HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE ONE OF 10 COLLEGES NATIONWIDE TO RECEIVE \$100,000 METALLICA SCHOLARS INITIATIVE AWARD

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) has been chosen from a highly competitive field of community colleges across the United States to receive \$100,000 for training that will transform the future of individuals and the community.

HCCC is one of just ten community colleges nationwide to have been named to the Metallica Scholars Initiative Cohort 4. As a recipient, the College will provide instruction and a pathway to certification in welding for previously incarcerated individuals. The life-changing HCCC program will partner with the New Jersey Reentry Corporation and the Governor's Reentry Training and Employment Center in Kearny.

The Metallica Scholars Initiative funding will provide students with tuition, textbooks, materials, Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) 10 training, consumables, helmets, safety glasses, jackets, and exam fees for American Welding Society certification. The scholars will also receive support from Hudson County Community College Student Success Coaches, plus tutoring, case management,

lients of the New Jersey Reentry Corporation have been enrolling in the Culinary Arts Institute since April 2022. The New Jersey Reentry Corporation facilitated their enrollment at HCCC - specifically, the Governor's Reentry Training and Employment Center in Kearny. This special cohort of four students has been completing studies within the Hot Food Proficiency Certificate credential, an 11-credit experience of four hot food production lab classes, and a food service sanitation lecture class. Students have learned proper knife skills, along with how to prepare sauces, soups, appetizers, and savory dishes, coupled with ServSafe Management and teamwork. All restaurants in the State of NJ must have at least one person who holds ServSafe Manager Certification, enabling them to not only supervise the sanitation, but also train employees and take corrective actions. The Certificate prepares students for immediate employment in restaurants, hotels, and banquet facilities.

to overcome a host of barriers and secure a positive future," said HCCC President, Dr. Christopher Reber. "We are very proud to have been chosen for this selective cohort and value the opportunity to offer a promising future for students and their families. This training will prepare a much-needed workforce for our community."

Since establishing the Metallica Scholars Initiative in 2019, the All Within My Hands (AWMH) Foundation has been working with the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) to provide direct support for career and technical education programs across the United States. Having grown from a concept to a strategic and thriving educational priority that focuses on enhancing skills and supporting students who want to enter a traditional trade or other applied learning programs, the Metallica Scholars Initiative has made a measurable impact. AWMH is replicating the program further by adding the ten colleges in Cohort 4 to the roster, and investing \$1.8 million for the expansion.

"Our goal for the Metallica Scholars Initiative is to shine a light on workforce education and support the next generation of tradespeople. With the addition of the 2022-23 Metallica Scholars program, our grants will reach over 2,000 men and women in 32 community colleges across 27 states," stated All Within My Hands Executive Director, Pete Delgrosso. "We are honored to support these students of all ages and backgrounds and look forward to growing the program even further in the future."

and manufacturing projects. The trade requires fresh and professionally trained talent as current welders age out of the field. The American Welding Society reports that by 2025, the United States will face a shortage of more than 400,000 welding professionals.

Hudson County Community College launched its first welding course in Spring 2022 as an elective in the College's Advanced Manufacturing associate degree program. As a result of demand, HCCC also created a noncredit version of the course that incorporates basic welding skills with preparation for the Certified Welder Test accredited by the American Welding Society. The course introduces students to welding fundamentals and provides opportunities for training in Shielded Metal Arc Welding and Tungsten Inert Gas Welding.

The HCCC 10-week welding course will be held in-person at the Governor's Reentry Training and Employment Center in Kearny, where New Jersey Reentry Corporation has invested in a newly constructed, state-of-the-art welding lab designed in collaboration with the American Welding Society and HCCC. Classes will be limited to a maximum of 12 students each.

Additionally, Dr. Reber said the College has contacted area employers who have expressed an interest in hiring students who attain the Certified Welding credential.

"The impact on the welding student graduates will be significant and transformational," Dr. Reber stated. "We are grateful to All Within My Hands and the American Association of Community Colleges and look forward to working with our many community partners to ensure the success and sustainability of this program."

Artist News

Duke Riley's work, *The Scuttling of the S.S. Gay* is on display on the lower level corridor of the Gabert Library. His new exhibition, "Death To The Living, Long Live Trash" is on view at the Brooklyn Museum through April 23, 2023. If you are 19 years or younger, admission is free.

According to the Museum, "Riley's practice often tackles political and social issues and examines the relationship between the precarious nature of the waterfront and transgressive culture." The exhibit looks at "the ecological impact of capitalism across centuries, connects the history of American maritime art to current themes of environmental justice [and includes] over 250 new and recent works from Riley's Poly S. Tyrene Memorial Maritime Museum series, which re-envisions traditional New England maritime crafts ... through the use of bottle caps, syringes, and other plastic beach trash. The series also includes Riley's contemporary interpretation of scrimshaw (ink drawings historically etched into whale's teeth), replacing commemorative portraits of whaling captains and shipowners with those of CEOs and lobbyists from the plastic, beverage, and

If you like Joan Semmel's work, which is on view in the studio arts classroom 516 in the Gabert Library, you might enjoy making a pilgrimage to Ithaca, New York to see her retrospective exhibition, "Joan Semmel: Skin in the Game," on view at the Herbert F. Johnson Museum of Art at Cornell University through August 21. (It was previously on view at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts.) Semmel has earned acclaim for her nude self-portraits, which she began painting in the 1970s. According to the artist, "I was interested in how my position as a woman affected my choices as an artist. I couldn't possibly relate the same way as a man would, for instance, to the genre of the nude. By using myself as the model those differences immediately became selfevident."

An exhibition of **Barbara Kruger's** work will be on view at the David Zwirner gallery at 519, 525 & 533 West 19th Street, New York City through August 12. Gallery admission is free. According to *The New York Times*, the artist deploys "the tools of mass communication shepherding to make the sheep think." The exhibit at Zwirner coincides with the Kruger installation mentioned in the last *Happenings*, "Barbara Kruger: Thinking of You. I Mean Me. I Mean You." in the Marron

Family Atrium of The Museum of Modern Art, on view until January 2, 2023. You can also see the Newark-born artist's work on the second floor of 2 Enos Place outside the campus Writing Center.

GATEWAY TO INNOVATION

Gateway to Innovation has enjoyed a successful first year! The program grant was extended five months because of efficient money management. In all, 145 students received training in our Patient Care Technician, Certified Nurse Aide, Hemodialysis Technician, and Pharmacy Technician certification courses that provide stackable credentials. Ninety of the students passed their certification exams, and the program has a 100% employment retention rate after 90 days. Additionally, the program \neg - which offers HCCC students and alumni received career development services – counseled 77 HCCC students in financial literacy, and engaged more than 400 alumni.

The Gateway to Innovation program partners HCCC with community stakeholders and employers who support healthcare, business, finance, and technology career pathways. Through the Employer Advisory Board, the program is gaining firsthand insight into employers' needs, and with this information, we are developing Gateway 2.0. This program will offer stackable credentialing, wraparound services, and experiential learning, which aligns with finance and technology careers.

How did you become interested in an IT career?


