HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HONORS 58 NURSING PROGRAM GRADUATES AT PINNING CEREMONY

udson County Community College (HCCC) honored 58 graduates of its Associate of Science RN Nursing Program at Pinning and Traditional Candle Lighting Ceremonies on June 18, 2025. Held at the HCCC Culinary Conference Center, the event marked the transition from students to professionals as they recited the International Nurses' Pledge.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber and Nursing Program Director Dr. Lori Byrd congratulated the graduates from the day, evening, and weekend divisions. Faculty presented nursing pins and special honors including the Gloria Larsen Lobban, National League for Nursing (NLN) Leadership, Highest GPA, HCCC Achievement, and HCCC Excellence Awards.


The Pinning Ceremony represents the formal entrance into the nursing profession, while the Candle Lighting Ceremony honors

Florence Nightingale and the compassionate legacy of nursing. Graduates pledged to deliver ethical, respectful, and high-quality care in service of community health.

HCCC's Nursing Program combines general education and science with rigorous clinical training. Students benefit from experienced faculty, flexible schedules, and state-of-theart labs. The program is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) and the New Jersey Board of Nursing.

With a 92.4% NCLEX pass rate and 96.6% job placement rate, HCCC's program continues to address the national nursing shortage. The College was the first in New Jersey selected for the "Pay It Forward Program," offering zero-interest loans and stipends to students in health care fields. Over 80% of HCCC nursing students receive financial assistance.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE'S DR. NICHOLAS CHIARAVALLOTI RECEIVES NEW JERSEY COUNCIL OF COUNTY COLLEGES LEADERSHIP AWARD

r. Nicholas Chiaravalloti, Vice President for External Affairs, Strategic Planning, and Senior Counsel to the President at Hudson County Community College (HCCC), was honored with the 2025 Dr. Lawrence A. Nespoli Leadership Award by the New Jersey Council of County Colleges (NJCCC). The award, presented during the Second Annual New Jersey Community College Opportunity Summit, recognizes senior leaders who have made impactful contributions to the state's 18 community colleges.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber praised Dr. Chiaravalloti for his tireless advocacy and instrumental role in securing funding for initiatives such as the new Center for Student Success, technology upgrades, and the nationally acclaimed Hudson Scholars program. "He is a key liaison with public officials and strengthens our College's connection to the broader community," Dr. Reber said.

An educator, attorney, and former legislator, Dr. Chiaravalloti provides executive leadership in legal affairs and strategic

planning, oversees government and community relations, and monitors legislation affecting HCCC and the community college sector. He also leads the HCCC School of Continuing Education and Workforce Development, where

he has expanded access to high-demand skills and workforce pathways through grants and apprenticeship programs. Under his guidance, HCCC is preparing to launch its inaugural Athletics program, further enhancing student engagement.

Beyond HCCC, Dr. Chiaravalloti serves on several influential boards, including the New Jersey Broadband Commission, Boy Scouts of America Executive Board, Hudson County Chamber of Commerce Executive Board, and the Regional Planning Association's New Jersey Committee.

Before joining HCCC, he was Director of Community Engagement and Executive Director of the Guarini Institute at Saint Peter's University. A Bayonne native and son of Italian immigrants, he represented New Jersey's 31st Legislative District in the General Assembly from 2016 to 2022, serving as Majority Whip from 2020 to 2022. He was also the 2024 recipient of the Daryl Harrison Leadership Award from the Hudson County Chamber of Commerce.

welve students from Kearny High School (KHS) graduated with associate degrees from Hudson County Community College (HCCC) two weeks ahead of receiving their high school diplomas. These students are the first KHS participants in HCCC's Early College program, which enables high schoolers to complete college courses and earn credits toward a degree.

The program is part of a growing national movement; 34% of U.S. high school students now take college-level courses, according to the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Programs. Research shows students in Early College programs are more likely to graduate and complete higher degrees, while saving time and tuition.

"These students have demonstrated drive, discipline, and excellence," said HCCC President

Dr. Christopher Reber. "They gain confidence, earn affordable college credits, and get an early start on their futures."

The 2025 KHS–HCCC graduates are headed to institutions including Penn State, Rutgers, NJIT, and Stevens, pursuing majors such as finance, engineering, and healthcare. One student plans to take a gap year.

