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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES NEW CHRISTOPHER M. REBER ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP FUND

udson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation Board of Directors Chair, Joseph Napolitano, Sr., announced that the College's President, Dr. Christopher M. Reber, has pledged a personal donation of \$50,000 to establish an endowed scholarship fund for full- and part-time HCCC students. Dr. Reber will fulfill this pledge through payroll deduction over the next five years. He plans to continue adding funds to the scholarship endowment throughout his lifetime and through his estate planning.

Mr. Napolitano said Dr. Reber created the endowment to provide a stable and perpetual source of income that will assist HCCC students in paying tuition and achieving their academic goals with fewer interruptions or postponements.

More than 90% of HCCC students are eligible for financial aid or scholarships. The Christopher M. Reber Endowed Scholarship will be awarded by the HCCC Foundation Award Selection Committee to full- and part-time students enrolled at the College, including Dreamers and international students, who are in good academic standing; have a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.5; and demonstrate financial need.

"We are very grateful to Dr. Reber for this endowment. He believes in leading by example. Students awarded scholarships from the fund will be able to focus more on their studies as it will reduce the worry of balancing their coursework with jobs, caring for families, and taking on student loans," Mr. Napolitano said.

Since becoming HCCC President in 2018, Dr. Reber has led a range of initiatives to support a student-centered learning environment, one that addresses economic and social challenges that are roadblocks to retention and completion. Each month Dr. Reber hosts "Pizza with the President" and Town Hall gatherings that allow him to meet one-on-one with students, faculty, and staff in order to learn about their needs and concerns, and support and celebrate their accomplishments. He has worked closely with the HCCC community and Foundation in establishing and developing

HCCC food pantries and the one-stop "Hudson Helps" services and support centers on the Journal Square and North Hudson campuses that address food insecurity and financial needs and concerns of students and their families.

Dr. Reber led the College's decision to join the Achieving the Dream network, a nonprofit national organization of high-achieving community colleges that utilizes evidence-based institution programming to improve student success. He championed the construction of HCCC's first state-of-the-art Student Center on HCCC's Journal Square Campus in 2019. He is leading and supporting the College's engagement in local, regional and national partnerships that support an upward trajectory of life-changing opportunities for students and the community. The award-winning HCCC "Out of the Box" video podcasts that he initiated and hosts spotlight the accomplishments of students, faculty, staff and community members, and build awareness of the College's achievements and innovative programs.

Outstanding student loans in the United States totaled \$1.41 trillion in 2019, a 33 percent increase from 2014. The Community College Research Center (CCRC) at Columbia University Teachers College reports that about 80 percent of U.S. community college students work, with 39 percent working full time. CCRC indicates that even though community colleges have a much higher proportion of low-income students than other higher-education sectors, their students' rate of receiving a \$2,000 per year Pell Grant is lower than at public and private four-year colleges.

"Dr. Reber's endowment sets an example that will help the Foundation raise funding to reduce and eliminate the disparities that have affected our community – especially our Latino and African American citizens," Mr. Napolitano stated.

ACHIEVING THE DREAM UPDATE

TCCC's Achieving the Dream Dream Team has successfully completed and submitted its Student Success Action Plan! Heather DeVries and Dr. Sheila Dynan, Dream Team Co-Chairs, would like to extend their gratitude to all members of the Dream Team and the College community who contributed to the Action Plan. The Dream Team is comprised of individuals from across functional areas and roles at the College, and the development of the Action Plan has been a truly collaborative experience. As part of its Student Success Action Plan, the Dream Team created a Student Success Vision Statement. This Vision Statement will guide our Student Success work in Years 2 and 3 of HCCC's Achieving the Dream membership and beyond.

Hudson County Community College is committed to engaging every student through a culture of care grounded in equitable, inclusive, and holistic supports. We empower our community of scholars to achieve their personal, academic, and professional dreams and goals. We maintain

a steadfast focus on student success including degree completion, transfer pathways, gainful employment, and engaged civic participation.

Two Student Success Priorities are at the center of HCCC's Action Plan. Priority #1 focuses on increasing fall-to-fall persistence for students enrolled in ESL and/or Academic Foundations coursework. Currently, approximately 90% of new first-time, full-time students begin in an ESL or Academic Foundations course sequence at HCCC. Priority #2 focuses on continuing to create a culture of care at HCCC that supports students in persisting by leveraging the roles of student leaders, removing barriers that prevent students from persisting, expanding services provided by Hudson Helps, and engaging students with academic supports. Each Priority employs multiple Strategies through which the goal will be accomplished. As the Dream Team moves into the next phase of its work, each Strategy will have two Dream Team members who will serve as co-leaders and who will spearhead the implementation of that Strategy.

