HCCC FEATURED IN NATIONAL CASE STUDIES FOR INNOVATION AND STUDENT SUCCESS

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) celebrates its 50th Anniversary, it is the subject of three nationally published case studies that spotlight the College's data-driven strategies and collaborative initiatives for student and workforce development success.

HCCC is featured in:

- "Data and Technology in Action" by The Project on Workforce at Harvard and Education Design Lab;
- "Hudson is Home" by Achieving the Dream (ATD);
- "Hudson County Community College and Eastern Millwork Create a Transformative Apprenticeship Program" by the Business-Higher Education Forum (BHEF).

In Harvard and Education Design Lab's study, HCCC is one of four colleges selected for its innovative use of data and technology. The case study, Building Bridges, highlights HCCC's seamless transfer pathways, employer-aligned academic programs, and wraparound services like the "Hudson Helps Resource Center" and nationally recognized "Hudson Scholars" student success initiative.

The "Hudson Scholars" program, developed with guidance from ATD, builds upon successful models such as the NJ Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) and CUNY ASAP. It provides proactive advisement, mentoring, financial stipends, and early academic intervention. Since its launch, more than 5,000 students have participated, with completion rates nearly doubling. The program has earned multiple national awards, including the 2024 AACC Student Success Award of Excellence and 2024 Bellwether Legacy Award.

ATD's case study showcases how HCCC scaled "Hudson Scholars" to support a broader student population. President Dr. Christopher Reber and ATD President and CEO Dr. Karen Stout will present the program's impact this October at the 2025 ACCT Leadership Congress.

BHEF's study profiles the HCCC-Eastern Millwork, Inc. (EMI) Holz-Technik Apprenticeship Academy. Developed in just seven months, the five-year, tuition-free, earn-while-you-learn program integrates classroom instruction and hands-on training. Students earn an associate degree from HCCC, a bachelor's from Thomas Edison State University, and secure sustainable, high-paying careers. The program has been praised by Governor Phil Murphy as a "blueprint for New Jersey's economic future" and is now a national model for workforce development.

Together, these case studies affirm HCCC's national leadership in educational innovation, student support, and workforce readinessadvancing the College's mission to transform lives and build stronger communities.

udson County Community College (HCCC) recently celebrated 11 graduates of its Solar Installation Training program, offered in partnership with Dimension Energy, a national community solar developer. The ceremony included congratulations from HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber, HCCC Vice President for Strategic Initiatives, Continuing Education and Workforce Development Lori Margolin, Dimension Energy Origination Associate Elana Mannion, New Jersey Reentry Corporation (NJRC) Executive Director and Chairman James McGreevey, and others.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND EASTERN MILLWORK, INC. WELCOME INCOMING APPRENTICES AT SIGNING CEREMONY

ix years ago, Eastern Millwork, Inc. (EMI), a leader in high-end architectural woodwork manufacturing and installation, turned to Hudson County Community College (HCCC) to help address a pressing challenge: developing a pipeline of engineers with the technical expertise and creativity needed in the industry. Traditional bachelor's programs were not producing jobready graduates, and recruiting mechanical engineers proved costly and inefficient.

HCCC responded with an innovative solution that has since become a national model. The Holz Technik Registered Apprenticeship Program reimagines education by immersing students in hands-on, career-specific learning from day one.

Each year, graduating high school students with talent in technology and craftsmanship are invited to apply. Apprentices are hired immediately after graduation, receive on-the-job training and a salary with benefits, earn two debt-free college degrees, and upon completing the five-year program, secure careers earning up to \$70,000 annually at EMI.

This summer, three new apprentices— Hannah Garcia (Memorial High School), Noah Pacheco (High School of Art and Design), and Gianna Ranero (County Prep High School)—celebrated their commitment at a signing ceremony at EMI's corporate offices. They were congratulated by HCCC Dean of STEM Dr. Burl Yearwood, EMI COO Heiko Sieling, HCCC Vice President for Strategic Initiatives, Continuing Education and Workforce Development Lori Margolin, and EMI Project Manager Regi Mulla.

"This program aligns with our focus on developing

strong relationships with businesses and unions that benefit students, businesses and the community" said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "It fills a workforce void, fuels the regional economy, and creates opportunities for young people to earn a tuition-free college education and launch well-paying careers."

To date, EMI has hired 11 apprentices, with several already completing their associate and bachelor's degrees. The program has been highlighted as a national case study by the Business-Higher Education Forum for its

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE EARNS COURSEDOG ACADEMIC OPERATIONS ROLL OUT AWARD

hroughout the country, students and registrars face the challenge of building course schedules that balance requirements, availability, and convenience. For years, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) managed this process manually for more than 90 programs and 500 courses, resulting in hundreds of scheduling emails, delays, and bottlenecks.