HCCC's partnership with the Kearny Board of Education began in 2021. Students complete college-level courses taught by both KHS instructors and HCCC faculty, with credits transferable to four-year institutions. Participants can earn up to 18 credits annually.

This year, HCCC awarded degrees to 48 Early College high school graduates, including students from Bayonne, Lincoln, and High Tech high schools in fields such as Liberal Arts, Environmental Studies, and Criminal Justice.

udson County Community College (HCCC) Board of Trustees Chair Jeanette Peña announced the appointment of Reverend Dr. Frances Snelling Teabout to the Board of Trustees. Dr. Teabout was sworn in during the Board's June 10, 2025 meeting and succeeds Trustee Emerita Pamela Gardner, who served for eight years, including as Vice Chair.

"We are very happy to welcome Reverend Dr. Teabout, whose leadership has helped impact and improve the lives of countless individuals within our community," said Peña. "We also wish to acknowledge and thank Pamela Gardner for her tireless advocacy on behalf of our students."

Reverend Dr. Teabout brings decades of experience in education, youth development, and community service. She currently serves as Director of Mission for New Community Corporation in Newark and is the Founder and Pastor of Open Door Worship Center in Jersey City. She also teaches as an Adjunct Professor at Fairleigh Dickinson University's Petrocelli Center for Continuing Education.

Her previous roles include positions at Rutgers University, the Newark Board of Education, and New Community Corporation, where she supported students and families through counseling, after-school programming, and youth services.

A graduate of McNair Academic High School, Reverend Dr. Teabout holds a Doctorate of Ministry from Drew University, Master's degrees in Divinity and Counseling/Psychology, and a Bachelor's degree in Psychology.

As a voting member of the Board, Reverend Dr. Teabout will serve a four-year term. HCCC's Board includes ten voting members — two appointed by the Governor and eight by the County Executive — and two non-voting members: the College President and a student from the current year's graduating class.

udson County Community College (HCCC) has appointed Zachary Forrest as Associate Director of Veterans Affairs and International Student Services.

In this role, Mr. Forrest will support enrollment, engagement, and academic success initiatives for veterans and international students; build partnerships with the community to improve educational access and completion; and collaborate across the College to enhance support for students, faculty, staff, and community members.

"We are excited to welcome Zachary Forrest to the HCCC family," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "He will lead efforts to expand global travel opportunities, enhance veteran engagement, and increase enrollment for both student populations."

Mr. Forrest previously served as International Admissions Coordinator at Western Carolina University's Office of Global Engagement and led an internship program at the University of Technology Sumbawa in Indonesia.

He holds a Master of Science in Global Studies and International Relations, with a concentration in Global Student Mobility, and a Bachelor of Arts in Communications and Political Science, both from Northeastern University. His international experience includes study-abroad programs such as "The Twenty-First Century City: Tokyo and Kyoto" at Meiji University and Northeastern University's N.U.in Program in London.

Mr. Forrest is certified as a Designated School Official (DSO), Alternate Responsible Officer (ARO), and Passport Acceptance Agent—qualifications that will support his leadership in student mobility and services at HCCC. He has also pre-

ARTIST NEWS

We are sad to report the recent passing of artist Henrietta Mantooth at age 100. Her wonderful "Jailbirds" paintings, addressing issues faced by incarcerated people, adorn the sixth floor hallway of the Gabert Library. Here's a link (https://seniorplanet.org/henriettamantooth-97-painter-and-unabashedhumanist/) to an interview with the artist when she was 97 in AARP's Senior Planet entitled People We Love: Henrietta Mantooth, 97, Painter and Unabashed Humanist - Senior Planet. She was always passionate about social justice. In the interview she said, "Ever since I grew up as a white child in a totally segregated Kansas City, Missouri, I have been interested in race and what has been happening forever in our country. In fact, it was at the second 'Jailbird' installation that I started asking people the question: 'How has segregation affected your life?' because we're all affected in some way by racism. One time I asked a taxi driver the question - he turned around and said, 'you mean it's over?' So, I've changed the verb tense to 'how does segregation affect your life?' The interviewer asked why she kept asking this question. Henrietta said, "I ask out of deep feeling a need to talk to each other. I find that people welcome opening up. Even when I go to a cocktail party, there is always someone who is willing to share their experience and open their heart."


