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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ANNOUNCE APPOINTMENT OF NEW PRESIDENT

ty Community College (HCCC) Board of Trustees announced that on May 8, the Trustees appointed Christopher M. Reber, Ph.D. to serve as the next President of the College. Dr. Reber will be installed to that office effective July 1, 2018. He is succeeding Glen Gabert, Ph.D., who is retiring from HCCC after more than 25 years as President.

Mr. Netchert said Dr. Reber was chosen from several candidates in a national search that began in January and was conducted by the Association of Community College Trustees. The search committee was chaired by HCCC Trustee, the Honorable Judge Kevin Callahan. HCCC Trustee Vice Chair Bakari J. Lee, Esq. served as Vice Chair of the search committee. Staff members of the College, as well as Hudson County community stakeholders, served as committee members.

"The College was looking for an experienced leader with a record of excellence and innovation to continue building upon the framework that has been established during Dr. Gabert's tenure, and Dr. Reber is that individual," Mr. Netchert said.

In its search document, the College stated it was seeking "an educational leader with firsthand knowledge of emerging trends in higher education and technology, who is also diplo-



matic, compassionate, and capable of overseeing this multicampus urban institution located in the highly competitive New York City metropolitan area."

Dr. Reber has devoted his 37-year career to higher education. He is currently President of Community College of Beaver County (CCBC) near Pittsburgh, PA, having assumed office there in July 2014. At CCBC, Dr. Reber focused on growth and meeting the needs of students and the community. He led new initiatives in support of a student-centered learning environment; strategic enrollment management; regional partnerships; career and educational pathways; di-

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE CLASS OF 2018 PROUDLY ACCEPT THEIR DIPLOMAS AT THE COLLEGE'S 41ST ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT CEREMONIES



In what is likely one of the most important evenings of their lives, the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Class of 2018 was joined by family and friends, as well as elected officials, and HCCC Trustees, administrators, faculty, and staff for a graduation celebration. The College's 41st Commencement ceremonies took place at New Jersey Performing Arts Center in Newark on Thursday, May 17.

Following an invocation led by Mount Olive Baptist Church Pastor Reverend John McReynolds, HCCC President Glen Gabert, Ph.D. delivered welcoming remarks and introduced Hudson County Executive Thomas DeGise and HCCC Board of Trustees Chair William J. Netchert, both of whom spoke.

HCCC Instructor of Theater Arts Joseph Gallo then introduced the keynote speaker, award-winning Broadway and television actor, composer, and lyricist Christopher Jackson, who is best known for his role as George Washington in the Broadway hit musical, Hamilton.

Mr. Jackson began his address by telling the graduates: "It is statistically impossible to count the number of things that had to go right in order for you to walk across the stage this evening. Some of you are the first in your families to graduate from college. Some of you had to overcome some incredibly long odds to finish – language barriers, cultural barriers, economic obstacles, crazy Presidents, times when it seemed like no one else in the world could understand what you were going through. But it wasn't blind luck that brought you here. Your hard work, your discipline, application of your education and studies, your resilience got you here. You earned this."

Mr. Jackson expressed that as a society, we are in desperate need of miracles today as much of our discourse is guided by hate, fear, doubt, and cynicism. "But I see hope in

versity; advancement and grant development; and continuous improvement. CCBC is an Achieving the Dream Leader College and offers 75 degree, certificate and diploma programs, hundreds of Continuing Education and Workforce Development programs, seamless transfer to a wide variety of baccalaureate and graduate institutions, and a nationally distinctive high school academy dual enrollment program. The Aspen Institute named CCBC one of America's Top 150 community colleges in 2017.

Before arriving at CCBC, Dr. Reber served for 12 years as the Executive Dean of Venango College of Clarion University of Pennsylvania, where he was the chief executive and academic officer. His career also includes 18 years at Penn State Erie, The Behrend College, where he served on the senior management team as the Chief Development, University Relations, and Alumni Affairs Officer during a successful \$50 million capital campaign; and Chief Student Affairs Officer during a period of major college growth.

