, geography or religion, to have an equal voice."

LoVid is a multi-disciplinary artist and a globally celebrated innovator in digital media. In a post-pandemic world, LoVid's NFT *Hugs on Tape (Erica/Sophia)* is full of colorful patterns intermingled in silhouettes of two female friends welcoming each other. *Hugs* is positioned on a large video monitor greeting gallery visitors. LoVid says, "Patterns are visceral reminders of the connection between technological objects, the human body, and the world."

Internationally known artists and metro area professors Deborah Jack and Tricia McLaughlin create videos that focus on the environment but differ through the artistic process. NJCU professor Deborah Jack's single-channel video *the fecund, the lush and the salted land...* imagines rhizomatic, protective intersectional landscapes and wetlands as sites of resistance. Jack explains, "This altered landscape, post surge, though temporary, is an exciting conceptual space regarding the intangible memory of water as it intersects with the land and people who live there." Tricia McLaughlin's delirious is composed of menacing mutant creatures. Granny Chicken, Satan Youth, and Red Ameoba are created as paintings and drawings and placed in a clean, almost antiseptic, illogical 3D space.

HCCC and Montclair State University professor Anna Ehrsam and HCCC alumnus Stevfni.XYZ create videos that explore abstraction, light, and color. Ehrsam's most recent work connects viewers to a digital space, extending their senses by exploring geometry, color, light, optics, and sound in higher dimensions. Emerging artist Stevfni.XYZ communes with topics of selfidentity, trans activism, and ecomodernism through her video *Self Portrait*: 000001.

Brooklyn-based artist Vandana Jain's digital corporate-branded mandala spacecraft ascends and descends in the third section of the gallery. Joined by logo-inspired sculptures, Jain's work explores the intersections of pattern, symbol, spirituality, and consumerism.

Last but not least, documentarian Donna Kessinger catalogs an illuminating art conversation between artists Nancy Spero and Marybeth Edelson. Kessinger has archived videos of founding feminist activists Carolee Schneeman and others. In the words of Nancy Spero in 1999, "As soon as we can get our artwork in some venues, we do have a voice."

#### What is the mission and goal of the club you currently advise?

## HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE PRESIDENT CHRIS REBER TO **RECEIVE PHI THETA KAPPA INTERNATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY'S MOST** PRESTIGIOUS AWARD

hi Theta Kappa (PTK), the premier international community college honor society, announced that Hudson County Community College (HCCC) President Dr. Christopher Reber will be recognized with the Shirley B. Gordon Award of Distinction. The award will be presented at PTK Catalyst 2024, the society's annual convention in Orlando, Florida, April 4-6, 2024.

The Shirley B. Gordon Award of Distinction is Phi That Kappa's most prestigious award for community college presidents. Named for Dr. Shirley B. Gordon, the society's longest serving Board of Directors Chair and a founder and longtime president of Highline Community College in Des Moines, Washington, the award recognizes college presidents who have shown support of student success initiatives leading to stronger pathways to completion, transfer, and employment. Recipients, who are nominated by students from their respective colleges, must have served in their role for at least five years and may receive the award only once during their career.

"This college president has made it a priority to support student success, both inside and outside the classroom," stated Phi Theta Kappa President and CEO Dr. Lynn Tincher-Ladner. "This award is special because it comes directly from the students, and it is evidence of the gratitude they feel for Dr. Reber's support for them."

Christopher Reber has devoted his entire career to higher education. He became the sixth president of HCCC in July 2018. Accessibility, advocacy, and collaboration are hallmarks of his tenure. Dr. Reber's engagement with students, monthly Town Hall meetings, and his association with unions; local, state, and national governance leaders, advisory committees; community organizations, and national higher education bodies, have been vital in supporting students and promoting the College's mission.

Prior to arriving at HCCC, Dr. Reber served as President of Community College of Beaver County (CCBC) near Pittsburgh, PA. His career also includes 12 years at Clarion University of Pennsylvania, and 18 years at Penn State Erie, The Behrend College.

"This honor is especially meaningful for me because our students put forth the nomination," Dr. Reber said. "Our students are at the center of everything we do at Hudson County Community College, and my most valued award is seeing them succeed. serve our students and this inspirational community."
