

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#### **HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE NAMED** '2022 GREAT COLLEGE TO WORK FOR'

udson County Community College (HCCC) has been selected as one of the best colleges in the nation to work for, according to the Great Colleges to Work For® program. The College was recognized for excellence in professional development; shared governance; faculty experience; diversity, inclusion, and belonging; and confidence in senior leadership.

"This honor is especially meaningful because it was awarded based on the results of a questionnaire that captured employment data and workplace policies, and more importantly, a survey administered to faculty, administrators, and professional staff," said HCCC President

Dr. Christopher Reber. "Confidential employee feedback was the primary factor in HCCC's earning this recognition."

The Great Colleges to Work For® program is one of the largest and most respected workplacerecognition programs in the United States. The program uses a two-part process to assess colleges that earn top ratings from their employees regarding workplace practices and policies. These include a ModernThink Higher Education Institution Questionnaire, and a ModernThink Higher Education Insight survey that was vetted by a panel of higher education experts. This year, 212 institutions participated in the program, including 130 four-year institutions and 82 two-year institutions. Sixty-eight institutions have been recognized as a 2022 Great College to Work For®, including 46 fourinstitutions vear and 22 two-year institutions. HCCC is the only college in New Jersey to be honored with this recognition.



Home to 18,000 full- and part-time students, HCCC is also home to nearly 1,000 employees, 40% of whom are former students. Anna Krupitskiy, HCCC Vice President for Human Resources, said that when Dr. Reber began his presidency in 2018, he focused on climate, culture, and community, addressing morale, salaries, and developing more trusting relationships between administration and all employees.

Dr. Reber inaugurated and conducts Monthly Town Hall Meetings and provides other platforms for faculty, staff, and students to learn about recent HCCC developments, and participate in dialogue with College leaders and one another. "This has empowered members of the College community to develop vertical relationships with colleagues, which in turn has led to many collaborations, partnerships, and alliances within the College and with external community partners," Ms. Krupitskiy stated.

At the start of Dr. Reber's tenure he also developed collaborative relationships with each of the College's four collective bargaining units:

udson County Community College (HCCC) announced the appointment of fourteen full-time faculty to serve students and the College as the new 2022-23 academic year begins. Some of these faculty are new to the College, and some have been promoted after serving with distinction as part-time, adjunct faculty.

HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber noted that student success is at the very heart of the College's mission, and HCCC is committed to appointing and retaining full-time faculty who

provide high-quality and inspirational teaching and educational services.

At HCCC's recent College Service Day that began the new academic year, Dr. Reber stated, "We are adding new full-time faculty where there is sustainable need, providing opportunities for long-serving adjunct faculty to move into full-time tenure-track positions, and investing in scores of best practice professional development programs and opportunities to support our workforce."

#### HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE FACULTY EARN NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED ACUE TEACHING CREDENTIAL

wenty-four Hudson County Community College (HCCC) faculty members were honored at a College pinning ceremony to begin the 2022-23 academic year. The ceremony recognized faculty for becoming Association of College and University Educators (ACUE) certified, earning the only nationally recognized collegiate teaching credential endorsed by the American Council on Education (ACE).

To earn the ACUE credential, faculty members completed the "Effective Online Teaching Practices" course and learned evidence-based teaching practices that improve student engagement, increase persistence, and close equity gaps. The 25-module course requires faculty to implement and reflect on new teaching practices in their courses and refine their methodologies.

"In pursuing this certification, HCCC faculty demonstrated a strong commitment to their continuing professional development and closing equity gaps in student achievement," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "The ACUE courses augment the resources Hudson County Community College provides to assist faculty in helping students succeed personally and academically."

The pinning ceremony was hosted by the College's Center for Teaching, Learning, and

Innovation (CTLI), which partnered with ACUE to facilitate the courses. ACUE courses address over 200 evidence-based teaching practices that include how to design an effective course, establish a productive learning environment, use active learning techniques, promote higher-order thinking, and utilize assessments to inform instruction and promote learning.

# HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE RECEIVES INSIGHT INTO DIVERSITY 2022 HIGHER EDUCATION EXCELLENCE IN DIVERSITY (HEED) AWARD

udson County Community College has once again received the Higher Education Excellence in Diversity (HEED) Award from INSIGHT Into Diversity Magazine, the oldest and largest diversity-focused publication in higher education. The annual award recognizes colleges and universities in the United States that demonstrate outstanding commitment to diversity and inclusion. HCCC is one of just seven community colleges among the 103 colleges and universities to receive this year's award. The recipients will be featured in the November 2022 issue of INSIGHT Into Diversity Magazine.

"We are very proud to accept this national award for the second year in a row," said HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber. "The 2022 HEED Award honors the College's collective efforts and best practices in support of student success and diversity, equity, and inclusion. This recognition of excellence is the result of the entire College family's dedication and contributions, and the strong support of our Board of Trustees."

"The HEED Award process consists of a comprehensive and rigorous application that includes questions relating to the recruitment and

retention of students and employees — and best practices for both — such as leadership support for diversity, campus culture and climate, supplier diversity, and many other aspects of campus diversity and inclusion," said Lenore Pearlstein, publisher of INSIGHT Into Diversity Magazine.

"We take a detailed approach to reviewing each application in deciding who will be named a HEED Award recipient. Our standards are high, and we look for institutions where diversity and inclusion are woven into the work being done every day across their campus."

#### HUDSON COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE PRESIDENT NAMED TO NJBIZ 'EDUCATION POWER 50' FOR SECOND YEAR IN A ROW

udson County Community College (HCCC) Board of Trustees Chair, William J. Netchert, Esq., announced that HCCC President Dr. Christopher Reber has been named to this year's NJBIZ "Education Power 50" list.

The 2022 list honors educators and administrators who are meeting the interrupted learning challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, rectifying historical inequities, and addressing the needs of New Jersey's important economic sectors. In announcing the honorees, NJBIZ Chief Editor, Jeffrey Kanige, wrote: "As education evolved along with the economy, these individuals will ensure that the next generation - and the one after that - will be equipped to move the state forward. They are producing new health care professionals to meet serious medical needs. They are ensuring that communities of color will be better able to participate in the economic growth most business leaders expect at least over the medium term. And they are imparting skills that will enhance the trades we all depend upon to make our lives easier and more enjoyable."

"This is the second year in a row that *NJBIZ* has recognized Dr. Reber with this honor," Mr. Netchert stated. "We are very proud of him, and all he has done to promote student success, and diversity, equity and inclusion, and to address the unprecedented systemic challenges of achieving lasting improvement in the Hudson County workforce ecosystem."

Dr. Reber, who was installed as HCCC President in July 2018, tirelessly and passionately advocates Hudson County Community College (HCCC) as well as state and national community college priorities. As HCCC President, he created the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (PACDEI); established the Vice President for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion position and Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion; instituted the "Hudson Helps Resource Center" to promote student retention and success through wraparound services to support the holistic needs of students; initiated "Hudson Scholars," an awardwinning student retention and support program poised to become a national model for community college best practices promoting student success; formed community and corporate partnerships that promote upward social and economic mobility for students and community members, including the Gateway to Innovation program that received a \$1,050,000 award from JPMorgan Chase.

His leadership throughout the pandemic resulted in the formation of the HCCC Return to Campus Task Force comprised of students, faculty, and staff; the College's investment in technology to offer courses, programs, and services remotely and online; providing free Chromebooks to all students in need; the preparation and distribution of more

than 11,000 readyto-heat meals by the HCCC Culinary Arts Institute students and chefs; and the HCCC vaccine initiative program that provided \$100 incentives for students to become fully vaccinated strengthening and prioritizing the health and safety of all. His administration also waived \$4.8 million in outstanding financial balances for more than 5,000 HCCC

students during the pandemic. Because of the culture of caring and connectedness Dr. Reber nurtured, HCCC students have proudly coined the phrase, "Hudson is Home!"

Christopher Reber has devoted his entire 40-yearplus career to higher education, serving as President of the Community College of Beaver County (2014-18); Executive Dean and Campus Executive Officer of Venango College of Clarion University of Pennsylvania (2002-14); Associate Provost for Advancement and University Relations, Dean of Student Affairs, and Affiliate Assistant Professor of Education at Pennsylvania State University at Erie, The Behrend College (1987-2002); Director of Human Resource Development Division, and Director of Lifelong Learning at Lakeland Community College (1984-87); and other positions earlier in his career. He holds a Postdoctoral Certificate from the Institute for Educational Management, Graduate School of Education at Harvard University; Ph.D. in Higher Education from the University of Pittsburgh; M.A. in College Student Personnel Administration from Bowling Green State University; and B.A. in Latin from Dickinson College.

