# English as a Second Language (ESL) Directed Self-Placement

Welcome! This is an exciting time as you begin your college journey. The faculty and staff at Hudson County Community College, are looking forward to supporting you as you work to fulfill your educational and goals.

The first step on your journey is an important one. Your courses in this first semester should be inspiring, educational, and yes, a bit challenging as well. To help you select the course that is the best fit for you and enables you to be successful, we have designed a Directed Self-Placement (DSP) process. The DSP process consists of four easy steps:

# ESL Writing & Grammar and Reading & Academic Discussion Course Expectations: Which is the best fit for you?

# Reading/Writing L0

- You should have written short passages of no more than 2 to 3 sentences.
- You should have read short sentences.
- You should have not had grammar and language instruction.

#### Reading/Writing L1

- You should have never written an essay or typed one page in many years.
- You should have read short passages of limited pages.
- You should have had some grammar and language instruction.

#### Reading/Writing L2

- You should have written essays before, but they may have been short (1-2 pages).
- You should have read printed readings before.
- You may have grammar and language challenges with your writing.

#### Reading/Writing L3

- You should have written essays of two to three (2-3) pages.
- You should have regularly read readings of several pages.
- You may have some grammatical challenges with your writing.

#### Reading/Writing L4

- You should have written essays of three or more (3+) pages.
- You should have read readings at least a chapter in length.
- You may have some minor challenges with grammar and language with your writing.