Dr. Reber holds a bachelor's degree in Latin from Dickinson College, a master's degree in college student personnel administration from Bowling Green State University, and a Ph.D. in higher education from the University of Pittsburgh. He also holds a post-graduate certificate from Harvard University's Graduate School of Education.

"I am honored to have this opportunity to join the HCCC community and continue the transformational work underway to serve students and the region," said Dr. Reber. "HCCC offers life-changing educational opportunities for career development, upward social mobility and greatly improved quality of life for the region's people and institutions. I am thrilled to begin this next chapter of my career and work side by side with HCCC Trustees, faculty, staff, students, community leaders and other members and partners of this regionally and nationally distinctive institution."

"We want to thank the members of the search committee for assisting us in finding and selecting such a well-qualified candidate, and ensuring that the process was open, democratic, and fair," Mr. Netchert stated. He mentioned that the process involved screening resumes and CVs and conducting video interviews with the more than a dozen candidates selected from the several dozen who applied; then holding a series of community meetings with each of the three, final, outstanding candidates (where attendees were able to question the candidates and anonymously provide their opinions of the candidates); and finally, conducting formal interviews with the Trustees. Chairman Netchert said: "The diligence used in the selection of Dr. Reber shows that the greater good of the community and the College was clearly foremost in the search committee's work."

"We look forward to working with Dr. Reber in continuing to grow Hudson County Community College in a manner that focuses on the needs of our community and is based in excellence," Mr. Netchert said.

In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern, and contemporary collections.

Dear Dr. Gabert,

For over seven years, this column has been anonymous, but this month I must come out of hiding to thank you personally for an outstanding job.

Eight years ago, you hired me to coordinate the Foundation Art Collection. At the time there were 25 artworks installed on the campus from the Collection. By the time we finish our installations for this year, there will be over 1,000 works on the walls, many by major American artists. I believe we now have the finest community college art collection in the nation. You had a huge – and extremely quiet – role in this successful project. Thank you.

Because much of your generosity happened behind the scenes, I want to illuminate some of the work that Joseph Sansone, myself, the College workers, and our great Federal Work Study student assistants accomplished during the last few years with your able, intelligent support.

First of all, when I got here, you walked me around campus, through every building and every floor, and you provided the vision for what this Collection could be. You said that seeing art in your young life had influenced your education a great deal in a positive way. You wanted the Hudson County Community College students, faculty, staff, and the community to experience that gift as well. You said we should make the College itself, the entire interior areas, into an "Educational Art Museum." You wanted art in the public areas of every corridor of every building.

I did not know how we could accomplish this, since at the time we had enough art to put two — maybe three – works in each building. Also, by then I had become acquainted with our budget, which was fumes. Our budget for the entire year was less than what we spent on *one* picture frame at my last job.

Joe showed me a desk in a cubicle. There was a computer, a phone, and a partition on which I could pin my calendar and some personal photographs. Joe said, "You have got a job. Go get art." You

both introduced me to Ben Dineen, the Foundation Board Member who had been an art dealer; and Ben then introduced me to the art world here. The 700+ donations of fine art and historic artifacts which we have received started with that amazing introduction

You encouraged us to build a collection that reflected the extraordinary diversity of our community. There are many metrics by which we can measure our success. Here are some: On average, works by women comprise less than 5% of American art collections. Here at the Foundation Art Collection, works by women comprise over 50% of the Collection. We have corridors of work devoted to art of the African Diaspora, contemporary Hispanic art, contemporary Japanese art, and work by many other people from many places. When we came upon an artwork that was perfect for our Collection and too dear for our budget, you stepped up personally (with your husband Greg Ratcliff, the soul of kindness and discernment). Using the donor match program where every dollar donated to the Foundation Art Collection is matched by both the Foundation Board and the Board of Trustees-you two made the contribution to the program that made that purchase possible. You were quiet about this; and I'm sorry, but I'm blowing your cover. Some of the works you personally contributed, or that we bought through the match program are depicted on this page. There is not room for all of them.