Dr. Reber is the recipient of the 2022 Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) Northeast Regional Chief Executive Officer Award; Hudson County Chamber of Commerce's inaugural "Spirit Award" presented at the 2021 Chamber Legends Gala; 2020 Phi Theta Kappa Middle States Regional Award of Excellence; and 2019 Phi Theta Kappa Paragon Award.

"Being named to the 2022 NJBIZ Education Power 50 represents the transformational opportunities that have been achieved for our students and our community by working with my HCCC colleagues, our community, corporate partners, and elected officials," Dr. Reber stated. "I am proud to share this award with all of them."

"Through this partnership with ACUE, which began in December 2019, 64 faculty have amassed 3,978 hours of professional development to improve student success and enhance teaching practices. We are proud of this stellar accomplishment by all completers," said Dr. Paula Roberson, Director of the College's CTLI. "The faculty completed a significant and meaningful certificate program during the height of the pandemic. They persisted while balancing the transition of their courses to an online format to become better educators and improve student learning."

"ACUE has given me the ability and confidence to attempt new teaching techniques and activities. In addition, ACUE has encouraged me to view my teaching, classroom organization, and management from the student's perspective," said Nancy Saliba, Lecturer of Nursing.

Numerous independently validated impact studies show that students learn more and that equity gaps close when courses are led by ACUE certified faculty.

This Collection reveals aspects of America's and New Jersey's rich artistic and cultural history from the Hudson River School period to today. In recent years, the College's acquisition efforts have focused on strengthening its American and New Jersey modern and contemporary collections.

#### **Artist News:**

If you like the work of Chakaia Booker, Luis Cruz Azaceta, Jaune Quick-to-See Smith, and Juan Sanchez permanently on view at Hudson County Community College, you might enjoy visiting the Zimmerli Art Museum at Rutgers University, 71 Hamilton Street, New Brunswick, where you can see more work by these artists in a temporary exhibit called "American Stories: Gifts from the Jersey City Museum Collection" until December 30. Admission is free. These works were originally part of the Jersey City Museum, which now makes its home at Rutgers. According to the museum, 'American Stories' highlights works by a wide range of artists and provides an inclusive view of American art and life through a local lens." Teresita Fernandez' work is on view on the first floor of the Gabert Library in the small wood-and-glass cabinet on the wall opposite the entrance. She was recently interviewed by the National Gallery of Art as part of their "Artists at Work" series. Fernandez spoke about the role of landscape in her art. She said, "I'm trying to radically redefine and reframe how it is we think about place and about landscape. It's less about the framed vista in front of your eyes...and more about understanding what happened there, who lived there, the less visible aspects of the landscape." She referred to her epic work, Fire: United States of the Americas, which is a huge map of the United States in charcoal—each state is surrounded by white space. (It is currently on view at the Philadelphia Museum through January 2023.) She says, "What I'm asking viewers to do is to actually find themselves, and to look for themselves in the landscape and to be curious about their connection and their implied role within the social, historic and political constructs. For me, the history of the land is really the history of power: who gets to be visible and who is invisible..." She adds about the work: "It's very strange to see these geometric shapes that are about domain and how land has been conquered and divvied up in these parcels that are very geometric and have nothing to do with the natural formations of the land itself." A limited-edition print by Meret Oppenheim is on view on the first floor of 2 Enos Place. Starting October 30 through March 4, the Museum of Modern art will exhibit her work in a large retrospective (over 200 pieces) called "Meret Oppenheim: My Exhibition." Admission for full-time students is \$14, unfortunately, and the Museum's "free" night is only open to NYC residents. However restrictive the museum's new admission policies are, it is nonetheless worth considering some things Oppenheim is famous for saying: "Nobody will give you freedom," she said in her 1975 acceptance speech for the City of Basel Art Prize. "You have to take it." A pioneer in her thinking about gender, Oppenheim also said she disliked the term "woman artist." Instead, the artist spoke of "androgyny of the spirit" as necessary to make fine art. She added, "If you speak a new language of your own, that others have yet to learn ... you may have to wait a very long time for a positive echo."

