U.S. SEN. ROBERT MENENDEZ HOLDS NEWS CONFERENCE AT HCCC SUPPORTING PELL GRANT

n Monday, Feb. 28, U.S. Sen. Robert Menendez held a press conference at Hudson County Community College's Administration Building at 70 Sip Avenue.

During the conference, Sen. Menendez addressed proposed legislation by Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives that would reduce the maximum Pell Grant allowance by \$845.00, and would end funding for several other student-aid programs.

(Under President Obama's proposed FY 2012 budget, the Pell Grant maximum would be sustained at \$5,550.00.)

Three HCCC students

who have received Pell Grants during their tenure at Hudson — Monique Dugan, Estefanie Castillo, and Fabiola Paredes — spoke about how the funding has impacted their lives.

IN MEMORIAM: RAYMOND P. CATLAW

It is with great sorrow that the College announces the passing of our esteemed colleague and dear friend, Raymond P. Catlaw.

Mr. Catlaw was a member of the Hudson County Community College Board of Trustees from January 2003 to the present, and served as the Board's Secretary/Treasurer from January 2003 to November 2010. He was also the Chair of the Board's Personnel Committee. and served on its Finance Committee. In these capacities, he played a role in the College's physical and academic expansion, and thereby broadened the educational opportunities for thousands of Hudson County residents.

Mr. Catlaw held a Doctor of Law degree and Master's degree in Finance from Seton Hall University. He was a graduate of the Trust School at Northwestern University, and earned his Bachelor's degree in Business Management from St. Peter's College. During his career, he was the Senior Vice

President responsible for the Trust Department at Capitol One Bank, Executive Vice President at North Fork Bank, and Senior Vice President at The Trust Company of New Jersey.

Mr. Catlaw's dedication to the community was also evident by his involvement with many organizations in Hudson County. He had served as a Trustee of the Hudson County Chamber of Commerce and the 200 Club of Hudson County, was a past President of the Jersey City Lions Club, and a former instructor at the American Institute of Banking. He was also a member of the New Jersey Bar Association, the President's Council of St. Peter's Preparatory School, The Jersey City Fiscal Advisory Board, and Our Lady of Mercy Board of Education.

HCCC Board of Trustees Chair William J. Netchert said: "We are very sad to learn of Raymond Catlaw's passing. We are very grateful for his dedication and contributions to

udson County Community College Council elections for Steering Committee officers were held during the week of March 15-22. Sixty-two voting members selected Catherine Sweeting as Chair, Ara Karakashian as Vice Chair, and Joseph Caniglia as Secretary. The Steering Committee will hold office until June 2013.

The pilot stage of the College governance model was launched in January based on the recommendations of the Blue Ribbon Committee on College Governance convened by HCCC President Dr. Glen Gabert from fall 2009 through spring 2010. A Charter was presented and a timeline for the Pilot Stage, including Assess-

ment of the process, was adopted.

The mission of the College Council is to provide an open platform for meaningful participation of the College community in the governance of the College. All members of the College community are encouraged to participate.

Committee members from all divisions of the College were announced, and officers for each committee were elected at the January meeting. The College Council committees include Academic Affairs, College Life, Space and Facilities, Development and Planning, Student Affairs and Technology.

HCCC ANNOUNCES 2011 SUMMER HOURS

udson County Community College President Dr. Glen Gabert issued the following:

I am authorizing a summer hour schedule beginning Friday, May 27, 2011 and ending on Friday, Aug. 12, 2011. The regular hours of operation during this time will be 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday. The College will not be open for regular business on Fridays during this period. Employees are expected to reduce their lunch breaks to 30 minutes to compensate for the shorter hours of operation during the week. College activities on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays during this period will be minimized to reduce energy and other operating costs. The College will go back to the regular five-day work week on Monday, Aug. 15.

The success and continuation of the summer hour schedule really depends on you. Every activity at the College directly or indirectly supports instruction and student services. The future of HCCC depends in large part on the continuing strength of our enrollments. Once again, we expect strong summer school enrollments. We also have ambitious summer recruitment and registration programs for our fall enrollments than last year's all-time high.

I know that you agree that a four-day summer schedule should not and need not result in a cut back in services. It is important that offices are open at 8:30 a.m. and stay open until 5:30 p.m. on Monday through Thursday. This means that employees need to be at their workstations.