Every month, you checked in and made sure things were going well. You and Joe worked behind the scenes to keep the donations coming, and to make sure the art installation ran smoothly. When we were baffled by the placement of a huge or unusual artwork, your expert eye helped us find the perfect location. You carried the vision, mentored the project, and tirelessly supported our good work. Most importantly, you gave this Foundation Art Collection the intellectual freedom to do the right thing (without ANY editorial interference). For eight years.

I see the fruits of our labor when I speak with the students about the art on the walls, and when students come back after graduating to tell me they

The HCCC Foundation is a nonprofit 501 (c) (3) corporation giving tax-exempt status to contributors. Since it was established in 1997, the Foundation has provided deserving students with scholarships totaling more than \$2.65 million.

The HCCC Foundation Art Collection, valued at over \$1 million, represents America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history, from the Hudson River School period to the present. Included are more than 1,000 paintings, lithographs, photographs, sculptures, American craft pottery, and more by major artists such as Man Ray, Ben Shahn, Joan Snyder, and Marcel Duchamp. A growing collection of emerging and established New Jersey artists is included. Themes include diversity, urban life, science, technology, United States history and culture, and architecture. The Collection was established in 2006 to coincide with the initiation of the College's Fine Arts program. The Foundation Art Collection is displayed throughout the College's Journal Square and North Hudson Campus buildings.

The third cycle of the Supply Chain Management program celebrated its graduation on Thursday, April 12, 2018. Twelve students participated in this third cycle: Geronimo Rganit, John Parker, Walter Roque, Anabel Damacela, Douglas Ferrell, Hugo Gonzalez, Joseph Tangalin, Liaqat Bhatti, Maria Pusateri, Albert Shin, Dalia Rosa, and Lamarquis Patten. Each student brought his or her diverse background in Supply Chain and logistics. One of the students, Albert Shin, was referred by Associate Dean Paul Dillon's Business, Culinary Arts & Hospitality Management Division. Mr. Shin, a matriculated student, was able to use the articulation agreement and add 9 credit in Supply Chain Management to his Business degree. These are credits that he can later transfer when he goes to a four-year college to attain a Bachelor's degree.

During this cycle, the students had an opportunity to work with Roy Tapia, a Supply Chain

Management recruiter. Roy works for SearcHire, a company he founded 15 years ago. Unlike other recruiter, Roy works to help companies find good workers. He had heard about the program at Hudson County Community College and reach out with the hope to volunteer. "I work on the phone all day, I never get to meet candidates face to face and I wanted the opportunity to help out and come face to face with those I am assisting which I find very rewarding," explained Roy. He helps students with their resumes by providing expert feedback to get them ready for the workforce. Roy has found very good jams here at Hudson. "I have found a lot of good candidates here and I have sent some resumes to my clients."

Another great addition to the program, and what has made the program successful, is having an instructor like Stuart Rosenberg. He has years of experience in Supply Chain. He has also had experience as a trainer. Recently, Mr. Rosenberg

wrote a book titled, The Global Supply Chain and Risk Management. When asked what prompted him to write a book on the subject, Stuart stated, "The chosen topic represents my attempt to respond to the growing demand for better understanding of supply chain management from managers, academics, and students alike. Most of my courses on supply chain management were targeted at the undergraduate and mid-level management levels, from which I have learned and enjoyed as much as my students do. The most important lesson I learned is that supply chain management is a dynamic and evolving subject. It is not a subject that just needs to be taught, but the one needs to be constantly developed. To certain extent, this book will hopefully contribute to such a development."

BREAD BAKERS GUILD OF AMERICA PRESENTS 'THE SCIENCE BEHIND SOURDOUGH' AT HCCC'S CULINARY ARTS INSTITUTE



On April 27 and 28, the Bread Bakers Guild of America hosted a two-day course, "The Science Behind Sourdough," at Hudson County Community College's Culinary Arts Institute. Chef Karen Bornarth and microbiologist Debra Wink facilitated the course.,,

n April 27th and 28th food came to life in Hudson County's premier culinary institution. Artisan bread bakers as well as home bakers from across the nation came together to learn from Chef Karen Bornarth and microbiologist Debra Wink about sourdough. The Bread Bakers Guild chose to use the HCCC Culinary Arts Institute to host "The Science Behind Sourdough" class. Our culinary and baking students shared their talent by preparing lunch for all the participants. They also volunteered to assist the chefs during the class.