At the Jewish Museum, 1109 Fifth Avenue at 92nd Street in New York City through January

8, 2023 is the exhibit, "New York: 1962-1964." The Museum is free on Saturdays. The show examines "how artists living and working in New York responded to their rapidly changing world, through more than 150 works of art-all made or seen in New York between 1962 and 1964." In that three-year period, America witnessed what the museum refers to as "epoch-changing events—such as the Cuban Missile Crisis (1962), March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom (1963), and the assassination of President John F. Kennedy (1963) [that] fundamentally altered the social and political landscape of [...] the nation. An unprecedented economic boom broadened the array of available consumer goods, and an expanding media network introduced new voices into increasingly urgent conversations about race, class, and gender." The exhibit includes many works by artists whose work is on display on our campus, including: Roy Lichtenstein, Agnes Martin, Robert Rauschenberg, Faith Ringgold, Miriam Schapiro, Carolee Schneemann, and Andy Warhol, among others.

# YOUR HOME IS MY HOME EXHIBIT CELEBRATING HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH OPENED AT THE DINEEN-HULL GALLERY

#### HCCC FOUNDATION AWARDS OVER \$200K IN SCHOLARSHIPS

he Hudson County Community College Foundation has awarded more than \$200,000 in scholarships to 77 students for the 2022-23 academic year. Student recipients come from various backgrounds and interests. Eight of the recipients completed their high school education outside the United States.

Our scholars are eager to meet the donors who have made this transformative impact on their lives, and our donors are eager to hear the students' stories and celebrate with them and their families.

The 2022 HEED Award recognizes HCCC for its efforts to recruit historically under-represented and first-generation students and its initiatives to recruit and retain a diverse faculty. The award also honors the College for its programs dedicated to student success and retention, including the ground-breaking "Hudson Scholars" program. "Hudson Scholars" is a tripartite model of student support providing proactive advisement, financial support, and early academic intervention that received the League for Innovation in the Community College "2021-22 Innovation of the Year Award." The other categories that earned HCCC this national recognition are excellence in diversity planning and accountability; diversityfocused financial strategies; diversity and unconscious bias training; multicultural branding and communications techniques; supplier diversity; development of cultural competency; and understanding and addressing issues of campus climate.

Hudson County Community College serves one of the most ethnically and racially diverse communities in the United States. In 2019, Dr. Reber established the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (PACDEI), a team of 40 students, faculty, staff, alumni, trustees, and external community members. PACDEI, through collaborations and partnerships, has played an essential role in the organic development of an inclusive institutional climate. At the time of PACDEI's inception, HCCC administered a College-wide climate survey. The survey results informed the development of four Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) overarching goals that served as the foundation of PACDEI's comprehensive DEI Action Plan.

These DEI goals are interwoven in the College's updated Mission, Vision, and Values statements, and the Board of Trustees' Goals, Academic Master Plan, 2021-24 College Strategic Plan, and Student Success Action Plan.

Led by Yeurys Pujols, the College's Vice President for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, the HCCC Office for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion includes Accessibility Services, Cultural Affairs, and oversight of Title IX operations. The Office of DEI is charged with promoting an institutional climate that embraces and celebrates differences while championing equitable and inclusive practices, policies, and procedures in all activities for all community members. This includes support for HCCC offices and divisions in establishing guidelines and practices for recruitment and hiring, screening committee policies, promotion considerations, and succession planning; creating clear and transparent processes for safety, security, and incident reporting that are free of intimidation and respectful of confidentiality; and building community and a sense of belonging for students by advancing their academic development, professional growth, and personal transformation. Hudson County Community College has also been recognized recently with other national and regional DEI awards including the "2022 Great College to Work For" Award from the Great Colleges to Work For® program; the "2022 Most Promising Places to Work in Community Colleges" from the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD) in collaboration with Diverse: Issues in Higher Education; 2021 INSIGHT Into Diversity HEED Award; and Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) 2021 Equity Award for the Northeastern United States.

#### NJ BLUEBERRIES AND HEALTH DISPARITIES

t the invitation of Dory Dickson, Director, Migrant Worker Outreach, Kathy Smith-Wenning, Director Health-Related Programs, joined a group of healthcare outreach workers to visit blueberry farm migrant camps in Hammonton, NJ. There are 56 blueberry farms located in Atlantic County. Eighty percent of New Jersey blueberries are from Hammonton farms.

