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HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE'S DR. CLIVE LI HONORED WITH AACC 2023 DALE P. PARNELL DISTINGUISHED FACULTY RECOGNITION

s the saying goes, people learn best by example, and Dr. Clive Li, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Assistant Professor of Engineering Science, most certainly is the model of an inspiring educator.

On April 4, 2023, Dr. Li was conferred with the American Association of Community Colleges' (AACC) 2023 Dale P. Parnell Distinguished Faculty Recognition medal. The honor – that recognizes faculty who demonstrate passion for and support of students, in and out of the classroom – was presented to Dr. Li by AACC President and Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Walter Bumphus, and AACC Board Chair, Dr. Joe Schaffer at the closing ceremonies of the AACC Annual Meeting in Denver, CO.

"The entire Hudson County Community College family joins me in congratulating our valued colleague, Clive Li," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "Dr. Li is a great asset to Hudson County Community College, our students, and the people we serve. He is respected by his colleagues, esteemed by his peers in academia and the research industry, and an exemplary

educator who inspires his students and creates transformational, life-changing opportunities for them."


Clive Li is a nationally renowned research scientist who holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry and Doctoral degree in Materials Science and Engineering from Stony Brook University. Prior to teaching at HCCC, he was a research scientist at Amco Polymers, and he holds patents on Biodegradable Diaper, Eggshell Biocomposite Materials, and a Wearable Aromatic Device. Dr. Li helped create the HCCC Associate in Applied Science degree program in Advanced Manufacturing – one that is rarely found at two-year colleges – and Dr. Li is an advisor to the Holz Technik Academy apprenticeship program. To help ensure diversity in STEM, he participates in the College's annual "Girls in Technology" symposium.

Dr. Li states that nurturing students' interests in science is the focal point of all he does. "I take pride in creating innovative ways to help students succeed academically, personally, and professionally. I mentor students to reach their

is proud to announce that six outstanding HCCC students were selected as semifinalists by the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation for the prestigious and highly competitive Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship.

The HCCC semifinalists are Raida Al Hattab, Computer Science major from Secaucus; Sally Elwir, Criminal Justice major from Bloomfield; Ella Mukasa, Business Administration major from Jersey City; Montaha Osman, Engineering Science major from Garfield; Birva Pinto, Engineering Science major from Jersey City; and Michael Salinas, Computer Science major from Jersey City. This represents a record number of Cooke semifinalists in a single year in the college's history, and one of the largest cohorts of semifinalists in the nation.

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship is awarded to community college students across the nation who have demonstrated exceptional academic ability, leadership, service, and a determination to complete their bachelor's degrees at prestigious four-year institutions. The HCCC students are among 459 semifinalists chosen from over 1,700 applicants who at-tend 215 community colleges across 38 states.

"The entire HCCC community joins me in congratulating Raida, Sally, Ella, Montaha, Birva, and Michael on achieving semifinalist status for this esteemed scholarship," stated HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "This is a great honor for them and for the College. We are very proud that their leadership, extraordinary academic achievements, and community service have been recognized nationally. We wish them all the best as

they progress in this process. This award is a game changer for the students who receive it, as it paves the way for them to achieve a four-year education that otherwise would come with a significant financial burden."

These semifinalists from HCCC have overcome many daunting obstacles to get to this point, ranging from working as a cook and delivery driver while completing their degree at HCCC to starting their college career as an ESL student without English language skills and needing to find housing during their first week in the United States.

The Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship is designed to create a clear pathway to a four-year degree by offering up to \$55,000 per year for baccalaureate study along with other bene-fits including academic advising and access to a network of peers. Some of the latest research from the American Talent Initiative estimates that, annually, about 50,000 high-achieving students from low-income backgrounds, who could transfer to four-year colleges, often do not because of the prohibitive cost of continuing their education.

"By lifting the financial burden of pursuing a four-year degree off their shoulders, our goal is to help students take full advantage of a four-year college experience without taking on student debt," said Seppy Basili, Executive Director of the Cooke Foundation. "This year's selected semifinalists reflect the deep bench of talent across our community colleges today, and we're looking forward to getting to know them better in our final application review process."

The Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship offers unparalleled support to community college students. In addition to the generous financial support, selected Cooke Transfer Scholars will receive educational advising from the Foundation's Deans of Scholar Support to guide them through the process of transitioning to a four-year school and preparing for their future endeavors. They will also have access to opportunities for internships, study abroad, graduate school funding, and the incomparable connection to a robust network of more than 3,000 fellow Cooke Scholars and alumni. The Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship recipients will be announced in April.

Hudson County Community College has a distinguished track record when it comes to the Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. Past award recipients include 2021 Valedictorian Pedro Moranchel, now a student at Princeton University; Abdellah Amrhar in 2020, now attending Columbia University; and Sarra Hayoune in 2019, who completed her Bachelor of Science degree from Stevens Institute of Technology. Sarra then went on to receive the Jack Kent Cooke Graduate Transfer Scholarship and is currently pursuing a Ph.D. in physics and astronomy at Rutgers University.

REFLECTION ON "IMPROVING STUDENT SUCCESS AND ENGAGEMENT THROUGH ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) AND LIFESTYLE DATA"

In April 2023, I attended the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) meeting in Boston, where I presented my work and attended a range of keynote sessions and workshops to stay updated on the most recent developments in higher education. One of the presentations that particularly caught my attention was "Improving Student Success and Engagement through Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Lifestyle Data," which was delivered by a Deloitte practitioner.

The presentation's main topic is how AI and lifestyle data may be used to increase student engagement and achievement. It demonstrates how AI systems may use lifestyle information, like social media use, sleep patterns, and exercise regimens, to provide insights into a student's general wellbeing, behavioral patterns, and preferences. This knowledge can then be used to create personalized learning experiences to meet the individual needs and interests of each student.

I strongly believe that institutions must embrace data-driven methods to thrive in an everchanging world. This means learning how to use AI and new data sources to generate predictive insights and engagement metrics across the student lifecycle. It is also crucial to understand how lifestyle data and machine learning can be combined to improve student engagement and

success rates.

On the other hand, it raises concerns about using lifestyle data ethically and safely. More steps need to be taken to ensure student privacy when collecting and using the data.

In conclusion, it is critical to recognize both the benefits and potential risks of integrating AI systems and lifestyle data. While using AI and lifestyle data can create more individualized and effective learning possibilities for both students and teachers, we must be cautious and take precautions to reduce any potential hazards.

Build Day

In its first collaboration with Rutgers Cooperative Education's (RCE) Hudson County 4-H Program, the Hudson County Community College (HCCC) Environmental Club participated in a "Build Day" led by representatives from the 4-H Family Learning Garden at West Hudson Park in Kearny/Harrison, New Jersey on March 31. Six members of the Environmental Club volunteered, including members of the Executive Board, to support the implementation of this project with a variety of tasks. Some tasks included planning and developing sites for raised beds. The volunteers were divided into teams to assemble raised beds that will be used to plant herbs, native plants and vegetation. The volunteers also assembled two raised beds for those who required special accessibility. They learned a variety of skills such as carpentry, urban planning, soil health and accessibility.

It was a valuable opportunity for club members to showcase their knowledge and passion for the environment and to demonstrate the importance of preserving our planet for future generations.

Recycling and Composting Event

In celebration of Earth Day, the Environmental Club and STEM Club, in collaboration with the Hudson County Improvement Authority (HCIA) hosted a hybrid informational session on all thing "compost" and "recycling," in our rendition of "Know Your Trash." Community Garden Bike Tour

The HCCC Environmental Club strives to promote environmental awareness in the school ecosystem; and among students, faculty and staff. However, it is important to note that the Executive Board curates programming based on other factors that help encourage a sense of community and inclusivity. The HCCC Environmental Club Community Garden Bike Tour, in collaboration with BIKE JC, held on Earth Day (Saturday, April 22) was held to celebrate both the environment and the club's values.

A bike-friendly city is easy on the environment as it reduces greenhouse gas, air pollution, energy consumption, traffic congestion and even noise pollution. Additionally, a bike-friendly city is safer for both cyclists and motorists, and our guides from BIKE JC showcased the symbiotic relationship throughout the tour. Dr. So joined HCCC in January 2023 as our new Dean of Student Success. Dr. So holds her PhD in Molecular Biology from the University of California, Los Angeles and previously held administrative positions at Rutgers University-Newark, New York University, the University of

Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and Lake Land College. However, this only scratches the surface of Dr. So's biography and does not fully express the dramatic turns that have shaped her career. The HCCC community was fortunate to hear about Dr. So's journey and how the different challenges in her life led to her pursuit of a career driven by values and identity.

