

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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE CELEBRATES THE CLASS OF 2020 WITH VIRTUAL COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES ON DECEMBER 10

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) invited family and friends to honor the HCCC Class of 2020 by viewing live-stream Commencement ceremonies on Thursday, Dec. 10, 2020 at 12 noon on the HCCC YouTube Channel – www.youtube.com/user/HudsonCountyCollege. At the virtual event, associate degrees and certificates were awarded to 1,680 May and December 2020 HCCC graduates.

The keynote speaker was James Elliott, the 2019-2020 International President of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Honor Society, and recipient of the first-ever PTK Presidential Scholarship. The 2020 Delaware Technical Community College graduate shared his inspirational life story. At age 19, Mr. Elliott was convicted of a felony, and spent nearly six years in prison. After his release, he returned to Delaware to complete a dual degree program in human services and drug and alcohol counseling. He has been named to the All-USA Academic Team, and is a New Century Transfer Pathway Scholar. Mr. Elliott is also a prison reform advocate who promotes education for recidivism reduction.

The Valedictorians were Gabriela Melendez (May 2020), and Vanisha Patel (December 2020), both Jersey City residents. Ms. Melendez graduated with an Associate in Science degree in Computer Science-Cybersecurity option, and Ms. Patel with

an Associate in Science degree in Biology.

Gabriela Melendez enrolled at Hudson County Community College in Fall 2017, and completed requirements for her Associate in Science (A.S.) degree in Computer Science-Cybersecurity in Fall 2019. Ms. Melendez plans to work as a cybersecurity analyst and start a family. She credits the College's collaborative environment and its focus on student success as helping her through rigorous academic challenges and personal growth. Ms. Melendez was a Peer Leader who assisted with campus events, including Pizza with the President, One-Stop Registration, transfer events, #TruckinThursdays, and more. She was a member of the Gaming Club and National Society of Leadership and Success.

Vanisha Patel began her studies at HCCC in Fall 2019, and just completed requirements for her Associate in Science (A.S.) degree in Biology (Science and Mathematics). Ms. Patel plans to transfer to Rutgers University, study Pre-Veterinary Medicine, and pursue a career as a veterinarian. At HCCC, she was the Student Government Association's Director of Record-Keeping, a member of the Academic Affairs Committee, Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society, STEM Club, Model United Nations, Photography Club, and more.

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Foundation Chairman Joseph Napolitano, Sr. reports that donors, the HCCC Culinary Arts chef professors and students, and HCCC staff made the 23rd Annual Holiday Gala a great success.

The virtual fundraising event, "Gala @ Home," was held on Thursday evening, December 3rd. To date, \$154,950 has been raised to provide scholarships for deserving students. Donors received a basket filled with a gourmet dinner prepared by chefs of the award-winning HCCC Culinary Arts Institute. The baskets contained cold seafood, antipasto, assorted cheeses, breads and crackers, a two-entrée dinner, desserts and beverages.

HCCC President, Dr. Chris Reber, and Dr. Nicholas Chiaravalloti, Vice President of External Affairs & Senior Counsel to the President, opened the online event with a welcoming toast.

"Many donors have reported that although they missed meeting in person, they thoroughly enjoyed this year's 'Gala @ Home,'" Dr. Chiaravalloti stated.

"We are grateful to everyone who participated in the Gala, and to all who worked to make it a success," Dr. Reber said. "The strong support for our students is especially appreciated at this time."

It was noted that Dean Dillon's leadership has propelled the HCCC Foundation Gala to be recognized as one of the most spectacular and enjoyable events in Hudson County.

ACHIEVING THE DREAM UPDATE

On November 3, 2020, President Reber received a letter from Dr. Mary Fifield and Dr. Rene Garcia, HCCC's Achieving the Dream Leadership and Data Coaches, respectively, that detailed key findings from their October 13-16, 2020 virtual visit to HCCC. In addition, Dr. Fifield and Dr. Garcia provided actionable recommendations to further our student success work. In the letter, they praised the College community for its commitment to keeping equity and student success at the center of our work, especially as we continue to navigate this "new normal." Dr. Fifield and Dr. Garcia also commended the College for the expansive and inclusive nature of our student success work as more members of the HCCC com-

munity have become involved through the How Teams and other complementary initiatives such as the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (PACDEI). Among their recommendations, Dr. Fifield and Dr. Garcia encouraged HCCC's Dream Team, the How Team working groups, and the broader HCCC community to examine existing practices and policies through the eyes of students (i.e., identifying points at which students may encounter barriers or have questions). The Dream Team will be reporting out on its progress in executing Dr. Fifield and Dr. Garcia's recommendations throughout the coming months. Dr. Fifield and Dr. Garcia's next virtual visit is scheduled for March 2021.

