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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE HOLDS VIRTUAL COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY AND IN-PERSON GRADUATION WALKS

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) honored graduates with a combination of virtual and in-person 2021 Commencement celebrations. They included the Virtual Commencement that premiered on Thursday, May 20 on YouTube; and in-person Grad Walk events Monday, May 24 through Thursday, May 27, 2021, at the HCCC Culinary Conference Center, 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City.

"We worked diligently to ensure that the May 2021 Commencement experience would be exciting, celebratory, and, above all, safe for our graduates, their families, and the entire community," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. The format for the events was determined utilizing information from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), New Jersey Office of the Secretary of Higher Education (OSHE), and input from a survey of graduating HCCC students.

The pre-recorded Virtual Commencement featured speeches and customized slides for graduates. The speakers included Dr. Reber; HCCC 2021 Valedictorian Pedro Moranchel; and entrepreneur, veteran, best-selling author, and CEO of Robin Hood, Wes Moore, who delivered the keynote address. Robin Hood is one of the largest anti-poverty forces in the nation.

The optional Grad Walk events allow members of the HCCC Class of 2021, as well as those who graduated in 2019-2020, to celebrate in cap-and-gown with up to three guests each. Graduates processed across the stage in the HCCC Culinary Conference Center Banquet Room, where they were cheered on by a small group of faculty and staff. Each graduate had the opportunity for traditional diploma photos.

The Grad Walk events were live-streamed. Participants were required to wear masks and observe social distancing.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE 2021 VALEDICTORIAN, PEDRO MORANCHEL, ACCEPTED TO PRINCETON

udson County Community College (HCCC) announced that Pedro Moranchel, the Class of 2021 Valedictorian, was recently accepted as a transfer student to Princeton University. He is one of just 16 students in the nation to be offered the opportunity to participate in the Princeton Undergraduate Transfer Admission Program. Mr. Moranchel was chosen from a pool of more than 1,300 applicants.

"Everyone at the College joins me in congratulating this exceptional young man," said HCCC President Chris Reber. "Pedro is an exemplary student, caring and involved citizen, and gracious and thoughtful person. He embodies the spirit and determination of our students and our College. We know he will continue doing great things."

Pedro Moranchel is a Physics major, an Honors student, and the son of Mexican and Honduran immigrants whose struggles motivated him to set ambitious academic goals and work hard. He was recently named the recipient of the prestigious and highly competitive 2021 Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship for his academic ability and achievement, financial need, leadership, persistence, and service. Only 72 students in the United States were selected as recipients this year. The award covers educational expenses to complete baccalaureate degrees – including tuition, living expenses, books and required fees –up to \$40,000 per year for up to three years, with an opportunity for additional funding sup-

port for graduate study. He is also an Achieving the Dream (ATD) Scholar.

A mentor and leader in the College community, Pedro is Vice President of Scholarship for the College's chapter of Phi Theta Kappa Internation-



al Honor Society, President of the HCCC STEM Club, and Director of the Inter-Club Council of the HCCC Student Government Association. He participated in the Summer Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REU) program at Queensborough Community College, which was funded by the National Science Foundation, and a 10-week internship at the Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory. He has worked as a volunteer in several environmental clean-up projects in Hudson County. Pedro's goal is to improve student success and close achievement gaps for historically underserved student populations, and he plans to produce diversity programs connected to STEM as a professor or person of influence in Hudson County.

"I'd like to thank everyone at HCCC for the support they have given me personally, professionally, and academically," Pedro said. "This encouraging environment truly has changed the trajectory of my family and me."



he Construction Management Program at Hudson County Community College has received a grant of \$298,806 over a three-year period (September 2021 – August 2024). It is the largest NSF grant received in College history. The primary objectives of this grant are to develop structured partnerships with local employers, seek to develop a strong advisory board to ensure the rigor and relevance of the Construction Management program, and provide recommendations to update the program as needed.