To streamline operations, HCCC introduced the Coursedog Scheduling Module two years ago. This intelligent academic operations platform has transformed the College's scheduling process, reducing related emails by 85%, standardizing workflows, minimizing errors, and improving communication across departments. For the first time, HCCC can now create course schedules a full year in advance, offering students greater clarity and access when planning their academic paths.

The College's success was recognized with the 2025 Coursedog Academic Operations Roll Out Award, presented at the Academic Operations Conference in Chicago. HCCC Dean of Humanities and Social Sciences Dr. Alison Wakefield and Associate Registrar Irma Williams accepted the award on behalf of the College.

The implementation was led by Ms. Williams in collaboration with HCCC's four academic school deans, more than 30 faculty coordinators, and Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and Assessment Dr. Heather DeVries. Ms. Williams also designed and delivered real-time trainings tailored to varying levels of technical experience, helping build consistency across the process. She continues to meet weekly with Coursedog to refine practices and enhance efficiency.

"Everything we do at Hudson County Community College is about student success," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "Utilizing Coursedog has dramatically improved scheduling, reduced administrative tasks, and strengthened operations. We are proud of the difference it is making and grateful for the leadership of Dr. Wakefield and Ms. Williams."

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE RECEIVES NATIONAL EXCELLENCE IN MENTAL HEALTH AND WELL-BEING AWARD

udson County Community College (HCCC) has been honored with the 2025 Excellence in Mental Health and Well-Being Award from *Insight Into Academia Magazine*. The national award recognizes institutions that foster a culture of mental health, wellness, and belonging through innovative support for students, faculty, and staff.

At HCCC, wraparound services are central to student success. Through the Hudson Helps Resource Center, students can access emergency funds, food pantries, a Career Closet, Chromebook loans, and 24/7 social services and mental health support. The College also partners with organizations such as Generation Hope, FamilyU, and the JED Foundation, while programs like Navigate360 and First Year Experience help students stay on track to graduation.

The HCCC Mental Health Counseling and Wellness Center provides confidential support for stress, anxiety, and depression, including counseling with licensed professionals, peer support through TalkCampus, teletherapy via Uwill, and specialized groups. The Hudson CARE(S) Team—made up of faculty, staff, and social work interns from five universities—coordinates holistic care for students. More than 100 faculty and staff have been trained in Mental Health First Aid and suicide prevention programs.

Faculty and staff also benefit from a robust array of services, including free mental health resources, flexible work schedules, employee resource groups, and up to \$9,000 annually for professional development. Family-friendly benefits such as paid maternity, paternity, adoption, and bereavement leave, along with lactation pods for new mothers contribute to HCCC earning nearly a dozen national workplace awards.

"We believe that everyone who makes HCCC home deserves the good health that

allows them to succeed in pursuing their goals and dreams," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber.

"Hudson County Community College is a role model for other institutions of higher education," said *Insight Into Academia* publisher Lenore Pearlstein.

ARTIST NEWS



About this work, Gonzalez-Torres wrote, "America has always been an unattainable dream, a place to dream about.... The America that I now know is still a place of light, a place of opportunities, of risks, of justice, of racism, of injustice, of hunger and excess, of pleasure and growth. Valeri Larko, Relic (1998), Oil on Gessoed Watercolor Paper, 15.25" x 13.25"





September Selection: The Glass Castle by Jeannette Walls

The Glass Castle is a remarkable memoir of resilience and redemption, and a revelatory look into a family at once deeply dysfunctional and uniquely vibrant. When sober, Jeannette's brilliant and charismatic father captured his children's imagination, teaching them physics, geology, and how to embrace life fearlessly. But when he drank, he was dishonest and destructive. Her mother was a free spirit who abhorred the idea of domesticity and didn't want the responsibility of raising a family. The Glass Castle is truly astonishing – a memoir permeated by the intense love of a peculiar but loyal family.

Solar energy has become one of the fastest-growing energy industries, reducing environmental pollution and costs while creating new career opportunities. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, jobs for solar photovoltaic installers are projected to grow 24%, far outpacing many other fields.

HCCC's seven-week training program, held at NJRC's Governor's Reentry Training and Employment Center in Kearny, was led by HCCC and Solar One instructors. Students gained hands-on solar installation experience and completed coursework in Construction Basics, Work Readiness Skills, and certifications

in OSHA-10, Basic Life Support, Green Construction, and Photovoltaic Installation.

The program emphasized connecting students with employers and trade unions. One participant secured employment before the course ended, and graduates met with Dimension Energy and other industry partners about future opportunities.