These Strategy-focused groups will be referred to as "How Teams" as they are focused on implementing initiatives and interventions, or the "how's" of how we accomplish our Student Success goals. The How Teams will be comprised of Dream Team members and members of the college community.

The Dream Team will continue to provide regular updates on its work and communicate progress on the Action Plan. The Dream Team looks forward to entering the next phase of its work and continuing to celebrate Student Success with the entire HCCC community.

ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY EDUCATORS: EFFECTIVE TEACHING PRACTICES

uring the summer, a time of rest and relaxation, these reflective commentaries continue to highlight the learning experiences of our colleagues in the Association of College and University Educators Effective Teaching Practices course. "This is a good opportunity for me as an adjunct faculty member, to take time to reflect upon the way I am teaching. Giving surveys to my students allowed me to learn from my mistakes, and improve my teaching style. I insist on this practice to keep me motivated and be more professional. My class is three hours long, and I needed to learn how to keep my students focused, especially since I have diversity in my class. There are younger and older students, workers, and different cultures.

"The lecture must be no more than 20 minutes, and during that time, the students get what is most important to know. The rest of the time should be practice with students, activities, or work with small groups. Each video I am watching in the ACUE course allows me to be more creative and improve my teaching styles. Reading the comments of my colleagues, and their experiences in teaching is an extra help for me."

Sibyl Ponder is a member of the English & ESL Division.

"As an adjunct teaching at more than one college, it became essential for me to learn and practice time management when incorporating ACUE curriculum into my day-to-day schedule. Although the modules were long, they were on point and full of great resources, sometimes extending beyond the time I set aside to work on the ACUE curriculum.

"Often, my assignments were turned in late and it helped me to realize that students can have problems in disciplining themselves to complete assignments. ACUE helped me to develop a little more empathy and also to offer tips to students on time management by not waiting until the last minute to complete an assignment. Also, with the COVID-19 pandemic, online learning requires much more discipline for all concerned.

"One of the main objectives in signing up for the ACUE curriculum was to enhance my skills as an educator. I gained so much insight on how to improve methods that I was already implementing and learned new techniques that I can't wait to try. While still in class face-to-face, I did implement a few techniques and didn't really get the opportunity to evaluate the effectiveness of the techniques.

"I was delighted to be able to share with my colleagues and get their perspectives on different techniques being demonstrated. It's refreshing to see so many instructors dedicating time to become more effective in the classroom, endeavoring to make the learning experience enjoyable and rewarding for most, if not all, students."

HCCC CONTINUES DIVERSITY PROGRAMMING

udson County Community College (HCCC) and the President's Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI) built upon its successful programming with a robust July calendar of important initiatives. These events are planned in direct response to the tragic deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and Ahmaud Arbery, and the subsequent civil unrest.

The Center for Teaching, Learning and Innovation, in partnership with PACDEI, concluded a weekly book talk discussing *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk about Racism* by Robin DiAngelo.

The Office of Student Life and Leadership, with PACDEI, hosted a panel discussion, "Student Leaders in the Movement," on Tuesday, July 7. The forum featured HCCC student leaders who are actively involved in the Black Lives Matter movement, the change they want to see, and suggestions on how you can get involved in making change happen.

On Thursday, July 9, the Office of Human Resources, North Hudson Campus, Academic Support Services Centers, and PACDEI hosted "Rest

in Power," a virtual vigil for a moment of reflection and remembrance for victims of social injustice.

On Thursday, July 16, the Office of Human Resources and PACDEI launched a new discussion series, "Our Stories Untold." Inaugural speaker Dr. David Clark, Associate Dean of Student Affairs, shared and answered questions about his compelling journey and experiences.

PACDEI encouraged participation in Strike for Black Lives with an "8:46 Pledge," in recognition of the death of George Floyd, on July 20. The 8:46 Pledge asks supporters to take 8 minutes and 46 seconds at noon on July 20 to either take a knee, walk off the job, or observe a moment of silence.

On Thursday, July 23, the Office of Human Resources, the North Hudson Academic Support Center, and PACDEI presented a panel discussion on allyship.

On Thursday, July 30, Prof. Dorothy Anderson, in collaboration with the Office of Human Resources, the Academic Support Services Centers, and PACDEI facilitated a virtual celebration of the life of civil rights icon Congressman John Robert Lewis, who died on July 17.