The administration team for the grant includes:

- Co-Principal Investigator: Prof. Engr. Raja Javaid (Adjunct Instructor – Construction Management)
- Co-Principal Investigator: Prof. Engr. Khursheed Khan (Adjunct Instructor – Construction Management)

Construction Management is the planning, coordinating, and building of a project from conception to completion. The Associate in Applied Science Degree trains students to coordinate and supervise all phases of modern-day construction including all types of public, residential, commercial, and industrial structures, as well as roads, memorials, and bridges. They are exposed to new construction methods, protocols, materials, testing procedures, cost estimation, and management principles. The program also facilitates students to get externship opportunities for practical hands-on experiences.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE APPOINTS YEURYS PUJOLS AS THE INAUGURAL VICE PRESIDENT FOR DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION

t its May 11, 2021 meeting, the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Board of Trustees approved the appointment of Yeurys Pujols to be the College's inaugural Vice President for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI). The appointment will be effective July 1, 2021.

HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber recommended the appointment, in consultation with the Board of Trustees Executive Committee, based on Mr. Pujols' leadership experience; support of the College's nationally distinctive diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives; and feedback from many members of the College community.

Yeurys Pujols is Executive Director of the HCCC North Hudson Campus. Born in the Dominican Republic, he moved to New Jersey at the age of 13. Mr. Pujols joined the College in 2006. After serving as Counselor and History Instructor, he was appointed Director of Enrollment and Student Services in 2010.

Mr. Pujols is currently enrolled in the doctoral program in Community College Leadership at New Jersey City University (NJCU). He holds a Diversity and Inclusion Certificate from Cornell University, a Master of Arts degree in Diplomacy and International Relations from Seton Hall University, and a Bachelor of Arts degree in History from New Jersey City University. Proudly, Mr. Pujols is a Hudson County Community College graduate who earned an Associate of Arts degree in 2001.

Mr. Pujols presides as Co-Chair of the HCCC President's Advisory Council for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI), and is a member of the North Hudson Scholarship Committee, the Enrollment Management Council, the President's Executive Council, and All College Council. He also serves as the College's Deputy Compliance Officer and Deputy Title IX Coordinator, and was Co-Chair of the College's Middle



States Commission on Higher Education committee that focused on governance, leadership and administration. His professional affiliations include HCCC's Alumni Association, Latino Advisory Council, African American Outreach Committee, Boys to Leaders Foundation, "Juventud Ecuatorieana," and Save Latin America, which recognized Pujols for his educational leadership with the Juan Pablo Duarte Award, named in honor of the patrician of the Domincan Republic, at their "Los Tres Proceres Antillanos" Annual Gala in 2020.

A dedicated husband and father of twins, Mr. Pujols is a leader devoted to the mission, vision, and values of HCCC and the surrounding community.

Dr. Reber thanked Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Darryl Jones, who chaired the Vice President for DEI Screening Committee and led the interview process; and all members of the Screening Committee for their time and commitment to this internal search. "This was an affirming process that again demonstrates the strong talent and commitment of our HCCC team," Dr. Reber said.

n Wednesday, May 12, 2021, Vice Chair of the HCCC Board of Trustees, Bakari Lee, was our featured speaker for the Spring's closing out session of Our Stories Untold Series. Trustee Lee talked about his experience as a son who cherished his time with his father, the life lessons that he picked up along the way, and the challenges he faced as a young professional trying to get "his foot in the door" of a new profession. He mentioned how his admiration for his father led him to fashion himself after him, a principled man who modeled a life of perseverance. Trustee Lee shared his fantastic upbringing and beautiful childhood. HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE EXTENDS MORATORIUM ON TUITION AND FEE INCREASES FOR SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR

I udson County Community College (HCCC)
Trustees have voted unanimously to freeze
the costs of tuition and fees for the second
consecutive year.

HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber said the Board voted to maintain the current level of tuition and fees with no increases continuing throughout the 2021-22 academic year. The extension will include this year's Summer II and Fall semester classes, as well as the 2022 Winter, Spring, and Summer I sessions.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has been physically, emotionally, and financially devastating for our students and our community," Dr. Reber said. "This is the right thing to do in spite of the financial constraints of the pandemic on our College and all higher education institutions."

The tuition rate for in-county residents will remain at \$149 per credit, the out-of-county rate at \$298 per credit, and the out-of-state and international rate at \$440 per credit. The \$25 per term registration fee, \$6.50 per credit student life fee, \$25 per credit general service fee, and \$18 per credit technology fee will also remain the same.