This trip provided an inside view into the lives of migrant farm workers. Smith-Wenning spoke with individuals from Haiti, Guatemala, and Mexico about life in the camp. Their stories provide case study background information for the course HLT 218 Health Disparities in the U.S.

In public health, migrant workers and families are considered special populations; their needs are complicated by access to few healthcare services. The good news: Southern Jersey Family Medical Centers has two mobile vans dedicated to bringing medical care to the camps. During the visit, representatives from both Jefferson Health NJ and Virtua Hospital Voorhees witnessed the critical need and discussed possibilities of expanding their reach into the camps to provide needed care.

Scholarship App at least once a semester to update or complete your app. Keep your application updated and relevant.

- 3. Meet the Requirements. Be honest on the eligibility quiz. Sounds so simple, right? Tricking the system to force an application open causes you to waste time if you aren't really eligible.
- 4. Apply Early. Get started working on your app as early as possible to provide ample time to finesse content before the deadline. Essays are usually the most heavily weighted item on an application. It's worth your effort to invest the most time on this portion of your application.
- 5. Get Personal. In it to win it? Let's get real the more candid you are with telling your story and how it has motivated you in your personal and academic pursuits, the greater chance you'll have of your app resonating with a judge. Increase the odds of scoring well by telling your story well.
- 6. Proofing Party. Different strokes for different folks. Having multiple sets of eyes on your application can help strengthen entries, spot grammatical errors, and create cohesive content. Host a proofing party to inspire peer reviewing.

Professional Association, Academic Administrative Association, Adjunct Faculty Federation, and Support Staff Federation. The fresh sense of collegiality and collaboration resulted in new, three-year contracts for all four collective bargaining units being resoundingly approved in May of this year by the HCCC Board of Trustees.

In 2019, Dr. Reber created the President's Council on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (PACDEI). The council consists of more than 40 members of the HCCC community – students, faculty, staff, and external community members who work together to foster a welcoming, diverse, equitable, and inclusive environment that embraces and celebrates shared values among all constituencies.

One of the first projects undertaken by PACDEI was a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) climate survey that was distributed to the entire College community. Responses from more than 800 individuals - students, trustees, faculty, staff and administrators - formed the basis for the development of four key goals: (1) Supporting an inclusive culture of care at HCCC, including DEI infrastructure and training, programs and initiatives across the College; (2) Weaving Diversity, Equity and Inclusion guidelines and best practices into recruitment and hiring practices, screening committee polices, promotional considerations, and succession planning for more diverse faculty, staff and administrators; (3) Creating clear and transparent processes for safety, security and incident reporting that are free of intimidation and respectful of confidentiality; and (4) Building community and a sense of belonging for students

by advancing their academic development, professional growth, and personal transformation. In Summer 2021, HCCC established the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, and appointed the first Vice President for that area, reporting to the President as a member of the College cabinet.

To support the College's commitment to bringing salaries to market rate over time, HCCC engaged in a two-year study by Evergreen Solutions, LLC to evaluate and update compensation and classification systems in order to help ensure internal and external equity. By December 2021 the College circulated the study recommendations to union leadership and the College community at large. An HCCC employee tweeted: "My institution hired a firm to do a compensation and classification study and has made the entire report, with all the recommendations, public to the college community. This is how you model transparency."

Dr. Reber believes the College has been successful in supporting students in large measure because HCCC supports the professional development and success of faculty and staff. HCCC provides a comprehensive offering of professional development opportunities including participation in the "Teaching at a Community or Technical College" program through the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD); offering Professional Development Day workshops; hosting the Annual Adjunct Faculty Conference; organizing and holding College Service Day and Convocation each fall and spring; developing and offering an All College Faculty Orientation; making Association of College and

University Educators (ACUE) certificate training, E-Cornell Diversity and Inclusion certificate training, and Title IX training available to faculty, staff, and students; and offering up to \$9,000 annually for each full-time employee to participate in approved credential attainment and professional development activities.

HCCC also makes it possible for faculty and staff to attend in-person conferences, workshops and institutes, and participate in webinars hosted by Achieving the Dream, Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT), American Association of Community Colleges (AACC), NISOD, Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU), Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society, College and University Professional Association (CUPA) for Human Resources, American College Personnel Association, National Conference on Race and Ethnicity in Higher Education, and many others.