On Wednesday, Aug. 5, the Office of Human Resources, the North Hudson Academic Support Center, and PACDEI will host an open discussion on colorism.

This Collection reveals aspects of America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history from the Hudson River School period to today. In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

ARTIST NEWS

Works by Egyptian-American artist Ibrahim Ahmed III are installed at both the Journal Square and at the North Hudson Campuses. In a recent interview in Egypt, he discussed the role of contemporary art in encouraging reflection on personal history. "Heritage," he says, "is an ongoing process." While describing a sculpture he is creating, he talks about "activating spaces with contemporary art," which he says allows for the landscape to change in terms of how people relate to their heritage. This idea has unusual resonance given the ongoing and heated discussion in American culture about the role of public statues. Check out the video here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zpvX0mlf6ww.

The Foundation Art Collection is privileged to own a work by major American photographer, Gordon Parks. Parks' work will be exhibited at the Alison Jacques Gallery in London through Oct. 1, 2020. In a review of the show, the British magazine AnOther highlights some of Parks' accomplishments: In the 1950s the first black photographer on staff at Life magazine; in the 1960s, the first black director to make a Hollywood studio film, The Learning Tree; and in the 1970s, he made the hit film Shaft. He is most famous as a photographer, for his profound portraits of American Black life. He was also an accomplished writer and poet. When he wrote about how art worked in his life, he said, "I picked up a camera because it was my choice of weapons against what I hated most about the universe: racism, intolerance, poverty. I could have just as easily picked up a knife or a gun, like many

of my childhood friends did ... most of whom were murdered or put in prison ... but I chose not to go that way. I felt that I could somehow subdue these evils by doing something beautiful that people recognize me by, and thus make a whole different life for myself, which has proved to be so." And he also thought deeply about the purposes of his work: "What the camera had to do was expose the evils of racism, the evils of poverty, the discrimination and the bigotry, by showing the people who suffered most under it." He reflected on his career: "In fulfilling my professional and artistic ambitions in the White Man's world, I had had to become completely involved in it [.] At the beginning of my career I missed the soft, easy laughter of Harlem and the security of black friends around me ... Many times I wondered whether my achievement was worth the loneliness I experienced, but now I realize the price was small. This same experience has taught me that there is nothing ignoble about a black man climbing from the troubled darkness on a white man's ladder, providing he doesn't forsake the others who, subsequently, must escape that same darkness." His posthumous foundation (http://www.gordonparksfoundation.org/) makes grants to young black artists seeking to make a "better life and a better world."

Mickalene Thomas' work is featured on the first floor of the Gabert Library. In a recent video, Thomas interviewed her old friend, artist Derrick Adams, about "Buoyant," his current show at the Hudson River Museum through Aug. 23. The

exhibit features images of Black people enjoying themselves and relaxing on the water. Adams says, "When I made my work ... I thought about how radical that would be if we were to focus our attention on lived experience as a form of subject matter; and how much that would influence ... the future generation of artists and people to look at leisure and Black leisure as a form of radicalness or revolutionary because we're showing that regardless of all the things that are happening to Black people all around the world, we still find time to connect with each other. And that if we were constantly in this place of battle, we couldn't really exist. We would need time to replenish our love and faith and joy. 
When enrolling at HCCC, students can choose from three options to determine their college placement:





6TH ANNUAL ADJUNCT FACULTY CONFERENCE

This year, Hudson County Community College convened the 6th Adjunct Faculty Conference, held annually during each summer season. The conference has always been a great gathering of adjunct faculty and the overall Hudson County Community College (HCCC) community. This year's conference was special because it was the first time the event was held virtually as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Even though the event was held virtually, there were seventy-one attendees from divisions across the college, showing that the adjunct faculty are proud to serve and be a part of HCCC. Third, the student services panel provided information about mental health counseling, accessibility services, tutoring services, and the writing center. Members from each service explained how they can provide help to the HCCC community virtually. Lastly, the Faculty Services panel informed participants about mentoring, Human Resources, Information Technology Services, the Center for Online

Learning, the Library, and the Center for Teaching, Learning and Innovation. Throughout each panel, prizes were given out to those adjunct faculty who participated IN the conference.