"In the post-pandemic world, a college education will be even more vital in securing – or tran-

sitioning to – quality, stable, well-paying jobs and careers," Dr. Reber stated. A recent McKinsey Global Institute report predicts that one of every ten U.S. workers will likely be forced to leave their present jobs and take up new occupations because of the pandemic. The most sought-after careers will include health professionals, health aides and technicians, cybersecurity experts, data analysts and managers, and financial advisors.

HCCC offers a vast array of financial assistance programs for students, including HCCC Foundation Scholarships, and federal and state resources including the New Jersey Community College Opportunity Grant program, which provided \$3.3 million in funding to over 3,000 HCCC students during the 2020-21 academic year alone. The College also provides students experiencing COVID-related financial hardships with federal stimulus and other funding. To date, the College has disbursed \$5,681,556 to 4,620 recipients, or an average of \$1,230 awarded to each student recipient.

Natalie Akel is a first-generation American, whose family roots are in Dominican Republic and Lebanon. She received a Bachelor of Arts in English from the University of Vermont in 2017, and then chose to pursue a nursing degree at HCCC. A Full-Spectrum Doula who provides support to birthing people and their communities in Hudson County and beyond, she plans to become a midwife.

Throughout her educational journey, poetry has remained Ms. Akel's consistent go-to when she needs to process, escape, or express her feelings, frustrations, and fears. During her time at Red Bank High School, she won the coveted national silver medal in the 2011 Scholastic Art & Writing Awards.

ARTIST NEWS

If you like the portrait of our former College president, Dr. Glen Gabert, on the sixth floor of the eponymous Gabert Library, you might enjoy making a quick trip to Hudson, New York, to see a group exhibition which includes the artist Mark Beard's work at Carrie Haddad Gallery through June 6. Beard paints under many different personas, each of which has a different name and style. Our portrait of Dr. Gabert is painted by his Bruce Sargeant persona which is featured in this exhibit. The gallery notes that this style (and the artist's name), "is inspired by the fashion photography of Bruce Weber and figurative painting of John Singer Sargent, but takes it into a realm all its own as themes and figures are reinterpreted to fit into his character's historical narrative. Sargeant is best known for his oil paintings made in the 1930's that celebrate the male form."

Artist Chakaia Booker, whose tire sculptures are installed in the STEM Building lobby and in the first floor of 70 Sip Avenue, was featured in a recent New York Times article. Why does she work in tires? "The material was just there," she said. "I was looking, like everybody else, trying various things. When the tires came in, it was like, I gotcha! And I didn't look back." The article discusses her sources for her materials. For example, Michelin sends her used racecar and motorcycle tires. The Times also describes her work in that medium: "Distinctive and idiosyncratic, her oeuvre transcends the material's utilitarian vocation and belies its uniformity. The sculptures can be robust and monumental, or finely detailed and uncannily tender. Some are almost figurative, the rubber cut, flexed and positioned in layers or strands to evoke the human body or more cryptic forms." The artist herself says, "It's infinite in its possibilities.... It just depends on your imagination." The article was published is in conjunction with her first show in more than a decade, and her largest show ever, at the Institute of Contemporary Art in Miami. If you're feeling frisky now that our country is recovering from quarantine, the show runs through October, and might be worth a quick road trip. The exhibition also includes her work in other media, such as painting, photography, printmaking, and ceramics. (Here at HCCC, we also have examples of her print work in the first floor Media Center of the Nursing Program at 870 Bergen, and the sec-



ond floor of the Gabert Library.)

Nancy Cohen, whose work is installed in the new Hudson Helps Resource Center on the third floor of 70 Sip Avenue, and in the Mezzanine reception area of 870 Bergen, is featured in a new show, "Atlas of Impermanence," at the Visual Arts Center of New Jersey in Summit. The work will be on view until June 13, and then again from Sept. 3-26. If you've seen the work in the Hudson Helps area, and puzzled over how an artist can call something a drawing when it is made of rusted iron or of drizzled rubber, this show is an exhibit to explore! The artist writes, "It's work on a very large scale, entirely in handmade paper; I call the pieces drawings, but studio visitors have likened them to tapestries or paintings. ... The show also includes a suspended glass installation." Timed tickets are necessary. so call ahead to make your reservation at 908-273-9121.