The Jewish Museum in New York City has a major retrospective of art by **Ben Shahn** through October 2025. The exhibit was the Critics Pick by *The New York Times* in a review, "Ben Shahn's Social Realist Art Feels Relevant Again in Landmark Survey, An old master

of the Great Depression painted a portrait of America as it still may be." Brittanica.com defines Social Realism as, "[a] trend in American art originating in about 1930 and referring in its narrow sense to paintings treating themes of social protest in a naturalistic or quasiexpressionist manner." New York Times art critic Blake Gopnik notes, "Those works use the timehonored art of painting to make the modern world, and its signature troubles, as present as Shahn can manage. The effect is gripping, and feels utterly relevant for the troubled moment we are living in now." Shahn reached his peak of fame in the period around World War II. He is best known for his portraits of workers and social-justice heroes or martyrs. After that period, his artwork that brought attention to real social problems, was less fashionable than the abstract painting that took center stage in the art world. Gopnik notes, "What Shahn couldn't have realized, as he turned away from his potent visions of the 1930s and 40s, was that they would find new purchase almost a century later, when once again we face issues of racial injustice, and what our nation might do about it, and prosecutions that can seem to serve politics, not justice." Closer to home, Shahn's work can be seen in the North Hudson Library and Multipurpose Room. Shahn lived in New Jersey for much of his career.

If you've never been to the Art Students League on 57th Street in Manhattan, it's worth a visit, if only for the very tiny art supply store where prices are quite reasonable. You might also want to check out the new exhibit, "Shaping American Art: A Celebration of the Art Students League of New York at 150" through August 17. Included in the exhibit are many works by artists who studied or taught at the League. The following artists in the show also have work on exhibit on the walls of Hudson County Community College: Will Barnet (North Hudson and Gabert Library), Alexander Calder (STEM), Audrey Flack (Culinary), Rockwell Kent (Gabert Library), Hughie Lee-Smith (North Hudson), Reginald Marsh (Gabert Library), Fairfield Porter (Culinary), Robert Rauschenberg (Gabert Library), and Ben Shahn (North Hudson).

udson County Community College (HCCC) hosted its annual Juneteenth Celebration on Thursday, June 19, 2025, in the Benjamin J. Dineen III and Dennis C. Hull Gallery at the Gabert Library. The event honored the historic day in 1865 when Union troops arrived in Galveston, Texas — two years after the Emancipation Proclamation — to enforce the freedom of enslaved African Americans.

Juneteenth, now a federal holiday, commemorates Black liberation and resilience. HCCC's program reflected this spirit through powerful words, music, and movement. HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber welcomed guests, and Reverend Paul P. Martin, Esq. of Mt. Pisgah AME Church delivered a stirring

keynote address. Dr. Reverend Dorothy Patterson (Wallace Temple AME Zion Church) led the invocation, and Dr. Bertha Reels (Higher Dimension World Ministry) served as Mistress of Ceremonies. Closing remarks were offered by former HCCC Trustee Pamela Gardner, with additional greetings from members of the HCCC Board of Trustees and the Hudson County Board of County Commissioners.

The celebration featured dynamic performances highlighting African American culture and creativity. HCCC student Zaria Keith opened with the Black National Anthem, "Lift Every Voice and Sing." Tap dancer and artist Asha DaHomey shared expressive movement and storytelling, while Student Poet Laureate Nicole Spearman presented original

spoken word. University Academy Charter High School student Zion Daise-Torres performed a dance piece, and vocal and instrumental performances by Nia Caldwell, Desiree Huntley, Dion Mitchell, Keyon Hampton, and Nathaniel Saint Jean rounded out the evening.

Rooted in historical significance and vibrant cultural expression, HCCC's Juneteenth celebration paid tribute to the past while affirming a commitment to justice and joy in the present.

udson County Community College (HCCC) hosted its 12th annual "Girls in Technology Symposium," convening more than 200 students, professionals, and industry leaders to promote and support women in STEM. The event featured handson activities and motivational talks aimed at encouraging young women to explore techrelated fields. "Our annual event is all about sparking excitement in young women for STEM," said Chastity Farrell, HCCC's Assistant Vice President for Continuing Education and Workforce Development. "We want to help them explore career paths ... and support their journeys to find their passion."