The adjunct conference provided a rare opportunity for adjunct faculty to speak comfortably about issues and their concerns, but also gave an opportunity to reach out and have a role in the HCCC community. It is indicative of the commitment and passion towards HCCC that so many adjuncts participated in the conference. As a result, it is clear the adjunct faculty are willing to help and mentor students as well as connect with all members of the HCCC family. We all are truly appreciative of the opportunity to take a part in the conference and we hope to continue to help one another succeed and triumph, especially during these difficult and uncertain times. What factors led you to decide to attend Hudson County Community College?

As a first-generation student, I was unaware of the process one needed to go through to attend college. All I was aware was the stigma behind attending a community college. If someone would have told me years back that I was going to be attending Hudson County Community College, I would have never believed that to be true. My mission was make my parents proud like any first-generation student coming from immigrant parents and that was to attend a well-known University. However, since I had no idea how to navigate the process of entering college I was not aware of the GPA requirements needed to apply to a University. My GPA was not that great and the only University that accepted me was New Jersey City University. As long as it was not a community college, I attended NJCU. However, I was only able to attend one semester because at the time my tuition was not being covered fully and my family were not able to afford it. I needed to work full time for a year to and put school on hold to pay off my tuition fees. Thankfully, my best friend then guided me into applying to Hudson County Community College since it would allow me to continue working part-time and go to school full-time. He explained to me how it would benefit me financially and academically and the opportunities of me raising my GPA and apply for scholarships. I can now say attending HCCC was the best decision I ever made in my college career because it open many doors for me personally, academically, and professionally.

What is your favorite memory of the College, in or out of the classroom?

My favorite memory of the College was when the Secretary of Higher Education, Dr. Zakiya Smith Ellis, Executive Director of the Higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA) David Socolow, and Assemblywoman, Angela McKnight visited to hear student concerns. I was able to sit in with other students and express our concerns regarding our Higher Education system. It was an awe moment to sit and converse with current leaders that are leading our state. It was a wakeup call that I want my future careers to be within Higher Education. As I continue my bachelor's degree at Rutgers University-Newark in Public Affairs Administration, this event gave me the push I needed to apply for the internship under the Secretary of Higher Education. Although, I did not get the opportunity to intern for their office I did get the opportunity to interview for the position and it was a bittersweet moment in my career experiences. Not only was it a step close to my dream, it was also during a pandemic in which at times I thought there was no hope for anything great to spark up my career goals. I am forever thankful for HCCC in bringing leaders like Dr. Zakiya Smith Ellis to speak to students and have their voices heard.

How did you become interested in [major/career]?

In attending HCCC, I graduated with my Associates in Psychology. My reason for pursing this degree at first was because of the stigma different societies have created for mental health. As a Latina coming from immigrant parents, mental health was never discussed and if someone mentioned their depressed or anxious they would identify them as 'crazy'. I wanted to bring more awareness on mental health



especially in the underrepresented communities. As I continue my studies at Rutgers University-Newark, I realized there was so much more I wanted to do. Being a psychologist or social worker was not going to be enough for me. I found my passion in majoring my studies in Public Affairs and Administration with a minor in Social Justice-Honors Living Learning Community (HLLC). Working in a government sector will provide me the opportunity to create change or be part of the change for our communities.

How did your time at HCCC prepare you for your career/life now?

HCCC is a huge part of my success academically and professionally. It allowed me to push myself academically and become an Honor Scholar. My favorite memory and opportunity was taking an honor class for English 102 with Professor Wexler. That course opened my mind and helped me believe in myself. Taking this course at an honors level motivated me to continue to learn and I saw my potential. I was inducted into three different honor societies. If it wasn't for HCCC and the different opportunities the college has for students I would not be succeeding like I am today. I currently work for the Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) Program here with HCCC and recently made two years with the program. HCCC also provided me the opportunity to apply and interview for the Honors Living Learning Community (HLLC) at Rutgers University Newark and be one of the forty transfer students to be accepted to minor in Social Justice and be awarded with a housing scholarship. I can proudly say I am forever grateful for the different opportunities HCCC provided me with.

What is a typical work day for you?

Now that everything is remote, there has been a tremendous change within the Higher Education offices overall. Although I am not able to see my team members in person we have staff meetings daily via zoom to not only discuss our EOF program but also as a check-in. This pandemic has affected us all physically, emotionally, and mentally. I am forever grateful to not only have my family at home supporting my remote from home career, but also to have a team that has been not only catering to our scholars but also for each other. I do miss seeing our students pop in our office even if it was to only say hello. As the program coordinator for our program, we have been programming different virtual events to not lose our connection with our students and each other. There really isn't a typical work day for me throughout this pandemic but somehow we tend to continue our routines which is key and continue to be that support system for our students.