If you like Judy Pfaff's work installed in the new Hudson Helps Resource Center on the third floor of 70 Sip Avenue, you might enjoy taking a trip to her new exhibit, "ar.chae.ol.o.gy" at the Pamelia Salisbury Gallery in Hudson, New York through July 25. This site-specific exhibition fills a Carriage House with sculpture and art. In an interview with Art21, Pfaff discussed gender issues in the art world, mentioning the legendary art historian, Linda Nochlin. She says that Nochlin wrote, "Something — not particularly about me

Thanks to the hard work of our installer Benjamin Galaday with the assistance of Darius Gilmore, this 19th Century hand-made horse was recently installed in the lobby of the STEM building. The horse is carved wood with copper and brass sheet appliqué and a brass handmade bridle. Unfortunately, we do not know the name of the artist(s) who made it. This horse was sculpted in Rajasthan, a state now in northwest India. There are archaeological remains of early human settlement in Rajasthan going back over 100,000 years. Thank you to the Estate of Peter W. Scheinman for the generous donation of this horse.

but about aspects of what I do. It was something about the chaotic nature of the work — that if a man did it, it would be seen as powerful, like, say, a Jackson Pollock. It would be seen as tough, manly, wild. It would be seen as fighting the dragons, the demons, the dark side — grappling with these things heroically. And if a woman were to handle something like that, it would only be seen as scattered, non-centered, hysterical, flighty." Have you ever tried looking at a work of art by a woman, and imagining what would be said about it if the artist were male? Or vice-versa? It's an interesting exercise. 

TWO HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS AWARDED PRESTIGIOUS JACK KENT COOKE FOUNDATION UNDERGRADUATE TRANSFER SCHOLARSHIPS

udson County Community College (HCCC) students Adoum Allamine and Pedro Moranchel have been chosen from 1,500 applicants nationwide to receive the 2021 Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship.

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation recognizes exceptionally talented community college students seeking to complete baccalaureate degrees. Scholarship recipients are selected for their academic ability and achievement, financial need, leadership, persistence, and service. Only 72 students in the United States have been selected as recipients this year. This is the third consecutive year in which HCCC students have been named Cooke Scholars; Sarra Hayoune was a 2019 recipient, and Abdellah Amrhar received the scholarship in 2020.

"The entire HCCC community joins me in congratulating Adoum and Pedro," said HCCC President Dr. Chris Reber. "Not only are they outstanding students, but they are also exemplary citizens. We are very proud of them."

Considered one of the most prestigious scholarship awards in the nation, each Jack Kent Cooke Foundation award is intended to cover students' educational expenses to complete baccalaureate degrees - including tuition, living expenses, books and required fees. Awards vary by individual, based on the cost of tuition as well as other grants or scholarships they may receive. This highly competitive scholarship includes up to \$40,000 per year for up to three years to attend a four-year, accredited undergraduate college or university where they may pursue any area of study; college planning support; ongoing advisement; the opportunity to connect with a thriving community of fellow scholars; and the opportunity for additional funding support for graduate study.

Adoum Allamine is a Criminal Justice major, Vice President of the Criminal Justice Club, Secretary of the Honor Students Council, and member of National Society of Leadership and Success and Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society. Adoum has served the community through volunteer work at Liberty State Park, the Hunger Free Bayonne food distribution program, Hackensack Riverkeeper cleanup, and Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

of Service at a Jersey City public school, among others. When the pandemic hit, he lost his job as a car service driver, but continued giving back to the community by donating items to the HCCC Food Pantry, cooking at a soup kitchen, helping at food distributions, and mentoring HCCC students. Adoum has applied to, and is awaiting decisions from Brown, Columbia, Princeton and Vanderbilt Universities.

Pedro Moranchel is a Physics major, an Honors student, and the College's 2021 Valedictorian. He is the son of Mexican and Honduran immigrants whose struggles motivated him to set ambitious academic goals and work hard. Pedro is Vice President of Scholarship for the College's chapter of Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society, President of the HCCC STEM Club, and Director of the Inter-Club Council of the HCCC Student Government Association. Pedro participated in the Summer Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REU) program at Queensborough Community College, which was funded by the National Science Foundation, and a prestigious 10-week internship at the Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory. He has worked as a volunteer in several environmental clean-up projects in Hudson County. In addition to receiving the Cooke Scholarship, Pedro is also an Achieving the Dream (ATD) Scholar. His goal is to improve student success and close achievement gaps for historically underserved student populations. Pedro has applied to Princeton University, Williams College, and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He plans to produce diversity programs connected to STEM as a professor or person of influence in Hudson County.

