

What is a Learning Community (LC)?

An LC is a small community of students and faculty learning together in an exciting and unique way. An LC links two or more interdisciplinary courses around a common theme, and a group of students takes this set of linked classes together, for a semester.

What are the goals of a Learning Community (LC)?

The primary goals of a Learning Community are:

- to increase student-student interaction and student-faculty interaction
- to improve students' learning and academic achievement
- to increase students' engagement and retention

What are the "special features" of a Learning Community (LC courses)?

- The two faculty members of an LC work together to help students progress in ALL the linked classes of a Learning Community.
- Class work and projects of the linked LC courses are connected and coordinated so that students are provided multiple exposures to the content.
- LC Academic Coaches (trained tutors) are provided to help students in and out of the class.
- Field trips and special events are planned and integrated.
- In an ESL/AF Learning Community, the linked English classes are specially designed to help students learn the concepts and the specific vocabulary of the linked College course. Thus, while these LC students improve on their English reading and writing skills, they earn college credits for the linked college course.

What are the benefits of a Learning Community?

Based on the last five years' LC assessment reports:

- LC students are 10% to 30% more likely to PASS the departmental tests (end of the semester exams) than their peers in traditional classes.
- Because of the supportive environment, LC students are LESS likely to withdraw from a course.
- Because of their positive experience, LC students are 10% to 15% more likely to RETURN to college the subsequent semester.
- Because of increased student engagement in class, LC students build strong friendships and develop group and leadership skills.

Who can sign up for a Learning Community?

Students from one of the three groups can sign up for a Learning Community: College Ready students, Academic Foundation students, and ESL students.

How are students graded in Learning Communities?

Although the LC courses are linked and the class assignments/projects are integrated, each of the LC courses has its own objectives and evaluation criteria. As a result, students in a Learning Community will earn a separate grade for each LC course, exactly as it would be for any other non-LC course.