Mr. Chusid spoke about a work from the Foundation Art Collection, the 1851 Etching "Riot at Hoboken" (on view at the STEM building 3rd floor computer lab) in his talk last month on Hoboken's Elysian Fields at the Frederick Ivor-Campbell 19th Century Baseball Conference at the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. He is writing a book about Hoboken's 19th Century Elysian Fields which were an important site for the early development of baseball. You can see this picture, with a whole group of historic New Jersey etchings, the 3rd floor STEM computer lab.

Artist News

Sylvia Plimack Mangold, whose work is on view at the North Hudson library will have a solo exhibition at 125 Newbury in New York City through June 3. The show includes 15 paintings and works on paper about the maple tree outside her studio in upstate New York. Each painting can take over a year to complete. Every day she returns to find the tree slightly different. "The act of choosing a single tree and painting it again and again is a profoundly Zen-like activity," writes gallery founder Arne Glimcher, "It evokes the way a monk might paint a single calligraphic form for their entire life. Or rake a garden of sand. There's something bordering on the spiritual about such sustained dedication to a single activity."

Jaune Quick-To-See Smith's comprehensive retrospective exhibit *Memory Maps* includes almost five decades of drawings, prints, paintings and sculpture. The work is on view through August 13 at the Whitney Museum in New York City. Smith is a citizen of the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Nation. She believes that her "life's work involves examining contemporary life in America and interpreting it through Native ideology." One of the works in the exhibit is called, *My Existence is a Miracle*, a phrase which recognizes the survival of her people despite "genocide, decades of war, forced assimilation, and systemic oppression." Her 2001 lithograph, *What is An American* is installed on the fourth floor of the Gabert Library.

When is it fair to use another person's work without crediting the source? This is a topic that college teachers are quite passionate about. A new

film WHAAM! BLAM!: **Roy Lichtenstein** and the Art of Appropriation looks at the cartoon work which the great pop artist used to make his world-famous paintings. The film asks: Was he a great artist? Was he a plagiarist? Both? One of the more than 30 comic-book artists whom Lichtenstein copied is 96-year-old Hy Eisman. He only recently found out Lichtenstein reproduced one of Eisman's images in the 1960s. In an article in The Guardian newspaper, Eisman says, "It's called stealing.... I worked like a dog on this stupid page and this guy has twenty million dollars to show for it. If it wasn't so tragic, it would be [funny]." The comic book artists were usually paid a few dollars for each page by the comic-book manufacturers. Lichtenstein paid them nothing. The Guardian notes that art history Professor, Bradford R. Collins, author of the book Pop Art, defends Lichtenstein. Collins says, "It's not plagiarism. It's appropriation. With plagiarism, you're stealing somebody's work and using it for the same purpose they did. If Lichtenstein made comic books out of it, that would be stealing. But appropriation means you're taking something and reusing it for a very different purpose, taking something out of a comic book and making it into a painting....I can understand why Eisman would feel angry. I would feel the same way. But artistically, it's not plagiarism." Ultimately, the film leaves the decision up to the viewer. Lichtenstein died in 1997, so he cannot address this matter. The Foundation Art Collection's Lichtenstein can be seen on the first floor of 2 Enos Place.

On Friday, March 24, HCCC graduating art students under the supervision of Prof. Laurie Riccadonna worked with Andrea Siegel, the Foundation Art Collection Coordinator on a professionalization exercise. The students supervised the curation of the installation of over two dozen works of art, including painting, photography, prints, and box constructions for the 5th floor Gabert Library art permanent exhibit. highest academic potential, guide them when they struggle, and relate learning to real-life experiences," he says.

One way Dr. Li engages students is to include them in planning and creating hands-on projects such as an Antimicrobial Door Opener, Automatic Face Mask Distributor, Hydroponic Mushroom Farm, Biodegradable Golf Tees, and even a launchable rocket. The experiences and mentoring he provides have brought his students scholarships and other rewards, including rare undergraduate opportunities to conduct research at Princeton University, New Jersey Institute of Technology, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Rutgers University.

