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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE IS RECIPIENT OF 'MUSLIM JOURNEYS BOOKSHELF' GRANT FROM THE NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) has named Hudson County Community College (HCCC) as one of just 842 libraries and state humanities councils throughout the United States and its possessions to be awarded the Muslim Journeys Bookshelf. The award, a collection of books, films and other resources, is intended to better acquaint the American public with the history and culture of Muslims in the U.S. and around the world.

"Hudson County's greatest asset is the rich diversity of its people," said Hudson County Community College President Dr. Glen Gabert, noting that students at the College come from over 115 nations and speak 29 different languages. "This incredible collection will provide us all with a better understanding and greater appreciation of our Muslim neighbors."

Dr. Gabert noted that Hudson County Community College is one of just five colleges and universities — and the only community college — in New Jersey to be awarded the collection. Fairleigh Dickinson University, Monmouth University Library, Montclair State University and Rowan University are also recipients of the collection.

The Muslim Journeys Bookshelf was developed by the NEH in conjunction with the American Library Association, utilizing guidance from scholars, librarians, and other public programming experts. The collection of 25 books, three films and access to the Oxford Islamic Studies Online was compiled to provide the American public with trustworthy and accessible resources about Muslim beliefs and practices and the cultural heritage associated with Islamic civilizations. It has been organized into five segments — American Stories, Connected Histories, Literary Reflections, Pathways of Faith, and Points of View.

Support for the project's development and distribution was provided by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, with additional support for the arts and media components provided by the Doris Duke Foundation for Islamic Art.

Hudson County Community College Library Executive Director Carol Van Houten said librarians John DeLooper and Clifford J. Brooks, who submitted the proposal for the grant, developed activities and programs around the Muslim Journeys Bookshelf print materials. These activities will include two programs centering on Islamic literature and religion that will be presented by Professor Lisa Bellan-Boyer.

Additionally, Dr. Beth Citron, the Assistant Curator of the Rubin Museum of Art in New York City, will lead a discussion on contemporary Islamic art and its far-reaching influences on the visual arts, architecture and décor. The event was arranged by the College's Art Coordinator Dr. Andrea Siegel with the support of a grant from the College's Office of Student Activities. It is scheduled for 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 3 at the College's Culinary Arts Institute/Conference Center, 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City.

The residents and business people of Hudson County are invited to attend all of the Muslim Journeys Bookshelf events, and to view the materials that will be housed at the College's Libraries — the HCCC Main Library at 25 Journal Square in Jersey City, and the North Hudson Library at 4800 Kennedy Boulevard in Union City.

Further details on the activities and events planned around the "Muslim Journeys Bookshelf" collection will follow.

Liberty State Park Cleanup Continues

The group swept and shoveled gravel, spreading it onto pathways and smoothing it out. NOTED AMERICAN ARTIST MARK BEARD TO APPEAR AT HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOUNDATION'S NEXT 'ARTS TALK SERIES' PRESENTATION

Hudson County Community College Foundation will present another segment in "Arts Talk Series" on Friday morning, March 1, 2013 when the very accomplished and productive artist Mark Beard appears. The event will take place at 11:00 a.m. in the Follett Room of the College's Culinary Arts Institute/Conference Center at 161 Newkirk Street in Jersey City — just two blocks from the Journal Square PATH Station. The event is FREE and open to the entire community.

Born in Salt Lake City, Utah in 1956, Mr. Beard has worked in many media. His prints, paintings, sculptures and handcrafted books have been exhibited throughout the world and are included in collections at the Museum of Fine Arts (Boston, MA), the Wadsworth Atheneum (Hartford, CT), The Whitney Museum of American Art (New York City), The Metropolitan Museum of Art (New York City), the Museum of Modern Art (New York City), Staatliche Graphische Sammlung München (Munich, Germany), Albertina (Vienna, Austria), at Harvard, Princeton and Yale Universities, and at Hudson County Community College (NJ).

Mr. Beard is a noted set designer with more than designs for 20 theatrical productions that appeared in New York City, London, Cologne and Vienna to his credit. He has also had large paintings and friezes installed at Abercrombie & Fitch's flagship stores in New York City, Los Angeles, Amsterdam, Brussels, Copenhagen, London, Milan, Paris and Tokyo.

To prevent himself from being typecast in any one style or medium, Mark Beard has developed several distinct, alter-ego artist personas, each with a detailed biography and portrait photo. These include: Bruce Sargeant (1898-1938), an imagined English artist and a contemporary of E.M. Forster; Hippolyte-Alexandre Michallon (1849-1930), a French beaux-arts painter and the teacher of Bruce Sargeant; Edith Thayer Cromwell (1893-1962), an American who was a student and friend of Michallon; Brechtoldt Steeruwitz (1890-1973), a Viennese artist who was also a student of Michallon; and Peter Coulter (born 1948), an American artist influenced by Cromwell's and Steeruwitz's work.