"This clean energy training program is an outstanding example of a public-private partnership," said Dr. Reber. Support came from multiple partners: HCCC tuition assistance funded by Metallica's All Within My Hands Foundation, stipends and networking opportunities from Dimension Energy, training from HCCC and Solar One, installation experience supported by the NJ Pathways to Career Opportunities initiative, and NJRC's training venue.

"Hudson County Community College is a great workforce development partner," added Dimension Energy Vice President Bryan Bentrott. "They ensure every student has a clear path to a full-time job, and we look forward to welcoming these graduates to future projects."

SUNY Adirondack Chemistry Conference

Instructor Raffi Manjikian recently participated in a multi-day professional development conference at SUNY Adirondack, which focused on implementing evidence-based teaching and learning practices in community college education. This conference convened faculty from across the country to explore research-supported strategies aimed at improving student learning and persistence, particularly in chemistry.

Throughout the conference, participants explored a range of instructional approaches designed to enhance student learning, engagement, and retention, all of which are areas of critical importance in STEM courses. Sessions were tailored to the unique needs of community colleges, with the goal of increasing student continuity in chemistry.

Faculty left the conference equipped with practical tools to support increased student engagement, foster critical thinking skills, and



support greater retention in STEM pathways. Thanks to his participation, Manjikian will lead a community of practice with other participants from the conference. The group will focus on implementing course-based undergraduate research experiences into the general chemistry curriculum.

By translating the latest educational research into classroom practice, Manjikian continues to contribute to the development of innovative, student-centered teaching approaches that empower learners and strengthen academic success in the sciences.

Hudson County Community College Attends STEM C^2 Symposium

On Wednesday, August 6, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) participated in the STEM C^2 Research and Career Symposium hosted at Bergen Community College. Instructor Manjikian also served as a judge for the presentation and poster sessions.

The STEM C^2 Research and Career Symposium provided an exciting platform for students to present their work, explore cutting-edge developments across science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, and connect with industry leaders and fellow scholars. Highlights included a high-energy research presentation competition, inspiring keynote address, engaging poster session, and dynamic career panel featuring professionals from academia and industry.



A.S. Environmental Science, Class of 2023

After graduating with his associate degree from HCCC in 2023 and completing the Water Workforce Utility Program, Martin earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Environmental Science from Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU) and began an exciting career as a Smart Technologies Specialist at Veolia.



What brought you to HCCC?

My journey at HCCC began in late summer 2022. Living in Jersey City, I was looking for an affordable and accessible way to pivot into a meaningful career while still being able to support myself. HCCC provided the perfect opportunity to do just that.

What inspired your interest in the Water **Workforce Utility Program and pursuing a** career in water management?

My interest stemmed from the alignment between the program and my academic focus. I was pursuing a bachelor's degree in Environmental Science with concentrations in Geographical Information Systems (GIS) and Data Analytics. The Water Workforce Utility Program curriculum strongly reflected what I was learning at the time, making the program a natural and exciting extension of my studies.

Tell us about your experience in the Water **Workforce Utility Program.**

My experience was excellent. The instructors - many of whom are now my coworkers and supervisors — generously shared their deep knowledge of the industry. I absorbed as much as I could by staying curious, asking questions, and engaging fully. The program gave me a new appreciation for the critical role water and wastewater services play in our daily lives. I'd like to give a special shout out to Joyce Alvarez and Mylz Wilson, who were instrumental in guiding our cohort and supporting us through everything from classroom lessons to internship prep.

How do you feel HCCC prepared you for success at Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU)?

HCCC helped me build the self-discipline and motivation needed to thrive in a fully online learning environment. Most of my classes were remote, which was challenging at first, but it taught me valuable habits that carried over to my time at SNHU. Thanks to those skills, I was able to complete my degree ahead of schedule while working full-time.

Tell us about what you do at Veolia.

As a Smart Technologies Specialist, I work at the intersection of GIS and data analytics. My role involves managing and improving our GIS interfaces and integrating data from smart tools like leak detectors and pressure monitors. This allows us to extract actionable insights that support proactive maintenance and operational efficiency across the water system.

What advice would you give to HCCC students interested in pursuing this career path?

Be open to learning and don't be afraid to get your hands dirty. One of the most valuable parts of my journey was walking the field and GPS-tagging around 7,000 water assets across Kearny and Bayonne in just a few months. That hands-on experience gave me a deep understanding of the system I now support from the office. Also, invest in learning key skills like scripting, data analysis, and geospatial tools — they're becoming essential as utilities transition to digital platforms.

Any favorite HCCC memories?

One of my favorite experiences was our field trip to the water treatment plant in Boonton. It was eye-opening and reinforced just how vital the water industry is to everyday life.