"Ensuring students complete their associate degree work, and finding ways for them to transfer to baccalaureate and doctoral degree programs, is at the heart of my work," Dr. Li says. Indeed, he has succeeded in doing so: One of his students – HCCC 2021 Valedictorian Pedro Moranchel – was the recipient of the 2021 Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship that is paying all of his college expenses at Princeton University.

HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE'S TENTH ANNUAL 'GIRLS IN TECHNOLOGY'



Tomen lead major research and development projects for corporations, build high-tech products, solve environmental problems, design web sites for influencers, and mentor the next generation of young women interested in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) professions. Although women have made strides in these historically male-dominated fields, they are still underrepresented, largely due to lack of role models.

On Thursday, March 30, 2023, Hudson County Community College (HCCC) hosted its Tenth Annual "Girls in Technology" Symposium to inspire and support young women in pursuing fulfilling and well-paying careers in STEM. The day-long event was held at the HCCC Culinary Conference Center. HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber welcomed middle and high school students from all around Hudson County at the event's 9 a.m. breakfast. HCCC Associate Vice President of Continuing Education and Workforce Development Lori Margolin provided an overview of the day, and Director of Continuing Education and Workforce Development Chastity Farrell delivered opening remarks. As part of the opening ceremonies, Grace Mejia of Jose Marti STEM Academy in Union City read her winning essay, "The Jetsons Were Onto Something." A panel discussion, activities, demonstrations, and contests followed.

The panel discussion, "A Day in the Life of Women in STEM," was moderated by HCCC Engineering student Sofia Ruseva, an Environmental Assessor at UNYSE, LLC, New York's most experienced source for asbestos, lead, mold, and hazardous materials testing.



Panelists included Zobia Alvi, Creator and Head Web Developer for The Z Collective, and Senior Technical Recruiter for DotDash; Summer Jones, Associate Vice President of Technical Support Services at Montclair State University; Nigar "Niko" Kazimova, Software Engineer, Mondo.com; Dr. Madhuri Singal, board-certified toxicologist and Principal Scientist of Worldwide Safety Evaluation at L'Oréal; and Ashley Turner, Virtual Design and Construction Manager.

Activity sessions began at 10:15 a.m. and included "Coding: Simon Says – Hands On Coding," led by Latinos in STEM; "Color Matching Technology" for textiles, paint, print, and cosmetic manufacturing, led by the Hudson County Community College STEM Division; "Origami Space Challenge," inspired by NASA and led by New Jersey City University (NJCU) Ed Tech Doctors; "Augmented Reality Storytelling Environments," led by Membit and Jersey City Fab Lab; and "Sensory/Expert + Instrumental Evaluation – Skin" and "Hair Care and Color Evaluation Techniques + Hair Grading" Science activities led by L'Oréal.

The STEM educators and entrepreneurs who led the activity sessions were Dr. Fahima Bacha, a secondary mathematics supervisor at North Bergen High School and NJCU professor; Kin Bae, Google Software Engineer; Baldween Casseus, Google Global Product Lead; Yavus Guner, HCCC Cybersecurity Instructor who holds Certified Ethical Hacker- EC Council and CompTIA Security+ Certification; Dr. Clive Li, Engineering Science instructor at HCCC and recipient of the 2023 American Association of Community Colleges' 2023 Dale P. Parnell Distinguished Faculty Recognition, who holds three patents; Dr. Dana Mason, a Technology teacher in Bayonne



and NJCU professor who combines her love of arts with technology; Michelle Megalia, President and Chief Executive Officer of Hickory Industries, Inc.; Marcos Navas, an active Maker-Ed and Ed-Tech community member, and founder of Hands on Coding, LLC, and Latinosincoding.org; and Eric Nadler, founder of Towhee Company, and Jersey City Fab Lab, which designs, produces and develops educational toys and programs, web and mobile media, accessories, and wearables. Karina Mitchell, Co-Founder and Vice President of Membit, a geolocative augmented reality application Paulina Porembska, Morgan Lamber, Sharmaine Latar, and Nicole Totorello, Scientists at L'Oréal

The Student Display Contest highlighted works themed "Technology: Past, Present, and Future." Students had the opportunity to learn about attending Hudson County Community College and the HCCC STEM programs.

What factors led you to decide to attend HCCC?