An employee who was honored for twenty years of service at HCCC wrote to thank the College for commemorating the milestone with a special plaque and pin: "I wanted to thank everyone from the bottom of my heart. I really loved it, and it made me proud to be an employee of the College and let me know that all those years of service are appreciated by Hudson County Community College administration and Board of Trustees. I just had to let you know how grateful I am to be a part of HCCC."

## **ALUMNI CORNER**

## Anna Tivade

#### Associate of Arts-Liberal Arts

#### What factors led you to decide to attend Hudson County Community College?

During high school, I went to Vo-Tech, so college wasn't in my immediate plans. However, after a couple of years working full-time and seeing my friends further themselves in college, I decided to change my life trajectory and enter college. HCCC was close to my home and job, and it didn't feel intimidating or too far out of my reach.

#### What is your favorite memory of the College, in or out of the classroom?

I have so many favorite memories of my time at HCCC I could write a novel! However, what stands out the most is the supportive environment and engaging professors that inspired my deep passion for learning! Before college, I greatly struggled with my learning differences, which I now know is due to ADHD, and my confidence took a huge hit. My fondest memories at HCCC include sitting in classes with the awareness that I was intelligent, interested, and valued! HCCC is where I had a significant paradigm shift!

#### How did you become interested in psychology?

Psych 101 was one of my first classes at HCCC, and I immediately became fascinated with psychology! I also really enjoyed sociology. Thus, I knew I wanted to further my education in the social sciences. Fast forward several years, I was looking for support for parenting issues and struggled to find what I needed, so I took a class on starting a mutual support group. After several years of creating and facilitating groups for parents experiencing high conflict divorce and parental alienation, I became very aware of my talent and passion, which helped guide my path to complete a master's degree in social work and become a psychotherapist.

#### How did your time at HCCC prepare you for your career/ life now?

I refer to my answer about my fondest memories. However, to expand, I enrolled in HCCC when my confidence was the size of a grain of sand. I had many faulty thoughts about my intelligence and was unaware that I was struggling with ADHD. However, after a very short time at HCCC, my confidence grew wild like an unbridled horse. The small class sizes encouraged one-on-one dialogue with the professors. The supportive environment provided many options for evening classes with other "older" students. The intimate size of HCCC offered many opportunities to improve my social skills, practice vulnerability, and develop friendships. Today, as a psychotherapist, I often provide this type of space and understanding to others as they grow their confidence. I pay it forward daily in my career.

#### What is a typical work day for you?

As a psychotherapist in a private practice, I make a schedule that works for me. I drive my kids to school every morning, and on days that I am responsible for dinner, I put together a crock pot meal. When I'm using my best self-care habits, I typically journal, meditate, do some yoga and enjoy a cup of herbal tea and coffee before heading to work. While at work, I often see about 25 clients a week



and thoroughly enjoy engaging them and walking with them on their therapeutic journeys. I use an eclectic approach, which includes family systems, cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT), mindfulness, emotionally focused therapy (EFT) and somatic approaches. I write progress notes between clients. I schedule my work so that I have time to be present for my children and their activities as much as possible, go on morning coffee dates or hikes with my husband, and take mini-travel trips by myself.

#### Who are your biggest inspirations that have impacted your work in some way?

I take a lot of my inspiration from others I observe. Mister Rogers was my first inspiration who brought love and unconditional acceptance into my daily life with the words, "There's no person in the whole world like you, and I like you just the way you are." Through her book, It Takes a Village, Hillary Clinton helped me first understand systems and communities. Dr. Dan Tomasulo introduced me to Positive Psychology in his class at NJCU, and I use his examples from his book, Learned Hopefulness in therapy sessions. Dr. Mark Lyall ignited my passion and drive to become a therapist in his counseling class at NJCU and through an intensive weekend called "Collective Momentum." Brene Brown, who reminds us that vulnerability is a good thing. Finally, Professor Ted Lai and his tireless and steady work as an advisor to Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society-where I first gained the skills to become a leader.

#### What advice would you give to recent HCCC graduates?

To borrow the words of Mister Rogers, "You've made this day a special day, by just your being you. There's nobody in the whole world like you." Take that quote and remember how amazing and important you are. Take the zest and motivation you gained at HCCC and keep on going with it because an object in motion stays in motion.
