HCCC TAKES TOP HONORS AT AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES CONVENTION

The American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) held its four-day annual convention in Louisville, KY. At the AACC Convention Gala on Monday, April 8, national awards were presented to outstanding colleges in 11 categories. Hudson County Community College was a finalist in an unprecedented seven of these 11 categories.

HCCC won three of the 11 2024 AACC Awards of Excellence:

The AACC Student Success Award of Excellence recognizes a community college that demonstrates, through evidence, a sustained commitment to advancing student success. HCCC’s Hudson Scholars Program is a shining example of the cutting-edge, data-driven approach that HCCC utilized to drive a sustained impact on student success in new and innovative ways. Honored with multiple prestigious awards, the Hudson Scholars Program expands academic access with a holistic approach that combines

proactive student support, financial stipends, high-impact educational experiences, and early academic intervention.

The AACC honored HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber with the CEO of the Year Award of Excellence. recognizes a leader with a strong track record in effectively participating in shared governance; supporting professional development; implementing results-driven student success initiatives; advocating for the institution and its students; participating in statewide initiatives and national dialogues; serving on local, state, and/or national boards; and demonstrating courage under challenging circumstances.

Dr. Clive Li, Assistant Professor, Engineering Science, took home the prestigious “Faculty Member of the Year” Award of Excellence. The award acknowledges an individual who continuously seeks to integrate evidence-based

PRESIDENT DR. CHRIS REBER INVITED TO JOIN UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN DIVERSITY SCHOLARS NETWORK

Hudson County Community College President Dr. Christopher Reber joins the University of Michigan’s Diversity Scholars Network (DSN), an interdisciplinary, multi-institutional community of scholars hosted by the National Center for Institutional Diversity (NCID) at the University of Michigan. DSN has over 1,500 members representing more than 200 institutions worldwide, comprised of tenured, tenure-track, clinical, and research faculty, research staff, and postdoctoral fellows. Dr. Reber was selected as a leader of applied research in student success, and diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives and best practices.

DSN is committed to advancing the understanding of historical and contemporary issues related to identity, difference, culture, representation, power, oppression, and inequality, and how they affect individuals, groups, communities, and institutions.

While the organization is comprised heavily of members from Research 1 universities, Dr. Reber’s strong and vocal stance in defense of values like diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) at national academic conferences and meetings

led his peers to nominate him for membership.

As President of HCCC, Dr. Reber is an ideal candidate for an organization like DSN that is working to create a more equitable and inclusive society. The College serves Hudson County, home to a rich tapestry of cultures and one of the most diverse communities in the United States. Fifty-five percent of HCCC students identify as Hispanic, and 88% as non-white. Furthermore, 80% of degree-seeking students qualify for federal financial aid.

Dr. Reber promotes diversity, equity and inclusion in post-secondary education with passion. He stated, “Diversity is more than just a catchphrase at HCCC; it is a priority that is interwoven into everything we do. It’s not just about checking off a box, it’s about promoting acceptance, seeking understanding, and having genuine empathy, respect, and love for the specialness and dignity of every person in our community.” During his time leading the College, HCCC students have coined the phrase “Hudson is Home” because of the inclusive and welcoming environment fostered by Dr. Reber and all members of the HCCC community.

The Girls Who Code (GWC) Club presented coding workshops at the Girls in Technology (GIT) conference on Thursday, March 21 from 8 am until 3 pm. GIT gives young girls in both middle school and high school the opportunity to experience different technological panels, speakers, and workshops. The club advisors for the GWC club are Raffi Manjikian and Laura Samuelsen. The club president for GWC is Dalia Poblano.

GWC was delighted to participate, and it is a testament to their hard work, talent, and determination that in one night they put together a fantastic proposal showcasing the basics of coding using Python.

While organizing a comprehensive and engaging Python coding lesson in 24 hours is a challenging task, the motivation behind accepting this challenge came from GWC's mission to inspire young middle school and high school students to pursue tech-related careers in college. With the help of Xena Khan, Vice President of the GWC Club, the GWC student facilitators composed slides that included the basics and principles of Python coding as well as examples to accompany each lesson. Upon arrival at the Culinary building where GIT was held, there was palpable excitement and curiosity in the students' faces. Multiple schools and organizations around the Jersey City area, such as Jose Marti STEM Academy, County Prep High School, and Big Brothers Big Sisters, were in attendance on that very special day.

