HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HOSTS FOURTH ANNUAL TEACHING AND LEARNING SYMPOSIUM ON SOCIAL JUSTICE IN HIGHER EDUCATION



Hudson County Community College (HCCC) held its fourth annual weeklong Teaching and Learning Symposium on Social Justice in Higher Education, February 24-28, 2025. ollege is not a one-size-fits-all route to a better future. From science and technology to the arts and humanities, academic programs reflect rapidly evolving industries where students of all backgrounds can thrive and improve their communities and regional economies. High quality, dedicated learning environments and dynamic approaches reinvigorate today's leaders and prepare tomorrow's leaders to access opportunities and prosper.

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) welcomed educators, business and civic leaders, community groups, and students as presenters and participants in the HCCC 2025 Teaching and Learning Symposium on Social Justice in Higher Education. Presentations were held February 24-28, 2025. Each day, elected officials and renowned education experts, attorneys, scientists, clergy, community advocates, and thought leaders from States provided expertise and exchanged ideas in hour-long presentations.

Now in its fourth year, the HCCC Teaching and Learning Symposium on Social Justice in Higher Education is a national model featuring acclaimed guest speakers, workshops, and panels, and is the first of its kind offered by a New Jersey higher education institution. Nearly 1,800 thought leaders, educators, and activists from 30 states and several countries attended virtual synchronous ses-

sions this year.

The symposium began on Monday, February 24, with opening remarks from Dr. Paula Roberson, Director of the HCCC Center for Teaching, Learning, and Innovation and the driving force behind the symposium. Dr. Darryl Jones, HCCC Vice President for Academic Affairs, introduced Newark Mayor Ras J. Baraka, U.S. Senator Cory A. Booker delivered the Symposium Charge, and Dr. Christopher Reber, HCCC President, introduced the symposium keynote speaker, Dr. Larry D. Johnson, Jr., President of Guttman Community College of the City University of New York (CUNY).

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HOSTS INSPIRING WOMEN IN STEM DISCUSSION FEATURING DR. NADIA DOB

o honor Women's History Month, Hudson County Community College's (HCCC) School of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) hosted a Women in STEM Discussion featuring distinguished alumna Dr. Nadia Dob. The event celebrated women's achievements in STEM and aimed to inspire the next generation—making Dr. Dob a perfect role model for the occasion.

The well-attended event, sponsored by Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, the American Chemical Society, the President's Advisory Council on Institutional Engagement and Excellence, and Girls Who Code, welcomed 125 in-person and virtual attendees.

An HCCC alumna, Dr. Dob shared her remarkable journey from Algiers, Algeria, to earning her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from Rutgers University's Ernest Mario School of Pharmacy, and currently completing her residency at Virtua Health to becoming a clinical pharmacist.

Dr. Dob's path to success began when she enrolled in English as a Second Language (ESL) courses at HCCC after emigrating to the United States. Despite the challenges of learning English as her third language—after French and Arabic—her passion for science and dedication to education propelled her forward. She earned an associate degree in Biology from HCCC, laying the foundation for her transfer to Rutgers University. In May 2024, she reached a major milestone by attaining her Doctor of Pharmacy degree. According to Instructor Raffi Manjikian, who coordinated the event,

"It was inspirational for HCCC students to see one of their own come back to tell her story, discuss the challenges she overcame, and show them that they, too, can succeed in STEM careers."

Dr. Dob offered valuable advice to current HCCC students, emphasizing the importance of utilizing available resources, engaging in mentorship and

leadership opportunities, and building relationships with professors. She highlighted the necessity of perseverance, stating that success in STEM requires sacrifices, but that the reward of a fulfilling career is worth it in the end.

Reflecting on her budding career, Dr. Dob expressed her passion for helping others, stating that, to her, the most rewarding aspects of being a pharmacist are when patients thank her and when she sees her patients get better.

Dr. Dob hopes to pursue a second year of residency with a focus on oncology. She is passionate about optimizing chemotherapy management and alleviating treatment side effects to ensure the highest standard of patient care.

Dr. Burl Yearwood, Dean of HCCC's School of STEM, emphasized the importance of inspiring more women to participate in STEM. He stated, "Encouraging and supporting

women in STEM is essential for fostering innovation, promoting equality, and driving progress in science and technology. Women bring unique perspectives and experiences that can lead to innovative solutions. Diversity in thought is crucial for tackling complex problems, developing unique solutions, and advancing knowledge. An often overlooked advantage is the economic impact. Increasing women's participation in STEM can boost economic growth. Women represent a significant portion of the talent pool, and their inclusion in STEM fields can help meet the growing demand for skilled workers."