How Team (n.)

A working group led by two members of HCCC's Dream Team and comprised of members from different functional areas of the college. Each How Team is tasked with reviewing research related to, collecting quantitative and qualitative data about, and making recommendations for the implementation of one strategy in HCCC's Student Success Action Plan. HCCC ALUMNA RECEIVES FIRST COVID-19 VACCINE IN NEW JERSEY

On Tuesday, Dec. 15, Maritza Beniquez, an emergency room nurse at University Hospital in Newark, became the first person in New Jersey to receive a vaccine for the coronavirus, other than clinical trials.

Beniquez received the injection during a ceremony at the hospital – coincidentally on her birthday – surrounded by colleagues, news cameras, and New Jersey Gov. Phil Murphy.

Beniquez, an ER nurse for five years at University Hospital, is a 2013 Hudson County Community College graduate and Phi Theta Kappa alumna, earning an associate degree in nursing.

Workers at five other New Jersey hospitals – Hackensack Meridian Health in Hackensack, Robert Wood Johnson in New Brunswick, AtlanticCare Regional in Atlantic City, Morristown Medical Center, and Cooper in Camden – also received vaccines on Dec. 15.


ERIC M. FRIEDMAN, PH.D. BECOMES BERGEN COMMUNITY COLLEGE'S EIGHTH PRESIDENT

In December, the Bergen Community College (BCC) Board of Trustees named Hudson County Community College's Executive Vice President and Provost, Eric M. Friedman, Ph.D., the eighth president of New Jersey's largest community college. Dr. Friedman will begin his tenure on Jan. 1, 2021.

"Eric has served HCCC exceedingly well for many years, and we are very happy for him," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. "He is more than ready to take this exciting next step in his career. At the same time, we will all miss him greatly."


As executive vice president and provost/chief operating officer at HCCC, Friedman's expansive portfolio of responsibilities included leading the College's recent reaffirmation of its accreditation, launching an array of new programs in high-de-

mand fields, and overseeing the expansion of a center for online learning as a key area for fiscal sustainability. Friedman also created additional enrollment opportunities by leading the development of off-site locations, expanding early college dual-enrollment programs, and managing the development of Hudson's first fully-accredited school of nursing.




Hudson County Community College extends a hearty thank you to Dr. Friedman for his service and wishes him every success in his new role.



In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

ARTIST NEWS

Artist Jo Baer says, "The nature of painting is such that it has no time. It has no tense. It's the

language of dreams." She calls her early 1960s abstract paintings "utopian" and talks about her process at that time. "I wanted to make ... things that I'd never seen before... I went to the big galleries and looked at things. It looked so different than what I was doing that I knew that no way that anybody would pick up the work. [The artist thought no gallery would show her paintings.] I was sort of stuck. They took up a lot of room, so I had to rent storage for them. I got sick of paying rent on them. I said, I think I'm going to destroy them. To h#\$% with it." Fortunately, she didn't destroy them.

Talking about the social justice movement, she said, "The world changed with the 1960s. You could feel that abstract and concept art wasn't saying what was necessary. It was speaking through wishful thinking."

Now in her nineties, the artist mentions her current works which look abstract from a great distance, but up close you see images of carefully drawn people and objects, "I'm doing the kind of

work that's sort of asks questions... I don't mean to baffle people. I really mean for them to sort of think about these things, because I am using images of real things... It seems to me that the history of painting has always been as a functional thing, a social thing, a way of speaking to the people, and that's all I really do."

Jo Baer's work is installed in the Gabert Library Makerspace and the reception area on the second floor of the Culinary Conference Center in Journal Square. She recently exhibited early and recent work at the Pace Gallery in New York City and was interviewed for that exhibition. The event marked the end of the Fall semester and celebrated students' creativity in their classes. The exhibition was presented in the HCCC Benjamin J. Dineen III and Dennis C. Hull Gallery. The students' Portfolio Presentations were offered on Friday, Dec. 18 via Webex.