After enjoying a delicious and nutritious breakfast, students were greeted by the hosts of GIT as well as faculty and staff volunteers. Students were placed in five different groups

AMERICAN CULINARY FEDERATION VISITS THE CULINARY ARTS INSTITUTE

On March 12-14, 2024, the Culinary Arts Institute (CAI) hosted chefs from the American Culinary Federation Education Foundation (ACFEF) for reaccreditation of two associate degrees and two certificate programs. The College hosted Chef George Dennis, C.E.C., C.C.E., A.A.C., from Michigan and Chef Billie DeNunzio, C.C.E., from Florida.

The lavish welcome reception on Tuesday, March 12, attended by students, Board of Trustees, President Reber, Foundation Board of Directors, President's Cabinet, Business, Culinary Arts, & Hospitality Management (BCH) Advisory Board, Alumni, Culinary Arts Institute Faculty, and Guests. Dr. Ara Karakashian, Dean of the School of BCH spoke to attendees, "We are very thankful to continue impacting the lives of community college students: Perhaps it's when we assist high school students as they earn college credits through our Early College program; maybe it's when our Culinary Club prepares fresh meals for the Hudson Helps Resource Center (which has surpassed 20,000 meals since 2020); perhaps it's because students could not afford to purchase a knife kit or even make it to class, and we secured federal Perkins grants to obtain knife kits and Uber rides. Regardless of need, HCCC is always prepared to provide equitable resources to all who are ready to put their trust in our services. Our legacy of providing hands-on, technical education

is over 40 years strong and we will continue to produce successful graduates who will outpace and outshine their industry peers."

The chefs assessed the facilities, quality of instruction, and services provided to students within this program, founded in 1983. The original ACF accreditation began in 1997 and the programs have been accredited, without interruption, since that time.

During the debriefing, the chefs provided suggestions and strengths, without concerns regarding compliance. Some notable compliments included our "Hudson is Home" approach towards all students and employees. Other strengths included dedicated and readily available faculty, students feeling valued, learning in a safe environment, and students feeling confident about the College's ability to address their needs. Additionally, the team commended the broad based community support CAI received for our programs by so many constituents.

The accreditation commission will issue its final assessment in summer 2024.

Dr. Karakashian thanks those who prepared for the self-study and site visit and congratulates the team on a job well done.



Foundation Art Collection

The Hudson County Community College Foundation Art Collection of 1,900+ works is installed in the public areas of campus buildings. The entire College is an educational art museum. This Collection reveals aspects of America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history from the Hudson River School period to today. In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

Artist News

We recently installed the largest painting in the Collection, *Prince Brickner* by **Robert Natkin**, on the second floor of the Gabert Library. Natkin is a well-known midcentury modern artist. For the artist, who grew up in Chicago in a poor, violent and mentally unhealthy family, painting became a way to make a beautiful home for himself in the world. This picture comes from a group of works he made, called the "Apollo" series, where everything was painted in stripes. If you are interested in this work you might enjoy the documentary made by Peter Fuller of the BBC about Natkin called, "Somewhere Over the Rainbow." It is available for free on YouTube. Natkin's work is in the collections of major art museums including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Museum of Modern Art and the Guggenheim Museum in New York City.

Who was Prince Brickner? The writer Richard P. Brickner, a Guggenheim Fellow, was the son of two psychiatrists: Dr. Ruth Pilpel Brickner and Dr. Richard M. Brickner. Robert Natkin's therapist was Dr. Ruth Brickner, and the artist became close friends with the writer. This is likely an abstract portrait of Richard P. Brickner. According to Brickner's obituary in *The New York Times*, Brickner was, "a novelist, memoirist and critic known for his fictional and nonfictional explorations of an automobile accident that left him permanently paralyzed... Mr. Brickner's memoir, *My Second Twenty Years: An Unexpected Life* (Basic Books, 1976),

recounted the aftermath of the accident, which took place shortly after his 20th birthday, when he was a student at Middlebury College. Mr. Brickner, who was paralyzed from the chest down, used a wheelchair for the rest of his life."

Thank you to the Carol Adler Revocable Trust for the recent donation of this work. The Trust also donated another important mid century modern "Op Art" painting by **Richard Anuszkiewicz**, called "The Yellows" (1968), which can be seen, on the second floor of the Gabert Library.