HCCC President Dr. Chrsitopher Reber added, "Dr. Dob is an excellent role model for women pursuing STEM degrees and for all students. By showcasing inspiring role models like Dr. Nadia Dob at events such as the Women in STEM Discussion, HCCC reaffirms its commitment to empowering the next generation of students."

Artist News

Jaune Quick-To-See Smith's work can be seen on the third floor of the Gabert library. Another print from our edition is now on view at Rutgers. Before her recent passing, the artist curated a show at the Zimmerli Art Museum at Rutgers University in New Brunswick. The exhibit is called, "Indigenous Identities: Here, Now & Always" and it will be on view through December 21, 2025. The show also includes work by 97 artists who represent over 74 Indigenous nations and communities across North America. Among them are Terran Last Gun and Melanie Yazzie, whose art also can be seen on the Gabert Library third floor. Quick-to-See Smith said, "Perhaps the preeminent issue in the Indian world is plain survival. Beyond that it means retaining our own cultures, governments, languages, religions, and ceremonies...I am telling stories about hope with humor. We wouldn't be here if we didn't have hope."

The exhibit "Mickalene Thomas: All About Love" can be seen at the Hayward Gallery in London through May 5, 2025. The artist says: "My gaze is the gaze of a Black woman unapologetically loving other Black women." Works by Thomas are in the collections of numerous

institutions including the Museum of Modern Art, New York; Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; Brooklyn Museum; Studio Museum of Harlem, New York; and Hudson County Community College Foundation. You can see two print works by the artist on the first floor of the Gabert Library. In this case, her gaze is turned upon her fabulous dachshund, Priscilla.

The recently published book, *A Handbook of Latinx Art*, edited by Rocío Aranda-Alvarado and Deborah Cullen-Morales, includes a chapter by artist Juan Sánchez: "The Puerto Rican Equation: Art as Plebiscite for Survival, Struggle, and Sovereignty" (1998). "This book is a curated selection of key texts and artists' voices exploring US Latinx art and art history from the 1960s to the present, [and] is the first anthology to explore the rich, deep, and often overlooked contributions that Latinx artists have made to art in the United States." You can see works by **Juan Sanchez** on the third floor of the Gabert Library.

We are disappointed we won't be able to see Elizabeth Catlett's work in the major exhibit called "Before The Americas" at the Art Museum of the Americas in Washington, DC, because the show of works by Afro-Latino, Caribbean, and African American artists had to be cancelled after the new Presidential administration labeled the exhibition as a "DEI program and event" and withdrew funding earmarked by the previous administration. The cancelled exhibit, curated by Cheryl D. Edwards, was four years in the making, and was slated to open on March 21. The curator told Hyperallergic, "This is an issue of silencing DEI visual voices ... and discrimination based upon race, caste, and class." Some who use the DEI acronym (short for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion), add a fourth element, Belonging. So, the acronym becomes DEIB. Educator Mac McGregor points out, "At its core, DEIB is about ensuring that all people-regardless of identity, background, or experience—have the

opportunity to thrive. It's not about exclusion or replacement; it's about recognizing talent, valuing different perspectives, and removing systemic barriers that have historically favored some while disadvantaging others." The show was to include 40 works exploring migration, colonial challenges, and interconnectivity in the African diaspora in the Americas. These included works by Mexican-American sculptor Elizabeth Catlett, whose prints you can see here at HCCC on the first floor of 870 Bergen in the Nursing program, on the third floor of the Gabert Library, and on the fourth floor of 71 Sip Avenue in the Academic Affairs area.

At the American Alliance of Museums conference in Los Angeles in May, Elizabeth Merritt, the Vice President of Strategic Foresight and the Founding Director of Center for the Future of Museums will present a workshop on, "How to Face the Future, Cultivate Optimism, and Defy Dystopia" which will address "how we can use foresight to envision positive change, cultivate resilience, resist apathy, and identify plausible options in difficult times." She recommends the book: Imaginable: How to See the Future Coming and Feel Ready for Anything, Even Things that Seem Impossible Today (2021) by Dr. Jane Mc-Gonigal, which "draws on the latest scientific research in psychology and neuroscience" to "build our collective imagination so that we can dive into the future ... and access urgent optimism, an unstoppable force within each of us." Encouraging us to look at the big picture, what Continued on page 7

we want to happen in the next 10 years, she offers exercises to give "our imagination space to expand, and enables us to envision change that may seem almost impossible over the short term." Likewise, Elizabeth's second suggestion: The Good Ancestor: How to Think Long Term in a Short-Term World, (2020) by Roman Krznaric, celebrates those he calls "time rebels" who are thinking ahead to explore how they can be good ancestors to future generations. He says the time rebels are "reinventing democracy, culture and economics so that we all have the chance to become good ancestors and create a better tomorrow." For a quick summary, you can watch his 2020 TED talk. (Forgive the lugubrious delivery and focus on his message.) our own HCCC Foundation Art Collection and other topics.