The HCCC Department of Cultural Affairs' monthly community interview series titled – "These are the People in Your Neighborhood..." – featured creative individuals from diverse industries sharing their personal stories of growth and success. DOCA Director Michelle Vitale interviewed Angus Vail, founder of Container Globe via Webex on Friday, Dec. 4. A New Zealand native who resides in Jersey City, Mr. Vail has been a business manager for internationally renowned rock bands, including INXS, 3 Doors Down, and KISS for more than 30 years. He combined his passion for rock n' roll with his love of Shakespeare to design a futuristic venue and constructed it from repurposed shipping containers and building materials as a pop-up setting for dance, theater, and music events. The "Container Globe" modular, mo-

bile theater is modeled after Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, which was built around 400 years ago.



BOARD OF TRUSTEES VICE CHAIR BAKARI G. LEE, ESQ., DELIVERS THE 2020 VIRTUAL KENTE CLOTH KEYNOTE SPEECH

Good evening, graduates! I am so very honored to serve as your Keynote speaker at this inaugural

Virtual Kente Graduation recognizing students of Black or African descent. As the graduate of an HBCU –Florida A&M University – I am so glad to see you all here today being honored and celebrated for your achievement. In talking with Dr. Jones and Ja'Via Hall, I was told of Anari Ramsey, an Early College student majoring in Human Services who was inducted into the National Honor Society of Leadership and Success during early college. Amazing work, Anari. And then there is Adoum Allamine an international student who is very involved as he serves as vice president for the Criminal Justice Club and secretary for the Honors Student Council. Adoum was an ESL student here at HCCC and upon exiting the program he has achieved no less than straight A's in ALL of his college-level courses, including three Honors courses with an elevated academic rigor, one of which happened to be ENG 102. Adoum is inspiring and a motivation for all who dare to dream bigger dreams, and I know that he will achieve his goals of going beyond his associate degree all the way through law school and beyond. So I am really very proud of you all, so elated about your accomplishment and so, so pleased to have the opportunity to provide capstone words to your wonderful achievement.

And particularly during this trying time in this nation's history. This is a unique moment in American history. The pressures, stresses and threat of COVID-19 has left us all in an uncertain world, unsure of where our careers will be, the safety and security of our homes, and in fact the welfare of our very lives. What is less unique, however, albeit so very unjust, is that this experience is not unfamiliar for those of us of African descent. Let us be frank, African slavery, the Middle Passage and European colonialism dispossessed millions of Africans from their ancestral homelands, from their family, language, culture, and religion. The masses of people of African descent in the States, South America, the Caribbean and Europe are the resultant evidence of this history. And we, the descendants of those enslaved Africans, have continued to bear the burden of this disruption to our lineage. This moment in time however has offered those around us with whom we live and interact on a daily basis a glimpse into our ongoing experience.

During this year, against the backdrop of COVID-19, we have borne witness to, among many, many others, the brutal murders of Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, and the horrific video footage of the murder of George Floyd. Similarly, we have witnessed unjustified calls to police clearly intended to threaten African-Americans enjoying life's basic pleasures: children selling lemonade, dog walking, jogging, swimming, cookouts in public parks...bird watching. The killings of, and intentional threats against, Black men, women and children participating in the simple

joys of everyday life are only the most recent in a long legacy of discrimination that has been a central and ever-present theme of the Black Experience. Things must change. As a chain is only as strong as its weakest link, a social order can only be maintained and thrive if there is the promise and hope of equality and equity in treatment and opportunity. If we cannot understand that we are all interconnected in every aspect of our lives and our spirit, we are doomed to fail. We all have to be an active participant in this effort.

We must all take a more active role in promoting dialogue, truth and transparency as this country considers systemic reforms against institutional racism and discrimination. At Hudson, we have begun, through Dr. Reber's work, with the establishment of the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI), an initiative that supports the Presidential goals he has adopted based upon guidance from those of us on the Board of Trustees. There will be other improvements to the college's governance structure that at present I am not at liberty to share, but please look forward to announcements in the near future. We will continue as we seek to better understand the causes and the cures for the silence and complacency of good men and women that are witnesses to horrific acts of racism and the grossly disproportionate adverse impacts on African Americans in the areas of health, environmental injustice, housing, law enforcement and economic opportunity.

Dovetailing from the state of the world around us, I want to leave you with a few words to hopefully help guide your steps as you chart your path going forward. I have come to believe the keys to our life experiences and lessons for our time here on this plane, can be distilled down to two things: decisions, and relationships.