Nearly half of all postsecondary students begin their college journey at two-year institutions. Jack Kent Cooke Foundation research has found that community college students who transfer to four-year institutions have equal to or higher graduation rates as compared to students who enrolled at these institutions directly from high school, or transferred from other four-year institutions. The Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship aims to increase the number of community college students completing their education at prestigious and high-performing four-year colleges and universities.

n May 5, 2021, Ocelot held a client workshop for New Jersey and New York postsecondary schools' programs on Best Practices to maximize the Ocelot Platform. Christine Petersen, Associate Director of Financial Aid, presented for Hudson County Community College, speaking about our Chatbot Libby, statistics about conversations and interactions, 24/7 availability, FATV custom videos and usage, student experiences, and overall student support services provided. Hudson County Community College Celebrates Graduating Classes of Early College Program at 2021 Commencement

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Class of 2021 included 31 students from area high schools who earned associate degrees as part of the HCCC Early College Program. The Early College graduates received their diplomas during the inperson Grad Walk on Thursday, May 27, 2021.

"We are so proud of our Early College graduates, most of whom will be receiving their college diplomas a few weeks ahead of getting their high school diplomas," said HCCC President Chris Reber. He explained that the HCCC Early College Program permits juniors and seniors living in Hudson County or attending County high schools to enroll in up to 18 college-level credits per academic year, and earn credits towards an associate degree. Credits earned in the program transfer toward baccalaureate degrees at four-year colleges and universities.

Additionally, agreements with some high schools allow students the opportunity to earn a full Associate degree upon high school graduation with a combination of in-school, dual-enrollment classes and college courses taken after school. "Apart from the benefit of jump-starting their college education, students participating in the HCCC Early College program pay just half of the in-County tuition rate – a huge savings in comparison to tuition at four-year institutions," Dr. Reber stated.

This the first year the College presented diplomas to students from the Jersey City Public Schools. Fourteen students from Dickinson High School graduated with Associate of Science (A.S.) degrees in Environmental Studies; one student from Lincoln High School graduated with an Associate of Arts (A.A.) degree in Criminal Justice; and three students from Ferris High School graduated with Associate of Science (A.S.) degrees in Business Administration.

In addition, HCCC celebrated its second graduating class of eleven students from Hudson County Schools of Technology High Tech High School, who received Associate of Science (A.S) degrees in Environmental Studies; and a first graduating class of two High Tech High School students who earned Associate of Science (A.S.) degrees in Science and Mathematics.

Robin Hood CEO and Best-Selli<mark>ng</mark> Author Wes Moore Delivers HCCC 2021 Commencement Keynote Address

HCCC welcomed Wes Moore as the keynote speaker for the College's virtual Commencement Ceremony. Mr. Moore's speech premiered on Thursday, May 20, on https://www.youtube.com/user/HudsonCountyCollege, and will continue to be available for viewing. Wes Moore is the Chief Executive Officer of Robin Hood, one of the largest anti-poverty forces in the nation. He is also a best-selling author, combat veteran, and social entrepreneur.

Mr. Moore's first book, *The Other Wes Moore:* One Name, Two Fates, a perennial New York Times bestseller, focused on the fine line between success and failure and was optioned by Oprah Winfrey and HBO to be made into a movie. His other best-sellers include *The Work, Discovering Wes Moore, and This Way Home.* His latest book, *Five Days*, explores the 2015 Baltimore riots through a kaleidoscope of perspectives, and examines the root causes of violence and poverty.

Growing up in Baltimore and the Bronx, Mr. Moore was raised by a single mom, and overcame challenges to achieve higher education and career goals. He graduated Phi Theta Kappa from Valley Forge Military College and Johns Hopkins University. Mr. Moore earned a Master of Letters degree from Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar. He later served as a captain and paratrooper with the U.S. Army 82nd Airborne, including a combat deployment to Afghanistan. He was also a White House Fellow to Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice.