PROSPECTIVE HCCC STUDENTS WILL LEARN ABOUT NEW NORTH HUDSON CENTER FROM PRESENT HCCC STUDENT

hen Hudson County Community College Vice President for North Hudson Center and Student Affairs Dr. Paula P. Pando sets out to talk with members of the community about the College's new North Hudson Higher Education Center, she will not travel alone. Dr. Pando will be accompanied by a team that includes the College's Director of Admissions Nelson Vieira, the Director of Enrollment and Student Services for HCCC North Hudson Center Yeurys Pujols, and HCCC student Julia Villamar.

"It is important that we communicate with the community about the College's new North Hudson Higher Education Center on a very personal level, as this center was developed to meet their needs. I was born and raised in Hudson County and have been working with the community for more than 15 years. Nelson has been involved with our students and with Hudson County's high school principals and counselors for 10 years. Yeurys is himself a graduate of HCCC, and Julia is well acquainted with the College and the community through her studies and her extra-curricular activities, so they can relate their own experiences to prospective students," Dr. Pando said.

Julia Villamar is one of the thousands of HCCC students for whom the College provides a road to fulfilling dreams. Born and raised in Guayaquil, Ecuador, 19-year-old Julia came to the United States just three years ago. The Union City resident graduated from Union Hill High School at the Union City High School North Campus.

Asked why she chose HCCC, she replied: "A representative from Hudson County Community College visited my high school and I liked the way they treated me."

Villamar related that the College provided the opportunity for her to study chemistry, which is essential to her career plans. After graduating in 2012, she will transfer to a school where she can pursue her aspiration of becoming a pharmacist.

She said that after completing her first semester at the present HCCC North Hudson Center (in West New York), she become more involved with the College's programs and outreach efforts, and she is presently the President of the Key Club and the Bilingual Coalition Club.

"I recommend Hudson County Community College to others because this College has a lot to offer students, and it is one that people can afford," she said explaining that HCCC students are afforded the same studies as those who attend more expensive colleges and universities. Ms. Villamar's husband is also a student at Hudson County Community College where per-credit costs are among the lowest in New Jersey. Additionally, more than half of the College's students receive financial assistance, and there are hundreds of scholarships awarded to students through the College's Foundation.

HCCC President Dr. Glen Gabert echoed Ms. Villamar's description of the College: "We are dedicated to ensuring that our neighbors here in Hudson County have the opportunity to acquire the education and skills needed to thrive in today's global economy, and we do that by providing high-quality courses and services that are affordable, accessible, and student- and communitycentered." All of the College's courses and programs are designed to meet the educational needs of the linguistically and ethnically/racially diverse Hudson County community. The College has initiated sunrise and weekend courses to accommodate individuals who work, and has invested more than \$2 million in a new student information system and on-line courses so students may learn when it is convenient for them. Additionally, Hudson County Community College has programs and services to help students succeed, including the Center for Academic & Student Success, Tutorial Services, Educational Opportunity Fund, Learning Resource Center, Academic Advisement & Counseling, and Transfer & Career Services.

Currently under construction, the College's new North Hudson Higher Education Center in Union City will be a complete campus under one roof, with Enrollment, Registration and Bursar's offices, a book store and Library, computer labs and media center, testing tutoring and counseling areas, language and science labs and art studios, Student Lounge and much more. Located on Kennedy Boulevard between 48th and 49th Streets, the sevenstory building — which has the distinction of being the first higher-education facility ever constructed in Union City will be easily accessed by public transportation, and will be connected to the Light Rail Transit Center by a glass-

This work, a digital print and etching with gold leaf and digital inclusions, was produced at Brodsky Center for Innovative Editions at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. Benjamin's collaborator was Randy Hemminghaus.

Siona Benjamin is inspired by traditional styles of painting, like Indian/Persian miniatures, Byzantine icons and Jewish and Christian illuminated manuscripts, but, she says, "I blend these ancient forms with pop cultural elements from our times to create a new vocabulary of my own." Originally from Bombay, India, Benjamin is of Bene Israel Jewish descent. She grew up in a largely Hindu and Muslim society, was educated in Catholic and Zoroastrian schools, and was raised Jewish. She says that because of this experience, "I have always had to reflect upon the cultural boundary zones in which I have lived. In this transcultural America I feel a strong need to make art that will speak to my audience of our similarities, not our differences as I feel I can

contribute to a much-needed 're -pair' (tikkun) through my art. I would like my audience to re-evaluate their notions and concepts about identity and race, thus understanding that such misconceptions could lead to racism, hate and war."