The Hudson County Community College Foundation Art Collection was established seven years ago to

coincide with the initiation of the College's Fine Arts studies program. The Collection is intended to enrich the lives of the community and to provide a point of reference and inspiration for the Fine Arts students. The HCCC Foundation Art Collection has since grown to its present stature thanks to the generosity of its many donors. Since its inception, several pieces have been directly donated by individuals, estates, corporations and other organizations. Monetary donations for art purchase are maximized by matching funds, and donations are given not only for acquiring works of art, but also for special events, and items in kind, such as art books for the College library.

Dianne Mohammed started her career at HCCC as Assistant Registrar in December 2009. She earned a bachelor's degree in liberal arts with a concentration in social sciences from New York University. Dianne plans to begin graduate school in the Fall of 2013.

As Assistant Registrar, Dianne implemented the event management system (EMS) system in 2010 that streamlined HCCC's course production and management process. Initially, this system was implemented as a scheduling solution. However, after learning of the various functions that could be utilized by many, Dianne proposed her ideas and began rolling out three modules of the software and was completed by March of 2012. The EMS desktop, EMS Online Editing Tool, and Virtual EMS are all being used by several areas within the HCCC community. Faculty and staff can now access and request space for special events and classroom usage using an online link. This has minimized the need for emails and phone calls regarding Special Event requests which accounts for approximately 350 - 400 requests per year. She has trained over 35 users from all areas of the College including Academic Affairs divisions, Facilities, Library Services, and Community Education.

Prior to joining HCCC, Dianne served as Associate Director at UBS Financial Services, where she held an education and learning position within Human Resources. She managed the training of financial advisors and associates stationed at over 50 branches throughout the United States. Dianne's greatest accomplishment in this role was spearheading the delivery of The Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) assessment for 98 Associates within eight regions using online technology and live meeting conferencing.

Preceding UBS, Dianne held several positions at NYU for 17 years, within the School of Continuing and Professional Studies. She spent 12 years in enrollment services where she managed registration, course scheduling, and created policies and procedures for a central administrative area. It was during this time, she developed her skills in facilitating training and development for staff, students, and part-time workers, as well as her front-line leadership and management skills.

Dianne transferred to NYU's Center for Career Education and Life Planning as Assistant Director after a great start in Enrollment Services to gain experience within an academic division, and work more closely with program development and faculty relations. In this role, Dianne implemented the first testing center to be housed within a non-credit division for the Paul McGee degree students as well as continuing education students in certificate programs. She built the system from the ground up, handling all technical and administrative logistics which included training, hiring, and developing staff responsible for running testing services.

Dianne was promoted to Associate Director after successfully completing and running the Test Center project. Shortly after the creation of the Test Center, Dianne worked closely with her Director to implement a new program at NYU, "Healthy Living and Life Transitions" as a pilot to increase revenues, have a competitive advantage within the university community, and produce exciting new courses geared toward personal development. The program most certainly thrived and is still running at NYU today.

Hudson County Community College's College Operations Division moved in December 2012 to its new home at 81 Sip Avenue. The last department housed in this location was Information Technology Services (ITS) before its relocation to 70 Sip Avenue, Third Floor. The space had been vacant for the past eight years and used for College storage, which was not ideal since because is not accessible by an elevator.

Prior to the Operations Division's move, the College installed a wheelchair lift to comply with Americans with Disabilities Act and other regulations. This space was found to be best suited for this Division, as it has the least student traffic. It is also part of the College's goal to transition

College departments from leased space to owned space. Prior to the move, the Operations Division was located in space not owned by the College at 26 Journal Square, 14th Floor.

Valeri Larko was featured in the February Issue of *New Jersey Monthly* magazine. The article talks about her artistic process, including her transport to the urban industrial worksites that are her métier, which she drives to in automobiles that have both rained inside and spontaneously combusted. Larko's work, *Relic, Newark Bay, Bayonne*, is in the Collection. We hope to install it later this year. Her work is also on exhibit through May 19 alongside that of Chakaia Booker's work in a show called "High Trash," at the Fleming Museum in Burlington, Vermont. Two works by Booker are in the HCCC collection. The sculpture made out of tires can be seen on the first floor of 70 Sip Avenue.



The work, titled, "Invitation to a Voyage: the Hudson River at Fishkill (river side),(1979-1999)" depicts several artists and people who work in the art world on a beautiful summer day, walking along the Hudson River. Each of the seven oil-on-canvas sections of the painting is 96" x 60", and this is only half of a 14-canvas work. The other seven panels depict the local Hudson River area woods. The Museum plans to install the entire work at a later date. Sylvia Sleight's work "Douglas John and Ms. Smith," is installed in the reception area of the faculty offices in North Hudson.

Also on permanent display at the Hudson River Museum is a large watercolor by Hudson River area artist Don Nice depicting the Hudson River area landscape and a giant fish. A beautiful watercolor work by Don Nice was recently given in honor of Edward and Joan O'Neill by thanks to a generous donation by their nephew, Dr. Glen Gabert. The Hudson River Museum is located at 511 Warburton Avenue in Yonkers.