Prior to becoming Robin Hood CEO, Mr. Moore was the founder and CEO of BridgeEdu, an innovative tech platform addressing the college completion and job placement crisis by reinventing freshman year For underserved students. He also worked as an investment banker with Deutsche Bank in London and Citigroup in New York.

Mr. Moore has served on numerous nonprofit and social-impact boards, and is a lifetime member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

udson County Community College (HCCC) Division of Continuing Education and Workforce Development will host its Eighth Annual "Girls in Technology" symposium on Thursday, June 3, 2021, from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. The interactive, live-stream event is open by invitation only to Hudson County middle and high school students, and is designed to provide information about fulfilling and well-paying careers in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) professions.



The centerpiece of the event is the "Working Women in STEM" panel. The "Working Women in STEM" panel includes Natalie Lihacova, Co-Founder and CEO of Mr. Simon; Carolyn Oser, Vice President, Business & Technology Transformation, EmblemHealth-ConnectiCare; Thzaira Charles, P.E., Senior Airport Engineer, Port Authority NY, NJ; and Meridangela Gutierrez Jhong, Security Consultant, Accenture.

In addition to the panel discussion, there will be a live demonstration with HCCC STEM Professor, Dr. Clive Li in the HCCC STEM lab, as well as an interactive presentation on digital marketing

by Ms. Lihacova's company, Mr. Simon, and a live food-science demonstration with HCCC Chef Marissa Lontoc in one of the College's nationally acclaimed Culinary Arts Institute kitchens.

HCCC HOSTS JEAN KRAUSS YOUTH LEADERSHIP AND CAREER DEVELOPMENT FORUM

udson County Community College (HCCC) in partnership with the Hudson County Department of Health and Human Services received a \$25,000 grant from the Juvenile Justice Commission for the Jean Krauss Youth Leadership and Career Development Forum. The keynote speaker, L'Mani Viney, an educator, mentor, and youth advocate, passionately spoke to the youth about expanding their world by engaging in opportunities within and outside their communities.

about his father's perseverance and commitment to hard work, particularly while earning a Doctorate in Education, which cost the father a lot of time away from his family.

The cardinal principle of perseverance was a consistent theme throughout Lee's story. He shared that while a young boy, he asked his parents' permission to play football and was allowed to do so finally in the third grade. After joining the team, he was disappointed to be practicing instead of playing, so he decided to quit. His father did not allow this, however. Instead, he demanded that young Bakari finish the football season, even if he ultimately chose not to return for the next season. The father pointed out that Lee's coach and teammates were now counting on him. When the team moved from practice to playing, he started enjoying the experience again, and talk of quitting dissipated.

Trustee Lee first found employment working as a financial analyst for Pfizer, a pharmaceutical company. His dream, however, was to become a lawyer and to practice law. He attended law school in the evenings after work. About a year after completing his law education, Lee decided to start

looking for job opportunities in law. He started applying; however, since he completed his program during the evening, he did not have the chance to obtain the customary internships that often turn into job opportunities after graduation. Lee presented to the audience a heavy stack of rejection letters from different law firms that he kept over the years. He joked that one firm was so enthusiastic about rejecting him that they sent him two rejection letters.

He further shared another rejection letter. This time the letter was from the firm that ultimately hired him and where he is currently employed, and where he is an equity partner, serves as Chief Diversity Chair, and Chair of the Affordable House Practice. This opportunity was possible because his father knew the lead partner, who agreed to meet with Lee. Lee reflected that resumes should be looked at carefully before being dismissed as organizations can easily lose the opportunities to hire an excellent employee due to an untraditional resume or work history.

Ultimately, that meeting turned into a job and the rewarding law career that Lee always wanted. While the rejection letters illustrated a closed door, just like football, he nevertheless persevered. Lee said that "left to my own devices, I was not successful, someone had to help me." Now, as a successful professional, a husband, and a father, he "needs" to be that person who helps and uplifts others. He clarified that it is not that he should help others or that it would be good to do so, but that he had an obligation to do so. He felt that his success is valued less if he does not help someone else. That statement was vital as it also spoke to the alignment between Trustee Lee's and the College's mission and service to the community.

"The entire Untold Stories program is powerful in connecting employees," a participated stated. Our Stories Untold storytelling emerged as a partnership between the Office of Human Resources and the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI). This series highlights the HCCC community members' personal, educational, and professional experiences, advice, and insight.