The Bread Bakers Guild of America is a community of those passionate about bread, whether they are professionals in the industry, farmers, students, home bakers, and the like. The guild promotes and supports artisan baking, providing a community forum and sources for its members to learn more as the world of bread baking continues to advance. These bakers turned students came to better understand what happens during the process of fermentation in sourdough making, and the different effects controlled fermentation has on their breads.

Along with getting to make a variety of sourdoughs with Chef Karen, Mrs. Debra Wink gave in depth lectures behind the chemistry of fermentation and the processes that occur when yeasts and microorganisms get a hold of that dough. Mrs. Wink also provided an acid testing so that students could understand the right balance they are looking for to get that classic sour taste in their breads. Chef Karen has an extensive career in bread. After graduating from the Culinary Institute of America, she went on to work as a production baker at Amy's Bread, a teacher at the French Culinary Institute, a worker in product development and quality control at Le Pain Quotidien, and currently works as the Training Director at Hot Bread Kitchen. You could easily see her ease and skill with bread as she moved around in our kitchen. Mrs. Debra Wink studied microbiology and works as a medical technologist. Intrigued by bread starters and applying her science background and knowledge, she fell in love with bread and has moved from joining the Bread Bakers Guild to having her literature appear in Bread lines and Fideles au bon pain, as well as teaching classes for the guild. It's safe to say that the students were rolling with the experts.




Celebrating Glen Gabert, Ph.D.





Glen Gabert and the Growth of Hudson County Community College



Glen Gabert, Ph.D. was installed as President of Hudson County Community College in September 1992. He was the fifth president or acting president to serve the College in three years.

At that time, the College was a deeply distressed institution which had experienced interventions by the New Jersey Secretary of Higher Education and Middle States. Every area of operation was in need of reform. There were just 3,076 students enrolled. The Board of Trustees had been asked to resign. There were discussions about dividing HCCC between two nearby colleges, or closing it altogether. There was little confidence for HCCC within the institution and the community.

Armed with a vision of what the College could be, knowledge of what the community needed, and an appropriation of \$250,000 from the New Jersey Department of Higher Education and County of Hudson, Dr. Gabert and the Trustees formulated a strategic plan. They worked with faculty, staff, elected officials, and the community to transform the College.



In 1992, HCCC was largely focused on developmental education programs with limited career and transfer programs. Today, the College has more than 60 degree and certificate programs. HCCC programs are nationally and regionally recognized for excellence with numerous awards and commendations. Additionally, the HCCC Culinary Arts program is now ranked number eight in the U.S. and the HCCC Practical Nursing program is the number two program in New Jersey.

Under Dr. Gabert's direction, HCCC is now student- and community-centered, and focused on fostering understanding and attaining success. The HCCC Johnson Center for Academic and Support Services has been recognized for its excellent, innovative programs. HCCC graduates are accepted at and attend New Jersey colleges and universities, as well as prestigious universities and technical schools throughout the country.

In 1992, the College owned one facility. Collegeowned, state-of-the-art, comfortable, safe buildings close to public transportation were a key feature of the reformation plan. Dr. Gabert and the Board of Trustees worked with administrators from various New Jersey departments and local elected officials. They obtained support and capital appropriations from the State of New Jersey and the County of Hudson, as well as grants funding – more than \$300 million in all

Today, HCCC operates two fully accredited campuses – Journal Square (Jersey City) and North Hudson (Union City) with more than a dozen HCCC-owned buildings. (A new eight-story tower with student center and gym on the Journal Square campus will open in 2020.)

Growing with and for the Community

The philosophy Dr. Gabert brought to the College dictated that having a presence within the community goes beyond buildings, and must include establishing relationships with students and residents via educational and cultural events that are free of cost to those attending.