The gathering featured an engaging discussion with a star-studded panel of women who forged different paths to successful careers in technology- and engineering-related fields. The panel was moderated by Alka Kustagi, Principal of a-Squared LLC, an architectural design firm. Panelists included Denise Dagadu, Partner Manager at Google; Ceallaigh Lorenz, Founder of Salvation Wellness; Allison Wesley-Jones, Senior Services Engagement Manager at life sciences software firm Veeva Systems;

Hilary Padget, Registered Architect, CPHD and Partner at pHdesign; and Jade Sessions, Software Engineer at the Farmer's Dog.

Xena Khan, a Computer Science and Cybersecurity major at HCCC, and President of HCCC's Girls Who Code Club, explained, "I was motivated to get into cybersecurity by the massive data breaches over the last few years – I realized that the industry needs skilled people to work on these complex challenges, and I want to be part of the solution."

Other activities included keynote speeches, networking opportunities, and hands-on workshops designed to equip attendees with experience and skills for the future. Additionally, there was a student display contest, which Laura Salamanca Rojas and Helen Ortega of North Bergen High School won for their display on instant cameras, and a student essay contest, won by Gisella Guerra of Jose Marti STEM Academy, who delivered opening remarks. ALUMNI CORNER

Dr. Nadia S. Dob, PharmD

A.S. Biology, HCCC Class of 2019

Dr. Nadia S. Dob recently earned her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from Rutgers University and completed her residency at Virtua Health. She will pursue a Postgraduate Year Two (PGY-2) residency in Oncology at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester, New York.



How did you decide to attend HCCC?

When I moved to the United States in the summer of 2016, fresh out of high school in Algeria, everything was new, uncertain, and overwhelming. I had no idea where to start, but I was determined to continue my education. HCCC was the closest college to where I lived, and I had a friend, another Algerian student, who went through the process before. She came with my sister and me to help us register. We took the placement test, enrolled in ESL classes, and just like that, my journey in American higher education began.

How did HCCC help you to get to where you are today?

Looking back, HCCC wasn't just a starting point — it was the right starting point. The small class sizes allowed for personalized attention, and I always felt seen and supported. Both the Academic and Student Affairs departments were incredibly helpful. As a new immigrant navigating an unfamiliar education system, I had so many questions, and the staff at HCCC never hesitated to guide me. Their support played a huge role in shaping the path I'm on

Tell us about your educational journey since HCCC.

After completing all the prerequisites and earning my Associate of Science in Biology at HCCC, I transferred to the Ernest Mario School of Pharmacy at Rutgers University. In May 2024, I proudly graduated with my Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) degree. It has been a long and transformative journey, and it all started with that placement test at HCCC.

How did you become interested in a career as a pharmacist?

My interest in pharmacy was inspired by both personal and family experiences. I grew up surrounded by healthcare - my aunt and uncle were nurses, my father is a chemist, and my mother is a biologist. Science was in my blood. But the true turning point came in December 2016. Just months after moving to the U.S., I experienced a health scare caused by an over-the-counter medication. That incident made me realize how important it is to understand the medications we take and the impact they can have. From that moment on, I knew I wanted to educate others about safe medication use and prevent similar incidents from happening to others.

What does your workday look like?

Today, I am pursuing a postgraduate residency — an intensive one-year training program for pharmacists — as I work toward becoming a clinical pharmacist. My day usually starts early in the morning. Depending on the rotation, which right now is Pediatrics and NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit), I review patient charts, assess medication appropriateness, check for drug interactions, monitor for side effects, and ensure each medication regimen is safe and effective. I then make the rounds with the medical team to discuss each patient in detail.

My afternoons are filled with verifying discharge prescriptions, participating in topic discussions, and following up on longitudinal projects related to medication safety, research, and clinical administration. Each day brings a new learning opportunity.

What are your next career goals?

One of the most exciting milestones in my journey just happened — I recently matched for a Postgraduate Year Two (PGY-2) residency in Oncology at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester, New York! I'm beyond excited to begin this next chapter and to take a big step closer to my goal of becoming an oncology clinical pharmacist. Cancer care has always been an area I'm passionate about, and I feel incredibly grateful to have the opportunity to specialize in it.

Can you tell us about a challenge you overcame on your way to what you've accomplished?

Of course, this journey hasn't been without its challenges. As an immigrant, one of the hardest obstacles was the language barrier and adjusting to the U.S. education system, which was very different from what I knew back home. But thanks to the supportive community at HCCC — from my advisors to the EOF program — I was able to piece things together and move forward, one step at a time.