Art by Nancy Spero, whose work *Maypole War* is installed on the third floor of 2 Enos Place, was on display in an exhibition called, "From Victimhood to Liberation," at Galerie Lelong in Chelsea through the end of last month. This was the first show in New York of her work since her death in 2009. Thomas Michelli, reviewing for the online art magazine *Hyperallergic*, called the exhibit, "Stunning ... The collages with their rhythmic interplay of repeating images, shimmer across expanses of paper with touches of jewel-like color when they're not

exploding in flashes of graphic intensity." The word "Victimhood," according to curator Mary Sabbatino, was invented by Spero to describe "the victim passing from sufferer to protagonist." According to Michelli, Spero's art focused those whose lives were "swept away by the industrialized forces of war and genocide, who were given no say in how their lives ended."

PERIODISTA Y AUTORA LEE WOODRUFF FUÉ INVITADA EN LA SERIE DE CONFERENCIAS ANUAL DE HCCC

Periodista y Autora Lee Woodruff estuvo como invitada en la reciente presentación de la Serie de Conferencias de Hudson County Community College el pasado Jueves, 7 de Febrero. El evento se llevó a cabo en el Instituto de Artes Culinarias/Centro de Conferencias de la Universidad, 161 Newkirk Street en Jersey City. El tema de la serie de conferencias de este año es "El Poder de la Mujer."

Woodruff es más conocida por su libro *In an instant: A Family's Journey of Love and Healing (En un Instante: El Viaje de Amor y Recuperación de una Familia)*, escrito junto con su esposo, el periodista de ABC-TV Bob Woodruff. El críticamente aclamado libro, cuenta la crónica de la recuperación de la familia Woodruff luego de que el Sr. Woodruff sufriera una herida traumática en el cerebro mientras se encontraba infiltrado con las fuerzas armadas de Estados Unidos en Iraq en Enero del 2006. Recientemente, dio autoría a *Perfectly Imperfect: A Life in Progress (Perfectamente Imperfecto: Una Vida en Progreso)*, una reflexión de su matrimonio y vida, y *Those We Love The Most (Aquellos A Quienes Mas Queremos)*, una novela basada en como una familia se acopla a la vida y tragedia.

Escritora y antes experta en relaciones públicas y mercadeo, la Sra. Woodruff ha escrito varios artículos acerca de su vida y de ser padres para revistas como *Country Living, Health, Redbook* y *Parade*. Como editor contribuyente del programa de televisión CBS *This Morning*, la Sra. Woodruff reporta acerca de una variedad de temas relacionados con el hogar y la familia y eventos actuales.

La Sra. Woodruff y su esposo fundaron el Bob Woodruff Foundation, luego de que él sostuvo sus heridas en Iraq. La fundación está dedicada a proveer recursos y apoyo a miembros, con heridas, del servicio militar activo, veteranos y a sus familias, y ha recaudado más de \$14.5 millones para esta causa. Los Woodruff han aparecido juntos y por separado en televisión nacional y radio, para ayudar a ponerle una cara a las serias consecuencias de heridas traumáticas del cerebro, entre los veteranos de la guerra de Iraq, así como las de millones de Americanos que viven con esta aflicción.

On Jan. 22 and 23, 2013, the Culinary Arts Institute was able to participate in the Northeast Regional Qualifying Competition for the San Pellegrino® Almost Famous Chef Competition at the Astor Center in New York City. The winner of this regional competition was to advance to the National Finals in Napa Valley, California. Of a total of eight institutions that participated in this competition, Jerri's dish was awarded third place. In addition to preparing food for the judges, her dish was also prepared by the organizers and served to the spectators. It was this larger group that awarded her entry with second place for "People's Choice." The ultimate prize for Jerri was being approached by some of the chefs from famous New York City restaurants, stemming from her splendid participation and success in this contest.

The Culinary Arts Institute would like to thank Chef Anuchit Pukdeedamrongrit, who was instrumental in training and grooming Jerri for this competition. We would also like to thank Ara Karakashian for spearheading all communication with the organizers of this event. TESTING SCHEDULE

All new students are required to take the CPT, which allows for course placement that is appropriate to their skill level. In certain cases, such as if a student testing has not completed high school or its equivalent (GED), the Placement Test can also be used to determine eligibility for financial aid.

It is extremely important that you take the College Placement Test seriously. Depending on your score, you may have to register for and pay to take additional semesters of courses that do not bear college credit/count toward graduation.

Before Taking the CPT:

- Students must submit an Application to Admissions (70 Sip Ave).

- For CPT exemption criteria such as SAT scores and applied transfer credit for English and/or Mathematics visit: www.hccc.edu/testing

On the day of the CPT students must:

- Report at least 10 minutes before the test start time.
- Bring photo ID (Driver's License/Passport/Green Card / Student ID).
- Have your College Wide ID number.
- Bring a copy of transcripts (only if student is a transfer or foreign student).

- All students must pay a \$20 HCCC service fee (non-refundable) per examination at the Bursar's Office, located at 70 Sip Avenue, Jersey City, or the North Hudson Center Main Office, located at 4800 Kennedy Blvd., Union City, NJ. This fee must be paid prior to setting an appointment for the exam. Testers must show receipt on the day of CLEP exam.