Each year HCCC hosts a lecture series featuring nationally renowned speakers. Other programming includes reading and literacy events for families, holiday parties for area children, and job fairs. The College has opened its facilities to the public and made the Library and its resources (books, materials, and computers) available, and the Culinary Conference Center provides spaces for seminars, trainings, and special events for companies, organizations, and individuals at lower-than market rates.

In 2015, the College held the first annual, monthlong "LGBTQIA Pride Fest," which now includes a fundraiser for the HCCC Georgia Brooks Memorial Fund and a daylong LGBTQIA conference. Proceeds for scholarships are matched by the Foundation.

The HCCC Department of Cultural Affairs, which was established in September 2015, celebrates the community and its diversity throughout the year with a variety of free, culturally enriching offerings. These include art exhibits, artists' lectures, book clubs, plus performing arts presentations. Trips to performing arts and Broadway shows, ballgames, and ecological events, are also offered to the community at deep discounts.

The HCCC Foundation

In the 1992 strategic plan, Dr. Gabert recommended that the College have a working Foundation that would seek funds, equipment, and other assistance from alumni and area businesses. In December 1997, the inaugural meeting of the HCCC Foundation was held, and in 1999 the first Foundation scholarships were awarded to 24 HCCC students. In the time since, HCCC students have been the recipients of nearly \$3 million in scholarships. Additionally, the Foundation provides free student-success programs, stipends for faculty development, seed money for new and innovative programs, and capital to assist the College's physical expansion.

The HCCC Foundation Art Collection was instituted in 2006 to coincide with the start of the College's Fine Arts studies program. Each dollar contributed is matched by the HCCC Foundation and the College itself. The Collection now includes over 1,000 works of art by noted New Jersey and U.S. artists which are displayed in the public spaces of every HCCC building. Throughout the year, the College hosts a series of "Foundation Art Talks," featuring artists and art experts. These sessions are open to the public free of charge.

In a presentation Dr. Gabert made to the College community in September 2015, the closing slide read: "Obstacles are those things you see when you take your eyes off your goals." Having a plan, enlisting the right people to work as a team, and finding resources – human and financial – to make plans realities is how Glen Gabert transformed Hudson County Community College from a troubled entity into an institution of first choice.



WORK CONTINUES ON CRIMINAL JUSTICE ARTICULATIONS



ichard Walker (Lecturer, Criminal Justice) and Phil Cafasso (Interim Associate Dean of Social Sciences and Humanities) met with Eric Friedman, Ph.D. (Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs) and John Marlin, Ph.D. (Dean of Instruction) to finalize the steps in articulation agreement revisions with city and county criminal justice agencies.

Mr. Walker amended the agreements to reflect an increased number of Prior Learning Assessment (PLA) credits to Jersey City Police officers, Hudson County Sheriff officers, and Hudson County Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation officers. Officers from JCPD and the Sheriff's Department will have the opportunity to earn 15 credits of criminal justice courses if they enroll in Hudson County Community College's criminal justice degree program within five years of graduating from the police academy. Correctional officers will earn 9 credits if they enroll within five years of completing the corrections academy. The Prior Learning Assessment credits are aligned with the course modules taught at the police academy and corrections academy in New Jersey.

Senior administration from the three respective agencies will be invited to the Journal Square Campus for a formal signing of the documents at a later date. The agreements will go into effective immediately after HCCC has obtained all required signatures.



Associate in Science & Mathematics - Biology

What factors led you to decide to attend HCCC?

I had just moved from Texas to New Jersey. I had never been to school in the U.S. I knew that there would be some basic courses that I would have to take in college, and HCCC made it possible to do this at a reasonable cost. I also wanted to be somewhere that had a lot of diversity, and HCCC provided me

What is your favorite memory of the College, in or out of the classroom?

I liked the small classes. I also remember being part of College Student Success. I started out needing tutoring in math and after my first or second semester, I was the one tutoring people. I also made a lot of good friends at HCCC and I still keep in touch with a couple of them. In fact, I am the godmother to the daughter of one of them. I remember some weekends, we would just go walk around in NYC. Those were fun times that I cherish to this day.