The Foundation Art Collection's first work featured in an exhibition catalog has been published by the Museum of Modern Art! The exhibition includes work by the contemporary Mexican designer Clara Porset who designed the butaque chair that the **Francisco Zuniga** model is resting on in the picture above. Porset was a famous midcentury modern designer who took the butaque chair,

which had been part of Mexican culture for hundreds of years, and made a new version that was sleek, modern and yet still handmade. That's the version you see in this Zuniga work. We hope you share our excitement about this prestigious moment for the Foundation Art Collection. The exhibition, *Crafting Modernity*, is up at MoMA through September 22. *Crafting Modernity: Design in Latin America, 1940-1980* | <https://www.moma.org/calendar/exhibitions/5657>

‘From Slavery to Freedom’

Dr. Reber has devoted his entire 40+ year career to higher education and is a longtime champion for diversity and a pioneering leader who drives change that creates better outcomes for students from traditionally underserved groups. His efforts in this area earned national recognition.

Embracing a data-driven approach toward student success, Dr. Reber spearheaded the creation of the Hudson Scholars Program, which broadens academic access and promotes student retention and completion through an innovative approach combining proactive student support, financial stipends, high-impact educational experiences, and early academic intervention.

The award-winning program recently won the 2024 Bellwether Legacy Award, the highest honor bestowed upon a community college by the Bellwether College Consortium. The Hudson Scholars Program significantly increased student retention and completion, particularly for students from traditionally

underrepresented groups including Hispanic and African American students.

The term-to-term persistence rates of Hispanic and Latino students in the Hudson Scholars Program increased by over 40%, while Black and African American student persistence increased by over 60%. Additionally, the two-year completion rate for traditionally underrepresented Hudson Scholars represents a threefold increase compared to 2018-20.

Students from these groups who participate in the Hudson Scholars Program are significantly more likely to stay in school and graduate on time. Ultimately, Hudson Scholars is giving traditionally underserved students the support they need to stay in school, get to the finish line, and get there faster.

The Hudson Scholars Program is just one example of how HCCC is breaking barriers for students from traditionally underrepresented groups under Dr. Reber’s leadership. HCCC is a federally designated Hispanic Serving

Institution (HSI) and received the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities’ (HACU) “Outstanding Member Institution Award” in 2023 for excellence in promoting success for Hispanic students in higher education. 
Empowering ACCESS Students: Paving the Way for Lifelong Learning and Career Exploration

Yassine Dribki, HCCC Class of 2016
A.S. Science and Mathematics



Yassine Dribki is an HCCC graduate who now works in the exciting and growing field of data analysis, as a data analyst at worldwide media, streaming and entertainment giant Paramount Global, the parent company of CBS, Paramount Plus, and more. After graduating from HCCC in 2016 with a degree in science and mathematics, he completed a bachelor's degree in Applied Mathematics from the New Jersey Institute of Technology (NJIT) and then earned his master's in data science from NJIT. He has also worked at Amazon and Lazard Management. We spoke with Yassine to find out more about his time at HCCC, moving on to NJIT, and his advice to students who want to pursue a career in data analysis.

How did you choose to attend HCCC?

I chose this school for several good reasons, including its reputation for academic excellence, its campus which offers opportunities for both collaboration and personal growth, and the diversity of the student body.

What made HCCC the right choice for you?

It was HCCC's convenient location, flexibility, and affordability that made it the right choice for me.

Any favorite memories or classes from your time at HCCC?

My favorite memories of HCCC are taking math and physics classes and engaging in collaborative work to solve problems with my classmates.

How did you choose NJIT to continue your education? What did you like about NJIT?

I chose NJIT primarily because of its strong reputation and the cutting-edge research opportunities it offers. I enjoyed doing research at NJIT, such as collaborative work researching slime molds with colleagues from Ohio State University, and appreciated NJIT's diverse and inclusive community.

You have a master's in data science and you've worked as a data analyst for some high-profile companies like Lazard and Paramount. How did you become interested in data analysis and what inspired you to pursue this field?

I was drawn to the field through exposure to statistics and math courses, where I discovered the power of quantitative analysis in making informed decisions. I recognized the potential of data analytics to drive innovation, solve complex problems, and improve decision-making processes.

What advice do you have for HCCC students who want to pursue a career in data analysis?

My advice is to build a strong foundation in mathematics, statistics, and computer science, as these skills are paramount in data analysis. Additionally, seek internships and projects where you can apply what you've learned in school to a real-world setting.

What software skills or programs would you recommend students become proficient in?

Students interested in this area should learn SQL, Python, Tableau, or Power BI.

What goals are you working towards now?

I am working on advancing my career by seeking further opportunities to sharpen my skills and tackle more challenges.