Every waking moment is a fork in the road of our lives. A decision we have to make as to what we will do with our time here, who we will be. What will we make of ourselves? Will we wake up early, will we sleep late, will we play, will we work hard, will we be productive, will we be destructive, will we be caring or callous, disciplined and diligent, or cavalier and carefree. Every moment you have a decision to make as to who you will be and how you will interact with the world. Your years of decisions have earned you today's achievements. Use the skills you have garnered here at Hudson to continue to make good, wise decisions on a daily basis: every day. Learn lessons from them, continue to dare greatly, continue to be the success stories each of you are. And while doing so, understand that the manner through which we experience and interpret life is as against the sounding board of relationships with others. This day is greater still because it is a shared experience, with loved ones and friends. As sound echoes against objects to create sonar that propagates and defines dark spaces, so do our relationships in and with the world around

us define our lives. So embrace those around you, love them, uplift them, share yourself with them, build them up, because within their ascension lies your truest glory.

And remember, inasmuch as your achievement today is a fantastic accomplishment, always be reminded to reach back and help those who come behind you. Muhammad Ali once said, "Service to others is the rent you pay for your room here on earth." Be service-oriented. Volunteer. Build and contribute to your community. So, in sum, I say be connected with and give back to others! Be purposeful in an effort to uplift the world around you. I'd like to leave you with a poem that's special to me, and admonish you to heed its words, as you move forward through your lives. It's called The Bridge Builder, by Will Allen Dromgoole:

"An old man, going a lone highway,
Came at the evening cold and gray,
To a chasm, vast and deep and wide,
Through which was flowing a sullen tide.
The old man crossed in the twilight dim-
That sullen stream had no fears for him;
But he turned, when he reached the other side,
And built a bridge to span the tide.
"An old man going a lone highway,
Came, at the evening cold and gray,
To a chasm vast and deep and wide.
Through which was flowing a sullen tide
The old man crossed in the twilight dim,
The sullen stream had no fear for him;
But he turned when safe on the other side
And built a bridge to span the tide.
"Old man," said a fellow pilgrim near,
"You are wasting your strength with building here;
Your journey will end with the ending day,
You never again will pass this way;
You've crossed the chasm, deep and wide,
Why build this bridge at evening tide?"
The builder lifted his old gray head;
"Good friend, in the path I have come," he said,
"There followed after me to-day
A youth whose feet must pass this way.
This chasm that has been as naught to me
To that fair-haired youth may a pitfall be;


EOF SCHOLARS RECEIVE THEIR SCHOLAR KITS ON CAMPUS



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

What factors led you to decide to attend Hudson Community College?

I really wanted to attend The Culinary Institute of America; however, the tuition was astronomical. When I did research, I learned that most of the professors from HCCC were all graduates from either CIA or Johnson and Wales. I knew I could get the same education for a fraction of the cost.

What is your favorite memory of the College, in or out of the classroom?

Ms. M's favorite catch phrase: "Etiquette Says" still haunts me in my dreams. (I love you, Ms. M!)

How did you become interested in culinary arts?

I always had a passion for food, but when I was younger, I pursued that passion by eating, rather than creating food. I would have never thought twice about becoming a chef, I kind of just fell into it when I saw how much schooling it took to be a pilot.

How did your time at HCCC prepare for your career/life now?

HCCC didn't just teach me how to cook, they taught me how to look at any food business as a whole, from costing and statistical guidelines in Dr. K's class to managing front of house in Mr. Moruzzi's class, the program really gave me an understanding for the importance of the flow of the entire restaurant not just the quality and production of the food.

What is a typical work day for you?

A typical work day would usually be in a restaurant; however, due to COVID, my work day begins and ends in my garage for the time being as I am building a company from the ground up and hopefully soon moving into a storefront.

What has been the most memorable project/case you have worked on?

I always thought working at Le Cirque would be the highlight of my career. One day this Cuban boy with a pig tattoo on his arm, walked into a kosher restaurant and little did he know his life would change. At The Ridge, I not only found my identity as a chef, but I broke boundaries in the kosher world. I did not make any traditional Jewish foods and pushed the bar as far as I could. I established and operated the longest dry age program in any kosher restaurant in the country.

Who are your biggest inspirations that have impacted your work in some way?

I can't name one person. There have been so many people that have contributed to my success. From all the professors at HCCC to my mentor at Le Cirque to working for Danny Meyers and even Hell's Kitchen winner, Ariel Fox.

What advice would you give to recent HCCC graduates?

Find your passion; don't let anyone tell you that if you don't work fine dining that you aren't a real chef. There are different niches in this field. Find your niche and make it all your own.

What advice do you have for those students who are just starting their college careers?

Dive in. Go get a job in a restaurant, even if it is as a dishwasher. The last thing you want to do is finish school and realize you don't want to do this for the rest of your life. It's hard, it's stressful, and it's not always rewarding. If you like this field, you might not make it. Make sure you love it.