How did you become interested in your career?

When I was about 7 years old, I chipped my two front teeth one day when I was running. It didn't bleed but was overly sensitive. I didn't see a dentist then but was told to rinse my mouth with salt water and it was going to get better since seeing a dentist was very expensive. It did get better, but at that moment I decided that I wanted to become a dentist. I never actually saw a dentist until I moved to the U.S. from Nigeria . I think I was about 19 by then.

How did your time at HCCC prepare you for

It was a good starting point for me. I grew up in Nigeria and our educational system was more like the British educational system. HCCC was a good way for me to get my feet wet in the U.S. educational system. I took my basic classes at HCCC . I had no difficulty at all transferring my credits.

What is your typical day like?

I guess I have to try to summarize how I got to where I am today. Here you go. I got my Associate degree in math and biology from HCCC, transferred my credits to Rutgers-Newark and got a Bachelor's in Biology and minor in Chemistry. I started dental school at the University of Connecticut in 2012 and graduated in 2016 with my D.M.D. During dental school, I realized that I really liked the surgical aspects of dentistry and head and neck as a whole. That's when I decided that I wanted to become an oral and maxillofacial surgeon (OMFS). I took the CBSE exam in my second year of dental school and applied in my third year. I matched at University of Alabama OMFS program, Class of 2022. It's a six-year program, during which time you also get an M.D. degree. Here is a breakdown of our training:

- First year: OMFS intern year (i.e., really hard year)
- Second year: third year of medical school
- Third year fourth year of medical school (you take all your board exams, then you graduate medical school, i.e., get your M.D.)
- Fourth year General surgery intern year (an

other hard year)

- Fifth year OMFS service
- Sixth year OMFS service chief (graduate and get your OMFS certificate)



Now back to my typical day. I am in my third year of medical school. I just finished my OB/GYN rotation. A typical day on the obstetrics service is round at 4:30 a.m. I deliver a couple of babies and just run the floor. As a med student, my day typically ends at 5 p.m. It's a little different when I'm on call.

What is the most memorable project you have worked on?

The mission trip I did in dental school to Galapagos. We were there for 10 days and provided dental care to over 400 residents at Isabella Island. The people there were extremely friendly and so grateful. We worked long hours, but it never felt so because time flies by when you are doing something you enjoy doing. I think that was also where I did my first root canal treatment. The patient was very nice and tolerated the treatment very well. I, on the other hand couldn't stop thinking about how an endodontist does this all day, every day. I guess that's why I chose to do surgery. No shade to any endodontist out there. They are awesome folks!

Who are your biggest inspirations that have impacted your work in some way?

I am an immigrant black woman who is trying to join a field that is predominated by men. I have to find inspirations somewhere to keep me going every day. My family inspires me a great deal, even when I make "crazy" decisions like going to school for six more years after dental school to become a surgeon. I think I still have to explain the entire OMFS educational process to my dad every time I see him. People like the late Nelson Mandela, Barack and Michelle Obama inspire me. We need more people of color and women in the STEM fields. I just watched Black Panther and was so happy when I saw the female character who was an engineer. You have no idea how happy that made me. Movies like that inspire me. Most of all, my inspiration comes from the people around me - whether good or bad. Folks that ask me every day if I am an illegal immigrant or how I am possibly a doctor inspire the heck out of me. It just gives me the drive to study more, help more and achieve more than anyone would ever expect of me. Seeing the smile on the face of a little old woman or a young black girl when I walk into her room in a white coat and she sees that I am her doctor is a huge inspiration for me. We can't forget our past, but we can change our future.

What advice do you have for those students who are just starting their college careers?

Just do it! We hold the keys to our future and we create the pathway on what we want in life. It may seem long and redundant now, but you will be where you want to be if you keep working at it. Seek help early. HCCC has a lot of tutoring services. Utilize them. Don't be afraid to reach for the stars. It doesn't end in an associate degree. That's just the starting point.