She has Master of Fine Arts degrees in Painting and in Theater set design. Her work is in the collections of many New Jersey museums including the Hunterdon Museum, the Morris Museum, the New Jersey State Museum, the Noyes Museum, the Montclair Art Museum, the Newark Museum, and the Zimmerli Art Museum at Rutgers University.

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HCCC ALUMNA RESEARCHING CONNECTION BETWEEN PLASTIC SURGERY, CLEFT REPAIR AND QUALITY OF LIFE

INTRODUCTION

Have you ever seen a beautiful child who cannot eat or speak properly because there is a hole in his mouth? What problems are caused due to cleft palate disorder? What difficulties are faced by patients? Have you ever thought about how cleft palate is caused or if it can be corrected? Plastic surgery is beneficial to cleft palate patients.

Cleft palate is a common disorder seen in infants. It is related to soft palate, the soft tissue building the back and top part of the mouth. The soft palate — formed by muscle and connective tissue — gives flexibility, mobility and support to the mouth.

Cleft palate is a birth defect seen mostly in infants. During the development of a fetus, sections of the face begin growing separately and then fuse together. The lip normally completes by five to six weeks later in the embryonic stage, along with the palate by 10 weeks. Correct development of the lips and palate is critical. This defect due to incomplete development is called cleft, meaning "cut between two organs." Cleft lip and cleft palate is the fourth superior birth defect in the U.S.

TYPES OF CLEFT

There are three main types of cleft:

- 1. Cleft lip without a cleft palate: In this type of cleft, a cut is seen in the upper lip which occurs between mouth and nose. This is caused by inappropriate fusion of upper lip with facial parts during fetus development.
- Cleft palate without a cleft lip: A cleft palate is a gap on the top of the mouth in which the two edges of the palate do not bind, or attach together around the 10th week of development in the fetus.
- 3. Cleft lip and cleft palate together are a combination of cleft lip and cleft palate.

There are four main functions of the soft palate: articulation, speech, swallowing and velarization. It mainly deals with pronouncing syllables and food swallowing. There are certain problems associated with cleft palate disorder, which include eating, hearing, speech and dental problems.

The cleft palate is caused by either genetic or environmental factors. Genetic factors include various types of syndromes which occur mainly due to mutation in the genes. Environmental factors include exposure to drugs, viruses or toxins in the fetal stage. Exposure of pregnant women to viruses or toxins can also lead to cleft palate in the fetus' development. Smoking, consumption of alcohol or other drugs by pregnant women may also cause defects in a fetus' development.

CONSEQUENCES OF CLEFT PALATE

Children with cleft palate damage face problems in different areas of life. Their condition affects them academically, professionally and socially. The problems start when one starts to speak and communicate in the society. Clefts affect children emotionally and psychologically as they face problems related to speech. This includes difficulties in pronouncing syllables and sentences which create problems for people to understand them clearly. Also, in school they can be the subject of ridicule from classmates.

SOLUTIONS FOR CLEFT PALATE

Solutions for cleft palate disorder are of two types: surgery and speech therapy. The choice of treatment depends on age and type of defects. Surgery helps to fix the damage or fill the gap found in the disorder. This helps to give a proper look to the damaged part. Speech therapy is based on the type of cleft palate defect and problems related to pronouncing syllables. This helps a patient to improve speech by teaching them techniques to pronounce syllable that they are not able to speak clearly. In this way, practicing and learning new techniques help them get better and perfect.

There are many institutions and organizations in the United States associated with cleft palate damage. They help patients by providing monetary and surgical support. One well-known organization is Operation Smile, a non-profit medical organization that collects charity to so that it can provide help patients for reconstructive surgery.

The class "Ethics in Science and Society" taught by Dr. Julie Fagan at Rutgers University, New Brunswick, deals with selecting issues related to science and its impact on society. Under the guidance of Dr. Fagan, I, Nidhi Radia, along with three other Rutgers students — Romal Vaidya, Sunke Sagar and Megha Shah — will serve our community by spreading awareness about "the upside of plastic surgery."

Solutions such as surgery and speech therapy give new lives to patients. Surgery helps to reconstruct damage part of the body and results in proper shape and appearance; while speech therapy aids to improve communication skills by practicing various techniques taught by speech therapists. This helps give courage, confidence and self-esteem to patients, and also motivates them to improve their professional and academic lives. They can live freely in the society without being mocked. Thus, it gives patients rebirth and leads to normal life with a smile. If it permits one person to smile, then can plastic surgery not be considered disadvantageous?

APRIL TESTING SCHEDULE