Three of Benny Andrews' prints are on the third floor of the Gabert Library. A recent exhibit of his work was called: Benny Andrews: Trouble. The title comes from Andrews's studio journal entries dated 1965-72. "Trouble," he says, "is an expression of being alive. To be in trouble is to embrace the struggle and vulnerability of the process." The exhibit was at the Ruth Foundation for the Arts in Milwaukee. Wisconsin. This exhibition title reminds us of the late Congressman John Lewis's idea of "good trouble." The Brookings Institute website details what Lewis meant by this. They start by quoting him, "Get in good trouble, necessary trouble, and redeem the soul of America." And then the site reminds us that "John Lewis made this statement on the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama on March 1, 2020 commemorating the tragic events of Bloody Sunday. Bloody Sunday occurred on March 7, 1965 as peaceful protesters were beaten by law enforcement officers for crossing the bridge" in a demonstration to bring attention to the fact that Black Americans overwhelmingly were denied the right to vote. "Lewis and others like Amelia Boynton Robinson were beaten so badly they were hospitalized." That brought Federal effort to support the protestors exercising their First Amendment right to protest, and to the Civil Rights movement. ALUMNI CORNER

Darius Gilmore

A.A. General Liberal Arts, HCCC Class of 2018

Darius is an art curator, musician, and aspiring writer. After his time at HCCC, he graduated from NJCU with a degree in music business.

What led you to attend HCCC?

Cost control. Attending a two-year college was a bit more affordable than attending a four-year college. I was accepted into quite a few four-year colleges but HCCC was more cost-effective and it was local so it was easy to get to by bus. I went to Snyder High School and knew people who were attending so there were some familiar faces here.

Where did you go after HCCC?

After graduating from HCCC, I went to NJCU for all of the same reasons – affordability and location. It's right by my house. I majored in music business, which is a hybrid between regular music classes and business classes so that you can learn the ins and outs of the music industry.

How did you become interested in pursuing music?

I became interested in music in high school. I was in the media arts program at Snyder. One of my teachers, Mr. Diaz, put me on to a lot of good music. From there I thought 'this is something I really want to do.' It even inspired me to pick up an instrument. I eventually saved up my money to buy my first bass guitar, a Kramer, at a pawn shop. I've kept it to this day despite the fact that I have three bass guitars now.

What kind of music are you interested in?

I have an eclectic ear. I'm willing to listen to anything, even something obscure. I'm openminded. I try not to judge music anymore. I try to appreciate everything. I like music that englihtens me even if it's a bit odd – I listen to polka, I've even warmed up to country. I play a lot of hardcore and punk rock, and even some thrash. I write the music myself and with my bandmates in my band, Mindless Generation. We had our first concert of the year in January. In a few weeks I'll be traveling to Philadelphia to record a live studio session with the band.

How did you learn how to play bass?

Just by picking up my first bass – I didn't know anything about it. I went with the James Brown philosophy of music – if it sounds good, play it! I got a big reality check when I auditioned for the music business program at NJCU. The program director said I sounded bad and my instrument was out of tune. They worked with me, and I started with the business classes first. I passed those and then enrolled in a music



class the following semester. I took a pop and R&B class and a former student spent a lot of time teaching me how to play – I learned a lot from him and if it wasn't for him, I probably wouldn't be where I am now.

At the same time, I also learned to read music. At first, you're just picking up an instruement, you're excited to play, and you don't really know how much you don't know. It takes a lot of perseverance and time.

Tell us about your involvement with the HCCC Foundation Art Collection.

We have over 2,000 works and we've been building it up for years. I've done a lot of the work to give the Collection an online presence, like adding captions and descriptions to the artwork on the website. Our Collection archive is the first thing that comes up when you Google many of the artists.

During my time working for the Foundation Art Collection, I've enjoyed learning more about art in general, appraising, and sourcing art. I had the honor and privilege of curating a whole floor of the North Hudson Campus. We received many photographs from artists for the Museum Project, (a philanthropic initiative to donate pieces from notable American photographers as a way of expressing gratitude towards museums that support the photographic art form) and I had the opportunity to select which ones we wanted donated to us.

What's your vision for yourself in the near-term future?

I want to keep going with my band. I'm also in the middle of writing my own manga (a Japanese-style graphic novel), and I'm working with an illustrator I hired. Right now, I'm in the midst of my hopes and dreams with the band and the manga.

What advice would you give to current HCCC students?

Calm down, relax, and remember that patience is everything.

I know that the music field is very crowded, so it's up to you to stand out in the most meaningful way possible to you. Put yourself out there.
